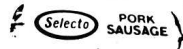

Rockcastle man arrested in shooting death of Hayes, Monday afternoon

A Rockcastle County man died Monday afternoon around 4:30 from a gunshot wound to the left arm and chest, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Ronald K. Hayes, 25, of Route 3, Brodhead reportedly pulled his car into the parking lot of the Valley View apartment complex, on old U.S. 22, around 4:15 p.m., Monday where he was confronted by Wayne Cotton, 22, of Route 3, Mt. Vernon, according to Kentucky State Police Detective Roland Hukabee.

Cotton allegedly pulled his 1971 LTD behind Hayes' car and got out, carrying a 12 gauge shotgun. Cotton then, reportedly, opened the driver's door to Hayes' vehicle and fired once at Hayes, Hukabee said. Hayes was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where he died a few minutes later, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor.

Taylor said the shooting was apparently the result of an argument the two men had a few days before concerning some wheels for a car.

Taylor also said that four Swinney men were in the car with Cotton when they left the scene following the shooting. He said the Swinneys (Everett, Cleff, Denver and Jack) were taken to their home by Cotton where they got out of the vehicle.

Taylor went on to say that several law enforcement officials throughout the county searched for Cotton for about five hours. He said that around 9 p.m., Cotton, along with his brother, Dale Cotton, and half-brother, Cov

Vance, came into the courthouse to surrender.

Detective Hukabee said that he shot Hayes in self-defense. Hukabee also said Cotton told him that Hayes was carrying a knife. However, Hukabee said no knife was found on Hayes' body or at the scene.

Cotton was lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail Monday night and charged with murder. His bail was set at \$50,000 cash, Tuesday morning during his bond hearing, according to Sheriff Taylor.

Hayes' body was taken to Louisville Tuesday morning for an autopsy. The preliminary report from the autopsy revealed that Hayes died from a single penetrating gunshot wound to the left arm and chest cavity, according to Coroner Dowell.

Hayes was born February 11, 1957, in Rockcastle County, the son of James and Anna Barnett Hayes of Route 3, Brodhead.

Court makes settlement offer in damage dispute

The alleged damage occurred in the fall of 1981 when the county road crew was widening and improving an old road next to the Peters property. Apparently, the county did not have a written right-of-way agreement signed by the Peters before they cleared a slope back toward a barn owned by Peters.

The bank which, according to Paul Hansel, county road supervisor, was sowed in grass, gave way and slid.

The Peters contend that it is a matter of time before the barn will be damaged by the slide.

According to County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper, the damage to the 40 barn, which is old, has been appraised at \$2,100.

Home at Sand Springs burns Monday morning

A six-room frame house in the Sand Springs area belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Graves burned about 2:30 Monday morning, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor.

Taylor said no one was at home at the time of the fire.

Certain evidence has led investigators to believe the fire was the work of a thief- arsonist. No one has been charged in the fire as yet.

City to seek grant for Fairground Hill

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted to seek a grant for improvements in the Fairground Hill section of the city at its November meeting Monday night.

This is the fourth time the city has made application for a Community Block Grant for the Community Block Grants are funded through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Jenny Curran of Will Linder and Associates, grants writers from Berea, was at the meeting to answer questions. Ms. Curran said she felt the city had a better chance than it ever had to receive the grant this time.

The matters of dogs and leaves surfaced at the council meeting.

Clarence Hasty, dog warden for the county, asked the assistance of the city police in picking up stray dogs. The council granted police the authority to help Hasty.

The widespread burning of leaves came to the attention of the council as did an ordinance banning the burning of leaves within the city limits.

Police will be advised to enforce the ordinance after Thursday, November 11. Leaves put into plastic garbage bags and placed at the curb will be picked up Monday, November 15 by city workers.

The council sanctioned a plan by Matt Powell, water superintendent, to replace torn up parking meters with used ones, if they can be located, and to try to repair as many as possible.

Sunday night, a beige 1979 Monte Carlo was stolen from the residence of William H. Morris at Trace Branch, south of Livingston.

Life added to color pictures

One essential quality of an outstanding piece of fine art is permanence. Piqua High School teacher Jack Bowman realized standard color photography lacked permanence, so he turned to a very old process to ensure his photographs would outlive him.

Bowman, 38, of 1010 Concord Ave., Piqua, Ohio, teaches art and photography at the high school. When Bowman became serious about photography in the early 1970's, he found basic black and white photography did not offer enough contrast and first glance, so he began to work with toned black and white photos and color processing.

While conventional color processing gives the photographer the chance to capture the beauty of his surroundings, the artwork eventually fades. "The color of my Army picture has almost faded away," Bowman said. The standard color photo has a lifespan of about 40 years.

In searching for a more permanent color photography process, Bowman came upon gum-pigment-bichromate watercolor processing. The gum process was developed in the 1850's. Bowman said the reason standard processing fades is that it uses dyes. The pigments in gum processing are permanent.

After taking a photograph, Bowman gives it permanent color by using the gum-pigment-bichromate processing, then adds watercolor paint to finish the fine art print.

The process takes a great deal more time than conventional prints, but Bowman said the end results justify the effort. "It's worth your while if it is going to outlive you," Bowman said.

The gum-pigment-bichromate process produces a print with soft detail. Bowman explained it is the soft texture which led to a sharp downturn in popularity for the process. He said early in this century tastes turned more toward sharp images, in part, because of publication requirements.

Bowman said the 19th century process is a splendid combination of photo-dye and painting. It takes patience to be a fine art photographer. Bowman said he studied a "winter scene outside his house for nine days before taking the picture." "A fine art photographer is not out for efficiency," he said. "It's for beauty," Bowman said.

Over a three-year period, Bowman took a number of photographs in his native Kentucky. These pictures of outdoor life in Appalachia were finished in the gum-pigment-bichromate process. The photographs have been compiled in a one-man show which Bowman has displayed several places in the three-state area. The show is entitled "Last of Noble Savages."

Bowman also uses color tones to give added beauty to his black and white photos. He has taken of the Miami Valley, in Ohio. One of Bowman's more interesting photographs is entitled "Appalachian Abstract," which appears to be a fog rising over mountains when, in fact, it is steam coming off a cinder pile near the Piqua Municipal Power Plant.

Photography is a relatively new art form developed in the 19th century. "Painters have been painting for 10,000 years, but photography is only about 100 years ago, so there is plenty of room for creativity," Bowman said.

Another reason Bowman likes this photography will become the popular modern art form is that everyone relates to pictures. "Everyone takes pictures, but few people paint once they get out of school," he said.

An avid crossbow hunter, Bowman often combines his love of sport and photography. He has taken a number of pictures which have appeared in national magazines. Bowman also has written numerous crossbow stories and for a few years edited a magazine.

He was national crossbow champion three times in the last few years.

Bowman is a native of Mount Vernon, Ky. He graduated from Eastern Kentucky University. He and his wife, Margie, have a son and a daughter. He

is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bowman of Route 1, Orlando.

"That's Your Interpretation"

If you have ever discussed the Bible with anyone who disagrees with you, chances are sooner or later you have heard the reply: "That's your interpretation!" This attitude stems from equating interpretation with teaching false doctrine, thus a misunderstanding of interpretation.

Interpretation is acceptable in every area of life except religion in the minds of many. In religion it is used as a catch phrase to suggest that what you are saying is wrong, never taking into consideration that what you are saying may be right. Every time we read a newspaper, document, menu, book, magazine, etc., we interpret it. For example, if we read in a newspaper that "a free gift will be given to each person who comes to John Doe Department Store between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.", it is easy to interpret the wording of this ad and we would not expect the manager of the store to stand in the door turning people away at 9 a.m. by saying, "That's just your interpretation." Therefore, the real issue is not interpreting the ad, but making the proper application by meeting the conditions. To receive the gift I must go to the right place at the right time. Can you imagine someone going to the store at 6 a.m. and demanding his free gift by saying, "I know it says

9:00 a.m., but it really doesn't mean 9:00 a.m." This person is trying to receive his gift by making an improper application of the stated facts, which are clear and easy to understand.

The most widely rejected passages in the New Testament are those teaching the essentiality of baptism. Again, it is not a problem of interpretation, but of application. Every elementary reader should be able to understand the simple language of Jesus when He said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16: 16). However, many reject it by failing to make the same application as the Jews on the day of Pentecost when they were baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38, 41).

Remember, the real problem is not interpretation, but one of application. The question is, "How are we going to respond to plain statements?"

King Hollow
Long ago Dick and Maudie King settled up this branch stream of Clear Creek and now the homes of their descendants are built along it. I found Julie King Abney cracking walnuts out in the yard and she says she stores the kernels easier than the whole nuts. These are put in cakes or candy around holiday time. So you know she feeds the family well by using what nature provides. Her husband, Eligh, was cutting wood on the hill trying to beat the winter snows that will swoop in and blanket the hollow one day soon.

Next, I went to Brother Dillard and Mossie King Bowman's home up the road. Here, too, I saw Mossie putting away bags of walnut kernels. I knew that she would put them in cakes for I had tasted one she had made and it was delicious. Brother Dillard, who is pastor of Macedonia Church, has retired from Dresser Industries at Berea after working 34 years there as well as other places in Kentucky. But he hasn't retired from his labor of the Lord. Bertha King Long, who lived in the last house which was across a wooden bridge over the stream, was not at home. As winter approaches, Rockcastle County Schools make plans for inclement weather.

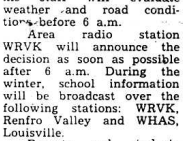
In the event of inclement weather primary consideration will be given to student safety. Weather and road conditions district wide have to be considered.

The superintendent and his staff will evaluate weather and road conditions before 6 a.m.

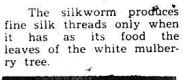

84 fiscal year. According to Ray, \$294,458 has been allocated to maintain Rockcastle's state maintained roads.

The department recommended improving a portion of Ky. 1249, 364 miles of Ky. 1152 beginning at the Pittman Hill Road and a bridge over Crooked Creek on Ky. 1004. The court approved the recommendations.

Joe Denney met with the court and told them about an Athey loader for sale for \$3,000 (as is) or \$4,000 (in running order when picked up). Joe offered to go with the judge and the county mechanic, Charles Bussell, to look at the loader.

A contract was agreed upon between the county and Ellis Kidwell for lease of property to place voting house on for the Conway precinct. It is \$50 annually for the next 5 years.

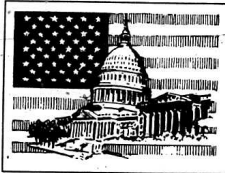

Congressman Rogers selected for special coal trade mission

In recognition of his continued work for increased exports, Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers has been selected to represent the United States Congress on a special Coal Trade Mission to the Far East.

This mission, sponsored by the Department of Commerce, will include Assistant Secretary William Morris, plus officials of coal companies, railroads, ports and others involved in the movement of coal to potential foreign customers.

"With unemployment still at an outrageously high level in our coalfields, we must continue to look for new markets for American coal," Rogers said. "This trade mission will give us an excellent opportunity to contact foreign buyers of all kinds, and let them know we want their business."

During his trip, Congressman Rogers will visit South Korea, Hong Kong and Japan. "Japan in particular is an outstanding market with great potential

for American coal," said Rogers. "Now is the time for us to lay the ground work for future increases in the use of coal, increases that will come as our economy, and that of the rest of the world, picks up."

In addition to his discussions on coal, Rogers will also meet with cabinet-level officials of foreign countries to discuss the reduction of trade barriers blocking U.S. exports of all kinds. The Congressman

Hospital Chapel ready for use

The Rockcastle County Hospital now has a chapel. With the help of the Ministerial Association a room has been converted into a quiet place where family members and friends can go to pray together and comfort each other.

Rick Holladay, pastor of Bethany United Methodist Church, is the chairman of the Rockcastle County Ministerial Association and has helped the hospital get a room ready to be used as a chapel.

What has been done to change the room downstairs into a chapel? "We bought curtains for one of the walls, painted the walls a different color, and hung up a sign to show where the chapel is," said Holladay.

There have been items donated to furnish the chapel. Two table lamps were donated, one by the First Baptist Women's Group and one by the Bethany United Methodist Women. An altar table was given by Ford Realty and Auction Co., Inc.

The Ministerial Association also helps provide a Chaplain of the Week for the hospital. "When we set up the Chaplain of the Week, the Ministerial Association had in mind that one minister in the county would give three days a week to visiting the hospital and then be on call all seven days of a certain week if something happened at the hospital that a minister was needed," said Holladay.

Church services are held on Sunday afternoons at 4:00 in the Day Room at the hospital for any patient who wants to attend. Interested pastors in the county take turns leading the services which usually last from 30 to 45 minutes.

Holladay feels that the Ministerial Association has not only helped the hospital with the chapel, but that it has helped in other ways. "I think the Association also provides good opportunities for people to contact a minister in the community to have spiritual counseling," he said. "I think this is important to any patient in the hospital because as the doctors and nurses are concerned with the physical welfare of the patient, so the ministers are concerned with the emotional and spiritual welfare of the patients."

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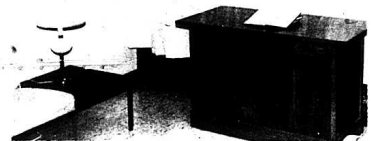

FmHa makes 46 loans and grants in 1982 Fiscal Year

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHa) made 46 loans and grants to communities and rural businesses during Fiscal Year 1982, which ended September 30.

FmHa State Director Kendall L. Seaton said today FmHa is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers, small rural communities, non-profit agencies and other rural residents who need credit but cannot get it from other lending institutions. FmHa provides service through more than 2,000 field offices nationwide with 77 in Kentucky.

Nationally, FmHa made 444 grants for rural water and sewer systems totaling \$133.8 million, plus 928 loans for \$375 million. Other assistance included 267 loans totaling \$126.1 million for essential community facilities in rural areas.

74 loan guarantees totaling \$125 million for rural businesses, including fuel alcohol production, 6 loans totaling \$1.9 million for such purposes as flood prevention, watershed protection and resource conservation.

The total for all community and business programs was \$761.8 million nationally.

In Kentucky, total grants for water and sewer systems were 11 for \$4,493,500; loans totaled 29 for \$12,091,000; other assistance during the year included:

- 4 loans for \$4,545,000 for community facilities,
- 2 loan guarantees for \$1,565,000 for rural businesses,
- Administered 2 ARC grants totaling \$640,000.

The Farmers Home Administration made 2,744 home loans to Kentucky families in Fiscal Year 1982 that ended September 30. FmHa State Director Kendall L. Seaton has announced.

FmHa is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers and other rural residents who need credit, but who cannot get it from private banks or other lending institutions. The loans are to be repaid in full, plus interest, to the U.S. Government.

FmHa has more than 2,000 field offices throughout the country with 77 offices in Kentucky.

Preliminary figures show that nationally the Agency provided more than 78,000 loans to families across the country who were without safe, decent and sanitary housing. Another 30,000 families were afforded an opportunity at better housing through 1,428 loans that financed rental housing construction. The total amount of FmHa housing loans for the fiscal year was \$3.5 billion.

Proper Use of Portable Kerosene Heaters

As with any heating appliance, proper precautions should be taken to ensure safe and efficient operation.

Following is a safety checklist for consumers:

Burn Only Kerosene. NEVER use gasoline, white gas, campstove or other fuels. They are extremely dangerous if used in kerosene heaters. Kerosene should be water clear. Yellow or colored kerosene will smoke, smell and interfere with wick operation.

Store kerosene supplies in an approved container, clearly marked kerosene, away from living quarters, living quarters, never near a heater. When the heater is cool, using a siphon pump to prevent spillage. Place the heater away from curtains, furniture, papers, clothes or other combustible materials.

Some heater surfaces become hot. Keep children away and instruct them not to touch the controls. Perhaps provide a barrier around the heater to prevent them from contacting it. Provide adequate ventilation, normally furnished by opening a window to an adjacent room. In totally closed rooms a window should be opened slightly. Avoid drafts.

Read and follow the manufacturer's directions for correct operation and maintenance of the heater. Keep the instruction booklet available for reference.

Clean and maintain your heater according to manufacturer's instructions. Keep base tray free of dust, dirt or any obstruction.

When turning the heater off, make sure the flame is completely extinguished. Open heaters have an igniter flame, do not use flammable solvents, aerosol sprays, lacquers, or gasoline in the same room.

Electric Blanket Is Energy-Saver

To keep warm and save energy, turn down the thermostat and turn on your electric blanket. If you cut off the heat to your bedroom, do not use flammable solvents, aerosol sprays, lacquers, or gasoline in the same room.

You'll also be saving money. It costs only a few cents per night to sleep under an electric blanket. If you don't like the idea of being wrapped up in yards and yards of electric wires, take comfort from the fact that the chances of you getting shocked or burned are slim. There were only 163 such mishaps reported all last year in the U.S.

Follow a few easy rules in buying, using and taking care of your electric blanket:

1. If you're shopping for a new blanket, get one with an automatic shut-off device. Then if the blanket overheats, the electricity will cut off immediately. A blanket sold with a 5-year warranty will usually give the longest and most-satisfactory service.

2. Spread the blanket out with a single thickness. Don't double it over to try to get extra warmth.

3. Don't tuck the wired areas of the blanket under the mattress. The better blankets have snaps at the ends that form snug corners to help hold the blanket in place.

4. Don't use an electric blanket for a baby or small child.

5. Never send an electric blanket to the dry cleaners, solvents can damage the heating-wire insulation.

6. Instead, wash it carefully according to directions that came with it. You can protect the plug by folding it into a corner of the blanket and pinning or sewing it in place.

How to Wash It

If you can't find the washing instructions, here are some:

Pre-soak blanket in lukewarm sudsy water, hand-wash and rinse twice. Squeeze out the excess water, but don't hand-wring it or put it through a washer-wringer.

If you have a washer with a pre-soak cycle and your spin, you can do your blanket in it. Pre-soak in lukewarm sudsy water, then turn it by hand and soak a little longer. Skip the gentle-wash cycle and give it the gentle spin. Repeat the soak-and-turn and gentle-spin directions for two rinses.

Many electric blankets don't need washing for years. When you put it away, protect it from dampness and dust with a plastic storage bag.

Choosing Wood Stove For Mobile Home Use

Don't buy a fireplace or wood-burning stove for your mobile home unless it is "UL-approved" for such use. The UL-approved fireplaces for a mobile home often come complete with stovepipe and chimney package, plus clear instructions on how to install it. They cost more than standard units, but there's good reason.

A conscientious dealer won't even sell you a fireplace or wood-burning stove if it's not listed for mobile home use by Underwriters Laboratories.

The extra fire hazard associated with mobile homes and their vulnerability to wind damage mean you need a wider margin of safety.

Many of these stoves and fireplaces are designed with an outside air intake so that they do not take combustion air from the living area.

Space is often a problem, as you need safe clearances from walls, floors and all other burnables. Facing wall surfaces with brick and setting the stove on a brick or ceramic hearth help fulfill safety requirements.

Follow the stove company's recommendations to the letter.

Wood stoves need a Class A all-fuel chimney for safe venting. The chimney gases from a wood fire are many times hotter than those from the fossil fuels. That's why any chimney that was safe for venting a gas furnace may not do at all for a wood-burning stove.
