## City Council approves Budget Hoskins ordered out of boat dock

After some discussion and delay by the members of the Mt. Vernon City Council concerning the city's budget for 1982-83, the budget was passed unanimously at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Mayor Roland Mullins told the council members while they were delaying on passing his draft of the '82-83 budget that if they didn't like the budget he had prepared then they could "tear it up and make one of their own".

The discussion which was started by councilman Ernie Tolle, dealt with the Water and Sewer department and whether or not the city had enough men to do the work. Mayor Mullins said that the department had one more man right now than they had before the death of Walker Norton and he told the council that if this was not enough to do the work that even though another man was not included in the budget they could still hire one later if the need arose.

Mayor Mullins told the council members in his annual budget message that the city of Mt. Vernon has no indebtedness going into the 1983 fiscal year, with the exception of the long term water and sewer department bonds.

"The end of the year financial reports indicate that the General Fund, the Water and Sewer Fund, and other accounts are in the "black". Cash assets sufficient to meet federal requirements of \$241,000.00 are deposited with the Bank of Mt. Vernon in interest bearing accounts. The Water and Sewer department, the police department, the street department, all have

adequate equipment and supplies. Appropriate depreciation accounts are maintained to replace these items as needed. Buildings are maintained. The sewage disposal unit is currently being updated with a \$20,000.00 grant from Area Development Funds. The first phase of the Park Project on Lake Linville is complete. Income from the sale of the City parking lot, \$25,000.00, will be placed in an interest bearing account, and will be used to further develop downtown parking.

Estimated receipts for Fiscal year 1983 in the General Fund, Municipal Aid, Economic Assistance, and Revenue Sharing Funds amount to \$142,314.00. The Water and Sewer income is estimated at \$277,230.00. The water and sewer estimate includes an increase in the Broadhead City and Western Districts contracts to \$4 cents per thousand effective October 1982, and January 1983 respectively. Mullins said that should the income picture allow for a balanced budget without the extra income from the raises, allowances would be made.

Estimated expenditures for General Fund, Municipal Aid, Economic Assistance, Revenue Sharing Funds amount to \$142,314.00 and include \$7,150.00 for depreciation, and \$8,113.00 as an emergency reserve. The water and sewer expenditures estimated at \$277,230 include \$200,000.00 for depreciation, and \$55,208.00 for debt service. Thus, the project expenses balance to the income.

The Police Department, the Water and Sewer Department, and the Clerk's office are all budgeted for the same number of employees as Fiscal Year '82. All employees are scheduled to receive a 5% raise in salary, except the Police Department. Their salaries are scheduled to increase to \$4.00 per hour at 1980 hours per annum, effective

January, 1983.

Blacktop surfacing is allowed for in the budget for the following streets: Maple Drive, Main St., Parsons St., Lower Drive, Paul St., and Tate Avenue. Patch work will be done elsewhere throughout the City.

Funds in the amount of \$8,714.00 are allocated for building sidewalks in the critical traffic areas-to county high school, or the hospital, or the library.

Overall the income continues to be extremely limited; however, additions are planned in the areas of sidewalks, limited expansion of the boat dock at Renfro, City attorney Carl Clontz said that Circuit Judge Phillip K. Wicker has agreed to the lease between the city and Sterling Hoskins and that District Judge Daniel Venters had given Hoskins seven days to vacate the premises. Clontz said that Hoskins was to start serving a thirty day jail sentence Tuesday for conviction of a "bootlegging" charge.

Dr. Edward Foree of Commonwealth Technology, who was present at the meeting at the request of the council to explain to them what would be the best method of testing the sewage disposal of the Industrial Park and the Vocational School, said during about a ten minute presentation that the best way to begin to test the sewage is to take a few samples from the sewage to see if any harmful chemicals were not being disposed of by the sewage treatment plant. He said that if nothing showed up in these preliminary tests then there would be no reason for further testing. He said that if there was some kind of problem, he felt like his firm could

The Morgan vehicle skidded into the side of the Cox vehicle, left the roadway and overturned, coming to rest in a creek.

Ms. Morgan received minor injuries and did not require immediate treatment.

### Child Restraint Law Goes Into Effect Today

The new state law passed earlier this year requires parents or guardians to place a child who is 40 inches tall or less in a crash-tested auto safety seat or other child restraint device when traveling in a motor vehicle. The law goes into effect July 15 (today).

Gov. John Y. Brown has announced the awarding of a \$15,000 federal grant which will be used by the Kentucky State Police to make people aware of the new law aimed at lower the number of babies and toddlers killed or hurt in traffic accidents.

KSP commissioner Marton D. Campbell said the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration grant will be used by the Kentucky State Police public affairs section to conduct a public awareness campaign.

Both this grant and a \$14,780 grant for a "before" study by the University of Kentucky are being administered by the state police's highway safety standards section.

The UK study will determine child restraint usage before the state law is in effect. Statistics collected in 1980 show only 9 percent of children under 4 are restrained while traveling in a car or truck. According to state police records, 26 children under 4 years old were killed in Kentucky in traffic wrecks during 1981. So far this year eight children under 4 have been killed.

Traffic experts feel most children, killed in car wrecks would have survived if they had been properly buckled in a crash-tested child restraint device.

Studies show traffic accidents as the number one cause of death for children past the newborn stage. That is, after the first critical days of life, a child is more likely to die in a car wreck than from any other cause including childhood diseases.

According to Danny Ford, state representative, the citation for noncompliance bears a similar penalty as for defective vehicle equipment.

A car seat purchase receipt can be shown to the judge in lieu of fine payment; the amount of both would be about the same. Also, proof of loan and child restraint seat will be satisfactory with officials, Ford said.

Car seats which meet the standard safety requirements of this law are available at most department stores.

## Is the public oblivious to the plight of the handicapped ?

After an interview with several handicapped citizens, I have been convinced that the general public is at least partially oblivious to the plight of the handicapped person as he or she struggles with barriers which are made manifest with every simplest daily tasks.

I recently overheard a conversation in which college students were discussing an assignment in special education class. The assignment was to choose a partner and go to a restaurant or store with one of the pair feigning an obvious major disability. The students were then to switch places, with each recording the reactions and any difference in responses by clerks, waitresses and the public. It was an attempt to make students who may "some day" work with "special needs" persons aware of some of the complexities of their lives.

The assignment was quick and simple and over with in a couple of hours. Unfortunately, real handicaps do not appear at work. Several years ago legislation was passed to insure some equal consideration

for the country's "second class citizens". One law states that all city, county, state and federal buildings must be accessible to handicapped persons. Federal funds were made available to install elevators, ramps and restrooms for the handicapped. Provisions were made to transport handicapped children to classroom.

In some instances, these funds were applied for and used, in other cases they were not. One local handicapped person pointed out that those with certain handicaps cannot go to various offices or courtrooms in our courthouse. A wooden, relatively inexpensive ramp has never been built for the front steps of the first floor for use even of the allowed for in the building.

Parking presents a special problem for handicapped persons. Handicapped parking spaces are the best, closest and most easily accessible places to park which does, in some instances, cause less honorable persons to park there. In Rockcastle County, eight special license plates and eight parking permits (to hang over the rear view mirror) were issued from

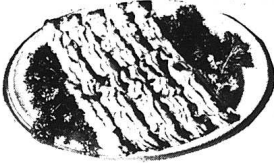

## Please Don't Call Me Reverend

BECAUSE nowhere in the Bible is there an example of any man wearing this title. The only time the word "reverend" appears is in Psalm 111:9 and here it applies to God-not man. I don't set me a title to me that belongs to God alone.

BECAUSE a wearing such a title is a violation of the teaching of the New Testament. We are all brethren in Christ. We are Christians. Preachers are not a special class of brethren that deserve some sort of title to set them apart from any brother who wears such a title or who is painfully ignorant of what the Bible teaches is guilty of ignoring its teaching. In either case, the offense is the same.

BECAUSE the New Testament makes no distinction of a clergy-laity relationship. Men make this distinction without the Lord's authority. Christianity is a priesthood of believers (1 Pet. 2:9; Rev. 1:6). We all stand equal before God and have equal access to the throne of grace. The Lord has not set some apart as special priests who are to wear titles of honor. Some dress themselves in a social garb to set themselves apart from the rest of the flock. Such men lack the humility that should

characterize a true servant of God.  
BECAUSE such titles are condemned in Matt. 23:10. Jesus forbids men being called king, father, or master in a religious sense. Yet the plain commandment is ignored by a great many religious leaders today who not only wear these titles, but insist upon others calling them what God forbids. There is no possible way to justify this vain practice.  
BECAUSE I am only a servant to serve God to the best of my ability. The fact that I preach does not make me "reverend". God has not set me apart from my brethren in a special way. We want no preacher's garb nor titles and we'll recognize none of them. If a man is not preacher enough to be known as a preacher, without the white necktie or the priestly coat, let him pass without being known. So, if you please, don't call me "reverend"; just call me "mister", "preacher" or "servant".

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## Soil Survey Presentation Held

A special presentation was held recently at the Harry Sparks Vocational School to introduce the new Laurel-Rockcastle Soil Survey. About 40 local Ag leaders, builders and realtors attended the presentation and luncheon sponsored by the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District.

Mr. Roy Rice and Mr. Glenn Kelly (Soil Scientists with the Soil Conservation Service who do the mapping and correlation of Soil Surveys) were the guest speakers. They talked centered around the importance of soil surveys and how they are made. Soil scientist, Roy Rice, gave a very informative demonstra-

tion on how to use and apply the soil survey information using an example situation and location. Mr. Rice went through each step of analyzing a soil site and the proper use of the soil survey manual's charts and descriptions. The new soil survey of Laurel-Rockcastle Counties is truly a very important document. Its use is very important in all aspects of proper land use and management. Everyone attending the meeting gained some very valuable information about Rockcastle soils and their proper use.

Anyone interested in obtaining a Soil Survey Manual may come by the Soil Conservation Service office on the 2nd floor of the courthouse and obtain one free of charge.

## Home Economist Attends Meeting

Attending the American Home Economics Association annual meeting held June 28-July 1 in Cincinnati, Ohio were Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agent for Home Economics in Rockcastle County and Martha Brown, Extension Intern. 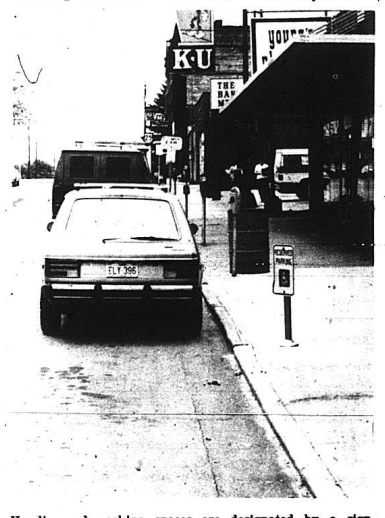

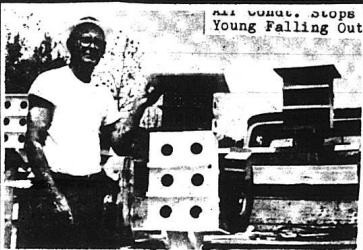

## School District to apply for federal funds

The Rockcastle County School District has recently prepared an application for the use of federal funds for the education of handicapped children in the Rockcastle County School District. This application specifies that a free and appropriate public education will be provided to all handicapped children ages five through seventeen who are residents of Rockcastle County School District. P.L. 94-142 also requires that the school district plan for the implementation of identification, location, evaluation and appropriate educational placement of all handicapped children. Guaranteed procedural safeguards for handicapped children and their parents in decisions regarding educational programs confidentiality of files of those children identified as being handicapped will continue to be instituted. ## SAVE OUR BIRDS!

I address the following to you good people of Rockcastle and surrounding counties.

Seven years ago, with your help, we came near to getting rid of the filthy Starlings. They are destroying all of our hole-nesting birds. They gang up on the Flicker Red-Headed Woodpecker, destroying their young ones, eggs, etc. They then take the nest and raise more filthy Starlings.

The Starling is a carrier of a dreadful disease called Hystoplasmosis. Never did a Starling see Kentucky until 1936. Now, they are costing Kentucky millions of dollars annually.

Yes, I make and sell Purple Martin houses—so do many factories. Of all the houses I have seen, half the young ones fall out and get killed. All houses have only the door to get air to the young ones. They get very hot and crowd into the door, crowding each other out.

If you will observe the accompanying photograph, you will see that mine, in reality, are "air conditioned". The partitions are peg board masonite.

Why all farmers, especially dairymen, don't have Purple Martin houses is something I don't understand. The Martins live on flies, mosquitoes, etc. The farmers cattle use a lot of energy fighting flies. That energy spent fighting flies could be making good red meat.

Many people say "we don't have any Purple Martins" of course. This is true if they don't provide a house for them to nest in.

Anyone, including factories, may feel free to use this idea as long as they don't try to patton it.

I sell 12 nest houses for just \$20. That's about half what you would pay for factory-made houses.

Please, let's get together and save our beautiful song birds or soon we won't hear our beautiful song birds when springtime comes; only house sparrows, starlings and frogs yacking.

Last Sunday, I observed two Blue birds for 15 minutes. They made twenty-nine trips to my garden for bugs to feed to their young ones. There are not as many hollow trees, fence rails and fence posts as there were a few years ago.

Please, let's spend a few nickels and a little time and save these beautiful and valuable birds.

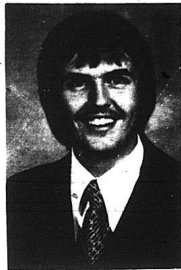
