Many people say "we don't have any Purple Martins," of course. This is true if they don't pro-vide a house for them to nest in.

Anyone, including factories, may feel free to use this idea as long as they don't try to patten it.

I sell 12 nest houses for just \$20. That's about half what you would pay for factory-made houses.

Please, let's get together and save our beautiful song birds or soon we won't hear our beautiful song birds when springtime comes; only house sparrows, starlings and frogs yacking.

Last Sunday, I sobserved two Blue birds for 15 minutes. They made twenty-nine trips to my garden for-bugs to feed to their young one. There are not as many hollow trees, fence rails and fence posts as there were a few years ago.

Please, let's spend a few nickels and a little time and save these beautiful and valuable birds.


