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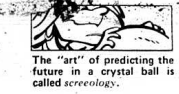

Two directors resign as county Farm Bureau encounters problems

Two of the board members in the past two weeks, has been announced in a confidentially since its annual membership meeting Thursday night, September 16, according to William K. Bullen, Farm Bureau insurance agent for the county.

Director and vice-president Jackie Cash and director Lloyd Cain both resigned from the board last week. "I just had too many irons in the fire, too many things to do and not enough time to work them in," Cain said. "I felt I should get out of something because I was not able to attend all the things that I'm involved in," he further said.

Cash's explanation of his resignation was much the same. "I had too many things going at once and decided I ought to get out of some of them," he said.

However, both the men's resignation came after Farm Bureau's annual meeting at which time, according to two letters to the editor in last week's Signal which were signed by several Farm Bureau members present at the annual meeting, a board of directors' meeting was held at 6:30 p.m. and the general membership was not allowed to vote during the open meeting.

Farm Bureau are two separate corporations and each is governed by its own membership. He also said, "Rockcastle County did not have to adopt the model by-laws we sent out and I don't know if they did or not. Each county federation usually keeps a copy of its by-laws on file here in Louisville, however, this is not mandatory and Rockcastle does not have their by-laws here."

One director, who was at the meeting of the board on 6:30 on Thursday, September 16th, said the reason the membership was not allowed to vote for the directors and officers of the Farm Bureau was because a fair election could not be held. The director, who asked to remain anonymous, said that only members of the Farm Bureau, who had paid their dues up-to-date, could vote. Associate members of the bureau cannot vote. He said there was no way to check the crowd of almost 400 people to see who was eligible to vote. Therefore, it was the directors' feelings that a fair election could not be held.

The directors' resignation was not at any meeting that was going to take place at 6:30," Mullins said. "Although I was on the grounds and at least some of the directors saw me and Steve Bullen, who is also a director, was also there but they did not bother to tell him either," Mullins further said.

According to Mullins, at the meeting at 6:30 of some of the directors, "The directors voted all the old officers and directors from the previous year back into office."

According to one Farm Bureau member, Frank Bullock, a slate of directors and officers for the coming year was circulating on the grounds the night of the annual meeting before the election was to have been held at 7 p.m. Bullock said the slate included a new president and one new board member. Two other directors from last year were not slated, Bullock said.

A special called meeting of the Farm Bureau board was held last Monday.

Farmers must notify legal office concerning new tobacco law

Federal legislation (the No Net Cost Tobacco Program Act of 1982) enacted by Congress July 20 of this year provides for the continuous operation of the tobacco price support and production adjustment program with no cost or threat of cost to the taxpayers.

The law provides for establishing a no net loss account within Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to assure that CCC will sustain no losses from the price support program for burley tobacco.

Commodity Credit Corporation is a banking system for farmers which bor-

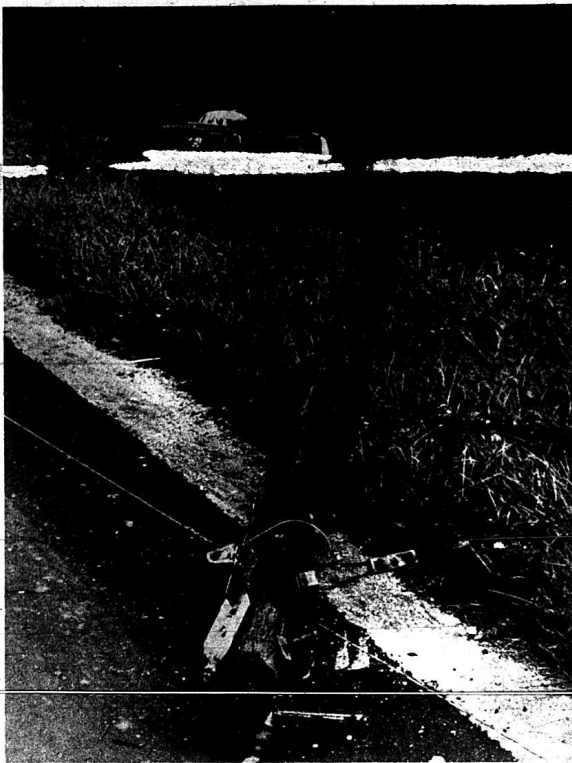
rows money from the federal government to loan to farmers. The Tobacco Cooperative Association administers the current burley tobacco price support program and commodity pool and uses CCC funds to subsidize farmers if tobacco supports are not on the market and to purchase surplus.

According to Harold Ballinger, Rockcastle County's ASCS director, the federal government (or taxpayer) has not spent any money on the burley tobacco program for several years. Due to inflation, any surplus tobacco bought and held over in the pool has brought more money before the year ended because of the shortage of burley tobacco. The pool, in actuality, has generated money.

In all the years since the burley tobacco price support and allotment program was initiated, the federal government has spent only 57 million dollars which, according to Ballinger, is very little in comparison with other federal programs.

This year, according to information from the ASCS office, before the issuance of burley tobacco marketing cards, the farmer must agree as a condition of elig-

Program places emphasis on keeping elderly in own homes

Getting to the doctor's office, the drug store, grocery, bank, post office or other necessary trips can pose a real problem for older persons who have no means of transportation and no one to look after their interests. Not being able to run the sweeper or prepare a well-balanced meal, yet wanting desperately to remain at home in familiar surroundings rather than move in with a relative or go to a nursing home is a situation many elderly persons also face. These situations are the ones the Rockcastle Senior Citizens program seeks to help.

With two vans bought with local city and county appropriations, the four employees at the Mt. Vernon Center and the two employees at Brodhead provide transportation and errand services of this sort for elderly persons in the county.

Faye Thompson, director of the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens Program, says transportation is the most expensive but most needed service of the several services provided by the program.

The past recreational emphasis of the program has turned more recently, Ms. Thompson says, to

homemaker services which include helping with a household chore the elderly person can no longer do, or perhaps, running an errand. Ms. Thompson says it is a conscious effort to keep elderly persons in their own homes and with a degree of independence for as long as possible.

Elderly persons unable to leave home and travel to the centers for lunch may have a hot lunch delivered daily.

Right now, according to the staff, a total of 86 persons in the county travel daily to the centers to eat lunch and visit. Twenty-eight lunches are delivered. Some of those who participated in the program walk in or get transportation.

For those who have no means of transportation to the Brodhead Center at the Fairgrounds or the Mt. Vernon Center at the Library, the Senior Citizens van is available.

The center is open from 9-3 daily for Senior Citizens. Some who eat lunch come in early and enjoy the piano, play bingo, watch T.V. or sit around and chat. For many the main attraction is the socialization and conversation with friends.

Contracts let to resurface over four miles of state roads in the county

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract to resurface 4.3 miles of Rockcastle County roads.

The Allen Co. of Winchester received a \$115,317 contract to resurface 3.5 miles of KY 1004, Brush Creek Road, from U.S. 25 to KY 1912 and eight-tenths of a mile of KY 1249, Mt. Vernon-Sand Springs-Billows Road, from U.S. 25 in Mt. Vernon to Culture Road.

"We have spent \$605,041 in 1982 putting new blacktop on 25 miles of Rockcastle county roads," said Transportation Secretary Frank Metts. "By resurfacing the roads now, we are providing better maintenance while reducing the need for more costly repairs in the future."

In the past two years the state's paving cycle has

been reduced from an average of once every 25 years to once every 13 years.

Funding for the resurfacing program has been increased by Metts to \$90 million, enabling the state to resurface one mile in ten of 25,000 miles of state maintained roads.

"Every taxpayer wants and deserves the best results from their tax money," Metts added.

ARE YOU WORLDLY?

Scriptures teach us to "love not the world, neither the things that are in the world." The reason being, "If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him" (1 John 2:15). While most agree that worldliness is in the church today, not all agree as to just what worldliness is. To help us properly deal with the matter, we must understand what is involved in worldliness.

First, there are **WORLDLY HABITS** such as use of alcoholic beverages or drug abuse. While sinners might indulge in these, the saint respects his body as the temple of God's Spirit and refuses to "defile it" (1 Cor. 6:18-20).

Then there is **WORLDLY SPEECH** such as cursing, taking God's name in vain, suggestive, sensual talk and vulgar jokes. A carnal mind might use such corrupt speech, but the spiritual man will use words reflecting a pure heart (Eph. 4:29). Thirdly, there is a **WORLDLY STYLE OF DRESS** that is extravagant or sexually provocative. People of the world think little of this but God's children adorn themselves in modest apparel (1 Tim. 2:9).

Also, there is a **WORLDLY TYPE OF RECREATION**. This includes such things as risque movies or television, gambling or dancing. Because it appeals to unwholesome fleshly appetites, Christians refrain from such (1 John 2:15). Only the judgement will reveal the number of souls who have allowed recreation to choke out their spiritual activities.

We must also recognize that there are **WORLDLY PROFESSIONS OR CAREERS**. Disciples of Christ have no desire to pursue a car-

eer that would involve them "in sinful activities or commitments, or encourage others to sin. Most careers in the entertainment field would fall here, as would making alcoholic beverages, etc." (1 Cor. 8:1-13; 2 Cor. 6:14-17). We are worldly if we allow our careers or professions to crowd the church and spiritual interests out of our lives (1 Cor. 13:2-3; 14:20). The spiritually minded see themselves as but pilgrims here, on their way to a heavenly home (Heb. 11:13-16).

Worldliness is preferring the friendship and company of the worldly over that of God's children. Spiritual souls prefer one another (Rom. 12:10). A carnal brother is more concerned about how the world views his conduct than how God and his fellow Christians do. Because of this the worldly is afraid to identify himself as a Christian around worldly people (Mark 8:38). The godly man confesses the Lord before all men (Matt. 10:32).

There are many other things which could be identified in the Word of God as "worldliness." We could sum up all these under the general heading "Worldliness is a failure to crucify self and embrace Christ, as the Lord of one's life (Gal. 2:20).

Are you willing to stand up against all worldliness in the church? Do you feel uncomfortable when the sermon is about worldliness? ARE YOU WORLDLY?

Thompson, a senior citizen may require escort service, in which case the aide stays with and assists the client during a trip to the grocery or a doctor, for instance.

Along with the other duties and services the local programs performs are the outreach and information-referral services. Ms. Thompson says "in outreach we go out and explain the program to persons who might be interested in some of our services." Information and referral services get information on other agencies and services available to aged persons. The person may not know about...

Anyone in the county who is 60 years of age or older and who is in need of any of these services may receive them. The vans travel to Livingston, Brush Creek and Bee Lick as well as other outlying areas.

The program which has been in operation in the county for about 7 years is funded by local city and county governments, state and federal funds and donations from local civic organizations.

Along with the six employees are several persons who volunteer time with the program and board members who help direct the program. Local board members include: Joe Harmon, Pete Hurd, Sophia Brown, Betty Lewis, Kizzie Owens, Wolkie Ballinger, Curtis Bradley, Archie French, Hazel Cummins, Verla Brown, Terrill Chandler, Roger Carr and Hubert Thacker.

The present National Congress of Parents and Teachers began February 17, 1897, as an intellectual, sociological, moral and spiritual necessity. What was organized in Washington, D.C., as the National Congress of Mothers has remained, actively and vibrantly, as a concerted act of faith, as a united labor of love and as a constructive form of public service. In 1925, the organization founded by Alice McEllan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst became the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The PTA's record of accomplishments for the well-being of youth is impressive. It has helped to secure child labor and school attendance laws; juvenile courts; maternal and child health; public school kindergartens; school lunches; funds for enrichment education programs; libraries and vocational education; juvenile delinquency research and control; and other legislation that benefits children and schools.

In 1977, an office of governmental relations was established in Washington, D.C., to continue to identify the legislative issues crucial to the interests of children and to take action to achieve the PTA legislative objectives. The most significant national effort in terms of impact has been the TV Project to reduce the violence on television and to improve the overall quality and diversity of programming.

Since its founding, three crucial areas have formed the framework of the PTA and have given direction to all its efforts for children: advocacy, service and parent education. As children's needs have changed, the PTA's specific objectives have been redefined, but these three have remained constant.

Children need PTA as never before. In 1897, and their needs will be as great in five, ten,

twenty years. To achieve the goals of the founders and the present leaders, the organization is continuing work on projects begun and is reaching out into new areas of concern: problems of children and families in the urban setting; standardized testing and minimal competency standards; in-service teacher training; reading; collective bargaining; school finance; handicapped children and the schools; special needs of the single-parent families and teenage parents; immunization of all children; and the energy crisis and the schools.

The PTA is proud of its past and the traditions that it has established; it is dealing with conditions of the present with courage and vision, and it looks to the future with a strong commitment, knowing that children will always need friends and advocates who will speak out and take action on their behalf.

ability for receiving price support for burley tobacco to contribute one cent per pound of tobacco sold to the No Net Cost Tobacco Account. The contribution will be withheld from the proceeds of each sale.

The agreement must be made in writing on a form provided by the local ASCS office in the courthouse. At the time, the owner of the tobacco base signs the agreement, he must be prepared to stipulate whether or not he wishes to contribute to the fund.

If neither the farm owner, nor the producer, agrees to contribute to the fund, a "NO PRICE SUPPORT" marketing card will be issued. Should one or more producers agree to contribute while another producer does not agree to contribute, a "NO PRICE SUPPORT" card will be issued in order to permit the marketing of that portion of the quota for which a contribution will not be made.

The new legislation, according to legislators in the tobacco belt was a compromise between anti-tobacco forces in Congress who want the government to abolish burley tobacco price support legislation. The "anti-forces" main premise being that it is inconsistent for the government to legislate smoking warnings on cigarette packages while it provides for government price support of tobacco.

The compromise, then, does not eliminate the tobacco price support program, but provides for an "insurance" against the government's loss of money in sustaining the support. In other words, if any money is lost through the program, the tobacco money will be there in reserve to fund the subsidy. Ballinger says farmers

he has talked to are not resentful of the new law. They felt, perhaps, it was much the lesser of two evils considering the amount of furor raised in Congress this year about price support.

For the average farmer in the county, who might raise 2,000 pounds, for instance, the amount which will be deducted from his tobacco check, provided he agrees, will be \$20. From Rockcastle, Ballinger says, if the quota is sold, about \$37,000 will go into the new account with CCC.
