An Environmental Review Record, respecting the within project has been prepared by the above-named county which documents the environmental review of the project. The Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination, and copying, upon request.

Rockcastle County will undertake the project described above with Community Development Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Section 119 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Rockcastle County is certifying to HUD that Rockcastle County and Judge Bob Jasper, in his official capacity as Judge's Executive, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibility in relation to environmental review, decision-making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Rockcastle County may use the CDBG funds, HUD will accept the objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) That the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer approved by HUD; or (b) That applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure, (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD Louisville Area Office, P.O. Box 1044, Louisville, Ky. 40201. The Kentucky Office of the Community Development, Capital Plaza Tower, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD or KOCED. No objection received after October 15, 1982 will be considered by HUD or KOCED.

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such statement are as follows:

(a) Only temporary and minimal adverse effects will occur as a result of construction activities such as noise and dust levels during daily working hours.

(b) The long term positive environmental effects outweigh the short term adverse effects listed above. The positive effects include:

-Creations of 65 permanent, full-time jobs for low & moderate income families

-Improvement of a site at the Rockcastle Industrial Park

## Local man drowns at Laurel mine site

A 31-year-old Rockcastle County man drowned Friday morning, September 10 at a strip-mine site in Laurel County after the 50-ton coal truck that he was operating dropped 150 feet from an embankment into a pool of water, authorities said.

The victim was identified as Elijah Wynn, a resident of Orlando.

Doug Bowling, a Laurel County deputy coroner, the accident occurred about 7:30 on land known as the Benge property, 14 miles east of London on Ky. 638. Bowling said Wynn, who was working for Reed Construction Company, apparently was driving in reverse and drove too far onto the embankment, causing the truck to tip over backward. Bowling said another worker recovered Wynn's body from four or five feet of water. He said the body was found under the truck. Bowling said the victim may have suffered an incapacitating injury that contributed to the drowning.

## County's Doughboys were also farm boys

Even though it is not Memorial Day or Armistice Day or Veterans' Day, this afternoon on the Mt. Vernon World War I veterans who still live in Rockcastle County. Anytime seems appropriate for such an attempt at honoring a man, however, not have included all surviving W.W.I. soldiers. If this is the case, the money was bleeding due to a subsequent article on them.

At ninety three years of age, John H. Rowe, of Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon, doesn't remember much about the War, but he remembers being knocked unconscious by a bullet which pierced his eardrum and left him deaf in the right ear. Mr. Rowe, who was 29 when he entered the service in 1918, spent his six months in the army fighting the Germans in France. His discharge papers show he was with the American Expeditionary Force near Soissons, France, Company K, the 150th Infantry.

Mr. Rowe has, in later years, lost the hearing in his left ear making it a little hard for him to communicate, but when asked about his war injury, he said he didn't realize he had been shot until he discovered he was bleeding after he "came to". He said some fellow helped him up and "we cussed him (the German who shot him) a little."

Mr. Rowe has been a member of the Disable American Veterans Association for 62 years. His disability is classified as 53%. After his discharge in 1919, John Rowe returned to Rockcastle County to marry Liza Corsett from Pulaski County and to work at the stone quarry

before opening a grocery store in Mt. Vernon.

John Lair says his stung in the army during World War I "wasn't army" for his memories of wartime service are pleasant. Twice he was pulled off overseas shipment and he says he "never pretended to be sorry of it". He never left the United States, serving most of his time in the Quartermaster Division, doing office work, serving as postal clerk in Harrisburg, Pa. and once performing in and helping produce an army play.

During his stay in Washington, Lair clearly remembers that a poem he had written about a homesick soldier entitled "If I Could Just Go Home Again" was recited in a Washington theater as an

encore by the famous Helen Ware. After she said her poem, Miss Ware identified Lair as the author. The poem was sung on him and he was asked to walk on stage. He did, but as a shy rural boy who had never been off the farm, he was embarrassed and overwhelmed by the recognition.

Mr. Lair thinks he was probably around 20 or 21 when he "went with the first crowd out of here" to go to the War. He was out of high school and had taught school at Livingston one year. He says he had been drafted, but had received a "Farm" deferment. He cancelled the deferment and joined the army leaving Mt. Vernon by train and going first, as most area recruits did, to Camp Taylor near Louisville. The War was over when Lair got out, came home and later married Virginia Crawford. Mr. Lair is now 88 years old, a widower, and lives at Renfro Valley.

Alvin Carpenter was 21 when he was drafted into the army during World War I in September of 1917.

He spent 12 or 13 months as an infantryman on different fronts in France and got to come home early because he signed up as a farmer.

During the fighting, Carpenter was wounded and spent some time recuperating in a hospital in France. He was sent back to the front when he could hardly walk. Carpenter said his doctor remarked that it was better to get a sick man killed than a well one. Carpenter says, "I didn't like that much."

Carpenter learned a great deal of respect for

## God's Unity Platform

Because God had provided for the Ephesian Christian abundant salvation in Christ, Paul brought them to walk worthily of the calling of Christ. They had been called to a higher life and must display a disposition of meekness, bearing without irritation or resentment the faults and injuries of others. They were to be long-suffering in dealing with others, remembering that they had been forgiven and would continually need to be forgiven of sins themselves.

It is the unity of each Christian to endeavor to keep "the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." The unity commanded has a basis in seven unities which then existed in the church and which should exist in it in all ages. "The God's Unity Platform" is as follows:

**ONE BODY.** The church, the body of Christ is not a Gentile body nor a Jewish body. Modern denominations were unknown in New Testament times (compare Rom. 12:5; 1 Cor. 12:13; Eph. 2:16). When one obeyed the gospel, God added him to the one church (Acts 2:47). If we will obey the same commandments today, God will add us to the same church. If the one body we achieve unity of organization.

**ONE SPIRIT.** The same Spirit was bestowed upon Jew and Gentile and dwells in the heart of all saints. The Holy Spirit is the third Person in the Godhead. He was sent to guide the apostles into all truth (John 16:13, 14:23). In the one spirit there is unity of life.

**ONE HOPE.** The one hope dwelling in the heart of every Christian is that we may follow Christ now and have eternal life in the world to come. The blessed hope that we will be rewarded in heaven anchors our souls and helps us persevere through all trials and tribulations. The one hope expresses unity of desire.

**ONE LORD.** This one Lord is Jesus-Christ, conceived in the womb of Mary through the instru-

mentality of the Holy Spirit-born in Bethlehem, lived among men thirty-three years, crucified for our sins, risen and exalted and given supreme authority in heaven and on earth (Matt 1:18-21; 28:18). Through Him all sinners may be saved (Acts 2:36; 10:36, 43; Rom. 10:12). Jesus "is on the right hand of God having gone up to heaven, angels and authorities and powers being made subject to him" (I Peter 3:22). Jesus is the true Christ and any other who claims to be Christ is necessarily a fraud and is in competition with the true. This one Lord provides unity of authority.

**ONE FAITH.** This is the faith which comes by hearing the word of God (Rom. 10:17). Whatever is taught in the New Testament is part of the faith. In the one faith we have unity of message with warnings not to preach any other (Gal. 1:8-9; Rev. 22:18-19).

**ONE BAPTISM.** This is a "burial" in water (Rom. 6:4; Col. 2:12) into the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit (Matt. 28:19-20), of penitent believers who have confessed their faith (Rom. 10:9-10), and is for (unto) the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). In the one baptism we have unity of practice.

**ONE GOD.** There are many false gods but only one true God. He is "the Father of all, above all, through all, and in all." Many gods cause division (1 Cor. 8:5-6). In the one God we see unity of worship (Matt. 4:10; John 4:23-24).

In the one person would subscribe to the seven-point unity platform, religious division would disappear and all of God's people would be of "one heart and of one soul" (Acts 4:32). God's unity platform is our platform of the Providence church of Christ.

## A Guide To Chimney Maintenance

Just how do you go about keeping your chimney clean? To begin with, there are several different types of chimneys. Fireplaces are either masonry or prefabricated, the chimneys will either be stone or brick if the fireplace is masonry, or sheet metal if it's prefabricated. If you own a wood-burning stove, your chimney will have a metal stove pipe, a masonry flue or be hooked up into a fireplace.

A chimney that is exposed to the elements will collect creosote more quickly than centrally located chimneys. Any device that increases the efficiency of a fireplace, such as glass doors or heat exchangers, will also increase how often the chimney must be cleaned. The lower the smoke temperature, the cooler the flue, the more condensation of creosote.

The whole process is advanced in woodstove design. Airtight stoves, which have a very high net efficiency rating, should be inspected at least every six months, if used on a regular basis. In order to generate a lot of heat, they control the rate at which the wood burns, creating a situation where the smoke is very cool. A smoldering fire also means combustion is less complete, so there are more unburned hydrocarbons that cause creosote entering the chimney flue.

To help keep creosote build up to a minimum in any chimney, burn well-seasoned wood, that means wood that has been cut and allowed to dry for several months before you burn it.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recommends that chimneys be inspected and cleaned annually. To inspect your own chimney use a powerful light and a mirror to look up the flue from the bottom. If the brick tile look pink, you're okay, if they're black or kind of furry-looking, it's time for a sweeping.

When cleaning your chimney, we use the most modern equipment available. Our system includes special brushes and other equipment for scrubbing the flue. It features the dust collector, a unit which is several times more powerful than your normal household vacuum. The brushes are used to clean the chimney. The purpose of the vacuum (or dust collector) is to control the soot by creating a vacuum in the fireplace or flue so great that dust simply won't move beyond the mouth of the fireplace or stove.

So don't take your chimney for granted. It's an essential part of your wood-burning system. To keep it functioning properly, have it inspected often and cleaned when dirty. It's a good rule of thumb to have a fireplace looked at after burning one cord of wood. A wood stove that's used regularly should be checked every six months.

Remember...a clean chimney is a safe and efficient chimney.

Cosmetologists and hairdressers must now take 1,800 hours of training, while barbering requires 1,500 hours. The hairdressing and barbering industry apparently wants to keep these requirements, again they want this in order to maintain professional standards," Representative Ford stated.

Representative Ford concluded by saying, "I measure that hampers the free enterprising system, yet the hairdressing and barbering industry wants to maintain the current laws and regulations and if that is what they think is best for them, then I am not going to vote to make changes. Further, as far as I am concerned, the Business Organizations and Professions committee should just lay the issue to rest."

carry him and it made him think they might be the "best ones over there". He said he and other U.S. troops had German soldiers tell them they didn't have much zeal for killing. They were given a gun and told to fight just as, Carpenter says, U.S. boys were.

Carpenter was discharged with a disability and came home in 1918 and married Mattie Pittman, a charter member of the Disabled American Veterans and a member of the American Legion. Carpenter lives with his wife of 62 years on the Old Broadhead Road near the High School.

Not wanting to be a "slacker", W.L. Hiatt who lives at Wildie with his wife the former Marjorie Parsons, volunteered to serve his country during World War I by joining the U.S. Navy.

Hiatt was born in 1897, making him 21 years of age when he joined the Navy in 1918. He signed up because "that was a just war", Vietnam, in his opinion, was another matter and he doubts if he would have been eager to volunteer for such a war.

The farm boy had "had a hard time at home" and found himself enjoying his assignment to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. He "had it easy there" serving in the Quartermaster's Division as a ship signalman atop a tower in the bay.

Hiatt was in no hurry to return home and leave the pleasant climate where the winters were like a typical fall day.

Hiatt did return, however, to Wildie where he settled and helped raise a large family while operating a store and post office there.

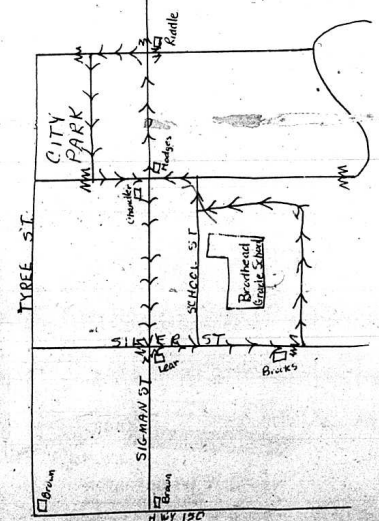

SL-5, Diversion-managing surface or subsurface water run off by use of a diversion ditch according to SCS specifications. Cost share is 60% of actual cost not to exceed \$7.20 per acre.

an equivalency exam in order to obtain the four year degree.

Gayle Scoggins is a medical technician of the staff and Sandy Dowell works part-time as an American medical technologist, which is a one-year course. Donna Spoonamore is the file clerk for the laboratory and x-ray departments.

The hospital requirements call for a medical technician or a clinical laboratory technologist to be available as a supervisor when tests are being done. There are two shifts: 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. with usually two staff members there during a shift. After 11 p.m. they rotate being on call. The lab is covered seven days a week.

What is the laboratory responsible for? "We're responsible for taking blood samples and analyzing whatever tests the doctor orders, such as blood sugar and blood counts," said Larry. They also do urinalysis, SMA 12's (12 different blood chemistries) and electrocardiograms and compatibility tests which match blood for transfusions.

"Your laboratory is usually broken into five categories," Bullock explained. "Hematology is blood counts. Chemistry is blood sugars and electrolytes. Serology involves tests for syphilis, arthritis and that sort of thing. A fourth category deals with blood banks. And, there is one other category."

category, microbiology, we don't do it here. You have to run so many controls and the equipment is so expensive that we send those to International Clinical Laboratories in Lexington.

The lab also works closely with surgery. "In order to put someone in surgery they have to have a blood count and urinalysis and you have to have blood ready to use during surgery, if needed," said Larry.

The Rockcastle County Hospital has a storage of blood they routinely get by courier from the Central Kentucky Blood Center. Since blood is a perishable commodity, our annual shipment is taken back to Lexington to be used before expiration and our stock is replaced with fresh blood. "In an emergency situation, we have it transferred by state police," he said. "They're always real helpful about it."
