## County tax rate set by court; pass resolution to add tax referendum

The county tax rate set by the county judge executive and the fiscal court and approved by the state granted final acceptance Tuesday by the fiscal court at its regular September meeting.

The tax rate for real estate was set at 14.5 cents and the personal property tax rate was set at 17.57 cents per \$100 of property. This is the first year, according to Irene Bales, county clerk, that the state has recommended a different rate for real estate and personal property.

Both rates are considerably higher than last year's combined rate of 12.88 cents per \$100 of assessed property value.

The county real estate tax rate of 14.5 cents is designated to be used in the following manner: 8.2 cents will go to the county's general fund; 2.5 cents to the health department; 1 cent to the library; 1.3 cent to agriculture and 1.5 cents to soil conservation.

The personal property tax rate of 17.57 cents was approved as follows: 10.1 cents per \$100 to the county's general fund; 3.2 cents to the health department, 1 cent to the library, 1.77 cents to agriculture and 1.5 cents to soil conservation.

The 1982 assessment on personal property is up from last year also. According to Elmer Hale, tax commissioner, additions account for the increase from \$21,887,808 assessment in 1981 to the \$23,921,287 figure for personal property for 1982. The increased tax rate from 12.88 cents to the corrected rate of 16.22 cents on personal property should increase county revenues considerably.

(Irene Bales, county clerk, notified us Wednesday morning that the state had made a mistake in placing a decimal point in one of the tax rates. The soil conservation rate should be 15 cent rather than 1.5 cents. This lowers the total rate for both real estate and personal property by over one cent per \$100. The revised tax rate will likely have to be approved by the court later.)

The court passed a resolution to allow the referendum, aimed at continuing operating the ambulance service to get the ballot "on this fall." The judge's shortsightedness with respect to the ambulance service was a result of the termination of the federally funded Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA). The county, which operates the service, had used CETA employees as ambulance personnel. When CETA funds were cut off, the county was forced to assume the extra financial burden. Without the extra levy the county says it will have to discontinue ambulance service to area residents.

Deputy sheriff Clarence Hasty was hired as dog warden to replace Farmer York. Hasty will be paid \$325 per month. Dog licenses will later be sold through the sheriff's office.

Michael Hayes of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District met with the court to request it approve a contract with the agency to provide administrative services and do an environmental review in connection with the grant application for a rail spur to be built at the Industrial Park. ## Over four million dollar school budget approved by board; tax rate set

A yearly school budget of \$4,619,195 was approved Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the Rockcastle County School Board. Over half of the total amount (\$2,387,000) will be spent on salaries for teachers, aides and supervisors and on instructional materials. The next largest single expense is transportation which is estimated to cost \$550,000. In the 1982-83 school year, Estimated income from local, state and federal sources is expected to meet the anticipated expenses, thus creating a balanced budget.

## EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

**Freeze Fresh Eggs Only**  
You can freeze freshly-laid eggs very satisfactorily. Fertile or not, they'll keep as long as 6 months in the freezer, but you must prepare and package them the right way.

Would it be good economics to buy eggs at the food store while they're plentiful and low-priced to freeze for later use? No. They won't be fresh enough for a high-quality product. Just buy your own eggs from a farm nearby.

**Freezing Egg Whites**  
Separate whites from yolks and freeze the whites in airtight freezer containers. Pack them in the amounts you'll need for different recipes. Then you can thaw and use the whole contents of a container at one time.

**Freezing Egg Yolks**  
You need to add a salt, honey or sugar to egg yolks or whole eggs before freezing. This "stabilizes" them, keeping them from getting grimy or sticky after thawing.

Separate the yolks from the whites, then add 1 teaspoon of salt, honey or sugar to each cup of yolks. It takes approximately 12 egg yolks per cup. Stir the stabilizer into the yolks with a fork, gently, so as not to whip any air into them.

Pack yolks in airtight containers, label and freeze.

**Freezing Whole Eggs**  
Gently stir the stabilizer.

er into whole eggs, again at the rate of 1 teaspoon salt, honey or sugar per cup. It takes about 5 eggs to make a cupful.

You can pack all the eggs together in one freezer container, or you can put them in a plastic ice-cube tray. Three tablespoons of whole egg per ice-cube compartment will make each frozen cube equal to one egg.

Freeze the ice-cube tray of eggs, then pop the cubes out and package them in a plastic freezer bag. That way, you can thaw just the number of eggs you need.

**Note Stabilizer Used**  
Write on the label what stabilizer you used, so you can make any adjustments after thawing.

Check the yolks, whether it's whites, yolks or whole eggs, and how many.

**Thawing & Using Frozen Eggs**

Thaw eggs completely before using. It will take 8 or 9 hours in the refrigerator and about 4 hours at room temperature.

Properly frozen and thawed eggs should taste the same as fresh eggs and have the same nutritional value. They work fine in all recipes calling for eggs.

Use them as soon as possible after thawing, for they will lose this fresh quality quickly if you don't.

I want you to get one egg back together from separate frozen whites and yolks, use 1 tablespoon of yolk and 2 tablespoons of white.

**Storing Apples, Winter Pears**

A root cellar is the ideal keeping place for tart fall cooking apples and hard winter pears. Root-cellar temperatures here in Kentucky range from about 40 to 50 degrees F and the humidity usually stays a high 90 to 95 percent.

But don't store fruits and vegetables close together. Partition off a little section from the rest of the root cellar for storing apples and pears.

**Wrap Each Fruit**  
Wrap each apple or pear individually in newspaper and put them gently in ventilated wooden boxes, lugs, crates or shallow cardboard cartons.

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SOUND, hard, mature, late-ripening apples will keep from 4- to 6 months. Freshly-picked pears that are mature, but still green and hard, will keep from 2 to 7 months.

Check fruits every few weeks and remove any that might be starting to spoil. Don't forget about them!

**Ripening Stored Fruits**  
Once you remove them from cold storage, apples can be used right away for cooking or eating. The pears will probably need ripening. Several days at room temperature, and out of the direct sunlight, will probably do the trick.

**Check for Storage**  
Check for storage whether it's whites, yolks or whole eggs, and how many.

If you'll watch the ads and garage sales or shop the second-hand stores, you can often pick up a used refrigerator for very little money.

A refrigerator is the modern-day replacement for a root cellar, offering about the same temperature range for keeping foods fresh and safe. But refrigerator air is much drier, so use perforated plastic bags to help hold (in natural moisture, and check the fruit more often than you would in a root cellar.

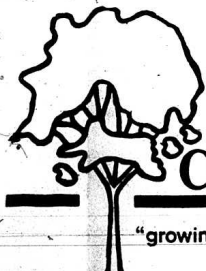

## What's It Like To Have A Chimney Fire?

It's no fun. If it doesn't burn the house down, it will probably wreck your chimney and scare you half to death. Here's how it happens.

Begin with one dirty chimney—let's say a fireplace not cleaned for a couple of years. The soot lining the chimney fire is saturated with flammable stuff called creosote. (More details on creosote is available in any dictionary.) It doesn't take much to ignite creosote—a newspaper fire sending flames up to the damper is enough.

Once kindled, creosote burns with joyous abandon. In a matter of seconds the fire spreads up through the flue creating a draft that only helps things along. At this point your average chimney fire begins to roar and howl, sending the occupants of the house running for cover.

If you run, you'll be treated to a real fireworks show. As the creosote fire builds and intensifies the heat melts the mortar between the bricks. The red-hot mortar actually drips into the flue, only to be caught up in the tremendous updraft, and these little fire balls shoot out the chimney and onto the roof. If you're lucky, the chimney will fall apart destroying one end of the building—if you're not, this miniature volcano can bring the whole house down.

However, if you stand your ground, a chimney fire can be controlled. Put out the fire in the fireplace with an extinguisher or sand. Cover the opening with a wet blanket, call the fire department, and hope for the best. **BUT IT SHOULD BE POINTED OUT THAT HAVING YOUR CHIMNEY CLEANED IS A LOT EASIER on the nerves than the sand and wet blanket method.**

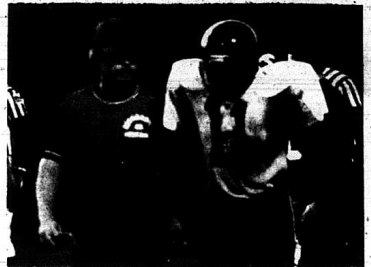

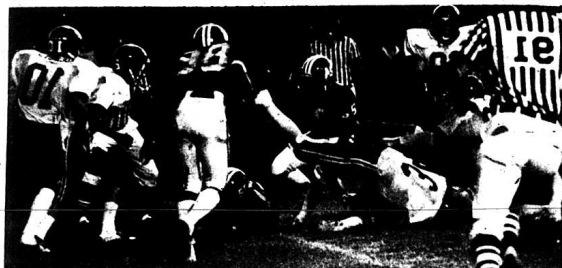
