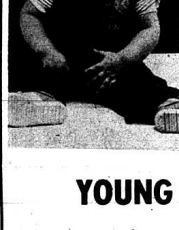

"DANNY AND JAMES" (Cont'd from second front), as comfortable as possible at Rockcastle's SNF. "He gets depressed sometimes," says Mrs. Stratton. "How does Danny feel about his condition?" "He doesn't talk about it very much. You can't take care of his condition by an immediate response-material or otherwise. But we're going to be hard to meet his needs."

She adds that the staff at the SNF can read his lips now with little difficulty. "There had to be a period of him getting used to us and us getting used to him. He used to say he wanted to go back to U.K., but he doesn't want to go back anymore. Now the Cub Scouts and the Sunday School class treat him as one of them and Danny likes that. He doesn't want any differentiation."

Danny and James were separated for four months until James' condition stabilized and he could also be moved. He arrived last Wednesday at Rockcastle's SNF, and once again he and Danny are roommates. Like Danny, he is constantly on a respirator and is dependent upon nurses for his exercise.

What chance does James have in the future? "You don't really know," Mrs. Stratton said. "I guess you hope for a miracle. I think James' family hopes he can come home someday." His mother has a degree in psychology from Berea College, but both his parents have decided to do woodworking in their home in order to be free to visit James whenever they want to. They have decided that James is more important than money or a job. James is covered by Medicaid, but his parents have control over the treatment he receives.

James has a sister, 5, and a brother, 3, that come to visit with their parents. Danny also has visitors, such as his mother, foster mother, foster brother and his real brothers and sisters.

How long will the boys be at Rockcastle's SNF? "They'll be there as long as we can meet their needs—they may need rehabilitation programs we

can't provide," said Mrs. Stratton. "We'll send them someplace that can." As long as the SNF can meet the needs, they will be there indefinitely.

Mrs. Stratton stresses how good the community care didn't have the community to help with them we couldn't have done it. It's a benefit that this is a small place because word spread around."

Until their conditions necessitate a change, Danny and James will remain roommates at the SNF where baseball bats are lined up on the fluorescent lamps over both their beds, there is a poster of Bo Duke on the wall in their room, and there is a big cardboard "Old Mac Danny's" barn in the Day Room.

Mrs. Stratton said that Danny had been saving a place in his room for James since he arrived at Rockcastle's SNF in March. "He said, 'Well, James is a Cub Scout now, when James got here. He has grinned ever since.'"

"When James saw Danny he smiled real big and it was obvious he knew who he was."

## Curious and elusive healer - the "madstone"

As a follow-up to last week's story about home remedies, here is a story about one of the most curious and elusive of all medicinal and legendary healers—the bane or "madstone" as it came to be called, because it was most often used to treat mad dog bites.

The madstone, strange sounding to modern medical science, is a stony piece of calcium found in the stomachs of a variety of animals including mules, horses, whales and especially deer. The light mottled madstone is composed of minerals which form around some foreign substance in the animal's stomach which can't be digested. From modern investigation, the foreign substance, which might be a piece of wood or metal, causes an allergic reaction or reactions comparable to the formation of a pear inside an oyster.

According to an article by Paul Keopig which appeared in the Happy Hunter Ground magazine earlier this year, a study done on a Georgia refuge showed only one madstone in its stomach. Another study in the southeastern section of the United States found one madstone in approximately 1,500 deer collected and examined. In the book "Diapuntia" by Terry Albenough, various instances are given in that section of Rockcastle were familiar with the madstone and its touted effects. Older residents placed the likelihood of finding a madstone at one deer in 50.

Some settlers used the madstone on malleable and infectious, but the stones had the ability to rid the body of poison. But the madstone's value had been known for centuries as kings and emperors reportedly sought healers because they thought the stone could nullify the effects of one of the most

lethal of the royal drink. Jundice, plague, melancholy and intestinal worms were treated with powdered madstone. Napoleon gladly accepted a madstone as a gift from the Shah of Persia in 1808. "It was a kindly gift, a prized possession—one which was passed down through the generations and well-guarded by owners."

One of the illnesses greatly feared by early settlers in America was rabies, a disease brought on by the bite of a rabid animal. Rabid dogs and animals posed a constant threat since there was no preventative for the animals and no treatment for humans, therefore little hope for cure once the hideous disease was contracted. Madstones reportedly had an amazing record of success when used to treat rabid animal bites. Whether from unknown secret chemicals leeching from the stone when it touched raw flesh is not known, but it is

## Council hears complaints from citizens concerning several matters in city

Complaints about the officers of the Mt. Vernon city police, dogs running loose in the city and children playing in the streets, consumed most of the time at the regular monthly meeting of the Mt. Vernon city council Monday night.

Mrs. Betty Abney of the Hummel section of the county, was at the meeting to inform council members of dealings her family, especially her two sons, Michael and Daniel, have had with city police officers in the last several months.

Mrs. Abney told the council that she was highly upset with the way Police Chief Ronnie Hurd handled an accident involving one of her sons last year. She said that Hurd allowed a man to leave the scene of the accident after, according to Mrs. Abney, the man caused one of her sons to wreck his vehicle. She also told the council that Chief Hurd arrested her son for driving under the influence and when she asked for a breathalyzer on the other man, Hurd refused.

Another incident Mrs. Abney brought to the council's attention was a wreck one of her sons had during a storm several months ago which, according to Mrs. Abney, totaled a brand new car. She said her son was being followed by a city police officer on the Hummel Road and he was more concerned with "what was behind him than the tree that was down in the road." She said he ran into the tree, totaling the car. However, Chief Hurd told the council, after Mrs. Abney left the meeting, that Officer Dickie Collingsworth was called to the scene after the accident had happened.

Mrs. Abney also complained that one of her sons had been given seven citations for no operators license although he had a written statement from District Judge Dan Venters to the effect that the boy did have an operators license. Hurd told the council that he had never given either one of Mrs. Abney's sons a ticket for no operators license but he said he did not know if other law

officers had. Mrs. Abney emphasized that a council that neither one of her sons had ever been found guilty on any of the charges brought by law officers.

The council did not take any action concerning Mrs. Abney's complaints, but Mayor Roland Mullins did instruct Chief Hurd to continue to crack down on drunk drivers in the city. He further told Hurd that if either of Mrs. Abney's sons were just driving through town and not bothering anyone to leave them alone.

Mrs. Datha Hanesl and Mrs. Mollie Ballinger were also at the council meeting to see if anything could be done about stray dogs in the city and especially in their neighborhood, Davis Street. Mrs. Ballinger asked if there was a city ordinance pertaining to dogs and City Attorney Carl Clontz acknowledged there was. He suggested to the ladies that the next time they had trouble with stray dogs they should call the city police. Mrs. Hanesl said she had called the county dog warden several times but he would not return any of her calls.

The two women also voiced concern over children playing in the street in their neighborhood. They said they did not feel it

was safe. However, Clontz told the women that children could be taken to planning to be done.

In other business, the Benfro Valley Boat Dock has a new operator. Ed Jackson and his wife Mary will officially be the new operators of the dock as soon as the lease agreement can be drawn up. The Jacksons have already taken over at the boat dock.

Karen Now was hired by the council for one-half day per week to assist City Clerk Mary McClure in the office.

The council paid the outstanding bills and the meeting adjourned.

## State to resurface Brodhead-Mt. Vernon road

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract for resurfacing 8.1 miles of road in Rockcastle County.

The Allen Co. of Winchester, received a \$145,864 contract to resurface 3.2 miles of Ky 1326, Mt. Vernon-Brodhead Road, from Ky 1562 to the curb and gutter section and 2.9 miles of Ky 1650, Lincoln County Ky 70 Road, from Ky 618 to Ky 70.

The project is part of the state's 1982 resurfacing program. Transportation Secretary Frank Metts has recently increased funding for the program to \$90 million.

"We're going to black top one mile in ten of the

25,000 miles of state maintained roads," he said. "We're protecting the investment Kentucky has made in its roads."

Last year the Transportation Cabinet resurfaced 1,100 miles of roads for \$40 million.

## Legal services to low income clients

Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc. ("Apparled") with its administrative office in Prestonburg, is a federally aided, non-profit corporation providing legal services to low income clients in 37 counties in eastern and central Kentucky. The Somerset office, one of eleven branch offices serves residents in the counties of Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Wayne.

To be eligible for the legal services offered by an apparled office, a person must reside in one of the counties served by the office in which assistance is sought, must have income at or below the federal

poverty line, and must be unable to obtain legal services from any other source. Apparled attorneys cannot handle criminal cases, nor can they represent individuals in cases in which a money settlement would pay for a private attorney's fees. Presently there are other criteria being developed that will limit the types of cases accepted because of the loss of funds to adequately staff the offices and handle the many cases presented.

A variety of legal services are offered by Apparled such as family law, bankruptcy, debt collections, individual civil rights violations, environmental in-

fringements, and pension benefits. Other matters handled are consumer transactions, sales contracts, garnishments, housing, landlord/tenant evictions, education, welfare, AFDC, Social Security, SSI, unemployment benefits, and employment terminations.

The Somerset office of Apparled is staffed by three attorneys, two paralegals, and two secretaries. In an effort to better meet the needs of low income persons in Rockcastle County, a staff member from Somerset will be at the Rockcastle County Courthouse on Monday, August 13, 1962, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. The purpose of this visit will

be to talk to prospective clients concerning their legal problems. Any prospective client desiring an appointment for August 23, should call the Somerset office to arrange a time.

Additional monthly visits will be scheduled if this proves successful.

## Many agencies use SS number

There are several agencies that use the Social Security number for other than Social Security purposes, Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

The Internal Revenue Service, for example, requires people to show their Social Security number on military service number for all members of the armed forces.

Social Security numbers are also required for anyone who applies for or received benefits under any Federal or federally subsidized program. Today, there are comparatively few

people who do not need a Social Security number for one purpose or another, Anderson said.

Among private organizations, there is a growing trend to use the Social Security number in their own numbering systems and control records. Such use is neither authorized nor approved by the Social Security Administration.

There is no Federal law that requires a person to furnish a number to these organizations for such purposes, Anderson said.

On the other hand, there is no provision against such use of the Social Security number by an organization for its own records if the number is

**Home Food Preservation**  
**For Special Diets**  
**Sodium-Restricted Diets**  
 Commercially canned vegetables and some frozen vegetables may have too much sodium for persons on sodium-restricted diets. And pickles, relishes and condiments are, of course, high in sodium content. Many foods may be preserved at home without salt for persons who limit the sodium.  
 Listed below are some recipes without salt. Other recipes from regular food preservation books may be successfully adapted to sod-

ium-restricted diets by omitting salt when it is included for flavor such as in canned vegetables. When salt is needed to provide a crisp texture or act as a preservative such as in cucumber pickles or sauerkraut, cooking the salt will not result in a good product.

**Frozen Lima Beans**  
 Select well-filled pods. Beans should be green, but not starchy or mealy. Shell and sort according to size. Heat in boiling water: small beans, 2 minutes; medium beans, 3 minutes; large beans, 4 minutes. Cool promptly in cold water and drain. Pack into freezer bags or containers, leaving 1/2" head space. Seal and freeze.

**Frozen Green Beans**  
 Choose bright green, plump, firm pods with sweet, tender peas. Do not use immature or tough

peas. Shell peas. Heat in boiling water 1 1/2 minutes. Cool promptly in cold water and drain. Pack into freezer bags or containers, leaving 1/2" head space. Seal and freeze.

**Canned Tomato Juice**  
 Use ripe, juicy, perfect tomatoes. Wash, remove stem ends, cut into pieces. Steam until softened, stirring often. Put through strainer. Add 4 teaspoons lemon juice to each quart of juice. Reheat once with boiling-hot juice to 1/2" of top. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust jar lids. Process water bath for 10 minutes; quart jars, 10 minutes. Remove jars from bath and let cool 12 hours. Store in cool, dry place.

**Chili Sauce**  
 5 medium onions

3 medium green peppers  
 About 6 lbs. tomatoes  
 3 cups vinegar  
 2 1/4 cups brown sugar, packed  
 1 tablespoon dry mustard

Grind onion and green pepper together through coarse blade of food grinder or blender. Remove skin from tomatoes. Cut tomatoes into eighths to make 3 quarts. Combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil and boil gently, stirring frequently, for 3 hours or until mixture is reduced one-half volume. Pack hot chili sauce into clean, hot pint jars. Fill jars to 1/4" from top; Adjust jar lids. Process boiling-water bath for 15 minutes (start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling). Remove jars and complete seals if necessary. Set jars upright on a wire rack or folded towel to cool.

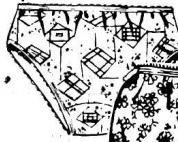

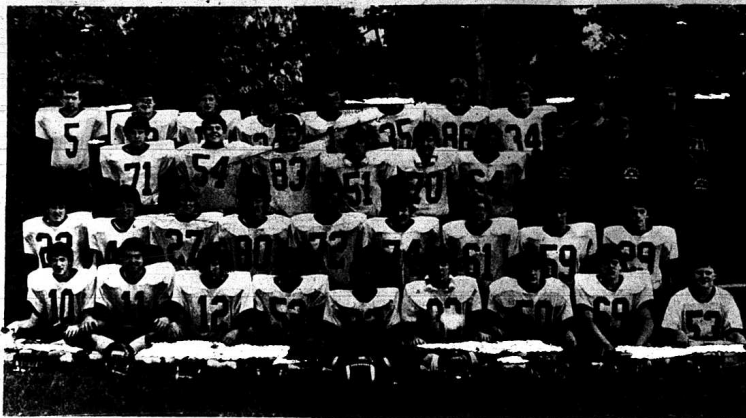

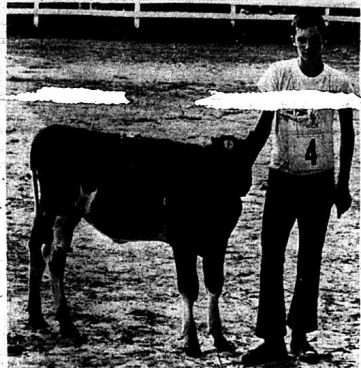

Wash beets, leaving 2" stems and taproots. Cover with boiling water and cook whole until tender. Drain, peel and slice. Loosely tie allspice and cinnamon sticks in a clean, thin white cloth. Combine sugar, vinegar and water; add spice bag (allow to boil); cook slowly 15 minutes. Remove spice bag. Pack beets into hot pint jars, filling to 1/2" from top. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water for 15 minutes (start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling). Remove jars and complete seals if necessary. Set jars upright on a wire rack or folded towel to cool 12 hours or overnight.

**Corn Relish**  
(Yield: 4 pints)  
2 qts. corn, whole kernel (use fresh, 16-20 medium-sized ears or frozen, whole kernel, six-10 packages)  
1 pint sweet red pepper, diced  
1 pint green pepper, diced  
1 1/2 cups onion, chopped  
1 cup celery, small, chopped or sliced  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups vinegar  
2 teaspoons celery seed  
2 tablespoons mustard, dry

Fresh corn-Remove husks and silks. Cook ears of corn in boiling water for 5 minutes; remove and plunge into cold water. Drain, cut corn from cob. Do not scrape cob.

Frozen corn-Defrost overnight in refrigerator or for 2 or 3 hours at room temperature. Place containers in front of a fan to hasten defrosting.

Combine peppers, celery, onions, sugar, vinegar and celery seed. Cover pan until mixture starts to boil, then boil uncovered for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Mix dry mustard and tumeric and blend with a small amount of liquid from boiling mixture; add with corn, to boiling mix-

ture. Return to boiling and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

This relish may be thickened by adding 1/4 cup flour blended with 1/4 cup water at the time the corn is added for cooking. Frequent stirring will be necessary to prevent sticking and scorching.

Pack loosely while boiling into clean, hot pint jars, filling to 1/2" from top. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water for 15 minutes (start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling). Remove jars and complete seals if necessary. Set jars upright on a wire rack or folded towel to cool 12 hours or overnight.

known that great faith, sometimes a healer in itself, was exhibited by Indians as well as early settlers as they applied the madstone, when available, to the animal bites.

Reportedly, if the stone stuck to the wound, rabies was present. To complete the healing process, the madstones had to stay attached to the area for an unspecified time, usually a few hours. If the stone fell off the wound after a short while, it was reappplied quickly so the healing could continue. When the stone would stick no longer, the patient was re-

leased, certain the wound had been properly treated and the poison neutralized. The madstone could be used indefinitely as long as it was recharged with fresh prior to each application.

In questioning those in the area who might have some knowledge of the use of madstones, Dr. Jack Lewis of Berea, formerly of Mt. Vernon, said that his great grandfather, Dr. John "Boss" Lewis of Hyden, Ky., who became a doctor and surgeon during the Civil War had a madstone which he used in his medical practice in Leslie County. (Even though Dr. Jack Lewis did not inherit the madstone his great grandfather used, he does have one which was first acquired well over a hundred years ago.) The madstone is in the possession of Walter Lewis of Lexington, another descendant of "Dr. Boss."

From a book "Old Border Men-A History of Leslie County" by Mary Brewer Lewis, comes his interesting account among others:

"Before anyone in Leslie County had a madstone, Wash Mosley's son, Grant, was bitten by a rabid cat. A madstone had to be found. Upon inquiry, Mosley learned that there was a stone in Clay County at Goose Creek.

"After prayer, he took his son on horseback across

the rough mountains and down the long, uncleared valleys to the woman who had the stone. She took the child into her home, washed the wound with sweet milk and placed the stone over it. When applied to the wound, the stone was said to become soft like a sponge and drew the poison out. It would cling to the wound as long as there was venom in it.

"For three days the treatment continued, as pus was drawn from the wound and the swelling went down. The stone fell from the wound but the woman tied the stone again to the boy's leg, washing often in sweet milk to be sure of a cure.

"At last the woman and Mosley started the long trek home. At the head of Muncy's Creek, several miles above Hyden, the horse began to act strangely, biting, kicking and running so that they had to leave him there in a wayside barn where he died, also of rabies. Mosley and his son walked the rest of the way home. Grant fully recovered and had no more complications, from the bite."

This account is by Mosley's great granddaughter, Gladys Begley. The book also includes a picture of "Dr. Boss" and one of the madstone he used.

I can find no one in

Rockcastle County who knows of a Rockcastle County resident who ever owned a madstone; however, I may not have talked to the right person. Any information on the subject might be interesting to pass on to readers.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A statement of current income, family size, names of all children and adults, and social security numbers of all household members is required plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, they should contact the school.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if the family's size and income changes during the school year, the family should contact the school for a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for free or reduced price meals if the family income falls at or below that shown on the family size and income scale.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to:

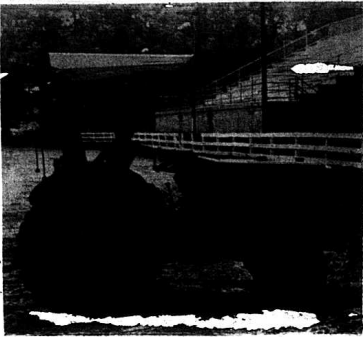

For a hearing to appeal the decision, the policy on file in each school and in the superintendent's office contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

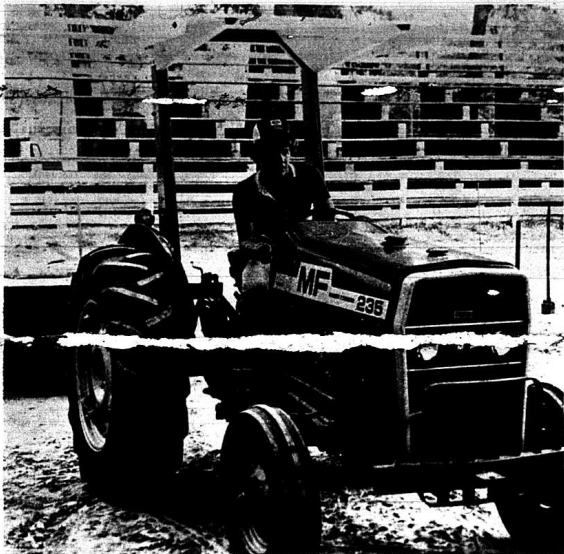

## Danny and James: Roommates again at RCH after four-month separation

Danny Sutton is nine years old. James Creech is just two years old. But the seven year age difference doesn't keep them from being close friends. In fact, they are roommates in the Child Nursing Facility at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

This is not the first time they have been roommates. Before Danny came to Rockcastle's SNF in March 1982, he and James were in the same children's intensive-care unit at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington.

"Danny and James became close there because

their problems were so much the same," said Mrs. Serena Stratton, Social Worker for the SNF at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

The "problems" Danny and James have in common are related to their medical conditions: both are quadriplegic, paralyzed from the neck down. Although the boys were born normal, circumstances have brought on the paralysis that has changed their whole lives.

Danny was eight years old when he was hit by a car as he ran to the mailbox after getting home from school. The accident happened last August. "It's a miracle that he is alive," said Mrs. Stratton. "There

was somebody there when he had the accident to do CPR or he wouldn't be alive."

Danny is originally from Mt. Sterling, and he has seven brothers and sisters. Because of home problems, he was placed in a foster home in the north end of the state about a year before his accident. The state is responsible, for him financially and gives permission for his treatment, although his mother has some say in the decisions that have to be made. After the accident Danny was taken to the U.K. Medical Center. It was there he met James. James is from Moxelle, which is near Hazard. He

## Parents should be aware of possible hearing problems in children

The Rockcastle County Health Department urges parents to be on the lookout for childhood hearing problems, especially in very young children. Even mild hearing loss caused by ear infections can interfere with learning ability and speech development.

Warning signs include such things as:  
Birth to 3 months-not being startled by a loud sound.  
3 to 6 months-not enjoying rattles and other sound making toys.  
6 to 10 months-not un-

derstanding "no", "bye-bye" and other common words.  
10 to 15 months-not imitating simple words and sounds.

15 to 18 months-not being able to follow simple spoken directions.

Children of any age can be tested for hearing by an audiologist using appropriate methods and equipment. If a parent can answer "yes" to the question: "Have you had any worry about your child's hearing?" a hearing test should be obtained.

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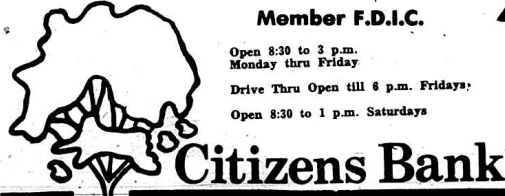
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
