\$5,995. Balfour Company of Louisville got the contract to sell rings to local students by submitting a bid of about \$20 less per ring than their low-bidding competitor.

The school picture contract will go to McEachern Studios of Loudon, Tennessee who will make a student packet of pictures for \$7.50. Their competitor bid \$10 for a similar packet. The current school bus insurance policy was renewed with increased coverage to meet state recommendations.

School bus drivers were rehired with the only change in personnel being the replacement of Henry Hayes, who resigned last year. Evette Cash was hired to replace Hayes.

Custodians were re-employed for the year 1982-83. Wages were increased from

\$3.50 to \$3.88 per hour.

Secretaries: Vonie Mink, Jerr Hummelley, Blanche Baldwin and Renee Burdette were employed for the upcoming school year and bonded for \$2,000 each. Barbara Fain was also hired as a secretary. Ronnie Cash, assistant principal at RCHS, is bonded for \$3,000.

Magistrates decided to do so, checking before coming to a decision to build four new shelters.

Mrs. Bales also asked for a contract order allowing for a 9% raise for her three deputies providing fees are available. The action follows an announcement last week from P&G that it is taking aggressive steps to stop the rumor. The rumors typically report that the company's "moon and stars" trademark is a symbol of satanism and devil worship and that a P&G executive discussed satanism on nationally televised talk shows. Producers of the shows mentioned and the shows have confirmed that these stories are totally false.

P&G said it is receiving more than 12,000 calls each month about the ru-

mor and has picked up copies of materials being handed out at stores and churches encouraging a boycott of P&G products. The high number of calls and the use of the reproduced handout materials suggests this is more than rumor mongering by individuals, the company said. P&G said it is investigating the possibility of additional lawsuits and that it will follow aggressively on leads of organizations or individuals spreading the rumors.

The trademark is a circular design featuring a man-in-the-moon figure looking out over a field of thirteen stars. It has been used since 1850 and was officially registered in 1882. The symbol started as simple markings on crates of Star Candles, an early Proctor & Gamble product, and evolved over the years to a formal design showing a man-in-the-moon, a popular figure of the 1800's, and thirteen stars representing the original colonies.

SAVE OUR BIRDS!

I address the following to you good people of Rockcastle and surrounding counties.

Seven years ago, with your help, we came near to getting rid of the filthy Starlings. They are destroying all of our hole-nesting birds. They gang up on the Flicker, Red-headed Woodpecker, destroying their young ones, eggs, etc. They then take the nest and raise more filthy Starlings.

The Starling is a carrier of a dreadful disease called Hypostomatosis. The Starling was introduced into Kentucky until 1936. Now, they are costing Kentucky millions of dollars annually.

Yes, I make and sell Purple Martin houses--so do many factories. Of all the houses I have seen, half the young ones fall out and get killed. All houses have only the door to get air to the young ones. They get very hot and crowd into the door, crowding each other out.

If you will observe the accompanying photograph, you will see that mine, in reality, are "air conditioned". The partitions are peg board masonite.

Why all farmers, especially dairymen, don't have Purple Martin houses is something I don't understand. The Martins live on flies, mosquitoes, etc. The farmers' cattle use a lot of energy fighting flies. That energy spent fighting flies could be making good red meat.

Many people say "we don't have any Purple Martins," of course. This is true if they don't provide a house for them to nest in.

Anyone, including factories, may feel free to use this idea as long as they don't try to pattern it.

I sell 12 nest houses for just \$20. That's about half what you would pay for factory-made houses.

Please, let's get together and save our beautiful song birds or soon we won't hear our beautiful song birds when springtime comes; only house sparrows, starlings and frogs yacking.

Last Sunday, I observed two Blue birds for 15 minutes. They made twenty-nine trips to my garden for-bugs to feed to their young ones. There are not as many hollow trees, fence rails and fence posts as there were a few years ago.

Please, let's spend a few nickels and a little time and save these beautiful and valuable birds.

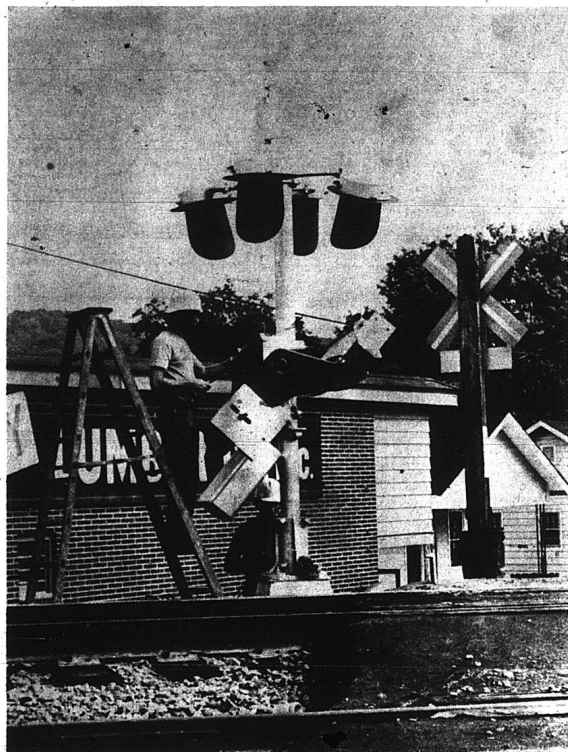

non. The restraint has been needed since the installation of the track many years ago. The two men said the lights should be in operation by Sunday.

Budget for fiscal year biggest in history

The 1982-83 county budget is \$950,453.50, the biggest in history despite the fact that the Revenue Sharing appropriation was roughly \$31,000 short of last year's figure. This year's total budget outweighs last year's \$901,984 budget by approximately \$48,000.

Part of the reason for the increase, despite the decrease, is the fact that recent state legislation made it mandatory that the jail operation in each Kentucky county be included in the county budget. Thus, the increased jail revenue (anticipated feed, paid by the state) was included and is reflected the overall budget increase.

This fiscal year's Rockcastle County did not get the nearly \$30,000 increase in Federal Revenue Sharing monies it had received in FY 1981 over FY 1980. Instead Revenue Sharing was cut from \$245,376 last year to \$213,281 this year. Revenue Sharing is money granted to counties to be used almost any way the county judge and magistrates see fit.

This year Revenue Sharing was budgeted in small amounts to a variety of social services programs and other governmental needs including the Senior Citizens program, the library, insurance, utilities, repair, fringe benefits, ambulance service, rescue squad, dog warden and 4-H agent, but the single biggest portions of RS go for garbage collection and clean up around the dumpsters (\$62,300) and road maintenance (\$47,850).

This is the second year the county has received Local Government Economic Assistance funds. This year the county is expected to receive \$108,000 LGEA, the amount of which is based,

in part, upon how much coal the county produces a year. Twenty percent must be spent to improve roads. The remainder may be spent in much the same way as Revenue Sharing, with very little strings and red tape. FY 1982 LGEA funds are up from last year's \$84,950.

The court appropriated \$35,729 for road maintenance from LGEA and spent \$10,190 to pay off a debt on the ambulance service building. A new county fire truck was purchased with

Man suffers arm injury in freak accident

A Mt. Vernon resident was injured Tuesday, June 29th, about 6:30 p.m. when a piece of plywood flew off the back of a passing pick-up truck and struck him.

Paul Monk, 40, was a passenger in a car driven by Billy Coffey. "As the two sat in the Super Test Service Station lot waiting to pull onto U.S. 25, a 4x4 piece of plywood flew from a truck coming down the hill traveling north. The wood struck Monk's arm, according to city police officer Ronnie Hurd, when Monk put his arm up to protect his face and head from the wood. Hurd said that following the accident, Monk got out of the car and fainted. In the fall he broke his leg which had only recently healed from a previous break.

The truck bearing the plywood was reportedly not loaded, but efforts to find the truck or its driver have failed since no license number was obtained from the truck which, according to witnesses, was dark green.

Proctor & Gamble takes legal action to stop spread of rumors

The Proctor and Gamble Company has announced that it is taking legal action to stop the spread of rumors associating the company with satanism or devil worship. The company filed suits in Atlanta, Georgia and Pensacola, Florida against several individuals who are charged with "libeling the character" of Proctor and Gamble by circulating "false and malicious" statements about the company and by calling for a boycott of its products.

Suits were filed against Mike Campbell in Atlanta and against Mr. and Mrs. William J. Moore, Jr. in Pensacola. In the suits, P&G charges that each individual made statements or distributed literature which stated that P&G supported satan and that its trademark was a satanic symbol. They also encouraged others to stop buying P&G products, the company claimed. P&G is asking the courts to stop the individuals from further activity and for compensatory and punitive damages.

Griffin Bell, former U.S. Attorney General, will represent Proctor & Gamble in the Atlanta suit. Patrick

Magistrates consider an increase for themselves; hear road complaints

Following close on the heels of a fourth or fifth refusal from County Judge/ executive Bob Jasper and several magistrates to consider Sheriff William Taylor's plea for subsidy from county government funds for his office, Magistrate Tom Denney made a motion to give each of the magistrates \$200 more in expense allowance.

Magistrates recently learned they could legally take the added expense money from the county coffers when state advisor for local governments, Al Howell, visited last week.

Magistrates now draw \$500 a month salary, plus \$100 a month expense account. The judge did not advise against the motion for any reason but "told magistrates to do whatever they wanted to about it. Denney's motion died, however, for lack of a second.

Magistrate Joe Clark said maybe they needed some time "to talk it over" but W.H. Wren said he was satisfied with what he was getting. Magistrates Rowe and Albright shook their heads negatively to the motion.

A matter over which there was some contention at last week's final budget approval meeting was obviously smoothed over Tuesday when four magistrates voted to pay Mark

Jasper.

The only magistrate vote "no" against the measure was D.G. "Alex" Albright.

Last Wednesday, June 30, the first vote for budget approval, the budget was rejected because of an appropriation of \$5000 for Jasper. After some discussion the budget was approved Wednesday, however.

Roundstone ceiling completed; payroll to be computerized

Local school board officials voted upon a recommendation by the superintendent Charles Parsons to contract with Central Trust Company in Cincinnati, Ohio to do the system.

A decision had been made some time earlier to accept the state's recommendation to place daily attendance records and other school records on computer. Local school officials are already making that transition.

The board approved payment of a total of \$64,017 for removal of asbestos ceilings at Roundstone school and the installation of a new ceiling. The work has been completed and awaits final inspection by the state department of education.

Repair work including patching and paving on school parking lots and drivers was approved to the amount of \$3,850. The drive to the school bus garage is to be paved as well as repairs to Broadhead School parking lot.

The wall and walk at Mt. Vernon Elementary school singled out for rebuilding and repair. The board voted to hire Jerry Kirby to do the job for \$2,495.

Barbara Ellen Collins was approved to receive a G.E.D. certificate.

Norton Insurance Agency was approved to provide school insurance policy. Pilot Life Insurance at a \$4.30 annual premium.

Bids were opened and contracts awarded to companies with the low bid yearbooks, class rings,

Ed McGee and Bruce Justice, owners of Kentucky Powder Company, which is located in the old Mullins Station Quarry, appeared before the court to request that work be done on the Mullins Station road over which they must transport large loaded trucks. McGee said the road had deteriorated over the last 3 to 4 years to the point that it was taking a considerable toll on their equipment. McGee said the hills had "washboarded" and that they were running on bedrock in most places.

McGee said the company was to the point of moving out of the county if something could not be done. He further stated that the company employed 15 persons with a yearly payroll of \$182,786. He said the company spends a considerable amount of money with local businesses and in licenses and taxes.

Magistrate Joe Clark, in whose district the road lies, agreed to go with Judge Jasper and inspect the road. However, Jasper told the men that "of roads were limited and they could only do so much with the funds available."

Bob Fields also petitioned the court to make some effort to control dust on the Pongo Road along which 18 families now live. The stretch of road in question is reportedly about 2 1/4 miles of ridge road which Fields pointed out is easily maintained.

The judge and magistrates promised some help, perhaps chipping and sealing as much as half of the stretch.

John Houston and David Stipes requested and were granted \$1,000 to meet the needs of the \$4,000 local soil conservation budget.

The Fiscal Court agreed to give Judge Jasper authority to purchase materials needed to repair one of the grandstands at the Broadhead Fairgrounds. Broadhead volunteer firemen have agreed to do the work on the stand in preparation of an upcoming event there. \$10,928, an increase of slightly over \$1,000 from last year. Road Aid is money the state turns over to counties to maintain certain roads the state gave to the counties just over

Break-ins occur night of June 30

Thieves broke into the Rockcastle County School bus garage sometime during the night of June 30, according to Sheriff William Taylor who is investigating the break-in.

Taylor said entry was gained through a gate in fence surrounding the property. A chain and lock were missing from the gate. Stolen items included jacks, battery chargers and various hand tools from the building. The combined value of the stolen property was estimated at about \$5,000.

Entry to the building was gained through the office door. There was no evidence of force and visible damage was done to the door.

Taylor said trampled grass and bushes indicated that thieves carried the stolen property through a back entrance to Fairground Hill where a vehicle or vehicles were apparently waiting near the old chicken hatchery building.

The same night, according to city police, the state highway garage was burglarized. Several sticks of dynamite were taken in that break-in.

As yet no charges have been filed in either case, however, the investigation is still underway.

 If you stayed up until the wee hours Monday night to see the total eclipse of the moon-it was time well spent even though you might not have thought so as you plodded bleary-eyed through the day Tuesday (as I did).
 I desperately wanted to stay up for the entire process but had to "white-eye" about 2:30 when the eclipse was total. There was a beautiful red glow clearly outlining the bottom half of the moon at that time.

My only companion for my nocturnal watch was my eleven-year-old who was the one who talked me into watching it with her. She enjoyed it thoroughly and called upon my "vast" reservoir of knowledge several times to explain the phenomenon to her; but, as a friend once explained to me, "If you don't know anything about it then I can explain it." Going on this premise, I dealt with Sara's questions while trying to not go too far outside the realm of possibility. I think she was impressed. Thank God for the daily newspaper which had at least given me a layman's knowledge of what was happening.
 One of the more interesting aspects of our night watch was my realization

that my children are highly uncomfortable outdoors after dark. I don't mean a little uncomfortable but very much so. Not only was I positioned at length about what was happening to the moon but quite often I was called upon to explain what that "strange" noise was over in the bushes or in the driveway or in the trees or on the balcony with us at one point.

When I asked if I could cut the lights off in the house to get the full effect of the almost total darkness resulting from the eclipse, I was quickly informed that no lights would be turned off and there was no explanation given except that "I don't want to."
 When I was a child (and you probably get tired of hearing that as my children have told me they do), the front porch was the place to gather after supper was over and the dishes were washed. For a long time, there wasn't even a fan to move the hot air around. Later we got really high class and managed a floor fan but this entailed keeping the windows open so a "draft" was created and we still sat on the front porch in the summer until bedtime.

At least, the older people did. We children chased lightning bugs, played hide 'n seek in the dark and just generally, I am sure now, made a nuisance of ourselves.
 But, the point I am trying to make, we were happy outside. If there was the noise web were not familiar with, and these were few, we investigated until we found the source or at least thought we did. Even

in winter, there were games to be played outside. I was the youngest of five children and we lived in the country but you could always round up enough people for a snowball fight or sleigh riding or whatever the weather permitted.

With my children, it's either the pool or the air conditioner in the summer or inside recreation or just being around near the fireplace in the winter.
 A great deal of this can probably be laid to the fact that no one feels quite safe anymore outside after dark with the skyrocketing crime rate and parents just don't feel as secure not knowing where their children are at all times as they used to, even in rural areas.

But, it is sad to realize that you have an eleven-year-old who doesn't recognize a bullfrog when they hear one or crickets or any of the sounds that I now associate with childhood because to be quite honest, I am guilty of lying around under the air conditioner and not encouraging outside activities myself and I guess that's where the main problem lies.

boredom, and to incorporate still another new experience, the program lasted only from 9 a.m. to 12:30 each morning, and an unusual and nutritious snack was served each day. A short evaluation form was filled out each day by all children. This took approximately ten minutes, and will be used in planning next summer's program.

The children met each day at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, Buford Parkerson, a K.A.G.E. member, made sure appropriate space was available for various lessons.

On Monday, Lawrence Bullock taught the processes of the dye and batik. Each child applied one of the processes to a tee shirt. Mark McFerron and Julie Lewis provided instruction, demonstration and materials for painting with water colors. The children painted beautiful pictures to take home. Renee Burdette demonstrated cake decorating techniques and equipment. Parents didn't get to see how well the children applied this knowledge, because the children ate the evidence, but they said it was great fun.

Tuesday was spent at the courthouse. The children toured the offices, the jail and the courtroom. They observed an actual trial in progress. The younger children also visited several projects and operations funded by our city and county government.

Rachel James used the Orff system to help the children make music on Wednesday. Janet Hart, director of the Lexington Ballet Company, explained some history of ballet and instructed the children in creative movement and beginning ballet. Bob Pybas explained woodwind, brass, percussion and stringed instruments, and he and local musicians, Johnny Sams, Buzzy Carlottis, Donald Jones, Casey Carroll and Mark Lovell, demonstrated instruments of each type.

Tours of Rockcastle Manufacturing and Mt. Vernon Plastics were the first part of the program on Thursday. Upon returning to Mt. Vernon School, the children worked with tangrams, attribute blocks, d-sticks and cardboard poly-shapes as a part of the

math experience. The program ended with a field trip to Berea on Friday where the children visited the Appalachian Museum, examined (and some played) the large pipe organ in Union Church, and developed a picture in the dark room of Mr. Brunner of Brunner's Studio. The final order of the day was a complete tour of McDonald's restaurant, which led, naturally, to lunch.

A cook-out was held Friday, July 2 for everyone connected with the program, to celebrate its success.

What is K.A.G.E.?

What is K.A.G.E.? After reading about the Pilot Enrichment Program which the Rockcastle County chapter of K.A.G.E. successfully carried out for 11 children, many people may ask that question. Here is the answer. K.A.G.E. stands for Kentucky Association for Gifted Education. It is a state wide organization of parents and educators who encourage, support and sometimes provide special education for gifted and talented children.

One purpose of K.A.G.E. is to provide information to parents on (1) how to recognize giftedness; (2) the special problems that may arise because a child is gifted; (3) what to do at home with these children and (4) where and how to seek outside help.

Another purpose which has now been accomplished was to lobby for funding for gifted education programs for every school district in the state. In 1981, only 65- or 180 districts had such programs. Because of the efforts of over 2,000 K.A.G.E. members, planning funds and friends to implement programs are now available for school year 1982-83 and 1983-84 respectively.

A third purpose is to provide enrichment for gifted children locally. Because of this purpose the summer Pilot Enrichment Program originated.

In November of 1981, an organizational meeting for a local chapter of K.A.G.E. was announced in WRVK radio station and in the Mt. Vernon Signal. This meeting was open to anyone.

It resulted in 23 members who took as a first project the planning and implementing of a summer Pilot Enrichment Program. This is a parent group, and although some of the members are also teachers, the program is not sponsored in any way by the school system or the Board of Education. The 31 children included in the program were the children of K.A.G.E. members. These members planned and carried out the program at their own expense.

Tentative future projects of this group include (1) local, state and possibly national participation in the Olympics of the Mind, a contest which encourages problem solving and creativity in ways similar to those used in popular sports programs; (2) convincing and expanding the Summer Enrichment Program; (3) providing an enrichment activity each month.

Membership in this organization is not closed. A meeting will be held in September to encourage new members and to adopt by-laws. State membership dues for K.A.G.E. are only \$3.00 per year, and local dues have not been set. If you are interested in becoming a member of the Rockcastle Co. Chapter of K.A.G.E., attend our September meeting. The date, time and place will be announced in the Signal and on WRVK radio.
