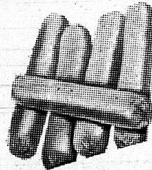

Rockets beat Casey impressively, now six and one on season

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team continued their winning ways last Friday night as they traveled to Liberty and spoiled Casey County's Homecoming by a score of 40 to 7.

It was a night of great offensive efforts by the Rockets. Senior running back Steve Holcomb carried the ball only sixteen times but gained an outstanding 253 yards and scored four touchdowns. His two counterparts, juniors Scottie Robinson and Bozie Kirby also had fine games in the backfield. Robinson had his first one hundred yard night of the year, gaining 105 yards and made several key runs to keep Rockcastle scoring drives alive throughout the game.

Casey, who was two and three on the season before their game with the Rockets, put a little scare into the Rockets and their fans early in the game. They won the toss elected to receive the kick-off at the start of the game and took their first possession down the field and scored with ease on the Rockets' defense.

The Rockets found themselves behind 7-0 with only 8:54 left in the first quarter.

It looked as if Rockcastle would tie the ball game on their next possession when running back Bozie Kirby made an outstanding run of 40 yards to the Casey County twenty after Jeff Ham took a short Casey County kickoff to Rockcastle's 40 yard line.

On the very next play, Holcomb carried for 19 yards to the one-yard line where he fumbled and Casey County recovered.

The first quarter ended with the Rockets behind Casey County 7-0. However, the Rockets' offense split in the second quarter and the defense came together to virtually halt Casey County's offense.

Early in the second quarter, Holcomb took a handoff around right end and scored on a 45 yard run from scrimmage. Kirby carried the ball in for the two extra points and Rockcastle led 8-7.

A few minutes later, after the Rockets' defense stopped Casey, Holcomb took another handoff from scrimmage and this time scored on a 51 yard run

play. The Rockets' extra point attempt failed and they had a lead of 14-7. The Rockets carried the 6 point lead into half time and came out in the third quarter "hotter" than they went into the dressing room at the intermission. Rockcastle scored once in the third quarter and three times in the fourth. The Rockets only score of the third quarter came on a 27 yard run from scrimmage by Scotty Robinson. The extra point attempt failed and the Rockets had upped their lead to 20-7.

However, in the fourth quarter, the Rockets put as many points on the board as they had during the entire first three. The first score of the fourth quarter came on a five yard run by Holcomb. Although quarterback Chris Cornelius threw only six times, during the game he did complete four attempts for 135 yards. One completion came in the second quarter. Cornelius hit flanker Greg Long in the flat who pitched the ball to Steve Holcomb who was coming up behind him. Holcomb took the pitch from Long and raced fifty yards for the second score of the fourth quarter.

The Rockets' defense led by noseguard Burley Burkhardt continued to give no ground to Casey County and a futile attempt for a score by Casey County with only 10 seconds re-

maining on the clock resulted in an interception by senior Jeff Lear, who ran the ball back 95 yards for the score. No attempt for the extra point was made because time expired during the runback.

Rockcastle, now 6 and 1 on the year will face Bell County at home this Friday night. This is a very important game for the Rockets because Bell County is in their sub-district.

College president dreamed of training ministers

"...I had a dream and a vision of training young ministers as I walked along the banks of Lake Michigan while I was a student at the Moody Bible Institute," says Dr. Leon Simpson, newly-elected president of the Clear Creek Baptist School. "Then several years ago," continues Simpson, "I was contacted by Cumberland College (Williamsburg, Ky.) to be the director of ministerial training."

This ministerial training program was one of the first of its kind to be offered by a liberal arts college, and it was the responsibility of Dr. Simpson, director of the program for twelve years, to grow to 439 total students' training for full-time Christian service.

Following the time spent at Cumberland College were three years as assistant pastor to Dr. W.A. Criswell, First Baptist Church, Dallas, Texas. Of his time spent there, Dr. Simpson has fond memories, "Worship at First Dallas is very near to heaven... our family loved Dallas and they loved this wonderful church. Of course, Dr. Criswell is a truly great man of God."

In 1981, Simpson was contacted by Clear Creek Baptist School to become president-elect, assuming presidential duties after the retirement of Dr. D.M. Aldridge. "When Clear Creek contacted me," says Simpson, "The rest of my life fell into place. The pieces of the puzzle—my successful ministry at Cumberland College, and associate pastor at First Dallas—fit well together and I felt prepared to become president of Clear Creek Baptist School. The next twenty-eight years of my life have been mapped out (since the establishment of Clear Creek's each president has stayed for twenty-eight years, and Dr. Simpson plans to be no exception)."

As always when beginning a new job one is confronted by problems. It is no different being the pres-

ident of a Bible College. Some issues confronting the new president include student housing and a building program. A present Clear Creek has 228 students registered, but could easily have enrolled 300

had housing been sufficient. There are only 150 housing units located on the campus to shelter 228 students, their wives and over 200 children.

Dr. Simpson hopes to see 50 additional housing units added to complement the existing number. Other long-term dreams include

Other problems confronting the president of Clear Creek have to do with insurance policies. It is not mandatory that students carry insurance, on themselves and their families; however, it is highly recommended, as accidents could easily happen with over 200 children on campus. Another concern of Simpson is the low tuition and high costs. Tuition is only \$147 per semester and wives may take Bible courses at no charge. Housing for students costs less than \$50 per month. These prices are lower than any other college costs in the nation.

Although a large portion of money is supplied to the school by the Kentucky Baptist Convention (which, through the Cooperative Program, pays \$3 out every \$10 needed to operate), the question remains, "From where does the other \$7 come?"

Clear Creek Baptist School, under the presidency of Dr. Simpson, has some specific guidelines which include firmly supporting and encouraging the stability and strength of the family unit as well as active civic involvement. The school has worked hard to establish a friendly relationship with the business community, as many of the students are employed locally. The faculty and students are also actively involved, either as ministers or lay people, in over 30 area churches.

Clear Creek Baptist School is a stable business in the Tri-State area, and operates at a proposed budget of approximately \$1 million per fiscal year. There are presently 36 members of faculty and staff.

With all the duties of a president, Dr. Simpson has little time for his favorite hobbies which include reading and golf. To put it in his own words, Dr. Simpson is a "voracious reader" and about his golfing ability, the "score will not be mentioned." 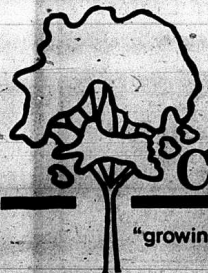
