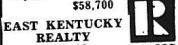

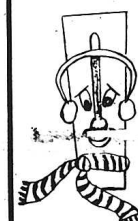

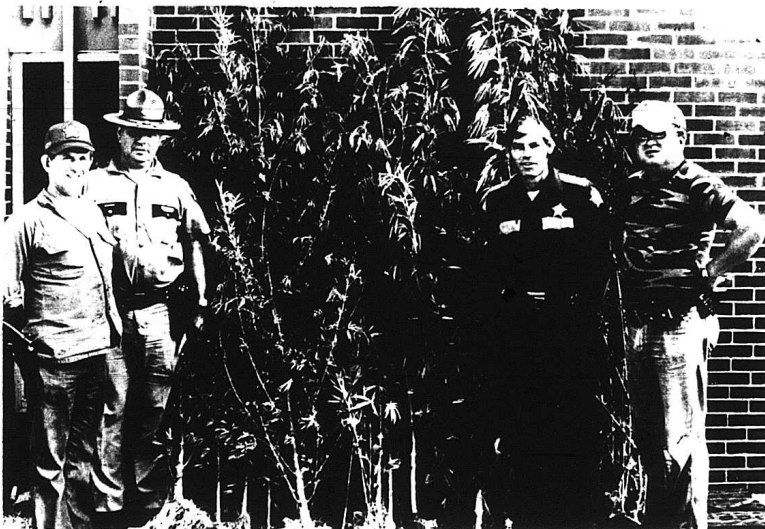

Sixty-four plants of marijuana confiscated in raid Sunday

Local law enforcement officials raided the residence of Sherman Kirby on Chestnut Ridge about 8:30 Sunday morning and confiscated about 34 plants of marijuana growing in a garden and in a tub and about 34 marijuana plants curing in the lower side of a chicken house there.

Clarence Kirby, 22, was arrested and brought to the Rockcastle County Jail where he was charged with cultivating and producing marijuana and placed under a \$5,000 bond.

As of July 15, 1982 the charge of producing marijuana was changed from a misdemeanor to a felony. The penalty for the offense is now a prison term of from one to five years.

Sheriff William Taylor, Deputy Sheriff Willie Powell and State Troopers Greg Ennis and Robert Belcher took part in the raid.

Rockcastle man killed in logging accident in Buffalo community

A Rockcastle County man died Monday as a result of a logging accident the previous Monday, July 19.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 28 at the Cox Funeral Home Chapel by Bro. Larry Proffitt. Burial was in the Mize Cemetery.

Paul Mink, 35, of the Buffalo community, died at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington from head injuries suffered when a tree which was being felled apparently crashed into a nearby dead tree and splintered, striking Mink.

The accident occurred about 2:30 p.m. as Mink and three other men, Leo Mink, Gilbert Mink and Roger Dykes were in the logging woods about 5 miles from Laurel County in the southeastern section of Rockcastle. The three other loggers were reportedly about 200 feet away from the accident victim and did not witness the incident.

Employees of the Ikerd and Bandy Coal Company, who were working above the loggers helped to get Mink out and met the ambulance.

Mink was a partner with his two brothers in a lumber and sawmill business at Buffalo.

He was born in Rockcastle County, June 1, 1947, the son of Charlie Mink of Route 1, Mt. Vernon and the late Jewell Jones Mink.

Survivors besides his father, are his wife, Mrs. Lena Caldwell Mink of Route 1, Mt. Vernon; two daughters, Tina Sue and Tanya Lynn Mink, both at home; seven brothers, Burn, Leo, Gilbert, Owen, Ronald, Delmer, Dale, and Leo Mink, all of Route 1, Mt. Vernon; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Dora Ann Mink of Route 1, Mt. Vernon.

He was preceded in death by one son, Paul DeWayne Mink.

Baker reportedly settled in the area and later died and was buried not far from the Cave.

He was paid 25 cents a day. He, like the others, had to work 10 days so they could be paid by a government \$2.50 gold piece.

Among the relics and interesting items left for viewing in the Cave from early work there are leaching vats, an iron kettle, a two wheel ox cart and numerous tools.

Blue mold again threatens tobacco crops in the area

A disease that can cause a tobacco farmer to lose hours of sleep and hard work has been found in Rockcastle County, as of last week.

Extension Agent for Agriculture, Tom Mills, said Tuesday that he had confirmed four fields of tobacco with the "dreaded, blue mold disease." "It was found in the Freedom area and Pongo and Willalla sections of the county," Mills said.

Mills said the hot, humid days and wet mornings that Rockcastle farmers have been experiencing the last two weeks are ideal conditions for blue mold. "We were beginning to think we were going to get through the season without any blue mold," Mills said. "But I guess it was just hope."

"During damp, cool periods, blue mold develops rapidly, killing large areas of leaves," Mills further said. "Most of the disease that has been found so far has been on young, fast

growing plants of tobacco," he said.

He also said the disease will affect the smaller crops of tobacco that were set out without an emulger being used and this has been the case in all four crops affected so far. "The beds were a main source of the mold and that once a farmer finds out he has blue mold in his field he should destroy his old beds," Mills said. Tobacco beds are a breeding place for the disease, Mills said, because

plants in the beds are close together and it is usually damper in the beds and the blue mold spores usually hit younger plants first.

Mills recommended that if a farmer finds blue mold in his patch, the best thing to do is to spray a quart of Ridomil to the acre on the ground and in it, if the tobacco can still be plowed. "If the tobacco cannot be cultivated, then it is against the law to spray Ridomil directly on the foliage," Mills said.

Great Saltpetre Cave full of interest, history and legend

One of the most interesting and historically significant sites in Rockcastle is the Salt Petre Cave located on Ky. 1004 (the Brush Creek Road), nine miles from the county's I-75 South exit.

According to legend, the Cave was discovered by John Baker, a Tennessee man who came through the area with his wife and three children hunting for new territory to settle in. The story goes that the family was hungry and desperately in search of food. They tracked a bear into the Cave following a light snowfall. Storytellers say the family wandered around in the Cave for several hours and finally found their way back out, whereupon the father soon killed a rabbit. The family was so hungry they ate it raw.

Baker reportedly settled in the area and later died and was buried not far from the Cave.

War as well as the Civil War.

The Cave played an important part in various aspects of life of area residents. Following the Battle

of Wildcat Mountain. Ten miles away, wounded soldiers were carried to the Cave, which served as a hospital, of sorts. According to stories "Biggy" told his grandson, six soldiers were

buried in the Cave. Apparently the Rebel Army which marched close, never found the cave and it was used as a hide-out for livestock and farm animals when the Armies came through.

Now lit by electricity, early settlers used torches, candles and lanterns to light the Cave so it could be used for social events such as square dancing. The large floored room, which was used for dancing, is 21' high.

Long ago, Mullins does not know the exact years, there was a 51 member secret organization of Odd Fellows which met in the Cave regularly.

The largest room is 50' 4", according to Mullins, and could easily seat 1,500 people. Several country music shows from Renfro have been held there throughout the years as well as some church services.

Mullins says there are three springs inside the Cave, two of which never go dry. There are perhaps 2 1/2 miles of walking routes inside the Cave as even though the Cave is only about eight tenths of a mile straight through from one entrance to the other.

A popular "fatman's squeeze" winds around about 400-500 feet.

The Cave and adjoining campsite are now owned by John Lahr and managed by

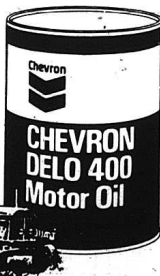

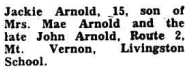

Fish and Wildlife Department replacing fish

The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has determined it will cost \$38,116.72 to replace the estimated 69,306 fish killed in North Fork of Elkhorn Creek in Fayette County in early June. Assessments of numbers of fish killed are based on accepted statistical sampling procedures.

The replacement costs include the monetary value of the fish killed, transportation costs for restocking the creek and expenses incurred by the department during investigation of the fish kill.

Officials of the state fish and wildlife department met with representatives of Production Plating, Inc., Lexington, on July 23 and agreed to a 30-day waiting period during which the plating company will consider its position with respect to the assessment of the fish kill and the replacement costs.

Pickle Making Do's and Don'ts

Pickle making isn't all that hard if you just follow an up-to-date tried-and-true recipe and pay special attention to some important do's and don'ts.

A free UK circular on making pickles and relishes is yours for the asking at the Rockcastle County Extension office, located in Mt. Vernon. Here is a list of do's and don'ts for successful pickles:

- Do use fresh, firm, perfect vegetables. Use slightly underripe fruits. Start pickling them soon after they've been picked-the same day, for sure.
- Use pure, coarse salt if

at all possible. Never use iodized salt, as it can darken the pickles.

Use either cider or white distilled vinegar with a 4- to 6-percent acidity (40 to 60 grain).

Use fresh whole spices for the best flavor and color.

Use only soft water in making brine. If your water is full of minerals, let it stand for 24 hours. Remove scum from the top, and ladle water from the kettle, leaving sediment in the bottom.

Use white table sugar unless the recipe calls for brown sugar.

Use unaxed cucumbers for whole pickles, because brine won't penetrate the wax. (Many commercially-marketed cucumbers have been dipped in wax to preserve their fresh look).

Use Water-Bath Canner. Do process all pickle products in your boiling-water-bath canner. Even though many old-time pickle recipes call for the open-kettle method, don't do it. There's too much chance for spoilage organisms to get in when food is transferred from cooking pot to jar.

Do remember that pickling isn't just limited to cucumbers. Some of the other things you can pickle are okra, green beans, beets, green tomatoes, mixed vegetables, pears, peaches, crab apples and watermelon rind.

MAKING SAUERKRAUT

Q. My homemade sauerkraut turns an unappetizing color after a few months. Is it due to the heat treatment in a boiling-water-bath canner?

A. No. The heat treatment which is necessary to prevent spoilage does not cause sauerkraut to turn dark.

Dark kraut may be due to a number of factors,

such as: (1) using table salt, (2) using too much salt, (3) extremely warm weather during fermentation, or (4) minerals in the water. The best temperature range for fermenting sauerkraut is 65-70 degrees, and it usually takes two to three weeks for full development of flavor.

Q. Some of my sauerkraut has a pink tint. Is it safe to eat?

A. Pink kraut is caused by certain types of yeasts which grow when the amount of salt in the sauerkraut is not measured correctly, or when the temperature is not right.

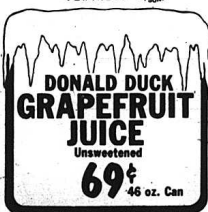

"and some other kind of fungicide will have to be used."

Mills said that like Black Shank, once Blue Mold is contracted by a plant it is destroyed. He said that Blue Mold had been reported in every county around Rockcastle and it had been just a matter of time before it was found here.

"There is no real evidence to the fact, but once tobacco has been topped and sugared, it seems to be more immune to Blue Mold," Mills said. "Blue Mold is a problem that a farmer hopes he is not faced with because it could mean the total loss of a tobacco crop for this growing season," Mills said. "But if any farmer thinks he has the disease in his crop, he should contact me as soon as possible and we will do everything we can," he said. To contact Mills about Blue Mold, call 256-2403 or go by the second floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse in Mt. Vernon.

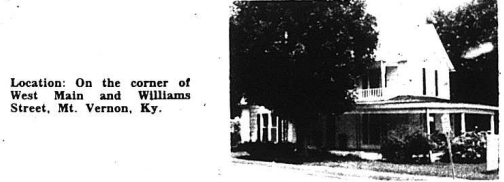

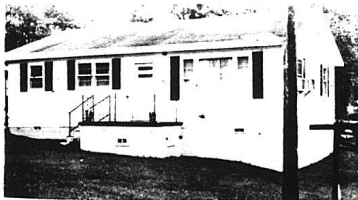

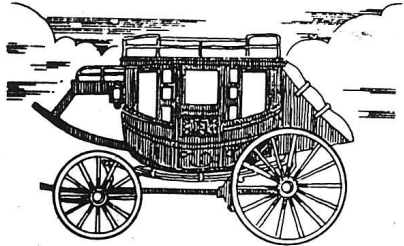

Glaucoma

Glaucoma is increased pressure within the globe of the eye, producing visual loss. This visual loss can be avoided by early diagnosis and proper treatment.

Improved treatment and better methods of measuring the eye's pressure now make it possible to recognize and control most glaucoma. In the majority of cases special eyedrop medications are all that is needed to maintain the eye's pressure at normal levels.

than wood duck or teal. The possession limit is double the daily bag limit. Shooting hours are from sunrise until sunset, prevailing time. Before participating in this special duck season, hunters must obtain a permit card, on which they indicate how many days they hunted and how many ducks of each species they took. These cards must be mailed back to the fish and wildlife department after the season ends.

State Awards Contracts

In spite of the economic downturn of the nation's economy, July will see the largest amount of contracts ever awarded during a one-month period in the state Transportation Cabinet. Transportation Secretary Frank Metts said that this month's three lettings—on July 2, July 22 and July 30—will total \$134 million. The previous record month was September 1979 when \$117 million in highway projects went to contract. Included in the July 30 letting are two resurfacing

projects for Rockcastle County.

The cabinet will resurface KY 1326, Mt. Vernon-Broadhead Road, from KY 1505 to the curb and gutter section, a distance of 5.2 miles. KY 1650, Lincoln County Line-Ottawa-KY 70 Road, will be resurfaced from KY 618 to KY 70, a distance of 2.9 miles. Metts said that contract dollars are a boom for Kentucky's economy. "This \$134 million will turn over seven times in our economy."

Bass fishing good on a few lakes

A few lakes have been producing some fair to good fishing. At night bass and crickets in stickups; black bass slow in late afternoon jumps and at night along drop-offs; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 84 degrees.

Rough: bluegill slow with worms and crickets in stickups; crappie slow along deep banks; clear to murky, falling, 1/2 foot above summer pool and 84 degrees.

Green: white bass fair trolling deep runs along drop-offs; bluegill fair in stickups; black bass slow at night with plastic worms and spinnerbaits along shoreline; clear to stable, at summer pool and 85 degrees.

Dale Hollow: bluegill fair in stickups; walleye slow trolling deep runs across points; clear, falling, at normal pool, 86 degrees.

Cumberland: crappie fair to good over deep submerged cover in lower lake; bluegill fair with worms and crickets in stickups; walleye slow, trout good, clear to murky, stable, 14 feet below the timberline, 84 degrees.

Laurel: trout fair to good at night off deep banks; bluegill fair with worms and crickets in stickups; black bass slow at night with plastic worms off rocky points; clear, stable, four feet below power pool and 83 degrees.

Herrington: bluegill fair with worms and crickets along deep banks; black bass slow fair at night with plastic worms; clear, stable, at summer pool and 85 degrees.

Cave Run: musky slow trolling deep runners along creek channels; bluegill fair along shoreline; black bass at night with plastic worms; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 86 degrees.

Grayson: crappie fair 8-10 feet deep in submerged cover; bluegill fair along

shoreline; clear, stable at summer pool and 85 degrees.

Buckhorn: white bass slow at night along main river channel; crappie slow at night in submerged cover; bluegill slow along shoreline; clear, stable, one foot below summer pool and 86 degrees.

Dewey: catfish fair with cutbaits along drop-offs; crappie slow 8-10 feet deep in submerged cover; black bass slow with plastic worms; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 84 degrees.

Fishtrap: catfish slow with cutbaits in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout slow; clear to murky, stable, at summer pool, 85 degrees.

Deer hunts scheduled for Lexington-Blue Grass Depot

Deer hunts will once again be held this year at the Lexington-Blue Grass Depot Activity's Richmond Facility. Archery hunts will be held October 9, 16, and 23 and gun hunts on November 20, 27. Because of the expected large number of requests to hunt at Blue Grass, a lottery drawing will be used to select which hunting applications are chosen. Application for the drawing must be made by postcard (or comparable sized index card) with only one name allowed per card and only one card per applicant. More than one postcard per applicant will disqualify applicant.

Each postcard must include name and address (including zip code), telephone number and which hunt, archery or gun, is desired. Hunting dates and hunting areas will also be decided by lottery.

Hubbard and wife, or parent and child who wish to hunt together should indicate on their postcards marital status or age in the case of juveniles. No one under the age of 14 will be allowed to hunt

and hunters 16 and under must be accompanied by an adult.

The postcards should then be stapled together and sent in one envelope. All postcards must be postmarked no earlier than August 10 and no later than September 10.

A \$15 fee payable in cash on the day of the hunt will be charged per person. Crossbows are prohibited. The only guns permitted are breech-loading shotguns of ten-gauge maximum and twenty-gauge minimum, firing a single projectile, i. e., slug only.

All deer hunting regulations will apply to these hunts. No one who has already taken two deer in Kentucky in 1982 will be allowed to take part in the hunts. Hunting at Blue Grass will be discontinued whenever the deer harvest quota is met, or upon orders from the installation commander.

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CF campaign chairperson appointed

The Kentucky/West Virginia Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has announced the appointment of Mrs. Kathy Cromer as chairperson of the Fall "Tricks" campaign in Mt. Vernon.

"On behalf of the thousands of CF young people and their families, we are grateful to Mrs. Cromer for this commitment," said Charles Thayer, president of the Chapter.

Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children and young adults. A degenerative and ultimately fatal disease, it attacks the respiratory and digestive systems. Every day, an average of five children are born with CF, and every day, three child-

ren die of it. Since CF exhibits symptoms much like other genetic ailments, many CF children go either undiagnosed or misdiagnosed.

"This is a far bigger health problem than we may realize," said Thayer. "Ten million Americans—one out of every 20 of us—are carriers of the gene which as yet is unidentifiable. When two carriers conceive a child, chances are one in four the child will have CF, and the chances are two in four that the child will carry the CF gene."

Thayer also stated, "Ten years ago, a CF child could not expect to live to reach his/her teens. Now,

many CF children live to see their 21st birthday. Such advances are made possible through funds raised from events like the one scheduled in this community. Public awareness of CF will be greatly increased through community involvement in the "Makin' Tracks" event."

The mission of the Foundation is to find the means for prevention, control, and effective treatment of Cystic Fibrosis. In addition to providing research grants to study the causes of CF, the Kentucky/West Virginia Chapter also supports three local Centers that specialize in diagnosis and medical care for CF patients.

SS says direct deposit saves

People in the Rockcastle County area who receive social security checks can easily arrange to have them deposited directly into an account at any financial institution. Bob Anderson, social security manager in Richmond, said recently.

Direct deposit can be made to an account in a bank, savings bank, savings and loan association or similar institution, or Federal or State chartered credit union.

Having checks deposited directly into an account has several advantages, Anderson said. They include: The person does not have to travel in line to cash or deposit the check. Money is immediately available if the person is away from home. No check cashing charges. No chance of a check being stolen.

To arrange for direct deposit, a person should contact the financial institution and ask for direct deposit form SF-1199. Completing the form only authorizes deposits, it does not authorize withdrawals from an account.

People considering direct deposit should ask the financial institution how they will handle direct deposit and whether there will be any charge for the service.

Once a person has his or her check deposited directly, he or she should continue to notify Social Security of any change in address or other event which may affect direct deposits. This is important since Social Security needs a person's correct address so that notices can be sent properly.

Are you majoring in Math or Science?

If you want to be a science or math teacher, the Kentucky Department of Education has an offer that's hard to refuse—a loan that you don't have to pay back.

The department hopes to lure more teachers into the math and science field and put an end to a shortage of teachers in those areas with a unique loan program.

In a National Science Teachers Association survey conducted in December 1981, secondary school principals reported that among newly employed science and math teachers, 50.2 percent were unqualified to teach science or math.

The student's college of education by August 1st and sophomores, junior and senior undergraduates are eligible.

"To our knowledge, no other state has a program like this," Barber said. "We are the first state to take any affirmative action to alleviate the problem."

Each of the colleges and universities with teacher-training programs was given an allocation based on the number of teachers certified in the past from that school.

"If a student receives a loan and decides not to teach, they must pay the loan back at the current interest rate on treasury notes plus 3 percent," Howard explained. "Other financial aid programs are at a much lower interest rate

so before they take money from this program they should be sure of their mind.

If a loan is not repaid, the individual's teaching certificate will be revoked unless extenuating circumstances can be proven, Howard added.

Each eligible institution will establish a screening committee to verify that a student is eligible for the loan. They will be looking at a student's grade point average, which must be at least 2.5, college entrance scores and financial need for the applicant among other things.

The screening committee will then forward the applications and names in rank order of eligibility to the Department of Education.

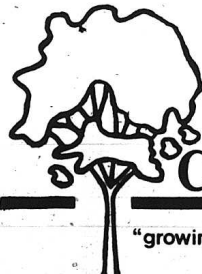

at which the hospital staff will be on hand to inform you of the services you can expect to find there.

For instance, did you know that the newly-built Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) at the hospital is specifically equipped to care for long-term patients? At the SNF patients will receive the finest physical, medical, social-psychological and spiritual attention. This type of attention is provided by a highly competent staff and is very important to the well-being of the patients with an extended stay at the hospital.

Only the long-term patients be well cared for at the hospital, but the same expert attention will be given to patients staying there for a short period of time. The medical staff at the hospital consists of four doctors and one surgeon who have been carefully selected to provide the highest quality medical treatment.

The doctors are assisted by a nursing staff composed of professional registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, nursing technicians, nursing assistants, ward secretaries and attendants. Along with the hospital pharmacist, dietitian, pathologist, physical and respiratory therapists, they strive to make the patients' stay at the hospital as comfortable as possible.

There are many specialized departments that are essential to the operation of the hospital as a whole.

The emergency room is one of these departments. It is furnished with modern equipment to give the quickest and best possible care to any person brought in because of sudden illness or injury. The emergency room is staffed 24 hours a day and is easily accessible for the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service.

Other departments play an important role at the Rockcastle County Hospital. The radiology department provides radiologic, nuclear

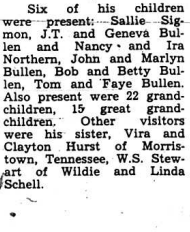
