FOR YOUR EYES ONLY

A cataract is a cloudiness or opacity in the lens of the eye which interferes with vision. It is the leading cause of blindness in the U.S. today. As a cataract forms, the normally clear lens becomes in-creasingly more opaque. This partially blocks and distorts the passage of light to the back of the eye where the seeing is actually done.

Fortunately, cataracts need not mean blindness for most people. Cataract surgery to restore vision is successful in 95 percent of cases and is possible is good. the surger of the surger of the surger of the surger is good.

Following removal of the cataract, a substitute lens must be used to restore clear vision. This may take the form of a small plastic lens implanted back into the eye in place of the real lens at the time of the cataract surgery. In certain cases, a con-tact lens or special eyeglasses may be more suitable.

A cataract itself cannot be treated with eye-drops or other medications, and there is no known way ot preventing the most common form of catar-act-those that are associated with advanced age.

It should be noted that in their earlier stages cataracts can improve vision and the padence's seeing can remain at finit best level with a slight change in the eyéglass presecription.


