Prenatal Classes Taught At BCH

Are you an expectant parent? If you are awaiting the birth of your baby, you may be interested in the prenatal classes taught at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

Betty Purcell, director of in-service training at the hospital, is responsible for teaching the classes. Who is eligible to attend? "Anyone who is planning to deliver her baby at this hospital," said Mrs. Purcell. "She can bring one person with her to the classes. This is usually the husband, but it can be anyone who will be with her during her labor."

The registered nurse explained what the expectant parent will be taught during the sessions. "At the end of the classes the person should know what is going to happen to her body during labor and delivery. She will also learn techniques to help her stay in control during labor. We will practice these techniques in the classes so that when she actually goes into labor she can perform properly and effectively."

When should the parents-to-be start taking the classes? "The classes start during the last two months of pregnancy. The classes are taught at the hospital training room. There are weekly sessions that run for five or six weeks depending on how many are

in the class. The classes usually last about one and a half to two hours." Mrs. Purcell said the classes are now free since they are a service provided by the hospital.

One advantage of the classes is that they prepare the father for the delivery. "The ultimate decision concerning the father in the delivery room rests with the attending physician," she said. "However, as a rule, most of the fathers who have attended past classes have been allowed in the delivery room."

Mrs. Purcell feels that the prenatal classes will benefit expectant parents because they will give information and guidance to a woman who is expecting a baby.

KSP ACTIVITY REPORT

During the month of October, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

1,043 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations). 52 were D.U.I.'s; 498 persons were given tourist information, etc. A total of 192 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 141 were property damage only accidents; 49 were personal injury accidents; there were 2 fatal accidents; 92 persons were injured and 2 persons were killed.

202 Criminal investigations were made resulting in 92 criminal arrests; 705 persons attended 22 safety programs conducted by the KSP.

During the month of October the Kentucky State Police at London reports the following activity for Rockcastle County:

97 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations). 1 were D.U.I.'s; 31 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 28 motorists were assisted with breakdowns given tourist information, etc. A total of 25 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 19 were property damage only accidents; 4 were personal injury accidents; there were two fatal accidents; eight persons were injured and two persons were killed.

Twenty-three criminal investigations were made resulting in four criminal arrests.

Cooking the Holiday Turkey
Thawing a Frozen Turkey
To thaw, leave turkey in the original plastic wrap and use one of the following methods:

1. Place on tray in the refrigerator for 3 to 4 days (about 24 hours for each 5 pounds of turkey).
2. For a faster method, cover with cold water and change the water frequently. Refrigerate and then cook turkey as soon as possible after thawing.

To Prepare For Roasting
Remove plastic wrap, and then remove giblets and neck from the body and neck cavities. Rinse the turkey inside and out with cool water, and pat dry with a clean cloth or paper towel. If the turkey is not to be stuffed, rub cavity of turkey lightly with salt (optional). If stuffing is used, stuff just before roasting or cook the dressing in a separate dish just before serving. Tuck drumsticks under band of skin at tail or tie together. Fold wings across back of turkey. Skewer neck skin with round toothpick or poultry pin.

Farm Bureau members honor restraining order at called meeting Friday night

The membership of the local Farm Bureau Association was somewhat surprised, to phrase it mildly, when they were served with a restraining order as congregated Friday night for the purpose of changing the by-laws of the corporation and electing directors.

The injunction, restraining the membership from holding the meeting for the intended purposes was honored, according to Steve Conley, attorney for the group.

However, Conley said, over one hundred persons signed a proxy statement appointing certain other members to cast whatever votes they might have at the state Farm Bureau meeting to be held in Louisville December 7 and 8. It was, he said, an attempt by those congregated up to send their feelings to the state body.

The injunction was issued, according to William "Bill" Hasty, president on the basis of the failure of those calling the meeting to notify each regular Farm Bureau members individually of the called meeting.

Deputy Sheriff Clarence Hasty delivered the injunction to Frankie Bullock at 7 p.m.; however, the injunction had been signed by Special Judge Don A. Ward of Barbourville, at 2 p.m. Friday. Ward is temporarily serving as circuit judge, a position left vacant when Phillip Wicker resigned a few weeks ago.

The dispute within the leadership and membership of the local Farm Bureau Association arose as a re-

sult of the agency's annual dinner meeting at which members allegedly were not allowed to vote for directors and at which allegedly no annual financial report was read.

Following this meeting, disgruntled members went through legal channels

whereby a body of petitioners called the Friday night, November 19 meeting.

The next step, according to Bullens, is to try to hold an election of directors, something, he said, they have not, as yet, been able to accomplish.

The Local Development Corporation seeks grant from the Kentucky Heritage Council

The Mt. Vernon Downtown Development Corporation has applied to the Kentucky Heritage Council for \$3,650 in the form of a 50% matching grant to be used in connection with the current three year downtown revitalization project.

According to the grant application, the emphasis of the project is on preserving the historic character of the downtown.

In keeping with that theme, the project, if funded, will be used by the city as an example of what can and will be accomplished downtown.

Rehabilitation will consist primarily of store front renovation including painting, window repair and general improvements to the structural facades.

Participating property owners will be required to invest their financial commitment first with the Heritage Council grant funds being used to complete the project, limited to 50:50 matching.

Two property owners thus far have tentatively agreed to be second parties to the grant request from the council.

Local group is awarded Arts grant

Members of the Rockcastle Association of Gifted Education (RAGE) learned Monday that the Kentucky Council for the Arts has approved a \$1,000 grant to be used to establish a community theatre.

The money from the council is a matching grant which must be equalled 50/50 with local RAGE funds.

Leaders of the thirty member RAGE group said Monday night that a sum-

mer production and Christmas 1983 production are planned.

The summer activity will be a children's theatre.

Anyone with experience or interest in working with children and/or the theatre is encouraged to apply for the position of director of the summer program. Applications can be picked up at the Mt. Vernon Signal office Monday through Friday.

Reflections:

World War I Veteran lives at Brodhead

At the beginning of World War I, Bill Allen made three unnecessary attempts to join the war effort. He made trips to Lexington to enlist in the Navy and the Marines, to be turned away. He weighed only 90 pounds, he said.

Allen finally entered the army as a draftee, but the War was over just as his company broke camp at Fort Sill, a final training center in Oklahoma. Allen had received training to be an artillery gunner.

He said they had already burned their straw bedding, stacked their beds and he had mailed his feather pillow home when word came that the War was at an end.

"They held us from hour to hour after that and there we were with nowhere to sleep," Allen said recently as he sat in his home in Brodhead, recalling his army days.

"After the War, I organized and was commander of Company I, 149th Infantry from Lincoln County, a National Guard Unit," he said.

Each county that sent a company of volunteers was entitled to a unit.

"For four years, we went to summer camp with 100% attendance."

It is at this point that

Allen punctuates his reminiscing, as he often does, with a humorous story or, at least one worth retelling.

It seems that one year as the unit prepared to go to camp, word came that one member would not be going. With thirty minutes before train time, Allen rushed out and asked his elderly uncle, Billy Shoemaker to go along as cook (and make the 100%).

"Uncle Billy was as excited as a little boy. His immediate response was, 'Well, yeah, but I'll have to wash my feet first.'"

A quick search could not turn up a wash pan, but-not to worry-Uncle Billy grabbed the water bucket, washed his feet in it and met the train with time to spare.

During World War II, Allen worked for four years and six months in internal security. He said he went wherever "they" sent him and not even his commander at the Blue Grass Army Depot knew that he was anything other than just a worker.

Millard F. Allen, whose mother was a Shoemaker of the same family as the famous jockey, Willie Shoemaker, and Anna Louise Juffer, the daughter of Swiss emigrants were married in Lincoln County and moved to Rockcastle County in the mid 1920's.

His older brother, Allen laughingly recalls, told him that if he married her (Anna), he would have to eat leftovers, for the rest of his life, implying that his German girl would never rake anything out. Although born in Kentucky, Anna Allen still has a faint accent.

Allen says the smartest thing he ever did was marrying a German woman to take care of him.

After sixty years of marriage, the Allens have a very unique and close relationship which is obvious even to the brief observer. Anna says she has tried her best to take care of Millard, but in the last two years, she thinks she must not have done a very good job. She refers to two "close calls" Allen has had within the last two years.

In the summer of 1981, Allen who is hard of hearing, was struck by an L&N freight train. His car was knocked 48 feet across a fence and into a field. Allen was not seriously injured. Six months later, he was working up under his truck when it fell on his shoulder, pulled his arm out of the socket and re-broke three ribs which had been broken earlier in the train accident.

His wife says the truck struck him only inches from his neck.

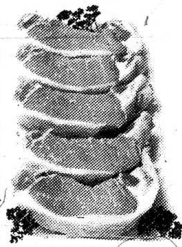

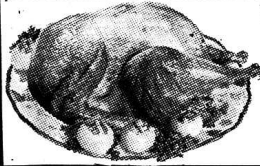

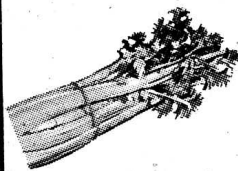

She later continued language study in France.

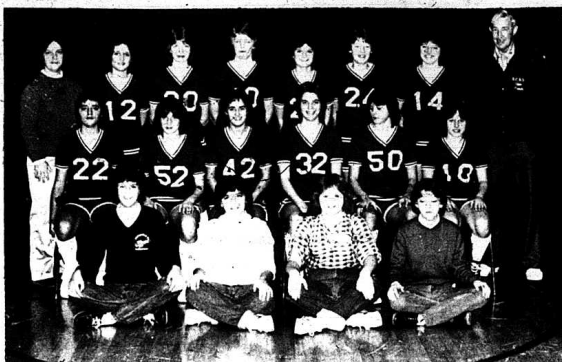

"ALLEN"

 From the time he was six years old, Allen has felt strongly that he has lived under divine protection. Anna Allen believes there are guardian angels.
 Anna tells of his miraculous life-saving feat on Falcon Lake in Texas during the years after retirement when the couple traveled, camped and fished in the warmer states during the winters.
 A man in a boat, let a wave catch him crossways on the lake as hurricane-like winds came up quickly at the campsite. The wind picked the man and boat up, flipped the boat over, trapping the man underneath. Anna Allen said her husband took the 14' boat and went out and rescued the man while those on shore who had larger boats tried to hold him back, saying there would be two drowned men if he went out.
 Allen said some of the camps later asked him why he would risk his own life to save someone—he didn't know, Allen said he could never stand by and watch someone drown and not make an effort to save him.
 But then, Allen has always been a gambler, so he says. Mostly he has gambled in merchandise though. He made "big buys" at the "right time" and always came out ahead.
 For instance, when the Sears Roebuck dress manufacturing plant in Lexington burned, he "bought everything while they were still pouring water on it." There was a million yards of dress goods which took two clerks three years to measure and sell. They sold the \$2 a yard material for 20 and 30 cents at their Economy-Cash Store in Brodhead, which they ran together for 40 years.
 Anna says she went to the Fair later and three-fourths of the women there had dresses out of their material.
 Once, Allen paid \$50,000 for a loaded barge sunk 40 feet at the bottom of the muddy Ohio. The barge was loaded with barb wire valued at \$300,000. He had to pay cash within 6 days of the purchase. Beinap Hardware Company in Louisville loaned him \$45,000 and wanted to be his partner in the deal.
 His buying and selling did not always go smoothly, however.
 After World War II, he bought a boat loaded with artificial flowers, made in Japan. The boat had been caught in a typhoon and the boxes were wet, but the celluloid flowers were not damaged. He stored them in the old Fort Knox laundry building in Louisville. The first sale he made was for \$10,000 to a Louisville florist two weeks before Christmas. The florist piled the flowers on a register to dry. The flammable celluloid flowers got too hot and exploded, burning the building and almost killing the florist. Allen said the Chief of Police in Louisville gave him 24 hours to get the flowers out of the city.
 "I brought two trailer loads home and sold some there in Louisville. It took two or three years to sell them, but they sold."
 When a millinery wholesale house in Louisville went bankrupt as a result of laws prohibiting the use of rare birds in hats, Allen bought out the entire stock. But, he says, he never sold any of the birds-of-paradise or other exotic birds acquired in the sale. Doing so meant from 1 to 3 years in prison.
 Anna Allen said it often used to be said that Millard would buy anything. He often bought at insurance sales and unclaimed freight sales. He once bought a carnival tent and a petrified man in a casket. After it was shown some locally and verified by Dr. McWilliams as being authentic, Allen sold it to some carver people at the Fair.
 Though he has farmed some, Allen says he never made any money at it. He bought and sold land, however, and recalls once when he sold too soon.
 "In 1932, a man in Lexington had 400 acres of coal land in Wolfe County that he wanted to sell me. I happened to have the

\$2,500 he was asking for it. Five years later, I sold the timber off for \$18,000. Five years ago, I sold the property for \$50,000 and thought I had made money. Two years later the same property sold for \$325,000." He says he and his family still own considerable coal land in Wolfe County and he doesn't even want to talk about selling it.
 Of all the unique qualities of the Allens of Brodhead, perhaps one of the most unusual circumstances

is that of Mr. Allen's schooling: At the age of 18, Allen was a charter member of the Kentucky Bar Association. Later, in 1931-32, he returned to the University of Louisville for a "refresher course," but he never practiced law—never took a case.
 He said with a twinkle in his eye, the reason was he didn't want to steal for

a percentage. "If I was going to steal, I wanted it all."
 At this point, his wife, who obviously didn't think the joke was so funny, nudged him and told him he was getting off the subject.
 The Allens had three children: John Phillip Allen, the eldest, a local lawyer who died in 1978;
