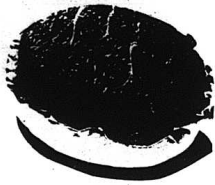

## Mt. Vernon gets new fire insurance rate from state

City officials and fire department members were pleased to learn this week that the city's fire insurance classification has been changed from Class 8 to Class 6.

The change comes as a result of recent evaluation by representatives of the Insurance Service Office of Kentucky, aided by local firemen.

The local fire department had anticipated the upgrading and had been working extra hours to get equipment and records in order to meet the require-

ments of the inspection.

The improved classification was due, in part, to upgraded equipment, including the new city fire truck purchased two years ago, according to Fire Chief John Cox. Other factors effecting the rate change were the methods and condition of records, the water department and the results of tests run on equipment.

Cox said the Insurance Service Office has been re-evaluating city fire departments every three years and are expected to test more often than that in

the future.

The new classification will allow for a reduction in most residents' fire insurance premiums; however, according to Cox, the decrease will likely be noted with the issuance of new policies and/or renewals and depends upon whether or not the insurance company in question uses the ISO rates or some other rate.

Residents should check with their insurance company to get the rate adjustment figures for their policies.

## Local schoolteacher abducted Monday; Returns home safely Tuesday night

A local man was abducted by two men early Monday morning on his way to summer school at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond.

Richard "Richie" Bray, assistant basketball coach at Rockcastle County High School, said in an interview Tuesday night that the two men, one black and one white and both around 40-years-old, pulled a gun on him and told him to drive to Louisville.

Bray said that Monday morning on his way to school, he stopped at the Standard station on the bypass in Richmond.

He said that he backed his car, a Ford Granada, up to the restrooms and went in, where he encountered the two men. Bray said the white man asked him if he was going to Louisville and Bray said he told them he was going to summer school up at the campus.

Bray said that the two men stayed in the car else and he later went outside to get in his car. He said that when he got in the car and started the engine, the two men opened the door on the car and said to him, "We're going to ride to campus." Bray said that he told them, "O.K."

The school teacher at RCHS, said that when they pulled out onto the road, the white man, who had gotten into the front seat with him (Bray), took a pistol from under the seat on his lap and told Bray, "I guess we're going to Louisville after all." Bray said that he told them he would and drove straight to Lexington. He said that he

started to say something to them they had some fear on the interstate, and when he did the white man stuck the gun in his ribs and said, "Shut up and drive." Bray said that the white man told him to get on I-64 in Lexington and go toward Louisville. He said the white man told him several times during the course of the day that if he would do everything they said him to do then he would not get hurt. Bray said that he did not say anything to either man throughout the encounter.

Bray said that when they got across the bridge through Louisville and into Indiana the two men told him to stop and get gas. He said that he stopped at a self-service pump and the two men told him to get out and pump the gas. He said the white man handed the black man a five dollar bill to watch Bray as he pumped the gas. Bray said that he considered making a run for it at this point but was afraid that he might fall down or something and he did not see anyone behind the car at this time. He said that after he pumped the gas, the white man asked him if he had gas money and Bray said that he took out his wallet and threw \$25.00 on the seat. The white man paid for the gas and they got back on the interstate, he said.

He said that when they traveled down the Illinois state line they saw four Illinois state police cars sitting together in the median. Bray said that the two men looked at each other and got very nervous. Bray said that they told him not

to get over 55 miles per hour. He said that the troopers made him very edgy, also, since he did not know if the troopers were looking for the two men with him or not but he said they did not bother his vehicle.

He said that when they got about 6 miles out of St. Louis, Missouri, the white man instructed him to take an exit in what Bray said he looked to be the black section of St. Louis. He said that the white man told him to go around behind a certain gas station a few miles off the exit and the black man got out of the car. He said that the white man then instructed him to drive back to a mall they had passed when they first got out of St. Louis. He said he was told to drive around behind the mall and the man told him, "See, I told you, you wouldn't get hurt," and he told Bray to get out. Bray said the man then drove off in his car and he stayed for a telephone in the mall.

He said that when he got hold of the operator he got him the right police department. He said that the police told him to stay there and wait until they arrived which was in about 15 minutes. He said they immediately began to search for his car, and about that time he arrived at the police station, an officer found his car in the opposite end of the mall. He said the officer went over the car taking fingerprints from it and the F.B.I., who was called in on the case by local police, advised him to stay overnight so they could get a clearer story and description the next day.

Bray said that the strange thing about the encounter was that when he paid for the gas in Indiana he took out the \$25.00 and then put his wallet back in his pocket and the two men never asked him for anything.

"One thing is for sure, it will make you talk to the man upstairs," Bray said. He said he missed the thing I was ever involved in."

Bray arrived home Tuesday evening around 6 p.m. after the seven-hour drive back from St. Louis, Missouri.

## Several laid-off at local hospital

An employee cutback affecting 23 of Rockcastle County Hospital's 144 employees was announced last Friday. "The cutback was painful," said board chairman Wayne Stewart, who further stated "the board would have liked to have been in a position to offer more jobs to local persons rather than lay-off from employed."

Stewart said the "temporary" lay-offs were due to what he termed a "seasonal" reduced patient load in the acute care wing which is where most of the cuts were made.

Most of those who were dismissed were part-time employees and, aides, he said, but there were reductions in all departments. He said he expected some employees to be called back as early as this week or next. Deason as the board has time to review the effects of the lay-offs and determine what each department can do to adjust to the current reduced patient load, without compromising patient care.

Stewart said the lay-offs were permanent, it would amount to approximately \$200,000 yearly in payroll cutbacks, however, Stewart said he anticipates the employee reduction to last about 3 months or until the patient load increases.

Stewart also said hospital officials are trying to come up with a 15% overall reduction in operating costs.

Several employees were laid-off at local hospital.

## Three year old drowns Friday in Lincoln

A three-year-old boy drowned late Friday afternoon in a farm pond about 300 yards from his grandparents' home near Crab Orchard in Lincoln County.

Joey Brummett apparently wandered away with three other children about 5 p.m., according to Lincoln County coroner, Bobby Martin. Martin said that when the child's father, Ricky Brummett, missed the children and looked for them, he found them at the pond and Joey was in the water.

Efforts to revive the child at the scene failed as did resuscitation efforts by an area rescue squad.

The child was dead upon arrival at the Ft. Logan Memorial Hospital in Stanford. Martin ruled the drowning accidental.

Joey Lane Brummett was born in Lincoln County, June 3, 1979, the son of Ricky Brummett and Barbara Denney Brummett.

Survivors, besides his parents, include: two sisters, Misty Sue and Michelle, both of Route 1, Crab Orchard, his maternal grandparents, James Barnett and Pauline Denney and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Brummett, with whom he resided.

## Two local banks join others in area seeking long term mortgage loans

The Bank of Mt. Vernon and Citizens Bank in Brodhead are numbered among other Eastern Kentucky banks to join a consortium of banks aimed at providing long-term home mortgages with low down payments.

The banks hope to take advantage of federal programs which allow mortgage loans with 25 to 30 year terms and down payments as low as five to ten percent.

Bill James, vice president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, said Tuesday that presently terms to maturity tend to be seven to fifteen years, with down payments ranging from between 20 to 40 percent.

James said he perceives the unavailability of long term real estate loans with fixed interest rates and payments as one of the biggest problems in our local community. He said Farmers Home Administration is the only agency which offers loans of this

nature, locally.

Acting as a consortium, the objective is to get the federal government to simplify the underwriting procedures so that smaller banks can take advantage of low cost programs.

James said hopefully the banks, which were encouraged to unite by the Mountain Association for Economic Development (MAECD) for get things in place, with red tape already taken care of, so that when interest rates come down, small banks will be in a position to offer the new type loans.

**30% of Children Are Overweight**

Being overweight is one of the most health problems in the United States. Overweight people are in all age groups, including children.

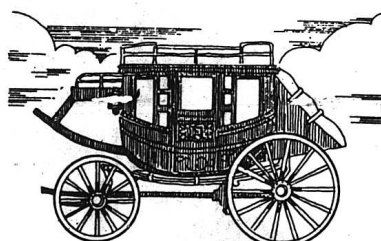

FOR YOUR EYES ONLY

A cataract is a cloudiness or opacity in the lens of the eye which interferes with vision. It is the leading cause of blindness in the U.S. today. As a cataract forms, the normally clear lens becomes increasingly more opaque. This partially blocks and distorts the passage of light to the back of the eye where the seeing is actually done.

Fortunately, cataracts need not mean blindness for most people. Cataract surgery to restore vision is successful in 95 percent of cases and is possible in very elderly patients. The general health is good.

Following removal of the cataract, a substitute lens must be used to restore clear vision. This may take the form of a small plastic lens implanted back into the eye in place of the real lens at the time of the cataract surgery. In certain cases, a contact lens or special eyeglasses may be more suitable.

A cataract itself cannot be treated with eye-drops or other medications, and there is no known way of preventing the most common form of cataract—those that are associated with advanced age.

It should be noted that in their earlier stages cataracts can improve vision and the patient's seeing can remain at their best level with a slight change in the eyeglass prescription.

Anyone suspecting that they have a problem with cataracts should have a thorough eye examination at regular intervals.

With current medical techniques the problem of cataracts and cataract surgery, if needed, has become greatly reduced over the past decade.

many strings until they are more mature. The pods may be left whole, broken like green beans or cut on a diagonal. Blanch for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes, boiling water, cool in ice water and thoroughly drain. Then package them in freezer bags, remove much air, fasten and freeze. Allow the pods the thaw in the refrigerator before using them in combination dishes.

**To Cook in Water**  
Cook the peas over medium heat in 1 inch of boiling, salted water. Heat the pea pods to boiling, cover them and cook 4 to 8 minutes until the peas are tender but still crisp. Season with margarine, butter, bacon fat or salad oil.

**To Steam**  
Cook pods in a steamer over boiling water until tender, about five minutes. If a steamer is not available, use a strainer to hold vegetable above boiling water, using pea pods with one teaspoon margarine and one teaspoon soy sauce.

**To Stir-Fry**  
Cook in small amount of cooking oil, bacon fat or margarine until vegetable is tender, crisp and still has good color. The peas may be cooked in a skillet or a wok. Stir the peas constantly until tender. Frozen peas may be left whole, sliced on the diagonal or snapped. Allow two teaspoons oil or fat for one portion of peas.

**Stir-Fried Pea Pods**  
3 lb. fresh pea pods, 1/2 medium onion, chopped 2 pounds pea pods, tender salt and pepper to taste

Cook crumbled bacon in skillet until crisp, drain all of fat except on tablespoon. Cook onion with bacon stirring constantly for about one minute. Add pea pods and keep stirring to coat with fat and cook until tender but still crisp, three to five minutes. Lightly season with salt, if needed. The bacon may add enough salt, serve at once. Yield: 8 servings. If pods are not as tender, it may be necessary to add 1/4 cup of water and continue to stir-fry.

**Beef With Pea Pods**  
1 lb. beef top round steak 2 tsp. cornstarch 2 tsp. cooking oil 1 clove garlic, minced 2 cups fresh pea pods, or frozen pods, thawed 4 ozs. water chestnuts, drained and thinly sliced

Partially freeze beef; slice thinly across the grain into bite-size strips. In small bowl mix cornstarch, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Blend in soy sauce and 1/4 cup water and set aside.

**Mt. Vernon Signal**  
Preheat large skillet over high heat; add cooking oil. Stir-fry garlic in hot oil for 30 seconds. Add pea pods and water chestnuts. Stir-fry about 1 minute, then remove from skillet. Add, if necessary, about 1/4 lbs. of beef, stir-fry 2 to 3 minutes until browned. Remove beef, stir-fry remaining beef 2-3 minutes. Return all beef to skillet. Stir soy mixture and stir into beef. Cook until mixture is thickened and bubbly, stirring constantly. Stir in pea pods and water chestnuts; cover and cook 1 minute. Serve at once. Yield: 4 servings.

**To Microwave Pea Pods**  
Wash, prepare pea pods by removing blossom end and strings, if any. Place 1/2 pound of fresh pea pods in 9 inch pie plate with 2 tablespoons water. Cover with plastic wrap. Microwave on high for 2-4 minutes until tender and crisp. Let stand 2 minutes. For frozen pea pods, place 6-ounce package in 1-quart covered casserole with 2 tablespoons water. Microwave on high for 3-4 minutes and stir once.

**Ridomil ZE Cleared For Use on Burley To Control Blue Mold**

Last week's outbreak of blue mold on burley in Hart and Edmondson counties has prompted state Agriculture Commissioner Alben W. Barkley II to declare a state of emergency on Kentucky burley and to clear Ridomil ZE for use on the crop as a cultivation (labby) application treatment.

Conditions are right for the blue mold fungus to reach epidemic proportions in the state, Barkley said. Kentucky normally is effected later in the season when tobacco is past the labby stage.

Dry weather early in the planting season caused about half of the state's farmers to decide not to plant a fungicide on the crop. However, with the recent discovery of blue mold in the state and predictions from the national weather service that weather will be favorable for blue mold development during the next two weeks, Kentucky burley growers should begin applying Ridomil ZE by cultivation as soon as possible, he said.

Farmers may be tempted to use Ridomil ZE as a foliar spray, but Barkley warned that use is still prohibited. According to University of Kentucky Extension Plant Pathologist William C. Nesmith, foliar use of Ridomil ZE could encourage more rapid development of fungicide-tolerant strains of the blue mold and thus jeopardize the na-

tion's control program of the fungus. For those fields where blue mold is not present and Ridomil was not applied at transplanting, Barkley said two applications of the fungicide should be made using one quart per acre at each application. Both applications should be directed broadcast to the soil followed by incorporation through cultivation.

Two applications should be made approximately 10 to 14 days apart, starting with the first cultivation but later than the labby (last) cultivation.

In fields which are showing blue mold and do not receive Ridomil at transplanting, Barkley suggests a three-fold approach. First, make one application of 9 inch pie plate one quart to an acre broadcasting the fungicide to the soil and cultivating it. Then immediately begin a foliar fungicide spray program using a registered protectant-type fungicide according to product label recommendations. Continue the use of these foliar sprays until the lesions dry up.

About 10 to 14 days after the first application of Ridomil ZE to the soil, make a second application. Then immediately begin a concentration of one quart to an acre and then cultivate.

Ridomil ZE should not be applied to burley fields with active blue mold unless foliar sprays with protectant-type fungicide are also used, Barkley said. This will help reduce the chance of a new strain of the fungicide developing before the Ridomil is taken up by the plant, Barkley explained. "By acting quickly, Kentucky's burley growers can avoid a potential blue mold epidemic," Barkley said.

### AN ORDINANCE OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY RELATING TO THE DISPOSITION OF REFUSE.

Be it ordained by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, Honorable Bob Jasper presiding, with the following magistrates present and voting, Honorable Donald Rowe, Honorable Tom Denney, Honorable Alexa Albright, Honorable W.H. Wren, and Honorable Joe Clark.

2. That after July 15, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons from any other county or municipality to bring or transport refuse, garbage or trash into Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for Multi-County Services, Inc., pursuant to a contract between the said Multi-County Services, Inc., and Rockcastle County, Kentucky, further:

That after July 15, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to place any trash, garbage or refuse, other than household bagged garbage and household bagged garbage only, into any container provided for the deposit of garbage by Multi-County Services, Inc., pursuant to a contract between the said Multi-County Services, Inc., and Rockcastle County, Kentucky, further:

3. That after July 15, 1982, in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, it shall hereby be illegal and in violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to place any trash, garbage or refuse, other than household bagged garbage and household bagged garbage only, into any container provided for the deposit of garbage by Multi-County Services, Inc., and Rockcastle County, Kentucky.

Penalty for violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be a fine of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) plus court costs for the first offense and a fine of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) plus court costs for all subsequent offenses.

**Sugar Snap Peas Are Crunchy Addition to Meals**

Sugar snap peas are the newest and most versatile variety of edible-podded peas. These and other peas cooked in the pod, such as Chinese peas, sugar peas, snow peas and salad peas, add crunch to every meal, says Dr. Sue Burrier, Extension specialist in food and nutrition in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Sugar snap peas may be eaten raw or cooked before the peas form, after the peas are full size, or any time in between. They can be shelled and cooked, also. "The pods are tender, bright green and sweet," says Burrier.

Sugar snap peas can be cooked in a small amount of water, steamed, stir-fried and combined with other foods in an Oriental dish or a favorite casserole. They may be served raw in salads or with other raw vegetables as an accompaniment for a dip.

Freeze extra sugar snap peas for later use, says Burrier. Wash the peas thoroughly in cold water, remove the stem end and strings if there are any. None of the varieties have "straws".

of the girls of average weight became overweight adults.

Being overweight does cause certain health risks due to the greater load the excess weight places on the heart and circulatory system. Some major health problems related to being overweight are cardio-vascular disease, high-blood pressure, and diabetes.

One way parents can help overweight children is to provide them with nutritious low-calorie foods when planning family meals. Fried foods should be avoided and little or no shortening used as seasonings. Also, low-calorie snacks should be made available such as fresh fruit, raisins, or popcorn. It would be much easier for the overweight child to eat properly if parents would not even buy high-calorie snacks such as candy and potato chips for any family members. Everyone could benefit from more nutritious snacks.

In addition to providing proper foods to their children, parents can promote activities that will get children interested in things other than eating. For example they can take them on long walks or get out puzzles or games when children ask for something to do. If parents can encourage children to be more physically active, it would help them use up more calories. By walking briskly for 16 minutes; playing basketball for 12 minutes, or bicycling for 13 minutes, children can burn-up 100 calories. Parents should discourage T.V. watching; it burns few calories and encourages eating.

Too often overweight children grow up to be overweight adults. Help your child by providing the proper foods, and encouraging more activity. The whole family will benefit.

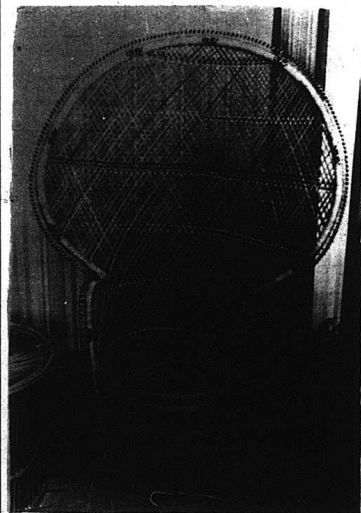

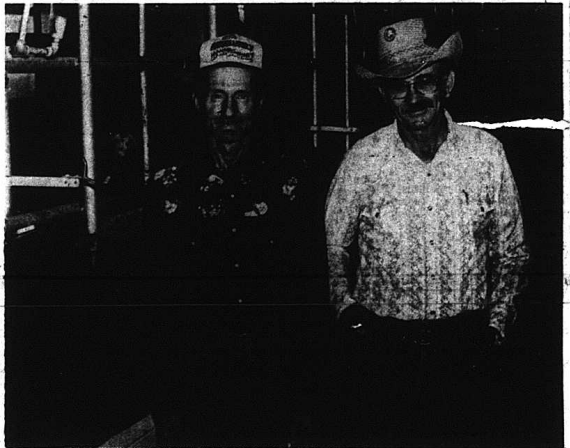

## Local dairyman Bill Norton finds help invaluable in dairy operation

 "If I didn't have a man like Kenneth Thompson to run my dairy then I would probably get out of the business," said Bill Norton, who owns a dairy operation in the Quail section of Rockcastle County. Norton said that Thompson and his three sons run his Grade A dairy for him and according to Norton, "Do an excellent job."  
 Thompson milks thirty-eight head of cattle for Norton twice a day beginning work each morning around 3:30 and again milking the Holsteins at 3:30 in the afternoon. Norton said that he has been in the dairy business for about five years and that there is more money in dairy farming than in beef cattle. However, he said that there is still not as much money in the dairy business as everyone thinks. Norton said that last year alone, he spent \$40,000 on feed of which 90 per cent went to the dairy herd. Besides the 38 head of

cattle being milked, Norton also has 10 dairy cattle dry at the present time and thirty Holstein heifers besides about 32 Charolais beef cattle on his farm.  
 With Thompson doing the milking, Norton has time to take care of a few other "chores" on his 183-acre farm such as the seven acres of tobacco, 25 acres of corn and 18 acres of alfalfa he raises.  
 Norton's milk parlor came with the farm and has three bypass stalls and a 300-gallon holding tank. He said that milk pick-ups have to be made every day and that complaints about the size of the tank are very frequent. He said that, with the cost of construction and higher rates, his holding tank will probably stay the same size for a while.  
 The thirty head are now averaging about 54 pounds of milk per day and the price of \$12.76 per hundred pounds has dropped in the last three pay periods.  
 Norton said he didn't quite understand how the

price the farmer is getting is going down and the price of milk in the store is going up. He said this makes a man wonder what is going on in the country today and that the "middle man" was evidently making most of the profit since the farmer was sure taking a beating.  
 Bill Norton, former plant superintendent for Armour Creameries when it was located in Mt. Vernon, is one of many fine dairy farmers in Rockcastle County and we salute this industry during June Dairy Month.

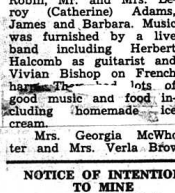

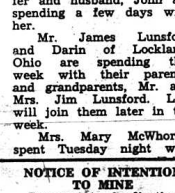

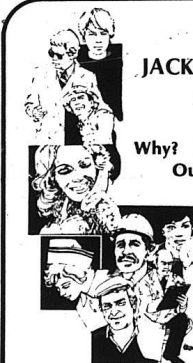
