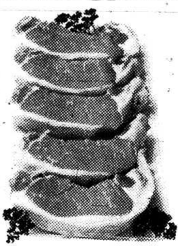

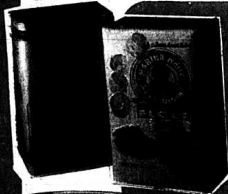

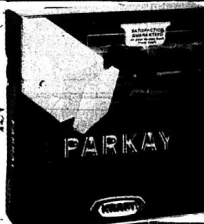

## Farmers hit hard by price support cut as tobacco markets open Wednesday

"It came at a very bad time for the tobacco farmer." Only seven days before the tobacco markets across the state opened, Secretary of Agriculture John Block announced 6.2 cents per pound price support cut.

As was expected, the announcement met with great hostility by most farmers. Across the state and Rockcastle County, farmers were no different.

The price support, which is the price the government will pay for tobacco if a bidder of a tobacco company bids less than \$1.813 per pound before Block's announcement. This would have been 17.7 cents higher than the support price last year. With the cut, farmers will receive 11.5 cents per pound instead of 17.7.

Block, who held a press conference in Louisville this past Monday, said that the reason he cut the price support was so that tobacco grown in the U.S. would be competitive on the World Market. He said that usually tobacco prices were so high on U.S. to tobacco that foreign countries would not buy it.

Rockcastle County ASCS executive director Harold Ballinger said Tuesday that the price cut could cost Rockcastle County farmers \$300,000 to a half million dollars overall. He said that around 3,740,952 pounds of tobacco are grown in the county each year and that 6.2 cents per pound can add up to a lot of money.

Ballinger said that he could not completely understand Block's decision because since the enactment of the price support system in 1934, only 33 million dollars has been spent on the program by the federal government. He said that this was pennies compared to the milk support price, which has been in the billions of dollars.

Several tobacco farmers across the county have voiced considerable criticism of the cut. One farmer, Randall Stevens of Maretburg, said Tuesday that in his opinion, Secretary Block was "an idiot." He said that the price support was put on by the government for a reason. He said that each year it gets more expensive to grow your crop. "Fertilizer was higher, labor cost more this year and most of us were counting on the support price to help offset those costs," he said.

Another local farmer, Paul Hansel of Willalla, was complaining Friday about the new program this year where a farmer must sign a form consenting to pay the federal government 1 cent per pound to help fund the price support program.

"They have got you any way you turn. If you don't sign the form (which is not mandatory) then your tobacco is not covered by the price support," he said. He thought that was bad enough but now Block has cut the price support," he said.

"Tobacco this year should average about a \$1.75 per pound," Ballinger said. "I know this isn't what the farmers expected

but it is still 11.5 cents more than last year's average of \$1.83," he said.

Ballinger went on to say that farmers who are considering using someone else's marketing card to sell their tobacco should think twice before doing it. He said that marketing using their own card is better. They were going to be watched very close this year.

He went on to say that the farmers would also be asked this year, for the first time, to sign a form stating that they did not nest their tobacco. He said that this will also have to be signed to receive the price support. He said that the government would be checking the bales very closely this year.

Formed in the early 1970's, it has endured and grown tremendously; however, just recently, the club has split and a new club "The People's Saddle Club," the original club is still one of the largest in the state.

The club is not only a source of enjoyment, it is also an organization which raises funds for worthwhile causes. They have an annual ride-a-thon for anyone who wishes to participate and the monies raised go to the Cancer society. They also own land at various locations in the county and have plans to build a clubhouse in the near future.

### State Legislature

The Program Review and Investigations Committee is looking into several problems involving state government employees.

For example, according to a study conducted by the committee, female employees under the state's merit system earn \$402 less per month than their male co-workers.

Also, non-merit women workers make \$1,093 less than their male co-workers each month.

The committee report said the difference was not an indication of discrimination, but a sign of occupational segregation with women holding the majority of the lower-rung clerical

jobs. However, 25 percent of the women surveyed said they thought their gender had been a drawback in their careers with state government.

The report recommended that the state make more of an effort to alert women to promotional opportunities and to provide more training.

Representatives of several state agencies will comment on the salary differential study at the next Program Review meeting.

Also, the committee voted to conduct a full review of the controversial reclassification of state employees' job and pay grade scales.

## Beautification tops LDC list of goals

"Beautification of Mt. Vernon" topped the list of 37 goals for Mt. Vernon, reported Eric Kuhn, of the Proctor-Davis-Ray Engineering Company of Lexington, at a meeting held last week of the City of Mt. Vernon Local Development Corp. (LDC).

The list of 37 goals was compiled by members of the LDC and local citizens at the October 14th meeting. At that time those present at that meeting voted on the five most important of the 37 goals and Mr. Kuhn took the list and votes and compiled them and made the report at the November 9th meeting.

"Beautification of Mt. Vernon" received 98 points in the voting and was followed by "more of street parking" with 81 points which tied with "commercial recreation" also with 81 points. Next in line of the voting was "adopt store front themes" with 56 points, and "special attraction days with 55 points.

Other prioritized concerns were "unity of business community" with 50 points and "improve zest of city" with 49 points. "Advertising of community" with 34 points, "advertising of business" with 29 points.

The project concerns of the Local Development Corporation are a part of the Downtown Revitalization project now being sponsored by the L.D.C.

Floyd Owens, Project Director of the Downtown Revitalization project stated at the meeting that he had contacted 65 merchants in the city area about the merchants survey, whereby city merchants are asked to complete a questionnaire of 39 questions about their business, about parking, what improvements they might make to their business places, and what they like or dislike about Mt. Vernon and what they feel should be done to improve the business climate in Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Owens also reported that he had talked to the City Council at the monthly meeting and that Mayor Mullins and the councilmen wanted to stress the point that the Revitalization project was for all the business places in Mt. Vernon, not just Main Street.

Next in the process will be a Random Shoppers Survey, which will be conducted by Mr. Owens and Karen Noe, in which they will interview people on the streets, in shops and at the local bank.

Some of the questions will be concerned with where the customer lives, how many shopping trips they made to Mt. Vernon in an average week, why they like to shop in Mt.

Vernon, what they like or dislike about Mt. Vernon, where they park, if they have trouble parking, what stores they shop most often, what other types of business establishments they would like to see in the Mt. Vernon area, and other questions about their shopping habits. The shoppers will also

be asked about their shopping out of town in shopping centers and why they shop in various areas.

These shoppers surveys will be turned over to the Proctor-Davis-Ray firm for them to compile and make a report to the next meeting of the L.D.C. which will be December 7th at City Hall.

The action occurred in the vicinity of Troina, Sicily, August 5, 1943, when the enemy threatened to encircle the rifle company he was supporting with heavy machine guns. Pfc. Gill exposed himself to heavy artillery and mortar fire to secure a command-

ing position for his weapon. From this position, he inflicted heavy casualties upon the enemy and materially assisted in dispersing them.
