Tony C. Cromer, son of James and Patty Cromer, Route 1, Brodhead, is taking part in the University of Louisville's new Professional Education Preparation Program (PEPP). The 1982 graduate of Rockcastle County High School is one of 27 high school graduates from across Kentucky participating in a five-week course which is meeting July 7 through August 11 on U of L's Shelby Campus in eastern Jefferson County.

Aimed at recent high school graduates from certain medically and dentally underserved counties, PEPP is designed to provide a good start in college for students who intend to pursue a career as a physician or dentist. In addition to enhancing a student's chances of completing a dental or medical education, a major goal of the PEPP program is to work to reduce shortages of health care professionals in underserved areas of Kentucky.

The 27 students of U of L (and approximately the same number of students at the University of Kentucky) are receiving reading and writing skills instruction, career testing and special preparation for scientific courses along with their personal attention to the management of the office, and they must be at least 18 years of age. ## VA taking steps to collect over \$175 billion in debts

Debt collection has never been a popular subject in the VA or any other federal agency. However, the current administration has chosen to place a very high priority on the collection of the \$175 billion in debts owed the federal government. Of this amount, approximately \$1.2 billion is owed by veterans nationwide, who have studied under the GI Bill and received more tuition money than they were entitled to; veterans who never repaid loans under the tuition loan program; and Kentucky veterans owe approximately \$2 million. A smaller amount is owed by veterans who received excessive medical payments that should have been repaid to the U.S. Treasury.

Lee Caudill, Director of the Louisville VA Regional Office, said that a new item is now being added to the bill, interest charges. In late 1980, Congress authorized the VA to collect interest on repayments, and within the next few

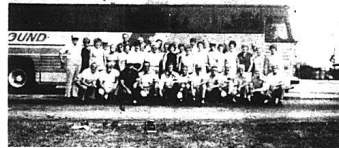

months, after rules and regulations have been officially published, veterans who owe repayments to the VA can also expect to be charged interest, set at a level the Treasury is paying currently to borrow short-term money. At present, this rate is 13 percent but is subject to change.

Caudill said that steps are now being taken in collection in this order: First, the veteran will be informed of the debt by letter with a Certificate of indebtedness attached and advised that he has 10 days to make arrangements for repayment, then if repayment arrangements are not made within 10 days, court action will be taken. The VA is authorized to obtain liens on property, garnishee

## Black Shank fungus found in county

Black Shank, a disease that can destroy a tobacco crop, but that is quite uncommon in Rockcastle County, has left its mark on at least one tobacco crop in the county thus far this year.

Black Shank is a disease that should be greatly feared by the farmer. It spreads rapidly in wet weather, killing numerous plants and leaving the fungus in the soil for several years.

When the disease first appears in a few plants in a wet area, it may be mistaken for damping, however, close examination will reveal its true nature, according to Harold Ballinger, A.S.C.S. director for Rockcastle County.

Ballinger said that the first days after infection, affected plants will during the day and recover at night. However, he said that the leaves then begin to gradually yellow and the plant remains wilted. In the earlier stages of wilting if the plant is pulled, the roots will be coal-black, he said.

The ASCS director said that black shank spreads rapidly during weather because the fungus produces numerous spores near the soil on leaves and stalks of affected plants. Each spore produces about 30 swimming spores that are carried with the rainwater to other plants in the field

and may cause a sudden outbreak a few days later.

Ballinger said that much of the tobacco in a crop can be saved in a new or mild outbreak if the affected plants are removed from the field at the first sign of wilting, so that secondary spread by swimming spores cannot take place.

"One thing a farmer must do if he has black shank in one field of tobacco and is using the same equipment on another field, is to clean the tractor and equipment thoroughly before using it again on another patch," Ballinger said. He said that one way to get rid of the fungus from an infested field is to sow the field in grass sod and the fungus will gradually disappear.

R.R. "Doc" Wolfe, who has been a farmer in Rockcastle County for most of his life, said that he had never seen anything like it in all his years of growing tobacco.

Mr. Wolfe is not raising his tobacco this year. He has it rented to William K. Bullen and he is the one who has had the misfortune to have the black shank show up in his crop. Bullen rents about five acres of tobacco from Wolfe and grows it all in the same field. The black shank, according to Wolfe, and Sonja Bullens, William K's daughter, is showing up in patches throughout

the entire five acre field. Sonja said that her dad was the first to recognize the disease in their crop but that he was not sure of what it was at first.

Wolfe said that a small portion of the field was affected by the disease last year but that he didn't think it was anything but damping of the plants in low areas throughout the field.

Sonja said they were going to try to salvage as much of the crop as possible and hope that the disease would not spread. "I've decided if it isn't one (Cont'd to P-11)

## DOT awards federal grant to CVADD

The Kentucky Department of Transportation has awarded a \$30,400 federal grant to the Cumberland Valley Area Development District.

The administrative funds involved total \$38,000 with \$7,600 in matching funds provided by the area development district.

Tuesday will find the first of two special "Kids Day" with Carnival Rides on the Midway being four rides for \$1.00. This special day will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until 5 p.m. Children under 12 will be admitted free during the entire week, and one "Kids Day" children up to 16

will be admitted free until 6 p.m. The Tuesday night attraction will begin at 7:30 p.m. with an Ole Fashion Gospel Sing featuring The Spirits Quartet of stage and recording fame in concert.

Wednesday night will feature an Open Quarter Horse Show with new and added classes of speed and action rings. The starting time will be 7:30 p.m. and promises to be one of the highlights of the Fair. Mid-South shows will be open on the Midway for the enjoyment of all.

## County receives block grant for rail spur at industrial park

A \$200,000 Community Development Block Grant to aid in the building of a rail spur at the local industrial park has been awarded the county. The announcement was made to State Representative Danny Ford who was representing the area at a district area development meeting Monday. Ford said Sally Hamilton from the Community Development Office in Frankfort made

the announcement. The money will be administered by the local Industrial Authority along with a \$100,000 long-term, low-interest loan the authority hopes to qualify for. The loan is being sought through the Kentucky Department Financial Authority. Ford said he was pleased because the project would stimulate local job opportunities.

## Marriage license requirements changed

According to Rockcastle County Clerk Irene Bales, as of July 15, 1982, persons applying for a marriage license in Kentucky will not be required to obtain a premarital syphilis serology (blood test) or to present a Premarital Medical Certificate as a condition for the issuance of the license.

House Bill 141 increased the fee for marriage licenses by \$10, making the cost now \$18. The ten dollars will go to a special Department for Human Resources account for spouse abuse shelter. The department will use the funds for providing shelter services for spouse abuse victims.

With the dropped blood test requirement, the total cost will be less despite the increased license fee, Mrs. Bales pointed out.

 I would like to respond to Mr. Charles Hurst's letter to the editor printed in your paper July 1, 1982 in which he serves as critic of a previous article written by me.

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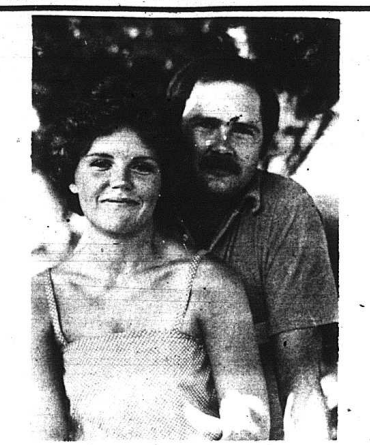

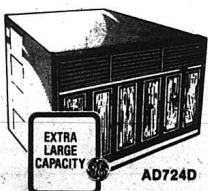

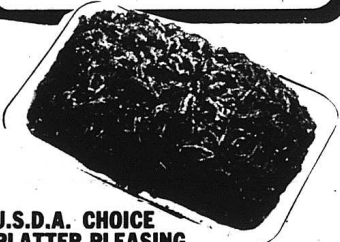

## What To Do If Jelly Or Jam is Too Soft

Or a batch of your jam or jelly turn out too soft? If so, it may be because you didn't stick closely to your recipe either in measuring the ingredients, or in cooking time.

Whatever the reason, you can probably thicken it by recooking, according to the direction given here. But do only 4 to 6 cups at a time.

To make with powdered pectin: Measure the jelly to be recooked. For each quart of jelly measure 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup water and 4 tablespoons powdered pectin. Mix the pectin and water and bring to boiling, stirring constantly to prevent scorching. Add sugar and sugar. Stir thoroughly.

Bring to a full rolling boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1/2 minute. Remove jelly from the heat, skim, pour into hot containers and seal.

To remake with liquid pectin: measure the jelly to be recooked. For each quart of jelly measure 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons liquid pectin. Bring jelly to boiling over high heat.

Quickly add the sugar, lemon juice and pectin and

bring to a full rolling boil, stir constantly. Boil mixture hard for 1 minute. Remove outer leaves. Cut into halves or quarters and remove the core. Wash and drain cabbage. Use a shredder or sharp knife to cut the cabbage into thin shreds. Weigh shredded cabbage and thoroughly mix 5 pounds with 3 tablespoons of pickling salt. Pour the salted cabbage stand to wilt. Pack solidly in clean glass jars to within 1/2 inch of top by pressing firmly with a small potato masher or wooden spoon. If there isn't enough juice to cover the cold water. Wipe rim of cap, screw band firmly tight.

Place jars in a pan to ferment. Sauerkraut will ferment best at room temperature—about 70 degrees. Some of the juice will probably bubble out and spill down the sides of the jars. After about 10 days, when the bubbling stops, wash outside of jar, remove lid and wipe rim clean. Wash lid and replace on jar. Tighten lid and process in boiling-water-bath canning minutes for quarts.

When your refrigerator test tells you it's done, remove it from the heat, skim, pour into clean hot containers and seal.

Storing: To avoid having to reprocess, freeze your boiling-water-bath canned, store it in the refrigerator and eat it up within several months. You don't need to refrigerate jelly until after it is opened.

## How to Make Glass-Jar Sauerkraut

You don't need a big wooden tub or crock to make sauerkraut. You can put a small batch in quart jars.

This is a good way to do it if you have just a few sauerkraut lovers in your family. Fill a quart jar with 1 1/2 pounds of shredded cabbage.

Here is a recipe for 3 quarts or 6 pints of sauer-

kraut. Select firm, mature heads of cabbage. Remove outer leaves. Cut into halves or quarters and remove the core. Wash and drain cabbage. Use a shredder or sharp knife to cut the cabbage into thin shreds. Weigh shredded cabbage and thoroughly mix 5 pounds with 3 tablespoons of pickling salt. Pour the salted cabbage stand to wilt. Pack solidly in clean glass jars to within 1/2 inch of top by pressing firmly with a small potato masher or wooden spoon. If there isn't enough juice to cover the cold water. ## SQUASH ARE IN Yellow squash and zucchini

Yellow squash and zucchini

chini are two of the most familiar kinds of summer squash. Both are low in calories containing 22-30 calories per cup and are high in vitamins A and C.

When selecting summer squash, choose young tender ones (7" or less in length), that are firm and well formed. The skin should be bright in color and free of blemishes. Store fresh squash in a cool dry place and use as soon as possible.

Summer Squash  
8 medium-size yellow squash  
4 slices bacon  
1 small onion, chopped  
2 cups beaten cream  
1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper to taste  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
Cook squash in a small amount of boiling salted water until tender; drain well and mash. Cook bacon until crisp; drain well and crumble, reserving drippings. Sauté onion in reserved drippings.

Combine all ingredients, stirring well; spoon into a lightly greased quart casserole. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

Squash Patties  
1 cup all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt

1 egg  
1 large zucchini or 2 medium, cut lengthwise into 9 full-length slices about 7/8" thick

Preheat oven to 350. Cook and stir ground beef, onion, garlic and green pepper in large sauce pan until meat is brown and vegetables are tender; drain off all fat. Add tomatoes and break up with fork; stir in tomato sauce, 2 tablespoons parsley; salt, oregano and basil. Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally; reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, 1 hour, or until mixture is thick.

Mix cottage cheese, egg, and remaining 2 tablespoons parsley together. In ungreased 8x8x2" baking pan, spread thin layer of meat sauce. Layer one-third each of zucchini slices, remaining meat sauce, mozzarella cheese, and cottage cheese mixture. (If desired, lasagna can be covered and refrigerated several hours at this point.)

Uncover, bake 45 minutes. (Allow additional minutes if lasagna has been refrigerated.) For easier cutting, let stand 15 minutes after removing from oven. (Makes 4 servings.)

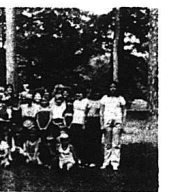

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## Hal Rogers supports legislation declaring offenders "guilty, but insane"

Over the last three weeks I have held thirteen Community Meetings from one end of the Fifth Congressional District to the other. These meetings give me the chance to hear from the folks I represent in Congress, and if I had to name the one topic most important to the people during these public meetings, it would have to be John Hinckley, the man who shot President Reagan on the streets of our Nation's Capital.

Everywhere I went, people were talking about how man they were that a man could shoot the President of the United States and three others and then get off scot-free. It's disgusting.

Well, by the time you read this, I will be back in Washington and I will have already introduced legislation to remedy this outrageous situation.

The problem with many criminal trials today, like the Hinckley case, is that insanity is used as a defense to prove the defendant "not guilty." This has to be changed.

John Hinckley was obviously guilty of shooting Ronald Reagan. The only question is what sentence should have been given.

Under the legislation I have introduced, someone like Hinckley would be found "guilty, but insane." What this means in practical terms is that when the judge hands down the sentence, the accused would serve his whole sentence, part of it in a hospital for the criminally insane and the balance (if the criminal judge is to be no longer insane) behind bars in prison where he belongs!

It's high time we protected society and the victims of crime instead of bending over backwards protecting the criminal. We simply can't continue slapping common criminals on the wrist and sending them back out on the street to continue their life of crime.

I can't really blame anyone who doesn't respect our judicial system after such disgusting verdicts like the Hinckley case, and Congress owes it to the American people to do everything it can to return respect and trust to the court room. I hope that my bill or at least a similar piece of legislation passes the Congress soon—Americans deserve real justice!

## ORDINANCE NO. 169

The Board of Trustees of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, do Ordain as Follows:

SECTION 1: Any and all persons owning real property in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or any lessee of real property therein, or any person or persons having charge or control over any real property in said Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall be, and is hereby required to keep buildings thereon clear and free from debris and the yards and premises clear and free of debris, weeds, briars and other growth that may become combustible when dry and create a fire hazard to the buildings located thereon or adjoining property and building.

SECTION 2: All persons owning real property in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or any interest therein, or any lessee of real property, or any person or persons having charge or control over any real property located in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall keep the sidewalks and parking curbs and the lands adjoining said sidewalks on either side thereof, clear and free from grass, weeds, earth and other debris and to immediately cause any and all weeds, grass and other growth to be cut and removed from the premises and to remove all earth, stone and other debris from the sidewalks adjoining their property.

SECTION 3: All persons owning real property in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or any interest therein, or any lessee of real property or any person or persons who have charge or control over any real property located in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall keep the said premises clear and free from boxes, cans, crates, paper, lumber, parts of discarded automobiles and trucks, rags and other debris on their said property or on any street or alley, or on property adjoining thereto.

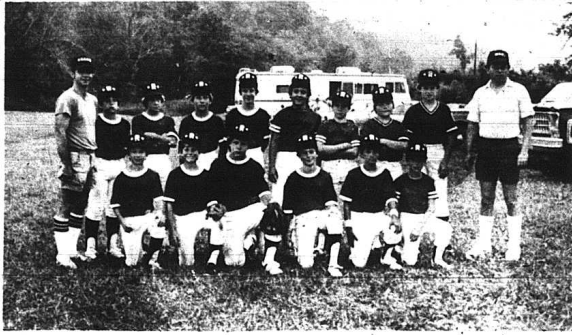
SECTION 4: It shall be the duty of the Marshal of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or the Chief or Assistant Chief of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department to see that the provisions of this ordinance, and each of them, are strictly complied with, and any owner of real property, lessee or agent as mentioned herein, who fails to comply with the requirements of this ordinance after he has received a written notice as so to do, by said Marshal, Chief or Assistant Chief of said Mt. Vernon Fire Department, for a period of three days after the service of said notice, he or she shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance, or any of its provisions, and upon conviction therefore before the Police Court of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, be fined in any sum, not less than \$5.00 or more than \$25.00 for each offense, and each day thereafter shall constitute a separate offense and failure to pay or remit said fine and costs he or she shall be confined in the jail in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, one day for each \$2.00 of said fine and cost and the court may say, in its judgment, that the jail sentence shall be served at hard labor.

SECTION 5: A failure of any person or persons, lessee or agent of any real property in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, who shall fail, neglect or refuse to refuse to remove any and all weeds, grass and other growth as required by the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance, or to comply with any of the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance, or to comply with any of the provisions of Section 3 of this ordinance, after the expiration of three days from the date of the service of the notice as required by Section 4 of this ordinance, then and in that event, the Marshal of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall proceed to remove all weeds, grass, briars, cans, boxes, cans, crates, paper, lumber, parts of discarded automobiles, trucks, rags and other debris, from the sidewalks, on the owners property, or adjacent thereto, placed there by said owner, lessee or agent and the cost of such removal by said Marshal shall be approved of record by the Board of Trustees of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall constitute a lien on said property, and shall be enforced as other liens as provided by law, in the enforcement of liens against real property.

SECTION 6: Any and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

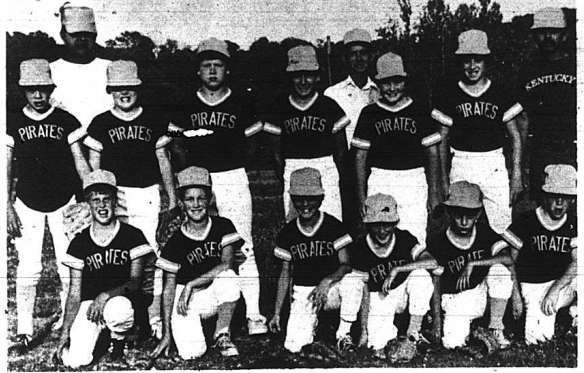

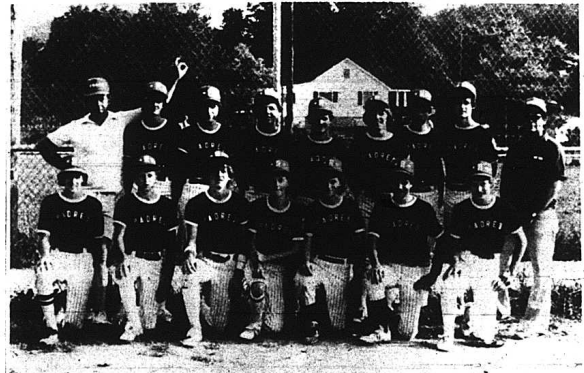

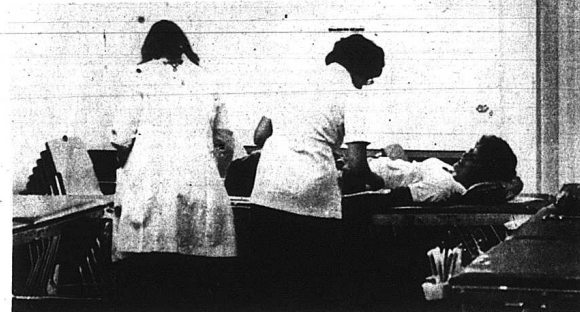
**Miss Hunt Attends Convention**

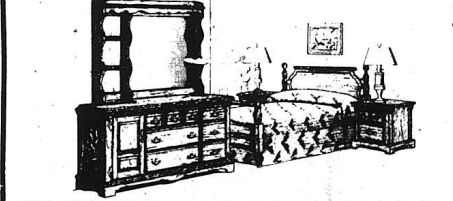
