Home Energy Assistance Program to help area residents with fuel costs this season

As many as 250,000 Kentucky households may be eligible to apply for benefits from the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), according to a recent statement byte.

But being eligible does insure help from the department, however, since funds are available to help only about 105,000 of those needy households.

To help meet the need, the Cabinet for Human Resources has announced a "Project Warmup" as part of HEAP this year.

A maximum of \$22 million will come to Kentucky for HEAP.

ment for social insurance at the junction of U.S. 150 and 25.

All other low income families which face crises in paying utility bills may apply beginning January 17, 1983 at the same office.

To assist those who are eligible but do not receive HEAP benefits, a total of \$1.6 million will be available — "olecal governments and agencies through "Proceed will be a supported warmy." Allocations will be a supported with the process of the p

Funds are available to local governments for two programs, the County Shelter Program and the County Intervention Program.

The cabinet for Human Resources has sent letters to all county judges inviting them to apply for funds to operate these two programs.

The County Shelter Program offers temporary shelter to persons without adequate heat in their homes.

The County Intervention Program provides blankets, space heaters and some fuel to households without suf-ficient heat:

The library currently receives state aid money, thirty new non-fiction books per month, a book grant plus a new Bookmobile when the old one needs replacing. All of this comes from the Kentucky Department of Libraries.

Mrs. Geraldine Robbins, current Bookmobile driver, visits each home in the county, which wants the service, once a month. The

Bookmobile circulation, Mrs. Davis says, is from 2500 to 3000 a month.

There are about 28,000 books at the library with a yearly circulation rate of about 81,000, including the Bookmobile.

Any printed book not available at the library can be ordered from Frankfort. Mrs. Davis says if Frankfort doesn't have it, they will go out of the state to get it for you. "The other day we got a book from New Mexico".

There are also records, pictures, magazines and projectors to loan, Mr. Davis points out that there is a genealogy section and a microfilm reader. Past Mt. Vernom Signals and some census reports are on microfilm.


