

#### concerning new tobacco law

Federal legislation (the No Net Cost Tobacco Program Act of 1982) enacted by Congress July 20 of this year provides for the continuous operations of the tobacco price support and production adjustment program with no cost or threat of cost to the tax-payers.

threat of cost to the tax-payers. The law provides for establishing a no net loss account within Commodity Credit Corporation "CCC" to assure that CCC will sus-tain no losses from the price support program for burley tobacco. Commodity Credit Cor-poration is a banking sys-tem for farmers which bor-

rows money from the federal government to loan to farmers. The Tobacco Cooperative Association administers the current burley to-bacco price support program and commodity pool and uses CCC funds to subsidize farmers if tobacco supports are not on the market and to purchase surplus.

According to Harold

According to Harold Ballinger, Rockeastle Country's ASCS director, the federal government (or taxpayer) has not spent any money on the burley tobacco. The pool has brought more money before the year ended because of the shortage of burley tobacco. The pool, in actuality, has generated money. 
