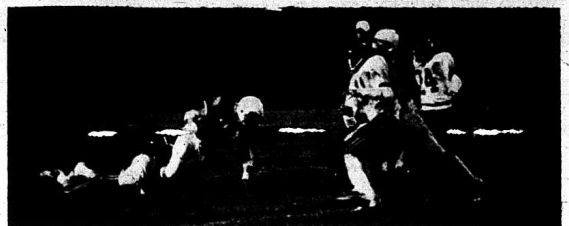

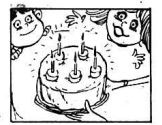

Ambulance defeated; Rogers stays in office

It is a well-known fact that people across the United States are very reluctant when it comes to imposing a tax upon themselves. This fact held true yesterday as voters in Rockcastle County went to the polls and defeated an ambulance referendum tax by almost 500 votes.

The tax, if passed, was to help the ailing ambulance service in the county, and would have assessed county residents an additional four cents for each \$100 of their property value.

The tax was passed in only two of the fourteen precincts in the county. West Brodhead precinct had seven more voters say yes than no and Climax passed the referendum by one vote. The tax tied in the Brown Precinct, however, these three precincts did little to help the referendum, and eliminating the use of across the rest of the county, especially in Livingston and Mt. Vernon.

County Judge Executive Bob Jasper said last week that if the tax failed, the

Fiscal Court would do what the voters wanted and begin to phase the ambulance service out.

However, during the November meeting of the Fiscal Court, Wednesday morning, the Judge Executive said that the Fiscal Court would continue to run the ambulance service until funds run out. He said that he didn't think this would be very long and that the ambulance service was in worse shape than the public realized. However, he said that everyone has the right to vote how they feel.

In only one other race on the ballot that was contested, incumbent Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers easily defeated his Democratic opponent Doyle Davenport by a vote of 1812 to 688.

This race, which was almost over before it even started, because of the Fifth District being predominantly Republican generated little interest throughout the county.

Davenport, who hails from Greensburg, did not receive any financial support from the state Democratic party because the

party did not feel like he was a serious candidate.

Rogers, who lives in Somerset, will begin his second term in Congress next January. The Fifth District is comprised of 28 counties in Southeastern Kentucky.

Two school board races were also on the ballot but both men running were unopposed. Rudolph Burdette and George M. Poynter, will remain on the school board. Burdette received 455 votes while Poynter got 223.

The blood drive is sponsored locally by the county homemakers club.

In the absence of board chairman, Rudolph Burdette at Tuesday night's school board meeting, vice chairman Willie Taylor conducted the meeting which dealt with several routine matters and one complaint.

Donald Holcomb was hired to replace Everett Bradley as night janitor at Brodhead School. He was approved to work four hours a day at \$3.86 per hour. He takes the job Bradley left to become maintenance supervisor for county schools.

The board voted to advertise for sealed bids, the

lease of 1512 pounds tobacco base the county school system owns as a result of land purchased for the high school. According to Superintendent Charles Parsons, the agriculture department at the high school also raises some of the tobacco acquired in the purchase.

In other personnel matters, Ricky Barnett was approved as substitute teacher and Earl Evans and Judy Bullock were approved as substitute bus drivers.

Parsons asked for the board's approval to request permission from the State Department of Education to

put a partition in the two new Title I classrooms at Roundstone Elementary, creating four classrooms, and eliminating the use of one trailer. The board granted approval.

The purchase of a used van to replace one that is getting old, was approved. The van will be used to transport pupils on a rural road.

Permission was granted Superintendent Parsons to advertise and accept sealed bids for Worker's Compensation Insurance, lunchroom tables at Brodhead School and lunchroom food and supplies.

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Vision for cleftRock has materialized into a unique church ministry

No one would deny that pilots of propeller planes need additional training to fly the modern jet planes. The need to train married couples in the art of staying married in today's fast-paced, fast-changing world is no less logical or necessary. "Our society has changed that much," says Bob Fields, whose idea for cleftRock, a marriage enrichment retreat center, located on the banks of the Rockcastle River near Pong, was materialized into something unique both in the area and in the state.

The focus on counseling for the purpose of stabilizing marriages was brought to the front fifty years ago by an English Methodist minister and his wife, David and Vera Pace. Fields said, "Mace, who spoke the question, 'Who speaks for marriage?' is entrusted from his church for proposing and practicing marriage counseling because the church felt he had no business prying into private matters. The Paces later joined the Quaker church and started the American Association of Marriage and Family Counselors, from which grew the international organization, the Association of Couples for Marriage Enrichment (ACME).

cleftRock counselors are well trained and are certified by ACME to train couples for today's marriage. Other counselors at cleftRock besides Eddie and Bob Fields, who have ACME training are Sarah and Lee Blivins, former missionaries in Israel, and E.B. and Sylvia Smith. The Smiths had, for some time, been "silent partners." Recently he left a job as design engineer for General Electric and she left her position as supervisor of the gifted education program in the Butler County, Ohio school district to join the staff at cleftRock. Blivins has a masters in theology and divinity and a masters degree in animal husbandry, works as a contractor for cleftRock. Blivins has a masters in counseling with a doctorate in counsel-

ing and does church counseling work in Berea, Somerset and London besides helping with retreat counseling. The Fields both have masters degrees, she from U.K. in family counseling, and he, in divinity from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The Fields are trained by the Southern Baptist Marriage Enrichment model. The Baptist model emphasizes more teaching, writing and input, whereas the ACME model stresses interaction, talking and group process more.

Baptists have a program called Bold Mission's Thrust, which is 25 year goal outlined for the church. Every year there are certain emphases. During the years 1983, 1984 and 1985, the goal of Southern Baptists is to retrain or run through a marriage enrichment retreat 15,000 couples," Fields said.

ACME stresses the need for marriage enrichment training as a preventative measure. That is, they encourage training before marriage gets to a trouble stage.

The Fields, who are charter members of ACME, which was begun in 1973, were recently appointed to a three year term on the ACME board of directors with headquarters in Winston Salem, North Carolina. Last year, ACME's annual conference was hosted at cleftRock.

A few Sundays ago, cleftRock celebrated its tenth anniversary. During the ten years since the Fields began working toward their long-range goal, six homes including the Fields', have been built there. Most belong to missionaries who have served, or are now serving in Israel and three of these cabins are used as housing for retreats.

cleftRock, Inc. includes 450 acres owned in partnership by four families. It is a non-profit corporation with a fifteen member

Skilled Nursing Welcomes Volunteers

Are you interested in donating some of your time and concern to make others happier? Then the Skilled Nursing Facility at the Rockcastle County Hospital would be the place to do just that.

Although the Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) admits patients of all ages, it is the older patients there that especially need someone to spend time with them. There are many things that you can do to make their days brighter, whether it be individually or with a group.

One of the most important things you can do is simply spend time visiting and talking with the patients. While you are there you could also write letters for the patients and give them to a member of the staff to be mailed.

Patients enjoy being read to by themselves or with several other patients. You could bring current magazines from home for patients who are able to read and want to keep up with happenings outside of the hospital. (Books should not be checked out of the library for patients because of the risk of the spread of infection.)

It would be nice for someone to give a checkers set or a deck of cards to the SNF, but even better if that person would take the time to play the games with the patients and let them know someone cares.

Quilt pieces, needlework and other crafts would be good items to donate to patients, and someone is needed to show them how to do the projects and get them started. Leather crafts would also be good for the men and women.

If you don't have time to visit, get the names of some of the patients and send them a card or a letter occasionally. Everyone likes to receive mail.

A birthday is a special time whether you are in the hospital or not, and it would be nice for several persons to find out when the patients have birthdays. Then they could send a card or bring them an inexpensive gift, such as powder, lotion, bedroom slippers, hair nets, a lacy handkerchief, etc.

A group might even decide to provide a box of new or homemade gifts marked for males or females, and the nurses could distribute a gift as the occasion arose. Once a month birthday parties would also be a good idea for a group to become involved in.

The Ministerial Association has a schedule of different churches in the county which provide worship services for the SNF patients in the Day Room every Sunday at 11 a.m. Perhaps you would like to share the worship time with them, or volunteer your talents to the patients by providing music and/or singing at the services. In the case of the latter you should contact Rick Holladay, minister of Berea United Methodist Church, who is presently the chairman of the Ministerial Association. He can be reached at 256-2013.

The patients love music anytime, and those wishing to provide this type of entertainment are welcome during the week too. Persons who sing or play musical instruments could entertain individuals in their rooms when the patients are unable to join others in the Day Room.

car for use in the driver education training at the high school for a cost of one dollar a day, plus \$75 clean-up cost.

After the matters on the agenda were taken care of, Teddy E... brought forth some complaints to Parsons and the board.

Brock asked why his application for the job of maintenance supervisor had not been considered by the board. He said he felt each application should be presented to the board.

Charles Parsons said that by law the superintendent is to recommend personnel to the board and, in his opinion, Mr. Bradley was the best qualified applicant for the job. (Everett Bradley was hired as maintenance supervisor to replace Paul Owens, who retired last month.) Parsons said Bradley had done similar work at Sowder Nursing Home and was acquiring with boilers and their operation.

Brock told Parsons and the board that he felt he was qualified for the job since he had worked as a carpenter, a plumber, had done electrical, block-laying and brick-laying work and he said he understood Jack St. Clair worked on the boilers. He said anybody could read gauges.

Parsons told Brock that he was not considering personalities, as he liked him (Brock) as well as he did Bradley, but that he had in mind that Brock's only experience was on the farm and the safety of the children was uppermost in his mind.

Brock said if he had not felt qualified, he would not have applied for the job.

Brock also voiced some frustration concerning treatment of his son who plays basketball at Rockcastle County High School. He said when the boys go on away games, they are furnished only one dollar to eat supper on. He said he felt it was a shame that with the time and effort the boys put into the game, they don't get enough money to eat when they are on the road. He made it plain that he was able to feed his son, but he said he felt the boys deserved more for their effort.

Brock went on to say that he felt it was unfair for parents who play one sport at the high school to have to pay for admittance to other sporting events. He said he asked Mr. Sawyer why basketball players had to pay to get into football games and was told they needed the money to operate on.

Brock said if the county (schools) was in that bad shape, it was in pretty bad shape.

Parsons responded by saying that matters of this nature were left up to the athletic department.

Question answered

about milk at a school

Some parents have voiced concern that, as of this year, their children are not allowed to buy extra milk with their meals, nor to buy milk to drink with a packed lunch. Also, this year for the first time in several years, there is no milk break.

In order to find out and clear the air, we called Buford Parkerson, principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary and E.J. Smith, food service supervisor for the county school lunchrooms.

We were told that the

government does not provide extra free milk for students this year. A free milk is provided only with each free meal.

This was one reason the principals in the elementary school... out out at the milk break. Parkerson said the reasoning was that those who might want milk but could not afford it should not be denied it at break while other students drank it.

Other reasons given were that in the past years, some schools have reportedly lost as much as three to four hundred dollars on milk money collections. Smith said the grade schools do not have the personnel to collect the milk money. He said at the high school, where students are allowed to buy extra milk, a cashier and cash register keep the records straight.

When asked why students can't buy an extra milk with their lunch, Parkerson said it might seem unfair to the students on free lunch program who could not. The decision to sell no milk and provide milk only with a meal also affects those who wish to bring their lunch and purchase a cold milk, as they have been allowed to do in the past.

Smith said that the state requires only that one milk be provided with each meal in order to get government reimbursement for the meal.

The decision about extra milk was made at a principals meeting, Parkerson said. He said he had had no complaints from parents, but that if parents were to indicate they wanted the policy changed, he felt there would be no problem.

Guidelines for Choosing Portable Kerosene Heaters. Part I

Portable kerosene room heaters can be a reliable and cost-effective alternative for home heating if they contain appropriate safety features. A new generation of modern kerosene heaters has been developed in recent years with materials, mechanism, design and performance which sets them apart from primitive designs that were common 30 years ago.

When selecting a portable kerosene heater, here are some common sense guidelines:

Be sure the heater design will not allow flooding of the burner. Models with a wick meet this requirement.

Ask your dealer to demonstrate what happens if the heater is jarred or tipped over. Heaters suit-

The children played able for home use should have a safety shut-off device which automatically shuts out the flame if the heater is tipped. No significant amount of kerosene should spill if the heater is laid on its side.

The heater should have a low center of gravity to make accidental tip-overs unlikely. Check construction for durability. The heater should be made of heavy-gauge steel and have such features as double walls or protective grills to guard against contact burns.

The fuel feed should be located below the burner. The fuel should be contained in a sturdy tank that will not shatter and spill fuel if dropped. A fuel gauge should be provided to prevent overflowing or unnecessary refilling. A siphon pump provided with a kerosene heater will help prevent accidental fueling spills.

Check for a push-button lighting device which eliminates the need for matches. Burner design should provide such complete and efficient combustion that there should be no detectable odor or smoke during operation.

Have your dealer demonstrate lighting and operating procedures. Approval by a recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories, can provide additional assurance that the heater has performed well under severe test conditions and meets acceptable safety standards.

Check manufacturer's literature for BTU ratings of various models. Discuss with your dealer the appropriate size unit for the area you wish to heat.

The children in the Skilled Nursing Facility would enjoy an adopted grandparent who would visit for about an hour a day, or at least three times a week.

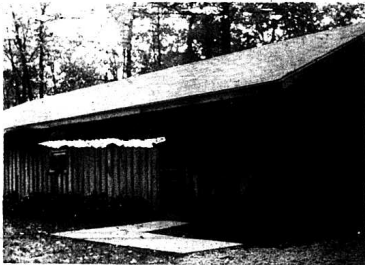

board of directors which administers its program. The most recent facility to be completed is a marriage enrichment cabin consisting of two bedrooms, two baths and a kitchen. The building was built at a cost of \$14,600, materials only. The labor was done by volunteers.

Fields says they do not ask for donations, but God has always provided. Recently, someone who is familiar with cleftRock and its mission asked for a grant from the Kentucky Colonels and after filling out a paper, Fields said

they were granted \$5,000 toward their next cabin.

A major building project, which is now under construction is the dining hall, expected to cost \$50,000. The building is ready for a roof to be put on before bad weather. Twenty-five thousand dollars has been donated for the project. The hall features passive solar heat and a wood burning stove.

For the past two summers a Baptist church in New Iberia, Louisiana, has sent volunteers (three or four families) for one week during the summer to work on construction projects at cleftRock. A group from

that church plans to return again this summer, possibly to finish the dining hall.

In the past, the Fields' home and other homes there have been used as conference rooms for housing and as a dining hall, and "in every way possible" for the various retreats' schedule. The extra "space" will be a welcomed relief to the leaders who have had to "make do" with the room available.

Church renewal is the overall theme of the efforts at cleftRock, but in the early days, most of the retreats were youth retreats and were held on weekends, Fields said. They still schedule youth retreats, but in addition, they now schedule deacons' retreats, Sunday School teachers, church staff and marriage enrichment retreats. When scheduling retreats, care is taken to keep the number small. The limit is 20 couples for marriage enrichment, they are certified to take only 8 couples. "There is no way a person can come here and get lost in the crowd. Everyone participates," Fields says.

cleftRock accepts groups from any church "where Christ is Lord", but this fall they have been so booked they have had to turn groups away.

Sometimes the staff travels to churches to hold staff seminars or marriage enrichment events rather than have church members travel to them. Distance and time sometimes become a factor.

Those who do not travel to cleftRock, however, miss something. There is a renewing in the natural beauty of the area that stimulates a feeling of closeness to nature. Whatever the season, the atmosphere at cleftRock is enhanced by the awesome scenery and the quietness.

Wondering in the early '70's whether his desire to return to Rockcastle from Israel and build cleftRock was his idea or God's leadership, Bob Fields said he fasted and prayed for divine guidance and came away feeling he and God were of one accord.

The idealistic young missionaries still hold to the vision and goal they left Israel and the mission field for ten years ago. The vision has materialized through physical labor, spiritual strength and an outpouring of gifts.

Many locals stood back

and shook their uncomprehending heads ten years and less ago, feeling sorry for Bob and Eddie Fields who had such a seemingly strange idea and were em-

barking on such an impossible project.

Confusion, suspicions, and negative responses engendered in large part by the church community have

been met with a quiet resolve and a Christian example above reproach.

The goal, though not yet fully realized, is certainly closer.
