program provides graduate level study of all aspects of banking, economics and related subjects.

Sponsored by 15 Southern state bankers associations in cooperation with the Division of graduate Education at LSU, the banking school requires attendance on campus for three years, with extensive home study assignments between sessions. The faculty consists of 125 bankers, business and professional leaders, and educators from all parts of the U.S.

During their three years at the School of Banking, students receive 180 hours of classroom instruction, thirty hours of reviews, planned evening study and written final examinations at the end of each session.

Iris Young frequently recalls childhood experiences which remind her of her father, Colson Stevens. With his increased appreciation for the lessons she learned from him, comes a regret that her children are

deprived of this association. The poems he quoted to his children, she says, were reflective of his values. He entertained whoever in the family that was sick by singing songs such as "The Wreck of the Twenty-seven". Among his favorite poems was "Abou BenAdem".

Iris says what she remembers most about her daddy was his friendliness. He was always pleasant and cheerful and had a way of making the other person feel special. His conversation, she recalls, was always sprinkled with wit and jokes. He never was vicious or spiteful.

Iris says her dad frequently emphasized that a person could never profit by lying or cheating. "He told us we might lie or steal and get away with it for the moment, but we would be sure to lose something we valued highly if we did."

She says he loved and admired his four daughters-in-law, but felt obligated to denounce his seven sons-in-law frequently, lest they believe themselves good enough for his daughters. He never had many possessions, but never wanted money. Once she said, grandchild asked, "Papaw, are you poor?" and he quietly replied that some people might think so, but he considered himself richly blessed.

Council hires Hurd as police chief streets named for Young and Parsons

The City of Mt. Vernon has finally gotten a Police Chief. In a unanimous decision, the council voted Monday a night to make Ronnie Hurd police chief and give him a \$100 per month increase in pay. Mayor Roland Mullins told the council, before Hurd was promoted, that it was his place to recommend a police chief and the council could vote on his recommendation. Mullins said if the council did not accept his recommendation, then he could make another and so on.

Mullins then began asking each councilman who they wanted to be chief. Councilman Ernie Tolle said that if the council, as a whole, was going to go along with the officer with the most seniority on the force then he would have to pick officer Hurd because he had the same training as the other officers. Councilmen Pete Hurd, Tom Welch, Conard Parrett and Joel Gentry all agreed with Tolle. The other council member, Roger McClure, was not present for the meeting.

After hearing each council member's recommendation, Mayor Mullins went along with naming Hurd chief. He told Hurd, as he was appointed, that he (the Mayor) did not want him reporting to anyone except himself (the Mayor) and that he (Hurd) would be responsible for the equipment and for keeping good relations between the five police officers.

In other business, Mayor Mullins brought up the fact that the city had two streets for which there was no name. Mullins told the council that there were two men in the city who had always come to the aid when called upon. Joe Young, who has filled unexpired terms on the council several times and Tommy Parsons, who did paper work on a grant for the city that no one else would do for less than \$7,500.

The Mayor asked one of the council members to make a motion that the ordinance requiring factories in the Industrial Park and the Vocational School to do tests on their water once every three months to make sure that no chemicals are being deposited in the sewer system that cannot be disposed of properly.

The council voted to have Mary McClure, city clerk, contact a state agency dealing with this area, and ask them to have a representative at the next council meeting to talk about such tests, the costs and what it would involve.

Dwight Griffin, local CPA, was awarded the audit for both the water and sewer, general fund and revenue sharing. Griffin was the only bidder on the audit with a bid of \$1,500.

A quick glance at the budget shows an estimated income by the city of \$414,418 for both the general fund and water and sewer budget. Salaries for the coming year were estimated as follows: city attorney, \$1,900; city clerk, \$1,022 (general fund portion); city treasurer, \$1,022; water and sewer department, \$72,000; police department, \$41,500 and administration, \$2,400.

Fathers Remembered

The tribute paid to fathers sometimes seems minimized since Father's Day follows Mother's Day and the celebration is then squeezed between Memorial Day and the Fourth of July.

But when adults reflect upon a good childhood and pleasant early memories, it often involves remembrances which include a loving father who provided stability.

When Zelma Hansel thinks of her dad, Everett Chaney, she thinks of his music. He sang tenor in the gospel group, the Red-bud Quartet, which sang at Rensselaer Valley in the early days. Zelma said when they lived in the country in Pulaski County before moving to Mt. Vernon, she took part in all the surrounding "singings". Later, he was, for years, a faithful member of the church choir at First Baptist.

At home after leaving the grocery store, his daughters says he was going to bed. He sat and read the paper and sometimes listened to the radio before going to bed.

She said he liked to boast that he and his wife has never had a fuss. But, Zelma says, that was because he merely sat and listened when her mother quarreled and never said anything back.

Zelma was the middle one of three daughters born to the Chaney's. She said when her dad corrected them, they obeyed. She only remembers one time

when he became aggravated enough to strike them. She said she and Irene, her older sister, were arguing at the dinner table and he picked up a broom and swatted them with it. It was enough to leave a lasting impression.

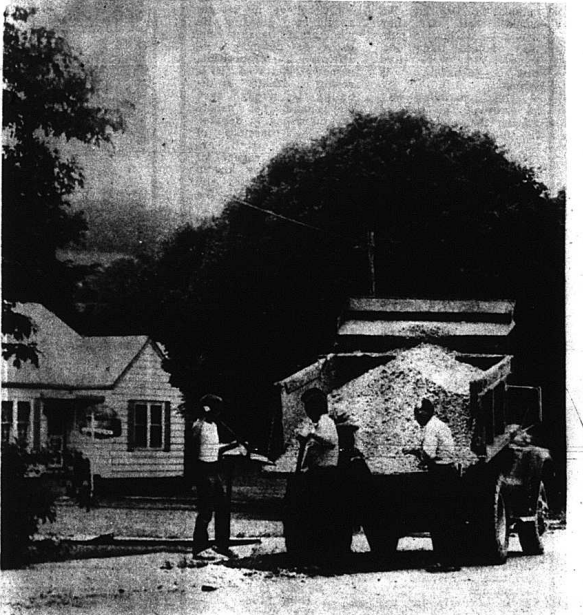
Near the end of his life, Zelma said her dad made the statement that if he had his life to live over he wouldn't change a thing, a statement, she says few of us could make.

Irene Bales and Bernice Sams are Zelma's sisters.

Elsie Shivel remembers her father as a quiet family man who was good to his family and gave them everything he could. She said when Mart Cromer worked at the stone quarry all his life to support his family and added extra support for his seven children by farming. His daughter says he firmly believed that everyone, including the children, should work. She said mornings when it was pouring rain, she'd say, "Dad, surely, you're not going to work today. And he would reply, "Been many a day's work lost waiting for it to rain," then he'd go to work, hoping the rain would stop.

They had no mode of transportation and Elsie said he carried home, on his shoulders, the groceries, sacks of meal, flour, and other staples as he came from work.

She also remembers the family walking from church at night and, after her father had worked all day, he would carry her home on his back because she was

Speaking Where the Bible Speaks

Jehovah's Witnesses refuse to Debate

Recently Jehovah's Witnesses knocked on our door wanting to discuss their "doctrines and heresies" (2 Pet. 2:1). We asked them if they would be willing to publicly debate their doctrines and were told that "debating is wrong."

One face-saving way of escaping the test of placing their doctrines in the open to be examined by the Word of God is to say that it is wrong to debate. It is easy to go around teaching whatever you wish and not have to debate it. Only a coward will hide behind the skirts of the idea that debating is wrong.

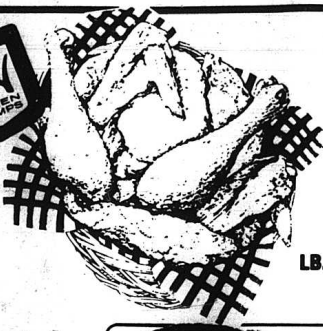
Some think the Bible condemns debating. The word "debate" is found twice in the King James version of the Bible-Rom. 1:29 and 2 Cor. 12:20. In both places it is translated "trifle" in the American Standard version. This word is derived from a term which means "a disposition to be quarrelsome and contentious, and is an outgrowth of enmity" (W.E. Vine). If a man to do a manifestation of bitterness, strife and hatred, certainly it would be wrong. But to say that debating is wrong is to take a position which will get one into trouble with many passages of Scripture. Christians are commanded to "CONTEND earnestly for the faith" (Jude 3). Solomon says, "Debate the cause with thy neighbor" (Prov. 25:9). Do these passages command us to violate Rom. 1:29 and 2 Cor. 12:20? Does the Bible contradict itself? Jesus was constantly engaged in debates with the religious leaders of His time. Did He do wrong? Those who say they don't believe in debates should stop debating. He who argues against debating is debating. He affirms a proposition, namely, "Resolved, it is wrong to debate." If debating is wrong, then one should not debate that is wrong to debate. Those conscious of having the truth are willing and eager for the truth to be known and fear no honest and fair investigation. The man who professes to believe a thing, but cringes back and refuses to openly defend it, either knows he has not the truth, or is more in love with his own opinion than that he is with the truth.

We ask the Jehovah's Witnesses to give us an answer for the reason concerning the hope that is in them (1 Pet. 3:15), and request that they "prove all things" (1 Thess. 5:21) in a public discussion. Will they publicly defend their "no hell" doctrine? We shall not be expecting them to do so, but if they have the truth, they have nothing to fear by having it investigated. Merchants will gladly "plug" their wares unless they know they're green!

Selective Service releases State registration data

The Selective Service System has released update statistics showing the compliance rates for registration of young men both at the national and state level. These statistics include the total results of the grace period registration granted by President Reagan and reflect registrations as of March 31, 1982.

At the national level, there is a 93% compliance with registration for all age groups, men born in 1960, 91, 92, 93 and the first 3 months of 1984.

Montana leads the nation with a compliance rate of 97.5%. At the median level are states like Texas and Indiana both at 91%. California has the lowest compliance rate in the nation at 83.4%. Other examples-New York 86%, Ohio 92%, Illinois 88%, Florida 94%.

Kentucky's young men have a 91.10% compliance with Selective Service registration.

By law, young men are required to register with Selective Service as they reach their 18th birthday—either 30 days before or after it. The registration re-

quirement applies to all men born in 1960 and later years. Failure to register is a felony, carrying a maximum penalty of \$10,000 and/or five years in prison.

Later this month, Selective Service will cross-reference the computer tapes containing the names of men who have registered against Social Security files to identify those who have not registered. Those failing to register will be referred to the Justice Department for possible prosecution.

Taylor L. Davidson, the Selective Service State Director of Kentucky, is urging those who have not already registered to go to the Post Office at once and so on. "It's an easy procedure—all a young man must do is fill out a simple form which asks only for his name, address, telephone number, social security number and date of birth. He should take some form of identification with him to show the postoffice clerk when he signs the registration form. Late registrations are being accepted."

Fishing Report

Cooler weather has caused water temperatures to fall a few degrees at most of Kentucky's large lakes, and fishing is generally fair around the state. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

Kentucky: catfish fair on cut bait and nightcrawlers off rocky points and rip rap; bluegill fair along shoreline cover; in tailwaters, catfish fair to good; clear to murky stable at summer pool and 77 degrees.

Barkley: bluegill fair to good along shoreline cover; catfish slow along rocky banks; white bass slow in the jumps; in tailwaters, bluegill good, catfish slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees. Barren: black bass fair to good early and late on plastic worms and jig-n-egg combinations around points and drop offs; white bass fair to good night fishing over channels; bluegill fair off steep banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

Nolin: white bass good in the jumps; crappie fair around stick ups; black bass slow casting crank-

baits and spinner baits off points; clear, falling, one foot above summer pool and 80 degrees. Rough River: bluegill fair still fishing worms or crickets off steep banks and around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

Herrington: black bass fair casting plastic worms at night along steep banks; bluegill fair on crickets off steep banks; clear to murky to muddy, rising, five feet above summer pool and 82 degrees.

Green: bluegill fair to good off steep points; catfish fair to good still fishing nightcrawlers and on trotlines; clear to murky, falling, one foot above summer pool and 82 degrees.

Cumberland: walleye fair to good casting live nightcrawlers off points and by trolling deep runners along points and steep banks in main lake; catfish fair drift fishing in coves (20-25 feet deep); white bass slow at night off steep banks; clear to murky, falling slowly, at 78 degrees.

Dale Hollow: bluegill fair off points and along steep banks; white bass slow night fishing over river channel, 20-25 feet deep; clear to murky, stable at one foot above normal pool and 80 degrees.

Laurel: trout good at night off steep banks; bluegill fair around stickups, black bass fair casting spinner baits and plastic worms in coves; clear, stable at one foot below power pool and 78 degrees.

Cave Run: murky good casting medium to deep runners along shoreline cover; bluegill slow on worms or crickets fishing from the bank; clear to murky to muddy, falling, five feet above summer pool and 77 degrees.

Buckhorn: catfish and drum good on worms or crawfish in head of lake; bluegill slow on worms or crickets fishing from the bank; clear to murky to muddy, falling, five feet above summer pool and 77 degrees.

Buckhorn: catfish and drum good on worms or

crayfish in head of lake; bluegill slow along steep banks; clear to murky to muddy, at summer pool and 77 degrees.

Grayson: crappie slow over submerged cover; black bass slow on buzz baits and crank baits around stick ups and off points; clear to murky, falling, two feet above summer pool and 80 degrees.

Dewey: crappie fair over submerged cover (18-20 feet deep); clear to murky, falling, one foot above summer pool and 78 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow over submerged cover and around stickups; clear to murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

The 42 officers proved their abilities by passing more than 15 written and practical tests over such areas as criminal law, accident and criminal investigation, social services, first aid, firearms and management of human conflict. Officers receiving certification will be given salary increases under the Kentuc-

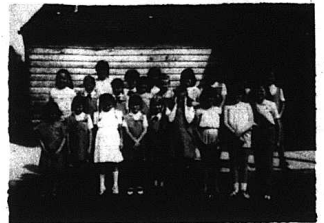
ky pay incentive program. To date, the Bureau of Training has trained 3,280 officers in the 10-week course.

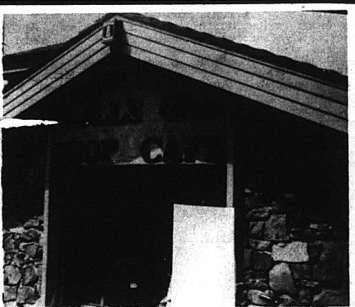

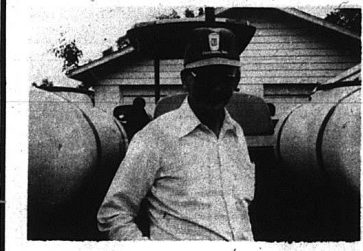

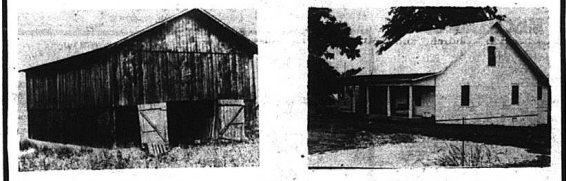
