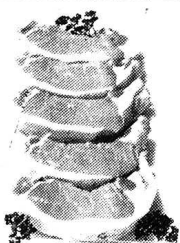

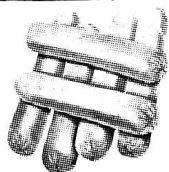

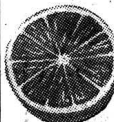

John Mandt, Somerset attorney, named to fill position vacated by Wicker

Governor John Y. Brown announced Tuesday the appointment of John T. Mandt of Somerset to serve out the unexpired term of former Circuit Judge Philip K. Wicker. Wicker resigned October 12, fourteen months before his term was up.

Mandt, 49, was born in Williamsburg, West Virginia and attended Kentucky Military Institute, the University of Kentucky and the UK School of Law.

He has practiced law in Somerset for the past several years and presently serves as city attorney.

According to the Circuit Judge's office in Somerset, Mandt has been active in civic affairs in Somerset and Pulaski County, having served as president of the Somerset Jaycees, the Pulaski County Industrial Foundation and the Somerset-Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce in recent years.

Mandt attends the St. Mildred's Catholic Church.

A date has not been set for the swearing in ceremony. Mandt will be sworn in by Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Stephens.

Don A. Ward, a lawyer and former judge from Bourbonville has served as interim Circuit Judge, presiding over the November term of court in Rockcastle County.

Facts and features of our local library

Though some of the youngsters in the community may think the present library has always been there, some of us remember when there was only a Bookmobile, and before that, when there was neither a bookmobile nor a library.

In the beginning, there was Joyce Henderson who was, according to all who remember, a moving force in getting the library started. Henderson received help from other community leaders including Johnny Allen, Clyde Linville, Nancy Williams and others.

The first Bookmobile was bought with funds from the Berea Rubber Plant. The first driver was Edna Grace McKenzie.

There were no books to fill the mobile unit, so donations were sought and present librarian Aleyne Davis said, "We took anything we were given. Once someone in Indiana donated a car load of books."

John Lair helped a lot with the project. He solicited books over radio station WRVK.

The first library was in the back room of the fire station, recalls Mrs. Davis who has been librarian since it began in 1954.

The books soon filled the Bookmobile and the

cramped library room and the facility was moved to the basement of the Rockcastle Hotel where Rainbow Exercise House is presently located.

In 1965, a 5 cents library tax was approved by 98% of the voters in Rockcastle County and the library was then eligible to receive state support.

In 1974, County Judge Charles Carter had the present library built.

The library currently receives state aid money, thirty new non-fiction books per month, a book grant plus a new Bookmobile when the old one needs replacing. All of this comes from the Kentucky Department of Libraries.

Mrs. Geraldine Robbins, current Bookmobile driver, visits each home in the county, which wants the service, once a month. The

Bookmobile circulation, Mrs. Davis says, is from 2500 to 3000 a month.

There are about 28,000 books at the library with a yearly circulation rate of about 81,000, including the Bookmobile.

Any printed book not available at the library can be ordered from Frankfort. Mrs. Davis says if Frankfort doesn't have it, they will go out of the state to get it for you. "The other day we got a book from New Mexico."

There are also records, pictures, magazines and projectors to loan. Mrs. Davis points out that there is a genealogy section and a microfilm reader. Past Mt. Vernon Signals and some census reports are on microfilm.

Neither the truck nor the items taken in the break-in have been recovered.

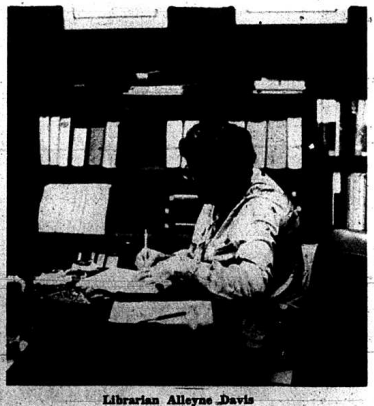

Unless we can get someone that will prosecute people who break the laws, we don't need anyone at all and certainly not the one we have now.

EDITORIAL

Here we are again at that time of year children look forward to with such enthusiasm.

Adults, however, anticipate the Christmas season with a mixture of dread, warm recollections of Christmases past, fear, fatigue, confusion, financial shortfall and a stimulant appetite.

With local merchants "Shop Mt. Vernon First" seasonal slogan in mind, let's analyze the Christmas season dilemma.

Most people dread the shopping (which brings on the fatigue, confusion, financial shortfall, a stimulated appetite, dread of bills and only an occasional youthful flashback).

What? Shoppers have just 15 minutes to buy genuine simulated pearls in the jewelry department for only \$4.00. Would your sister like pearls better than a sweater? Maybe so. But wait. There seems to be a stampede at the jewelry counter. People are pushing and shoving. Heading for the sweaters with more resolve, you find no blue sweater in your sister's size, with the exception of some see-thru styles which would not keep her very warm.

Oh, well, the popcorn was good. You can munch on Mounds bars on the way home.

The budget may stretch farther for shopping locally. Expenses incurred in an out-of-town shopping trip must be included in an estimation of savings. An out-of-town trip incurs \$10 or \$15 for gas, \$10 for a babysitter (if one has small children) and the money for at least one meal. Of course, there is the trip back to you buy the wrong size or color.

During the Christmas season, local merchants purchase special gift merchandise which has not been on the shelf all year. If you do not visit the local stores before going elsewhere you may not know that what you traveled miles to get was right at home.

Before trudging off to a surrounding shopping area, call local stores to check for items you plan to purchase.

State legislature

The 1982 session of the Kentucky General Assembly passed legislation giving the Executive Branch authority to use approximately \$31 million of Kentucky tax dollars as incentive pay increases for state employees.

This past June, a new program of reclassification was created that apparently has placed all the incentive funds in the hands of 24 percent of Kentucky employees.

Also, job performance was not used to any great degree. Career employees with substantial seniority were unduly hurt and new employees were the prime beneficiaries of this social job performance incentive raise.

This action, by the Brown administration has

been so disouted and surrounded by rumor that over 7,000 state employees filed appeals, to the state personnel board, following the most recent job status upheaval.

As a result of this controversy, I requested the Committee for Program Review and Investigations to study this program.

In turn, the committee voted to conduct a full review of the controversial reclassification of state employees' job and pay grade scales.

Also, the review will include the Work Planning and Performance Review system.

The review will also be in conjunction with a similar investigation being conducted by a subcommittee of the full State Government committee.

The committee's investigation will focus on four primary areas, and they are as follows:

- (1) Reasons for a total job reclassification;
- (2) Criteria used for job reclassification;
- (3) Breakdown in 5-year groups—the percent who received a raise;
- (4) Breakdown more specifically the percentage who received raises who have been employees for 1 year, 2 years and 3 years.

Preliminary results of the committee's review should be forthcoming the first of next year.

Stay On Your Diet Through the Holidays

Egg nog, cookies, candy, hors d'oeuvres, drinks and rich desserts are traditions of the holiday season and a great temptation to even the most sincere dieter.

The trouble is that after indulging in holiday foods, you'll probably really be disgusted with yourself the next day.

Especially around the holidays, many dieters are

haunted by eating binge-compulsive or unscheduled eating. These are hard to deal with, but they are by no means uncontrollable. Think about the situations where you might go off your diet and you'll be one step closer to establishing control.

For example, if you know that one bite of something sweet triggers an eating binge you can plan to resist that first bite. One of the best things to do when you feel an eating binge coming on is to move away from the food. It may be fairly easy to keep food out of sight or to move to another room in your home but they may be harder to do at a party or other gathering.

In the social situation where you'd like to taste but not gorge, many dieters have found it helps to visualize the setting before they even step in the door. First, decide how many calories you'll allow yourself. Then act out in your mind how you can stick to that limit.

Picture yourself getting your appetizer plate or napkin in one trip to the serving table-and that's it for the evening. Think about how you'll make the lowest calorie choices possible at the hors d'oeuvres table and say "no thanks" to the calorie-laden treats. Then pace yourself so that one drink and two hors d'oeuvres or whatever you've decided last the whole evening.

See yourself eating slowly and enjoying the food. Make visiting with the other people present primary in your mind-not the food.

To try to have a little something on your plate and in your glass or cup all through the evening. This can be a good defense against the "food pusher" who tries to make you "give-in" "just this once."

Another way to cope with the food pusher is to compliment the host or hostess and add that you've simply had enough. Or a simple but firm, "No, thank you" may work.

Going through this fantasy and trying to second guess the situations you're likely to be up against gives you a chance to develop a plan for coping.

Also, it can raise your confidence, stick to your own wishes.

Finally, do you give up and keep eating through the holiday? If you stray from your plan, the best advice for treating yourself here is to forgive and forget then continue on your dieting course.

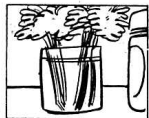

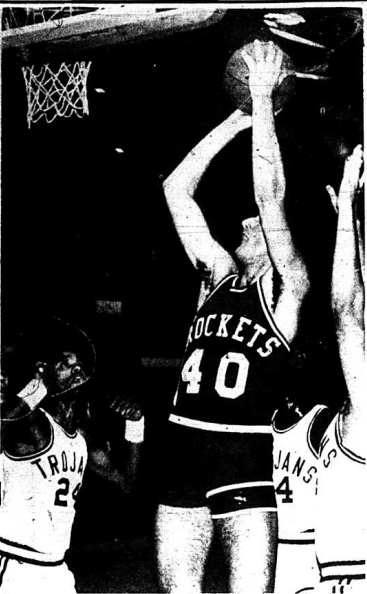

"I intend to explore all legal avenue to make certain that Kentucky farmers get fair treatment in the marketplace," Barkley said.

Barkley's statement followed a decision by a federal judge to allow Virginia producers to do just that.

A ruling by U.S. District Court Judge Glen Williams said that Virginia farmers could continue to receive the supports until December 2.

Farmers had argued that the USDA decision came too close before the market opened, especially since they had been led to believe that USDA would decide to accept sheeted burley.

Barkley said that this ruling, which does not apply to Kentucky, will cause confusion in the total market area. Representatives from the industry in Kentucky, as well as Tennessee were in attendance at the hearing, Barkley said.

Barkley said that he had earlier encouraged USDA to permit price supports for sheeted burley because he felt all marketing methods should be treated the same.

Human Resources and State Police combine efforts to get drunk drivers off roads

Officials from the Cabinet for Human Resources and the Kentucky State Police November 23 announced the beginning of a new statewide drunk driver education program called Action RAPID.

Action RAPID, an acronym which stands for Action Report a Problem-Intoxicated Driver, is a combined effort of the state police and Human Resources. Human Resources provided funding and the state police are implementing the program.

The foundation of Action RAPID is public involvement. Kentuckians are being asked to help get drunk drivers off the road by calling the Kentucky State Police hotline (1-800-222-5555) whenever they spot an intoxicated driver.

The announcement concerning the new drunk driver detection program was made during a press conference held by Human Resources Secretary Buddy Adams and State Adjutant General Billy Wellman in Frankfort. Wellman is the state police commissioner and the Justice Cabinet secretary.

Secretary Adams said \$19,440 has been allocated for Action RAPID. The money comes from federal funds obtained by the alcohol and substance abuse section of the Human Resources Cabinet.

This effort to get intoxicated drivers off the road is part of a larger Human Resources effort aimed at alleviating the alcoholism problem in Kentucky, said

Adams. Wellman said the money will be used by the state police to pay for increased use of the Kentucky State Police hotline and to fund a public awareness campaign.

The public awareness campaign will focus attention on the drunk driving problem and encourage people to report sightings of drunk drivers, said Wellman.

"Drunk driving is now a victimless crime," said Wellman. Drunk driving accidents cost Kentuckians an estimated \$29 million per year in medical costs, he said.

Drunk driving also costs thousands of lives every year, said Wellman. The state police commissioner said accident reports filed by police officers at the scene indicate drunk driving is a factor in at least one out of every four fatal accidents in Kentucky.

Wellman said the national average quoted by the National Safety Council is even higher. The council estimates that one in every two fatal accidents involves drinking and driving.

Wellman described the reporting procedure being

promoted under Action RAPID.

People are being asked to report drunk drivers by calling the state police hotline 1-800-222-5555. The call is free and the caller will not have to give his or her name.

The call will be answered by a dispatcher at the central office in Frankfort, then quickly switched to the state police post nearest the caller.

At that point, the caller will be asked where he spotted the drunk driver and which way the vehicle was headed. He will also be asked to supply the vehicle license number and a vehicle description.

After the report is received, a trooper will be dispatched to investigate the complaint.

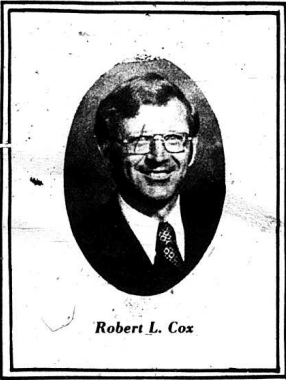

Hospital Focus

Medical Records: The Paperwork Pays Off

Almost all of the paperwork that has to be done at the Rockcastle County Hospital eventually finds its way to the medical records department. There the records are kept permanently and confidentially.

Debra Martin, director of Medical records, explained what the department does. "We keep everybody's medical records together. We have records from 1956 when the hospital opened." They take care of the files for patients in any area of the hospital—the acute wing, the Skilled Nursing Facility, and the emergency room.

The volume of paperwork increases and accumulates, which may necessitate the use of microfilm in the near future.

Keeping records for the entire hospital involves a variety of jobs. The first thing every day, all patient information is logged in the inpatient and outpatient registers. The department handles admission forms that come from the admitting clerks, and they keep each patient's card in a box which contains the daily inpatient record.

They are also responsible for checking the inpatient charts to see if they are complete. "In order to check the records we have to go through every page of it piece by piece," said Mrs. Martin. "If we find one incomplete we will fill out a deficiency slip and then send it back to the nurse or the doctor."

"We also check to make sure everybody's lab

work is in it so that when they come back at a later time the doctor will be able to go back to that chart and see exactly what was going with them and what happened to them."

The department is responsible for the hospital's disease index, which codes each chart for a certain disease. "We can check back to see how many patients were admitted with each disease," said Mrs. Martin. The index is separate from the regular files and is for study purposes.

The medical records department also has to keep statistics to show how many patients were admitted at a certain time, etc. The statistics are used for studies and are updated daily, followed by monthly summaries.

The department aids the local doctors' offices by informing them of outpatient lab results that have been done at the hospital.

The doctors on the medical staff use a dictaphone to dictate information about a patient's physical condition, history, and other pertinent facts. Someone in the medical records department will listen to the dictation, type it up and see that it goes on the patient's chart.

Once-a-month committee meetings are held and Mrs. Martin said, "We make sure the forms we're documenting on are still current, and we work with the doctors to make sure that patients are getting the best type of care. They also discuss any problems that have come up during the month. A registered record administrator visits the hospital periodically to evaluate the department and see that it is running smoothly."

Mrs. Martin said that she definitely enjoys her job, although it is hectic at times. "You're not really involved directly with the patients, but even though we don't see them we feel like we know them."

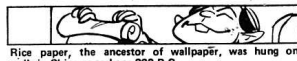

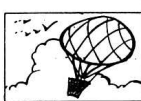

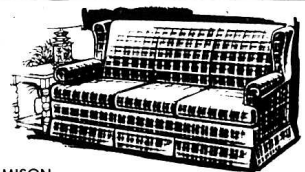

THEY TURN CLEAR CREEK!
The farmers roundabout don't mind these cold rainy days in November for it means they can bulk down the gold turned brown leaves of tobacco hanging in the barn. Their "pay day" for the summer's work is now in sight. Some have even finished stripping the leaves from the stalk and have put it on the market ready for sale. Charlie Lamb of upper Clear Creek is one who has done that and is "ahead of the hounds" with his crop from the Payne heirs farm. That means the family will be awful nice to him near the holidays.

Up Hammonds Fork Road I could not find a lot of folk at home as I knocked on doors, scattered dogs and scattered chickens out of my way in visiting one day. But I did find Eva Mullins on the log bridge crossing clear, swift-running Clear Creek while she was watching some children drop a hook in the stream. Her visitors were Stephen and Diane Mullins and children from Lexington. He is a son of Fred Mullins, whose parents were Willie and Eliza Mullif, of upper Clear Creek. I see that the little boys were excited at catching their first fish, the fourth generation of Mullins who had settled here long ago, and wondered if they would ever know of their heritage in these hills, of the strong people who had built it with courage.

Eva says she is enjoying her TV these days for with a flick of her wrist she can bring the world into her living room without ever having to leave this hollow. She was ill in the early spring and watching TV has helped her pass the time.

"Come in and see what he has made," said Charles Northern, in speaking of his son, Charles Edward, who is studying mechanics at the Vocational School in Mt. Vernon. "He made this stove that we use to heat by and he has another one for sale." It was an exceptional looking piece of work and Charles was very proud as he showed it to me. Randy, the other son,

attending his last year of high school also is taking welding as part of his class work. These boys of the hills know that they can't depend on the land for a living and they're ready when it knocks on their door.

Charley and Sarah King, along with Nina Beatty, were just sitting down to supper as I stopped in the late evening hours. Charley said he was looking forward to selling his tobacco crop. Their son, Lloyd King of Miamisburg, Ohio was expected to visit them soon, probably to see what his chance would be to "get his name in the ring" for Thanksgiving Dinner.

It was after the Civil War that a man named John W. Dees came into the headwaters of Clear Creek and planted the roots for the Dees Family who now people the region of the upper valley. One of his descendants, Tommy, went along with his father, who was noted for buying his coffee in large bulk amounts. They would drive a horse, pulling a sled, down to the Payne's store and bring back a 25 pound bag of coffee beans which was then ground on a coffee mill and strong, black coffee made by boiling the grounds.

Tommy had a talent for making music playing a handmade banjo and many a neighbor would drop in to hear him. One of Tommy's descendants is Jimmy Lee Dees, where I visited him and Fabra, his wife.

Jimmy had married Fabra Young when she was 14 years of age and raised four children. They lived in Ohio for some time in order to make a living in the industrial world but Fabra says, "I got tired of living up there, just took a notion to bring my kids back to the hills where our roots were, best place in the world to raise kids."

I looked around and agreed with her. Trees to climb, a creek to play and fish in, cliffs to explore and they hadn't lost anything for the school bus goes by their door. The mail is delivered to their box at the road, the Bookman goes by their door, and church, which they attend, was just down in the blacktopped road. Water from the hills is brought into the house. Like a lot

of other people here, they are gradually adding on rooms.

Jimmy is 65 and Fabra claims 54 but in spite of hard work they have a youthful spirit about them. Some time ago and Fabra says work to do for other people. Their children have settled near them, one in a trailer and others built or are building nearby.

"We help each other," Fabra remarked about her children and that has always been the mark of the hill people, to share in a family which brings to mind that "blood is thicker than water." Fabra has been raking leaves when I got there but she sat down and talked of the plans and hopes she had for the future. With Jimmy's disability, she has to get forward and lead her family which she seems to have the courage and determination to do so.

Coming back to the road, I talked with Wanda Dees Isaacs who lived nearby in a trailer with husband, Carl. She was the daughter of Jimmy and Fabra. Carl does carpenter work when he can. Fourteen year old Jeff got out the school bus. He is a 9th grader whose hobby is motorcycling. There had to be an eight year old daughter also (whose name I didn't get). Wanda says her recreation is walking, up roads and hills, and she has a body to prove it, exercise can do that and walking is supposed to be the best.

Farm News Brief

Good News-Good Prices Drop 3rd Consecutive Month

In a bit of good news for Thanksgiving, weekly grocery shoppers, Kentucky Farm Bureau's November marketbasket survey has documented a decline in retail food prices in Kentucky for the third consecutive month.

The decline measured 1.5 percent since October, according to survey coordinator Ruth Ruggles. The 40-item marketbasket now costs \$57.80, compared to \$58.69 last month.

The three month drop-off has brought retail food tabs in the state's super markets down 4.3 percent since August, Ruggles noted. The current level is virtually unchanged (less one cent) from the price average of November 1981, and just 3 of 1 percent higher than November two years ago.

Three of the four major food groupings showed price declines in the November survey. Ruggles noted, causing price-gaining items to be outnumbered by decliners better than two-to-one. Ten of the thirteen cuts of meat, including beef, pork and poultry, were down an average percentage during the month. Four of seven dairy products dropped, bringing the group average 1.3 percent lower, and five of six grain-based foods dropped 2.4 percent.

Fresh fruits and vegetables proved to be the exception, as seasonal factors pushed them up 1.5 percent even though Idaho potatoes registered their fifth consecutive monthly decline. A 10-pound bag of potatoes now sells at \$1.79 average, down 56 cents, or more than 20 percent, since July.

A number of food items have shown unusual price improvement during the first 11 months of 1982, Ruggles pointed out. iceberg lettuce, plagued early in the year by crop damage in California, has dropped from \$1.07 to 56 cents a head since January. Similarly, flour in a five-pound bag is currently priced at \$1.00, down from \$1.16 eleven months ago. Large eggs are 13 cents a dozen lower and American cheese is down 14 cents a package.

Pork cuts, reflecting improvement in market hog prices, generally moved in the opposite direction, up during the period. Bacon, for instance, registered one of the largest gains among the

marketbasket's 40 items, showing an average gain of 42 cents a pound.

Hopkinsville, the lowest local marketbasket average during November while a newcomer to the survey, checked in with the high figure. Overall, volunteers price checkers affiliated with Kentucky Farm Bureau Women canvassed food markets in 26 Kentucky communities.

Those local averages are: Hopkinsville, 49.33; Morehead, 50.42; Greensburg, 53.20; Scottsville, 53.68; Salyersville, 54.37; Shelbyville, 55.79; Wilmore, 55.80; Tompkinsville, 55.85; Glasgow, 56.32; Elizabethtown, 57.26; Lone Oak, 58.30; Frankfort, 58.32; Cynthia, 58.36; London, 58.41; Brandenburg, 58.44; Louisville, 59.02; Greenup, 59.53; Seebree, 59.77; Lexington, 60.10; Henderson, 60.23; Owensboro, 60.79; Jackson, 61.13; Stanford, 61.36; Georgetown,

61.80; Madisonville, 62.86; and Nicholasville, 64.08.

While shoppers were the beneficiaries of the latest round of food price cuts, farmers were the victims. All major Kentucky farm products showed price drops during the most recent reporting period, according to the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Grain prices were pushed well under break-even levels as a huge harvest built already bulging stockpiles into market-breaking surpluses. Live-stock prices also moved lower, but remained above year-earlier benchmarks.

Tobacco and milk were the exceptions to the trend, but even the burley markets opened at bid levels that were disappointing to producers.

The Liberty Bell cracked in 1825 while tolling the death of Chief Justice John Marshall.

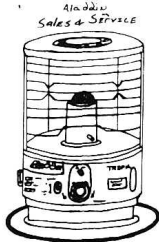

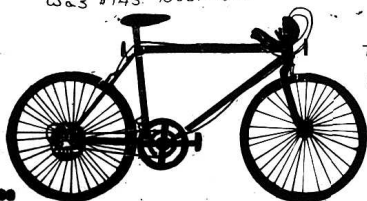
