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Hospital Focus

RCH's dietitian does more than plan a meal

Providing quality health care for a patient involves treating all aspects of a patient's physical needs. This includes a patient's diet.

The Rockcastle County Hospital has a registered dietitian on its staff to see that patient's nutritional needs are met. Jill Stevens has worked as the consulting dietitian at RCH since 1975 and has spent full-time for about three years before she moved back to Brodhead, she worked for two years as a dietitian at Central Baptist in Lexington.

Becoming a registered dietitian is now easy. "To be registered you have to have your dietetic degree meeting certain requirements of the American Dietetics Association and you have to take a registration exam over everything

you've covered during your undergraduate work," said Mrs. Stevens.

Mrs. Stevens did two years of study at Somerset Community College and then transferred to the University of Kentucky to finish her B.S. and Master's degree in dietetics management. Her master's in nutrition included a research thesis on "Effect of exercise with vitamin E on rats."

How, did she get interested in dietetics? "I changed my major about five times," she said. "Actually I started in pre-med. To become a nutrition major in therapeutic dietetics you take a lot of the basic courses for pre-med, so I had some of the classes in common."

Mrs. Stevens described her responsibilities as a

hospital dietitian. "On a typical day I may get involved in instructing maybe two or three patients about a diet. The patient's doctor orders a diet, presents it and writes it on his chart. Mrs. Stevens takes the orders and advises a patient what to eat when they get out of the hospital. She also sees that a patient eats right while still in the hospital. If we have a patient that is having problems with their food, if they can't eat for some reason, then I'd get involved in that."

What would she do in that case? "You talk to them and find out what they can eat, whether it has to be mechanically altered or if they just can't eat."

She went on, "In the Skilled Nursing Wing I have to do a nutritional assessment on each patient. That is a state requirement. It is an in-depth look at the patient when he comes in, and then it requires monthly or even daily updates, depending on the patient's condition. To do this I talk to the patient, look at his diagnoses, try to judge weight, the condition of his skin and hair, and any other physical condition that might affect his dietary intake."

Making out menus for the patients is a complicated part of Mrs. Stevens' job. For each meal, there are menus for 10 different types of patients, such as low calorie, diabetic, soft and bland, low sodium, low fat, etc. There are three weeks of menus and then they start over again. There is also a spring and summer set of menus and a fall and winter set.

In order to get the correct meal for each patient, the Skilled Nursing Facility sends a diet sheet once or twice a week since they don't experience as much patient turnover. The kitchen staff prepares the trays for each patient, and the nurses' aides deliver them and pick them up again.

The hospital has two part-time and four full-time workers who staff the kitchen. There is a 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. shift and a 12 noon to 8 p.m. shift, with a two hour overlap during lunch. The full-time kitchen staff works five days a week and gets off every third weekend.

The employee turnover in the cafeteria is small. Hazel Thompson, the kitchen supervisor, has been there for 18 years. Jean Carter has been there 14 years. Evelyn Lakey has worked there for 3 years and Telvis Daugherty has

been there for 14 months. Virginia Roberts has been a member of the staff for two years and Jewell Benge is a new employee. Both work four days a week.

The staff has noticed a change in the way things have been run in the kitchen over the years. Mrs. Thompson explained that RCH has had a consulting dietitian for about 10 years, but before that the doctors left diet orders and the kitchen staff was responsible for preparing them. She added, "At that time we just had one per-

son on the morning shift and one on the evening shift."

"The biggest change would be our modern equipment," said Mrs. Carter. The kitchen has come from just a range, toaster, electric knife and hand mixer to a microwave oven, pressure steamer, convection oven and meat slicer. "We've really got some nice things." Does Mrs. Stevens consider her job as dietitian a big responsibility? "I think we all do," she replied. "Everybody in here takes pride in what they do."

Bullens receives Forestry Award

A Rockcastle County timberland owner was recently presented with an award from the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times. Tom Wallace Farm Forestry competition according to Kenneth Thompson of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Certificates of recognition for having carried out woodland management programs with definite objectives and having protected and improved his woodland, was presented to William K. Bullen near his property in Mt. Vernon.

The Farm Forestry Contest, sponsored each year by the two Louisville newspapers, seeks to promote good forest management by recognizing those Kentucky and Southern Indiana woodland owners who are doing outstanding jobs in managing small woodland tracts. The contestants are nominated for foresters annually to be judged for \$1,000 in prize money for the top three winners. Besides cash prizes all county winners receive special recognition certificates and district win-

ners receive specially designed plaques.

Items considered in judging nominations include carrying out a definite management plan with plans for fire protection, protection from grazing by livestock, and forest insect and disease protection. Also included in woodland management accomplishments such as timber stand improvement, tree planting, products harvest, erosion control and wildlife habitat enhancement.

In Mr. Bullen's case he has been involved in managing his woodland under a forest management plan since 1965 and has already harvested sawlogs from his property in accordance with sound forest management practices, done over 100 acres of timber stand improvement work and over forty acres of tree planting. At this time, Mr. Bullen has been active in erosion control and forest protection having been advised by the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

The Pirates took the ball on their first possession from their 8 yard line, and marched 92 yards for the score. However, their scoring was over for the night and the Rockets went on to a 34-6 fourth win of the season.

The Rockets, who had moved the ball well on their offensive series, used their own yard line, had to turn the ball over to the Pirates after an incomplete pass on a fourth and 8 play.

After Berea's score and kick-off, the Rockets wasted little time in retaliating as junior back Scotty Robinson went around left end and approximately 45 yards into the end zone for the score. The extra point

attempt was no good and the score was knotted at 6 all with 1:31 left in the first quarter.

After Wayne Baker and Burley Burkhardt each got a quarterback sack of the Pirates, the Rockets began their next series from their own 34 yard line. Three plays later, Chris Cornelius connected with junior Greg Long but Long fumbled the ball and Berea recovered on their own 42 yard line. However, two plays later, the Pirates returned the favor by fumbling the ball away and senior James Miralce.

While there was no chance to take a punt, Coach Larry Woods got a coach to use some of his younger players and they acquitted themselves very well. Sophomore Gary Fain, who sees quite a bit of action defensively, showed good speed and the Rockets were actually in scoring position early in the fourth quarter until an incomplete pass on fourth down gave the ball back to the Pirates.

It was an exciting game to watch and the Rockets were ready to kick when they were. The kick was taken by senior Jeff Lear on the Rockets' 35 yard line and returned to Berea's 15. Robinson picked up 5. Steve Holcomb, seeing his first action since the Lincoln County game where he received an injury to his ribs, got no gain on the next play. The Rockets then called time out, with a 3rd and 5 situation to talk things over. They eventually got things straightened out because Holcomb went to the one yard line on the next play and scored the TD with 4 minutes left in the second quarter. Cornelius carried the ball for the first time in his first game and the Rockets were ahead 14-0.

The Rockets kicked off to the Pirates and they began their next series from their own 34 yard line. They ran one offensive play and, on the next one, fumbled the ball and senior Tim Harding came up with it. Holcomb carried the ball for good yardage and, four plays later, Cornelius threw Holcomb a short pass and he went into the end zone for the Rockets' third score of the game and a 20-6 half-time lead.

Rockcastle's fourth score of the game came with 7:51 left in the third quarter and was set-up by a Pirate punt blocked by Burley Burkhardt which gave the Rockets the ball on Berea's 30 yard line. Four plays later, from the 10 yard line, Holcomb went in for his third TD of the night and Cornelius scored the two extra points for a 28-6 lead.

Then, with 44 second remaining in the third quarter, the Rockets struck pay dirt once again with a 27 yard run by Holcomb into the end zone. However, the touchdown was called back because of a holding penalty against the Rockets which put the ball on the Pirates' 43 yard line and gave the Rockets a 3rd and 23. On the next play, Cornelius threw to Long who carried the ball into the end zone for what appeared to be a touchdown but this one too was called

back because of an offsides penalty against the Rockets which made it 3rd and 28. But the Rockets were not to be denied as the "flea-flicker," which had not worked well the other times the Rockets had tried it, worked to perfection this time. Cornelius threw a short pass to Long who immediately lateraled the ball to Holcomb and he went into the end zone untouched. The Rockets attempted an extra point kick which was no good but the ball game belonged to the Rockets.





(Cont'd from front) assessed property. Last year, the combined total was \$648. For instance, if a taxpayer's taxes were \$200,

the value has not changed), valued at \$4,000, the taxes would increase this year from approximately \$25.75 to approximately \$27.20.

The real estate property tax rate this year is \$1.315, up from \$1.288 per \$1,000 last year. The state lowered its real estate tax rate this year. Instead of paying \$2.29 to the state this year for real estate, taxpayers will pay \$2.24. The total rate when county (1.315), state (2.24) and school (.68) are combined, adds up to a rate of \$4.233 as compared to last year's \$4.228.

What it means to the taxpayer is very little if any increase. For instance, the taxes on real estate valued at \$90,000 last year was approximately \$380. This year, taxes on the same property will be about \$381. The increase is roughly a \$1.00 increase per each \$100,000 assessment.

In terms of increased total revenues from personal property taxes, this year, the county stands to increase its tax intake from last year's by approximately \$6,000. Revenues from real estate taxes will amount to a little over \$3,000 more, bringing the total the county stands to gain by the tax increase to a little over \$9,000, providing all taxes are collected.

This increase, though welcomed, will by all accounts be enough to fund the county ambulance service which is in danger of being discontinued.

The county found itself unable, this year when budgeting the money to find funds to finance the service which has been operated by the county with the aid of now withdrawn CETA funds. The Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA) funds were used to employ ambulance drivers. The county stopped receiving these funds in September, 1981.

Elimination of the federal job program, plus the county's seemingly ineffective bill collecting methods, pose threats to the continuance of the ambulance service which lacks about \$75,000 yearly being self-supporting. (This figure does not take into account the replacement of equipment.)

The fiscal court has taken steps to alleviate the

problem by taking it to the voters this fall in the hopes that a tax referendum would allow for an ad valorem tax of not more than 5 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. The tax, if passed, would amount to roughly \$78,000 in revenues with which the county would continue to operate the ambulance service.

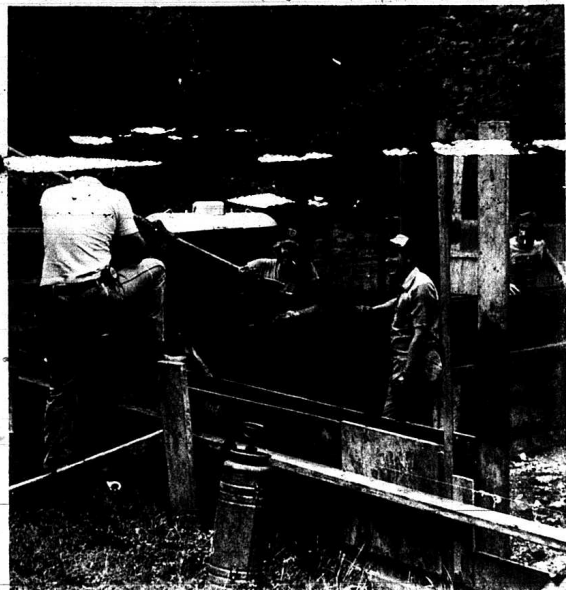

Madstone once used in county

At long last... a picture of a madstone. Monte VanWinkle of Champaign, Illinois was visiting his brother, Dr. L.S. VanWinkle of this county this week and stopped by to give us a look and let us photograph a madstone which has been in his family for years.

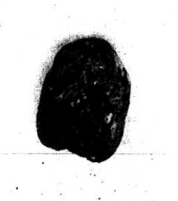
VanWinkle said that his grandmother, Nannie Harris VanWinkle, who lived around Three Links and Morrill during the period from 1850 to 1900, received the madstone from her family who came from Virginia. The stone reportedly came from the stomach of a white deer.

Mr. VanWinkle said his grandmother did not charge a fee for treating neighbors who were suspected of having been bitten by a rabid animal.

Once, he said, a horse owned from Lexington whose thoroughbred had been bitten by a dog which was suspected of being rabid came to his grandmother and tried to rent her madstone to treat the animal. His grandmother refused, saying that the stone's effectiveness would be diminished if it came into contact with animal blood. The horseman, then offered to buy the stone from his grandmother for \$500. His grandmother still refused. Mr. VanWinkle said \$500 at

County property assessment up by 5 million; state lowers rate while county increases

Assessment tax assessments real estate assessments information released earlier this week from tax commissioner Elmer Hale's office shows the total county property assessment is \$157,828,754. This figure shows an increased assessment of \$5,349,343 over last year's \$152,479,411 assessment.

Real Estate
Accounting for the biggest increase in the real estate assessments which rose from \$120,093,933 in 1981 to \$122,494,383 in 1982 was the construction of a public housing project on old U.S. 25 South in Mt. Vernon.

According to tax commissioner Hale, last year's

real estate assessments on the same property was reduced to \$118,786,883; some individual valuations were lowered, some were increased. In addition of \$2,140,000 commercial and industrial properties, \$1,303,000, additions in the residential address category plus the \$257,500 farm assessment increase brought the total increase in real estate to \$3,700,500.

Personal Property
Personal property in Rockcastle County assessed this year at \$23,921,287, an increase of over 2 million dollars from last year's \$21,887,508 assessment. The increase is due, in part, to the increase in the number of motor vehicles (by almost 1,000) plus the increase in the value of used cars. (Tax assessment on motor vehicles is done by the Blue Book value.)

Also showing substantial increases were industrial and commercial categories including manufacturer's finished product and professional trade tools.

Intangibles
Stocks, bonds and other intangibles, which are subject to a state tax only, are down this year to \$7,192,930. The value of bank shares was up in 1982 to \$4,062,430 from the previous year's \$3,995,040.

First World War Veteran at Wabd

We were afraid we would miss one of our Rockcastle's surviving World War I veterans when we wrote last week's feature.

Thomas C. Hayes, who will soon be 87, lives and lives at Wabd, has been identified as the fifth "Doughboy" living in Rockcastle County at this time.

In May of 1918, when Mr. Hayes was drafted into the army, he was twenty-three years old and had been married to the former Lora Sams of Rockcastle County for less than a year.

From here, Hayes was sent to Fort Thomas, Camp Forrest, Georgia and then on to Camp Mills, New York from where he was shipped to England and across the English Channel into France. He spent the rest of his army career serving in France.

He served in the U.S. 51st Infantry 6th Division, Company I in the Gerardmer Section of France doing guard duty. He was later moved to another front, the Meuse-Argonne, as part of back-up forces for the U.S. when the Armistice was signed.

Hayes spent the rest of the winner in France after the fighting had stopped. He was fortunate to return home to greet his wife and son whom he had never seen, without having been wounded.

The expansion will add 18,000 square feet to the existing 12,000 square feet of space and will increase, during the next year and a half, the number of employees from the current 90 to approximately 180. Fritch said construction is expected to be completed by November 15. Kentucky Highlands, a privately owned venture capital firm, is putting up the building at a cost of approximately \$600,000. Kentucky Highlands also owns the present structure which houses Rockcastle Manufacturing. The plant is owned by Cintas, a uniform rental company in Cincinnati.

Dear Editor:

Approximately 350-400 Rockcastle County voters showed up at the annual election grounds last Thursday evening. These members came to the fairgrounds for the picnic and an annual meeting. The picnic was held, and afterwards, the majority of members retired to the grandstand. The members sat chatting and waiting for the annual report and election of Board members.

Soon the members in the grandstand became impatient when no one came forward after about 20 minutes to give the annual report or conduct the election. Finally, someone urged Mr. Wallis Proctor to address the members about whether the annual report would be given and whether the election of Board members would be held. Mr. Proctor told the group that there would be no report and there would be no election. Mr. Proctor said

an election had been held earlier at about 6:30 p.m. among himself and some of the incumbent Board members. Mr. Proctor indicated the Board members re-elected themselves and Mr. Proctor as President of the Board. Mr. Proctor remarked several times that he had never seen as many people at an annual meeting of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau. He replied that there would be an annual report and that members should go home.

Many of the members lingered after Mr. Proctor's announcement, discussing among themselves what had happened. Most persons expressed dissatisfaction with what had happened. Some people wondered why a report had not been given, the approximately \$40,000 in annual membership fees had been deducted. Others asked how a group of individuals could meet secretly and re-elect themselves. These questions are very important ones, made especially significant by the fact that the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau has the largest membership of any organization in the county and handles a sizable amount of membership fees.

We would urge that Mr. Proctor and the Board members relieve the doubt that has developed about the respective roles of Board Directors and Bureau members. Also, we would urge that members be provided a report of the uses to which their membership fees are being put. The best way to accomplish these goals would be by a public meeting (with proper public notice) at which an annual report is given and

an open election conducted by Board members. We think Farm Bureau members and the citizens of Rockcastle deserve nothing less than this from its largest non-profit organization.

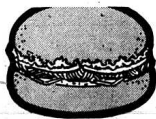





Vision Problems of Children

It is estimated that 80% of learning during the first 12 years of life is through seeing. This is the critical period for parents and teachers to watch carefully. Certain symptoms to watch for: tilting the head to one side, placing the head closer than normal to book or desk when reading, writing or coloring, excessive blinking or rubbing of the eyes, frequent headaches or nausea, even excessive daydreaming.

The appearance of the eyes themselves is also a good indicator of certain visual problems: are they red or watery? crossed? pupils of unequal size? eyelids red-rimmed and/or swollen?

When your child goes to school, there are also certain signs to watch for that may indicate a vision problem. These include holding a book too close when reading, skips words or lines when reading, frowns, scowls or reads too slowly or a gradual drop in grades from one year to the next. Parents should be alert to their child coming home from school with headaches or looking very tired-eyed or sleepy.

During the school years, both teachers and parents should be aware of the limitations of the famous Snellen eye chart. A child may secure 20/20 on the school chart and still not have good vision for reading.

The best and safest policy is to have school kids' eyes thoroughly examined on a regular basis, especially during the early grades.

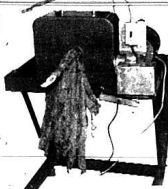
