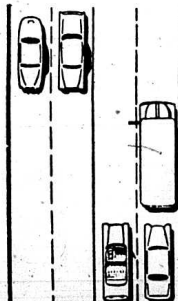
How to save a child's life...



Every school bus is a 'STOP' signal

No Median - All traffic STOPS

Median Strip - Traffic moving in bus direction STOPS



The bright yellow school bus, laden with children going to or from school, is a familiar sight on Kentucky highways.

It travels in the early morning, at midday, during afternoon rush hours, and all too often, after dark. Whenever it travels, however, you, the motorist, must exercise special caution to protect the lives of its young passengers. A bus loading or unloading children will display a STOP sign and flashing red lights.

If you meet a school bus loading or unloading children on a highway that is not divided by a median, you must stop no matter which direction you are going, and wait until the bus moves on. On a divided highway, you must only stop if you are going in the same direction as the school bus; if you are across the median going in the opposite direction, you may proceed with caution. A painted area in the middle of the road is a median and cars going in both directions must stop.

The STOP sign that swings out from the side of the school bus places the safety responsibility squarely on your shoulders. So be careful - the child you save may be your own.

Kentucky Revised Statute 189.370 States:

"Whenever any school bus or church bus used in the transportation of children is stopped upon a highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, the operator of a vehicle approaching from any direction shall bring his vehicle to a complete stop and shall not start up or attempt to pass until the bus has completed receiving or discharging passengers and has been put into motion; provided, that this stop requirement shall not apply to vehicles proceeding in the opposite direction from a church or school bus which is stopped upon a highway where multi-lane roadways providing for opposite directions of travel are separated by a raised, depressed, mountable or non-mountable median."

Sixteen charter members organized First Baptist Church in 1887

The First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon was organized on November 28, 1887, in a meeting at the Rockcastle County Courthouse. Among the 16 charter members was the first pastor, John Caldwell Carmical. The other charter members were: Mrs. Harriet Carmical, Mary Carmical, Sarah F. Carmical, Kryshiah Arnold, J.L. Arnold, H.H. Baker, Mrs. Maranda Baker, F.D. Colyer, H.C. Gentry, Susan Pollard, James Livesay, Sarah White and Lydia White.

For two years before the organization of the church Rev. Carmical had held services once a month in the Christian Church building on the corner of Highway 25 and Church Street, which later housed the Mt. Vernon Signal office. The building was torn down in 1975.

The congregation continue to hold services in that building until 1897, when it built and moved to the new building on the west side of William Street, near Main. Here the early congregation continued to worship until 1929. That building too was torn down in the early 1970's.

In 1929 the congregation

moved to the present location at the corner of West Main and Craig Streets. The first service in the present building was held September 15, 1929. The service was held downstairs because the upstairs was unfinished, despite the depression, and a spacious educational building was added. A parsonage was built in 1939 and the final payment on the indebtedness was made in April of 1945.

The church was gone through some lean years financially and as a result, some unique arrangements were made. For instance, one pastor's salary was arranged on a percentage basis. He was to receive 75 percent of the first hundred dollars taken in each week and 50 percent of anything above \$100. At one time two boxes were placed at the main entrance to receive old collections.

Through it all, the church has maintained a missionary spirit and exhibited community awareness and patriotism. During World War II, the church voted to buy War Bonds rather than make some desirable repairs.

The First Baptist Church has also organized missions and

helped smaller churches, among them the Northside Baptist Church and Baptist churches at Flat Gap, Chestnut Ridge, Sand Springs and Well Hope. In April, 1934, when radio station WRVK in Renfro Valley began operating, First Baptist Church became one of its earliest clients and began broadcasting the Sunday morning service directly from the auditorium. That outreach ministry has been continuous to the present.

Serving the church as pastor throughout its nearly one hundred year history, besides Rev. Carmical have been: W. Briscoe; E. Edgar Allen; Rev. Jamerson; Rev. Mitchell; F.R. Duke; Fred Taylor; Dave Webb; W.S. Taylor; J.W. Mahan; E.S. Gaylor; W.C. Younce; Wendell Selew; Raymond Lawrence; Lee Hopkins; William Hall; Ray Cummins; Jack Bruce; Raymond Roaden and Charles Hedrick.

In June of 1945 the church membership was 460, with Sunday School enrollment at 352. The average attendance for the year at that time was 141. The current enrollment of members is 874 with 340 of these on the non-resident list.

KSP July activity report

During the month of July, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity: 1222 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations). 59 were D.U.I.'s.

361 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 256 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 233 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 171 were property damage only accidents; 57 were personal injury accidents; there were five fatal accidents; 103 persons were injured and six persons were killed.

218 criminal investigations were made resulting in 135 criminal arrests. 44 persons attended two safety programs conducted by the Ky. State Police.

During the month of July the KSP at London reports the following activity for Rockcastle County:

107 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations). Six were D.U.I.'s.

30 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 38 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 21 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these 16 were property damage only accidents; 5 were personal injury accidents; there were no fatal accidents; seven persons were injured and no persons were killed.

16 criminal investigations were made resulting in 14 criminal arrests.

Import Loophole Costs Jobs

Anything I can do to help keep jobs in the Fifth District, I'll do. Just last week I went to war over a ridiculous loophole in the import regulations which have caused 150 citizens in McCreary County to be laid off.

Several months back, the president of a tent manufacturing company in Stearns, Kentucky asked me to look into a serious problem he was facing with skyrocketing tent imports.

Cheap foreign imports were flooding our country and had now forced him to lay off 150 out of his 230 employees.

After looking into this problem, I was outraged to find that because of a ridiculous loophole in our law, our own government has opened up the door for these cheap imports. Let me tell you just how ridiculous this was. Normally, foreign manufacturers have to pay a duty which gives our American companies a chance to compete with

them. In 1979, though, the U.S. Customs Service, after looking into the footnotes to some arcane rules, decided that if a foreign tent manufacturer glued a little plastic applique logo onto a tent, his tent would move into a new customs classification for "ornamented" tents. In this new category, they could get away without paying a single penny of duty.

The net result: cheap, foreign imports are flooding our country. With American companies paying their workers about \$5.75 per hour, while companies in Hong Kong and Korea are paying about 75 cents,

American companies just can't compete without the duty fees charged on imports.

The losses could be staggering! One hundred fifty workers in Stearns have been laid off. Five thousand workers in similar plants across the country could lose their jobs. And if the Asian manufacturers find they can get away with this cheap loophole, they'll add plastic appliques to even more products—stealing away as many as 50,000 jobs.

After learning these facts, I decided to go into battle for these jobs and to close this outrageous loophole in our law.

On August 9, 1982, I joined with the president of this company in testifying before a special inter-agency committee. I told them how important these jobs are in McCreary County—that this company had opened up jobs for young people, who just a few years ago would have had to leave the area to look for work.

I told them the choice was clear: we could allow a stupid loophole to transfer these badly needed jobs to Korea, which has a 5.2% unemployment rate, or we can keep them in McCreary County, which is suffering with a 13.4% unemployment rate. And the choice is that clear.

And, finally, I've contacted the other congressmen who have tent manufacturers in their districts, so we can join forces in getting this loophole closed.

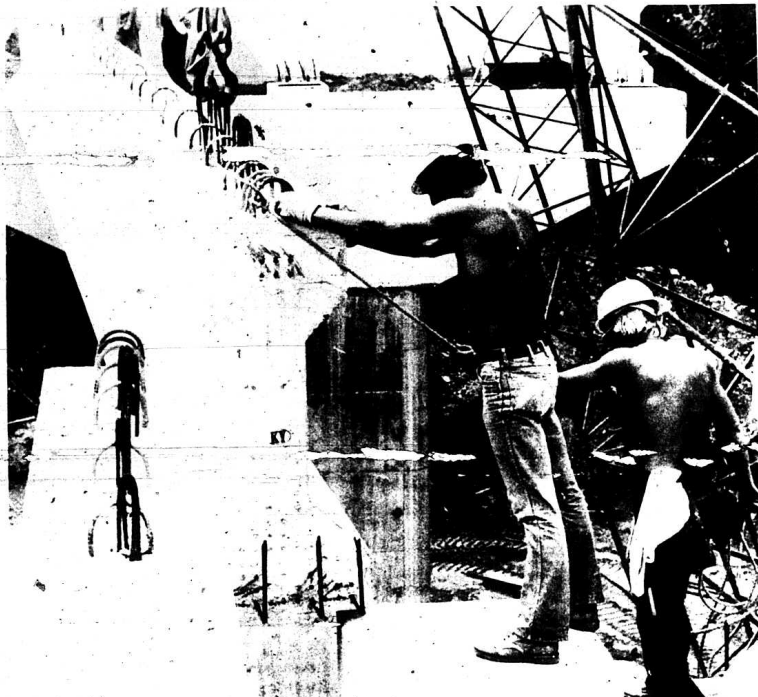

"The valley where time stands still"

"When it's springtime in the mountains and the dogwood blossoms flow, we'll be back in Renfro Valley as in days of long ago."
In the 1920's, John Lair wrote these words concluding a song that described his feelings about where he was born and where he longed to return. He had left his quiet Kentucky valley and entered the bustling world of America's glamorous new industry—radio—in the fast town of Chicago. But glamour and fast living were not Lair's style—the simplicity of life and song in the Kentucky hills was. So the innovative country boy living in the big city went home to bring the two together. The unique result was the Renfro Valley Barn Dance and Sunday Morning Gatherin'.

"Buffalo Gals", "The Soldier and the Lady" and "How Many Biscuits Can You Eat?" King George was noticed tapping his foot throughout their performance.
On November 4, 1939, Lair began his program with "Howdy, Folks, welcome to Renfro Valley Barn Dance." The historic occasion marked the beginning of over forty years of weekly broadcasts from the valley. Times were hard then and most people were skeptical of this venture and the new approach to radio. But people came from every state in the union and several foreign countries to see this unique little community and to meet the man who still welcomes them to the "valley," where time stands still.

After forty years the "Barns" are still filled every Saturday night with people who keep coming back, bringing their children and grandchildren to get a glimpse of and to hear in the song the way their ancestors lived.
John Lair credits his love of ballads, folk music and even his first dreams of creating Renfro Valley to preserve these songs and traditions to his great grandmother, Matilda Dalton, who sang these songs to him when he was a

The Kentucky Highway Marker erected in Renfro Valley by the state begins with these words: "From Renfro Valley in November of 1939 originated the first series of radio broadcasts aimed at preserving the customs, culture and music of pioneer America. The Renfro Valley Barn Dance and Sunday Morning Gatherin' consisted of local people and unknowns who later, under the direction of John Lair became prominent in country music."
Five months before the November opening of the Barn Dance and radio broadcasts in the valley, in June of 1939, Lair was asked to come and bring with him the Coon Creek Girls (the first all girl string band that put together) to the White House for a special performance given by Pres. and Mrs. F.D. Roosevelt for the King and Queen of England on their first visit here. The group represented folk music in America and performed with such notables as Marian Anderson, Kate Smith and Lawrence Tibbett. They sang "Cindy"

small boy. She left one old faded, hand-written ballad to him and from that he built the largest library of source music in America—said to include over three hundred thousand pieces.
The heritage of music in the valley is the heritage of all of rural America, in song. What opera is to Europeans, ballads and folk music are to Americans. They are the stories of our forebears and their way of life as they built this country. They are the stories of their hardships, loves, play-parties, barn raisings, quilting bees, religious beliefs, feuds, births and deaths, all handed down from generation to generation. Those interested in the heritage of this past are strongly attracted to Renfro Valley where they find preserved in music the feelings of forefathers and mothers as they lived in sickness and strife, frolic and fun.
Gene Autry, with whom Lair was associated in earlier times and whose friendship he still claims, wants Mr. Lair's collection of folk and country music, considered to be the biggest library of music of its sort. Mr. Lair says Autry will be afforded a chance to buy the collection "in due time."

A few years ago a new Red Barn was built across the road from the original Renfro Valley Barn by a competitor, but before long, Renfro Valley Folks, Inc. bought the new barn and began staging two shows in each barn every Saturday night. The shows in the old barn feature Blue Grass and the more traditional country music with little or no electrical instruments. The new Red Barn features the more modern country music sounds complete with drums, electric keyboard and guitars.
The shows are timed so that visitors can easily see

Milburn pleads guilty to murder of motel clerk

A Rockcastle County man pled guilty to murder Friday morning in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Paul Milburn, 46, of Route 2 Mt. Vernon, pled guilty to the murder of Milford Kemp on September 25, 1981 at the Best Western Motel, located at the Burr interchange of the

Attorney William Chambliss, the public defender, provided Milburn by the state, entered Milburn's plea, and the Commonwealth's attorney, Benny Ham, recommended that Milburn be given a forty-year prison sentence.

Milburn was also indicted by the grand jury on three other counts, first degree robbery, first degree rape and kidnapping. No action had been taken by the court on these three indictments, as preliminary hearings, according to a source close to the case, the other three charges are expected to be dropped.

Another Rockcastle man pled guilty on Friday in Circuit Court to aiding and abetting Milburn in the murder of Kemp.

Donald Newcomb, of the Livingston area, entered a plea of guilty and Commonwealth Attorney Ham recommended a sentence of five years.

Newcomb was also indicted on charges that he aided and abetted Milburn in first degree robbery, rape and kidnapping. No action had been taken on the other three charges as of Wednesday.

Two other men, James Brown of Mt. Vernon, and Duke Gibson of Livingston were also indicted with Milburn and Newcomb and they are standing trial this week in Circuit court.

Brown is being tried on aiding and abetting Milburn in the murder, aiding and abetting Milburn in rape and kidnapping.

The Commonwealth is trying Gibson on aiding and abetting in murder, rape, robbery and kidnapping. His trial was still going on at press time.

The guilty pleas and indictments of the four men stem from incidents which reportedly occurred on Friday, September 25, 1982.

Milford Kemp, who was the night clerk at the Best Western Motel, was found shot in the face with a shotgun by two motorists around 6 a.m. Kemp died before the ambulance arrived. The robbery charges were also a result of the incident at Best Western. At the time, police thought robbery was the motive for the murder, according to State Police Detective Roland Huckabee.

The rape and kidnapping charges also stemmed from the same Friday night, during which the four men reportedly entered a dwelling in the Pine Hill section of the county and forced a man and a woman to go with them. They allegedly placed the man in the trunk of their car but the man later escaped. He told police, according to Huckabee, that he managed to undo the trunk and get out while the car was still in motion.

The women, Barbara Renner Ballinger, was taken from the Sand Hill area where she was reportedly raped. She was later taken back to Pine Hill and released, Huckabee said. Sentencing hearing date for Milburn and Newcomb will be August 19th.

Local man critically injured in accident

A Rockcastle County man was critically injured early Tuesday afternoon, when the farm tractor he was driving turned over on a hillside and rolled over on him on his farm in the Scaffold Cane section of the county.

Virgil Abney, a retired farmer, was mowing a field behind his house when the accident occurred, according to deputy sheriff, "Jibb" Hasty. Hasty said that when Abney's tractor turned over it threw him out of the seat on the ground and the tractor rolled over on him a couple of times before coming to rest on its top.

Abney's neighbor, Elmer Hale, heard the tractor turn over and along with another neighbor, Neal Powell, arrived first at the scene, according to Hasty. "When I got to the scene Virgil had swallowed his tongue and was smothering," Hasty said. "I got his tongue out of his throat and held it down, but by the time the ambulance arrived he had stopped breathing again," he said.

Mike Barr, head of the ambulance service and a physical therapist, performed an advanced life-saving technique on him to breathe again, according to Hasty.

Abney was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and later transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington where he is listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit.

Fiscal Court called meeting

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court gave its approval to the Rockcastle County Hospital to join with other hospitals throughout the state in a program that will make available low interest loans for equipment, during a special called meeting of the Fiscal Court, Monday morning.

The program is being funded by the Kentucky Development Finance Authority, which will issue tax-exempt bonds. Interest rate on the money turned back to the hospitals for the leasing of equipment will be around 10.5%, according to Robert Cromer, acting Rockcastle County hospital administrator. Cromer said that each Fiscal Court across the state had to approve the program and that, at the present time, only seven counties had not passed the resolution.

With time running out on the landfill now being

used by the County, magistrates also voted, unanimously, Monday to give Charles Mullins engineers and land surveyors, authority to make feasibility studies on two sites in the county, to determine which site would make the best landfill. The two sites under consideration are one in Sand Springs owned by Jibb Hasty and the other near Pine Hill, owned by Emory Foster.

The court voted unanimously to rent the barns located at the fairgrounds to D.A. Robbins for \$250 per year.
County surveyor Charles Mullins was at the meeting and told the court that his elected office guaranteed him an office in the courthouse and that as soon as one became available, he wanted to move in.
The court made some transfers of money and the meeting adjourned.

Ford named to committees

Danny R. Ford, State Representative for the 80th House District of Rockcastle, McCreeay, Pulasaki and Lincoln counties, was appointed to serve on several interim-legislative committees.

Representative Ford will serve as a member of the Business Organizations and Professions committee and the special legislative Task Force on Small Businesses.

A Review: The government and the selling of Kentucky

The Brown Administration intends to spend, during fiscal year 1982-83, \$1.8 million in personal service contracts to fund two advertisement campaigns and an economic development office in New York City. A \$200,000 contract has been awarded to Doe-Anderson, Inc., of Louisville to continue the promotional campaign of "Kentucky and Company" the state that's run like a business. This represents an increase of \$200 over last year's "Kentucky and Company" contract.

The declared purpose of "Kentucky and Company" is to recruit new industry to Kentucky and this begins the program's third year.

Kentucky's unemployment rate was 8.5 percent in April of 1981 and 10.3 percent in April of 1982.

According to a publication called the Gen'l Business Scan, published by Alexander Grant and Com-

pany's CPA's, twenty-two factors were used to rank the 48 contiguous states on business climate and Kentucky ranked 39th.

A \$924,000 contract has been awarded to Doe-Anderson, Inc., of Louisville to continue the "OH! Kentucky" tourism campaign. This contract is \$176,000 less than the one last year, which the Secretary of Commerce said is due to lower production costs.

Last year the focus of the "OH! Kentucky" campaign was primarily aimed within the Commonwealth's border. This year's campaign is directed at the surrounding states and Michigan and Pennsylvania.

The Secretary of Commerce has stated that the "OH! Kentucky" campaign has for the most part, kept increases in state park lodging rates from affecting occupancies.

However, very recently the state Parks Department has blamed a 94 percent decline in statewide park occupancy for May 1982 compared with May 1981, on increased state park fees which have been raised anywhere from 21 percent to 52 percent for the 1982 season.

The state commerce department will pay aid in individuals, by way of personal service contracts, \$191,826 in fiscal year 1982-83 to run the state's New York Economic Development office.

The declared purpose of this program, established under the Carroll administration, is to coordinate trade missions and generally woo industry to Kentucky. Also, the Secretary of Commerce has stated that state bond issues underwritten in New York are coordinated by this office.

The Secretary of Commerce has said that last year the New York office was responsible for bring-

ing 450 new jobs to Kentucky.

The manager of the New York office will receive a maximum of \$97,416 per year. Included in this amount is a monthly salary of \$4,568 plus a housing differential of \$833 and a tax differential of \$141. Also, travel expenses not exceed \$20,000 and entertainment expenses not to exceed \$10,000.

The associate director of the New York office will receive a maximum of \$55,852 and the office's administrative assistant and secretary will receive maximum amounts of \$21,220 and \$16,138 respectively.

During fiscal year 1981-82 the New York office ran \$7,400 over the original amount contracted for by the state.

Over the past two years the advertisement campaigns and the New York office have received a measurable amount of criticism, from both elected officials and private citizens. This criticism has been directed at the cost versus results of these programs.

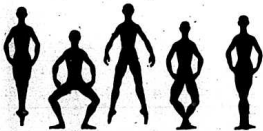

matters relating to administrative, regulatory or operating issues which, because of their smaller size, uniquely impact small businesses.

Earlier this year, during the 1982 legislative session, the Task Force earned a reputation for reducing the size and scope of government regulation.

"Basically, my goal in the legislature is to reduce the size of government and make it easier to live with. I believe the laws and regulations of government should protect and serve everyone and not be unnecessarily restrictive or burdensome," Representative Ford said.

Representative Ford continued, "The purpose of interim-committees is to study various proposals and fact-based bills for the legislature to consider during its next session. Also, I will be working on matters of concern to small businesses, for the purpose of streamlining government regulations. This is especially important, because small business enterprises constitute the single largest employer in the Commonwealth."

Representative Ford concluded his remarks by saying, "By reducing the size of government, we can make government more efficient and give the taxpayers a break at the same time."

Representative Ford is a Republican from Mt. Vernon and is serving his first term as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

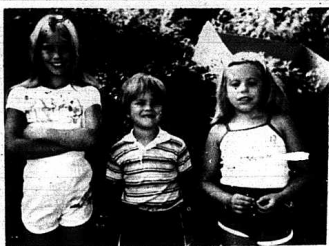

"With You Always"

In the Great Commission Jesus promised to be with those who observe all things He commanded, from now unto the end of time on earth (Matt. 28:19-20). This great promise is most reassuring to Christians as they are confronted with trials and temptations daily.

We are not to think of Him as being with us in times of emergencies only (as a fire extinguisher), but the One who is by our side always.

"With you always"; "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee" (Heb. 13:5), are most comforting words to those who forsake evil and cleave to the Lord. Friends give Him His rightful place as the Pre-eminent One. Accord Him the honor of being with you in salvation, authority, instruction, worship, and tribulations, and you have His promise of being "with you always", even in Heaven.

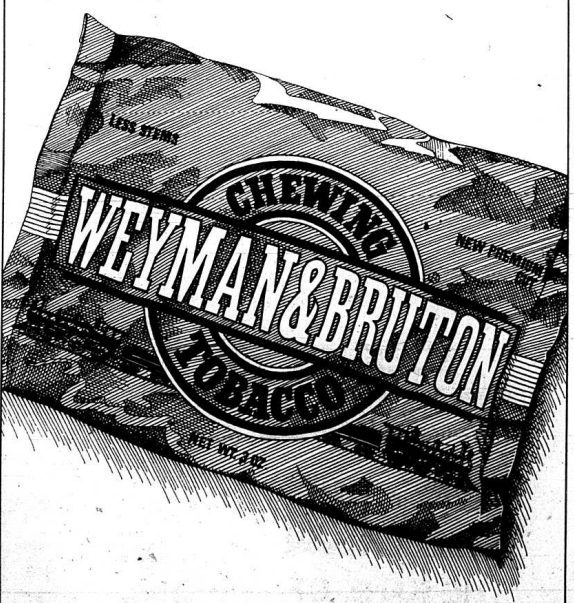
