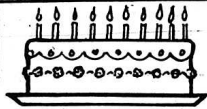

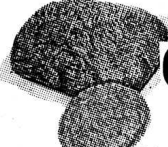

The rugs Mrs. Sutton makes are masterpieces and, like most hand-made items, no two are alike. She makes up her own patterns, both on the old-fashioned wool rug hooks on burlap and a frame and the cotton rag rugs she crochets.

When asked how long it takes to make a rug, Mrs. Sutton says she has no idea because it rests her to work on one type and then another. There is usually something going in every room, she says. Much time is spent getting the strings and strips cut, sewn together and rolled into a ball in readiness. She admits there is more and harder work to making a hooked rug.

"A lot of people think it is a song to make rugs," but she says, "it's work." She tackles the physically harder hobby because it is not as hard on her eyes as working with thread.

## Ambulance Service referendum main issue on November ballot

An election that earlier would have seen one of the lowest voter turnouts in the history of Rockcastle County was scheduled for the voters to go to the polls next Tuesday.

The question of whether or not Rockcastle County citizens want to continue to have an ambulance service in the county has been placed on the November ballot, by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

The reason the Fiscal Court put the ambulance question on the ballot, was the fact that almost \$75,000 from the Federal Government's CETA program was cut out last September. The money that was provided by CETA was used last year to pay the county ambulance drivers.

The question is whether or not Rockcastle Countians want to assess themselves an additional 5 cents on one hundred dollars on their county taxes, which will be used strictly to run the ambulance service.

Rockcastle County's total tax assessment for this year was \$157,828,754.00. If the tax referendum passes, next year's tax assessment is about the same, the county would receive approximately \$74,000.00 from the additional tax to run the ambulance service.

However, Rockcastle County Judge Executive Bob Jasper said Tuesday, that if the tax passes, the county would still require that the ambulance service charge fees for their services. "This money, along with the tax money, would insure that the ambulance service have enough funds to operate on each year," Jasper said.

Jasper said that if the tax referendum failed the Fiscal Court would have no other alternative except to start phasing out the ambulance service. He said that the Fiscal Court would go along with whatever the people wanted. He said that if the tax passed the

Fiscal Court would have to find some way to keep the service going. He said that tax money would not be received until next year, and that some arrangements would have to be made this year.

The judge said that \$8,000 was all that the Fiscal Court put into the County's budget to operate the ambulance service for the 1982-83 fiscal year, and that the money to operate on further would probably have to be borrowed against the next year's taxes.

According to secretary for the ambulance service, Willametta Cromer, approximately \$95,000 was spent on the service last year. She said that of the approximate 200 runs made by the ambulance service last year, about one-third were paid for by the people who used it. She said that most of that was paid for by Medicare or Medicaid.

Rockcastle County Hospital Director Robert Cromer said Monday that if the tax referendum failed next Tuesday, the hospital would not be able to take the ambulance service over and run it. He said that the new addition to the hospital and the remodeling that was done to the old part had put the hospital in a financial pinch and that it would not be feasible for the hospital board even to consider the funding of an ambulance service for the county.

Employees of the two

local funeral homes that ran the ambulance service in the county before the Fiscal Court took it over would not start an ambulance service if the referendum failed. The two funeral homes, Dowell and Mar-

Saturday night from six to eight is the time designated for trick or treating by grade school principals in the county.

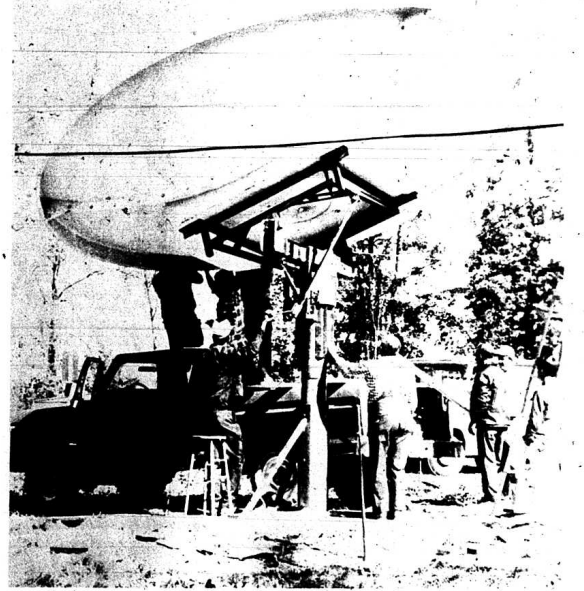
Teachers and principals in the schools have issued warnings to children who will be trick or treating on that night.

The larger and better class, constituting all but a few are English, Scotch Irish and German origin; honest, courageous, kindly, somewhat reserved, but loving people, they kept retreating before advancing civilization until at last they lodged among the least accessible lands of the county; a hospitable, gentle-mannered people yet fierce and reckless when thoroughly aroused. Many of them bear the names and have in their veins the blood of statelymen and heroes who will be forever honored in their country. Latent in them are all materials of a magnificent manhood. Only religion and literary culture are needed to call it forth. This class labors, is industrious, hardy, enterprising, a law-abiding and useful citizen. Of this class Boone, Kenton, Davy Crockett, Sam Houston, Andrew Johnson, John C. Calhoun, Lincoln and many others descended.

The second class of people of whom there are only a few in Kentucky mountains are a sallow, gypsy-like people of unknown origin; idle and vicious. Whenever you read in the newspapers about these terrible vendettas which disgraced the country, you will, upon inquiry, find that nine out of every ten of them are traceable to this class or race of men.

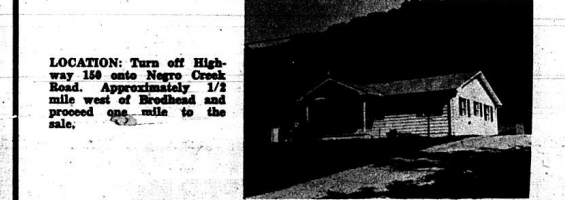

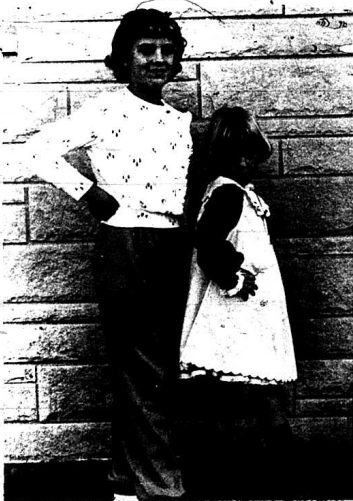

DAR Homecoming

Homecoming is the annual fall festival held by the Kentucky Society NSDAR to raise funds for the maintenance of Duncan Tavern and Anne Duncan House. Duncan Tavern, built in 1788 by Major Joseph Duncan, was in use as an inn for many years. By 1940 the structure had been divided into small apartments, had housed many families and had fallen into such deplorable condition that it had been condemned. Then, the Kentucky Society DAR with the assistance of the city of Paris and Bourbon County was able to purchase the building on the condition that they restore it and maintain it as an historic shrine open to the public.

The restored Duncan Tavern became the headquarters for the Kentucky Society. In 1956, the adjoining Anne Duncan House, built by the widow of Major Duncan about 1803, was purchased and restored by the Society. The two buildings, a museum and the John Fox Jr. Memorial Library are all open to the public.

## Burley sales opening set week earlier

With estimates climbing steadily about the size of the 1982 burley tobacco crop, the Burley Sales Committee has fixed November 17 for opening sales, instead of the customary Monday before Thanksgiving.

Latest unofficial projection for the eight-state 1982 production is 797 million pounds. For the states in which the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association handles the price support program, the latest USDA estimates are: Kentucky—\$33,577,000 lbs., Indiana 21,600,000 lbs., Ohio 29,325,000 lbs., West Virginia 2,640,000 lbs. and Missouri, 6,670,000 lbs.

First official weighing day under the 1982 schedule will be November 8. Sales are set for November 17 and 18 on opening week, and for November 22, 23, and 24 Thanksgiving week, then four days a week Monday through Thursday until the December 15 closing for Christmas. Plans then are for

selling to resume after the holidays four days week until the crop is sold.

At the Burley Association's annual election meeting on October 13, two

new directors were installed, following their election last month by growers and delegates in their districts.

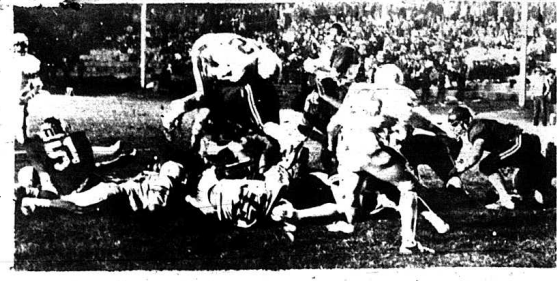

## Is One Church As Good As Another?

I know of no one who honestly believes that one church is as good as another. Some may say it, but their practice denies it. Most people are affiliated with a particular religious body because they think it to be the best—whether they are correct in this evaluation or not. If people believed that one church is as good as another, they would just as readily be a member of one as another, yet they contend for their own faith and religious system. These facts betray all of the lipservice given to such an affirmation: that one church is as good as another.

Would we dare affirm that churches built by men are as good as the church built by the Lord? Man is finite, limited in knowledge and imperfect in character; the church is infinite, perfect in character, and possessed all power (Matt. 28:18). Do the two compare favorably?

Christ is the head of the church. He built the church, and the churches built by men exist by no higher authority than that residing in the man who built them. Unless a human institution is as good as a divine institution, it must follow that a church built by my mere man is not as good as the church the Lord built. "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it..." (Psa. 127:1).

No teaching in the Bible is plainer than the fact that God has but one church (Eph. 4:4). There are no more churches than there are Gods, Lords, and Holy Spirits (Eph. 4:4-6). When Jesus promised to build the church He called it "My church" (Matt. 16:18). Never did He refer to

"my churches." This church had its beginning on the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ some 2,000 years ago (Acts 2:37, 41, 47). Roman Catholicism began in A.D. 806, and all other denominations are less than 500 years old.

However, there are hundreds of churches today, all claiming to be the one true church, or a part of it. Why do we have so many? The answer is simple—apostasy. Long before you and I were born, men became dissatisfied with God's arrangement and proceeded to establish their own righteousness and churches.

No, one church is not as good as another. To be identical with the church established by Christ, the church today must be like the apostolic church in name, origin, organization, doctrine, worship, faith and practice. Is the church to which you belong identical to the church in the New Testament in every way? Would you be willing to compare the identifying marks of Christ's church with the identifying marks of the church to which you belong?

It behooves every responsible person to study the Bible wherein is revealed an identified, one church of Christ. There is no human sect that can compare with the Lord's church. Christ said, "Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up" (Matt. 15:13).

# EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

## COME JOIN US

One of the major programs in the Cooperative Extension Service is the Homemakers Association. The purpose of the Extension Homemakers Association is to carry out an informal educational program. The educational program is planned by club officers and members assigned to provide information to help homemakers make better use of their resources in order to improve their life for themselves and their families.

Anyone can be a Homemaker member. There are two types of membership available. The regular member belongs to an organized group which meets once a month, has officers, has an educational program at each meeting, and meets in the community or homes. Homemaker club members are active on the club, county, state and national levels of the Association.

The second type of membership is the County-wide. This is for the person who has little time or interest in organizational activities, but is interested in on-going learning. The County-wide member does not attend club meetings, but has all the other advantages. They are a part of the Association, receive monthly lessons through the mail, have newsletters giving information of events, and are eligible to

participate in all county programs, tours and other activities as they choose.

Two dollars a year plus your Extension Homemaker dues to be a member of a club or a county wide member. Club members must pay a small amount for their club treasury.

As a homemaker, you will learn such things as energy, money and time management, family foods and nutrition, clothing, family life, health and safety, cultural arts and crafts, international understanding and community issues and concerns.

Club members develop leadership by serving as project leaders, being a leader in club programs, or serving as club officers. Homemaker club members become a vital part of the community. They are members of a community service projects and citizenship

programs.

## Start Your Own Club

If there is not an organized club in your community, you and some of your friends are invited to organize one. Usually ten to fifteen members is a good number to get a club going. No set number is required. Some groups are smaller; some larger. Clubs meet on a regular basis, usually once a month, from September through June. They may meet either during the day or at night. The County Extension Agent serves as advisor and will assist the club in organizing.

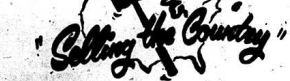

I knew about ambulances. I did state my credentials to qualify myself on the subject that I was writing about.

Second, your statement of me not trying to help the ambulances out instead of complaining and criticizing them is erroneous and demonstrates your lack of respect for the subject.

In my article I stated that I had been in the third party in arranging a meeting between the Fiscal Court and the Lake Cumberland Emergency Medical Services System. This to me is called helping.

If you had done any research you would have found that I have given many hours of my spare time to the ambulance service and at no charge. The only gain that I can recall is that my Mother was transported several times at no charge in appreciation for the services that I donated. I have not given my time in the past several years for reasons that are evident but should there be a request I would not hesitate to assist. My service now is spent as a volunteer fireman for the City of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County at no charge.

I agree that the truth shouldn't hurt but the shoe didn't fit so I am returning it. The remainder of your letter, you are entitled to your opinion as are those who have opposing views.

The article written by Ms. Hiatt was both informative and interesting, describing the way that our ambulance service is operated. The illusion presented was magnificent, or the operation of our ambulance service has undergone recent major changes. There are several areas of the article that I would like to address.

To my knowledge, only four employed by the ambulance service are certified as Emergency Medical Technicians. The remaining five have gone through their training, but have not taken their state practical examination. Therefore, two E.M.T.'s are not duty now nor have they been for several months.

The requirements to become an E.M.T. in Kentucky is different than what you wrote. The course is 47 hours with 10 hours for in-hospital observation or ambulance duty. Because hospitals and ambulance services will not permit trainees to be observers for many reasons, the 10 hours are not mandatory and are used for skill development in the classroom. Trainees must complete four written tests with a 75% average to pass the classroom course. After

this phase the trainee must pass a practical examination with a 100% score to be certified by the state as an Emergency Medical Technician. Also, the E.M.T. can administer certain drugs and can assist the patient with certain drugs. The E.M.T. can also introduce certain tubes into the airway. Your description of what an E.M.T. is allowed to perform leaves out several functions.

The ninth paragraph suggests to me that little research was done to write the article. The words, such as an ambulance can reflect one picture when the actual subject is different. Exactly how many hospital personnel serve as backup for the ambulance and of those how many are R.N.'s. Isn't it a fact that when these ambulances are called the runs that they are on hospital time. I will say that those that I see making calls are not E.M.T.'s and their primary jobs at the hospital the same but I don't think certain times are donated. You suggest in the next paragraph that 25% of the ambulance runs are made by hospital personnel. I do not have access to the run sheets but I do not feel this is a realistic percentage. This paragraph also suggests that our ambulance service is an Advanced Life Support System when in reality it is a Basic Life Support system. We do not have had an Advanced Life Support service but it went out the window when negotiations with the fiscal court failed.

Cumberland E.M.S.S. Any Advanced Life Support you refer to is a part of hospital operation and has nothing to do with the ambulance service and is used in the transfer of the patient from our hospital to another.

The 12th paragraph states that there is an ambulance available anytime it is called to an emergency. So, why did it take close to thirty minutes for anyone to respond to the fatal accident at the intersection of US 25, Main and West Main on Monday night, the 28th of October. I believe approximately three blocks from the ambulance station.

I enjoyed the article of it half way deals with an efficient Emergency Medical Services System. Although I feel that it was not operated, hopefully, it will be instrumental in bringing about the change necessary to create such a service.

The article submitted by our Fiscal Court gives the impression of whether we want people to live or die. Any person or subject put on a ballot is subject to rejection and no one knows which way it will go before hand. It is clear by now that the people of Rockcastle County expect an ambulance service even those with opposing views.

The question isn't whether we want people to live or die but whether we want to be taxed for the service.

The removal of CETA funds did not occur overnight. All local governments were warned years

before it happened. Very few did anything to offset this loss.

Why does it take 9 E.M.T.'s to operate our service? Couldn't 6 do the same job? Is sending a fully equipped ambulance with two E.M.T.'s necessary for non-emergency transfers? Will granting the tax increase the pay scale of employees and provide some benefits should they become ill or injured? Wiser use of money, personnel, and equipment could greatly reduce the operating cost.

If the tax is granted, there is nothing to say that it cannot be raised to the now legal limit of 10 cents per \$1,000.00. If the tax is granted you will also pay taxes that not only will pay for the taxes for the service but that we must also pay for using it. What if the manager decides that he services he wanted paid for his services, the hospital wanted pay to provide communications, the hospital wanted pay for the use of their personnel that made the runs. Suddenly I think the 5 cents would go to 10 cents.

Personally, I feel that this fiscal court has made many improvements for this county, especially in management. No other court has taken the initiative to move into the services for the people the way the present fiscal court has done. I have no malice for anyone from the ambulance service, hospital or Fiscal Court. They are some of the finest people

that I have known. I do feel that the timing, planning and gaps are too soon, too little and too many to support this tax referendum.

To the editor, I appreciate the space both before and now. I also urge all voters to go to the poll and cast your vote for your candidates and this question whatever your vote might be. Let us protect our rights by using them and honor our dead that fought to keep them.

## What would Rockcastle do without an Ambulance Service?

In last week's Hospital Focus, you read about the services offered to the county by our local ambulance service. Perhaps you have wondered: What would Rockcastle do without an ambulance service?

If our county did not have an ambulance service, we would have to call up on the ambulance service of a surrounding county, such as Lincoln, Pulaski, Laurel, or Madison in case of an emergency. Because every county serves its own residents first, we would have to wait until one of their ambulances is free and they have no urgent needs to meet of their own. An out-of-county emergency would not take precedence.

We would also have to inform other county of our intention to use their ambulance service and obtain permission to do so.

The time factor involved in a delay, or inability to get another county's ambulance could mean the difference between life and death to a person in a trauma situation. In the case of a heart attack, a person would need to be reached in a matter of six to 10 minutes to be saved, and with an out-of-county ambulance service that would be virtually impossible.

Another disadvantage is that some other ambulance service would probably take a patient to the hospital in its own county. For example, an ambulance coming from Berea would take the patient to the Berea Hospital. This would increase the time it takes to get a person to an Emergency Room to be treated or just stabilized.

Having our ambulances

come from another county would also eliminate the free and volunteer services offered by the Rockcastle County Hospital to our own ambulance service. There would no longer be continuous radio contact from the hospital during runs to receive the condition of the patient in order to prepare the Emergency Room for the arrival.

An out-of-county ambulance service would also eliminate the volunteer work of the hospital personnel who serve as backups to the ambulance service and provide advanced life support. The hospital also supplies the ambulance service with a volunteer director and medical director.

The close connection between the Rockcastle County Hospital and the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service enables the saving of lives by giving fast and

competent medical attention in an emergency situation. The next emergency in our county could happen to you or a member of your family. Would you want to depend on an out-of-county ambulance service?

## FmHA assisted 3,455 Kentucky farmers in '82

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) provided loans to 3,455 Kentucky farmers in fiscal year 1982 which ended on September 30, FmHA State Director Kendall L. Seaton announced today.

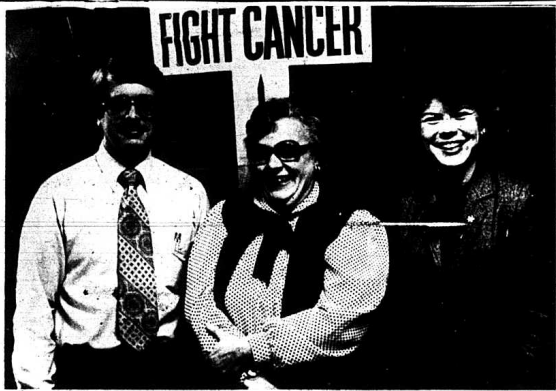
FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers who need credit but who cannot get it from a private bank or other lending institution. The loans are to be repaid in full, plus interest to the U.S. Government. FmHA has over 2,000 field offices throughout the country with 70 offices in Kentucky.

Early preliminary figures show that nationally the Agency provided about 100,000 loans to farmers across the country. The total amount loaned through FmHA farmer programs was approximately \$4.1 billion.

The breakdown of farmer program preliminary totals shows that Kentucky FmHA provided 1,781 Farm Ownership loans for \$25,135,390, 1,179 natural disaster Emergency loans for \$40,420,370 and 87 Soil and Water loans for \$449,670. "Some farmers received more than one type loan," Seaton said.
