## What Do You Need Most?

Let me ask you-what do YOU need most in this world? Off the cuff, you might say a new car, a better job, a vacation or a lot of money. While all of these things you might want or desire, they are not what you need most! Your greatest need is the same as my greatest need. You need forgiveness, and you can be free from guilt, so that you can have inner peace, the assurance of a right relationship with God, and the hope of eternal life.

This greatest of all needs can be found only in Jesus Christ, and in the "great salvation" which He offers freely to all who will trust and obey. He is God's greatest gift, and apart from Him there is no real hope (John 12:48). And, whether you prefer to think about it or not, that "last day" is fast approaching. The hour is late, and time is rapidly running out.

There are multitudes who have never accepted Christ in obedient faith. His will to become a New Testament Christian, a member of the Lord's church, you need to be "born of water and of the Spirit" (John 3:5) so that you can have the cleansing power of the blood of Christ in your life. It happens by neglect, by failing to study God's word daily, failing to pray, failing to worship, failing to put God's kingdom and His righteousness first (Matt. 6:33), and failing to grow spiritually. If you don't, there is real danger that you will drift beyond the point of "no return" and be lost eternally (2 Peter 2:20-22). That you need most is to return to the Lord.

If you will open your heart's door, and let Him come in, you can know that wonderful love of God, the transforming power of the gospel, and the blessed hope of eternal life. Don't agree that your greatest need is salvation through Christ? We pray that you will return, "Come unto me, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28-29). 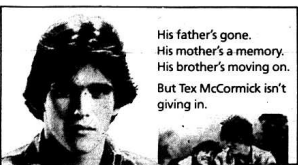

## Tobacco farmers reportedly reasonably happy with prices

Local tobacco farmers are reasonably happy with the prices their crop is bringing so far this selling season, according to Wayne Stewart, local farm supply merchant.

"This is the first year, however, buyers are paying significantly less for lower and mixed grades," Stewart said. "The good grades, properly graded tobacco is bringing a good price."

Harold Ballinger, local ASCS officer, says he has encountered a few farmers who are disappointed, "but overall they are pretty happy." Although the best grades are bringing \$1.91 and \$1.92, wet and muddy tobacco is not being bought. Single grade tobacco has been selling at between \$1.80 and \$1.85 and some low grade for as low as \$1.54 to \$1.55.

Farmers are bringing a lot of wet tobacco home to dry before returning it to the market. Ballinger said there is more than the usual amount of wet and dirty tobacco this year due to the extremely rainy season. Most tobacco is baled this year. Ballinger guesses not more than 1% of the tobacco grown in Rockcastle this year was hand-tied.

Even though farmers are not making much money considering the time and investment, Ballinger says they are not grumbling too much.

Maloney Enterprises, Inc. closed out its Mt. Vernon location on U.S. 25 South with very little fanfare during the Thanksgiving week.

The closing was reportedly a shock to employees who did not know the store was being closed until a Maloney's truck came to pick up the merchandise.

A spokesman for the company said Monday that they had moved the Mt. Vernon Store at the location in order to keep the name here while they looked for a larger tract of land and a larger building; however, he said no deal

## Interstate accident claims life

A Pulaski County man died of multiple injuries as a result of an auto accident early Thursday morning on I-75, ten miles north of Mt. Vernon.

Pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Rockcastle County coroner Bill Dowell was Herbert Dozier, 56, of Bronston, Ky., driver of a 1978 Buick. Receiving class 4 injuries was Eugene Trester, 37, of Aurora. Illinois, driver of the other vehicle, a tractor trailer truck. Trester told Greg Ennis,

state police who investigated, that he saw the Dozier vehicle traveling in the passing lane at a slow rate of speed as both drivers were northbound. Trester said he remained in the right lane and as the front of his truck became even with the rear of the Dozier car, Dozier suddenly changed lanes into the front of the truck.

Trester struck the Dozier vehicle in the rear and both vehicles traveled down the emergency lane and down the guide rail going back across the roadway and into the median. The sudden friction of the mud caused the Dozier vehicle to stop and the truck turned over onto its side on top of the Dozier vehicle.

Officers said it took nearly four hours for rescue workers to remove the car from beneath the truck.

## Main Street Mishap

A strange twist of fate caused a freak accident on Main Street last Friday afternoon that did damage to four vehicles and demolished a parking meter, but luckily, left no one injured.

## Board approves five new school buses and sidewalk

The school board authorized the purchase of five 1983 school buses valued at over \$108,000 at its regular meeting Tuesday night. Funds for school buses are provided by the state.

The board also agreed to build a sidewalk along school property on the old R... Road to the High School. The city is bearing the expense of sidewalk construction up to where school property begins.

Improvements on the local school administration building, to include painting rooms, patching plaster, painting and caulking windows upstairs and installing storm windows on the second floor, were approved. A total of 18 bids were submitted for the tobacco case owned by the school system. The best bid, was \$1,154 per pound of the crop. The bid was submitted by Bernice Beasley. The low bid was 75 cents.

Pennington-Maupin Insurance Agency of Richmond had the lowest bid for Workers Compensation Insurance. The bid was \$10.874 through the Aetna Insurance Company.

Central School Supply submitted the lowest bid for 15 lunchroom tables for Brodhead cafeteria. Hadden Company was the only other bidder on the tables. Lunchroom food and supplies, which are re-bid

every quarter, were purchased with the board taking the low bid on each item.

Other business, the board voted to approve the cost of bonding and deputizing both night watchmen at RCHS, to approve the use of school buses for the annual Christmas Party at Renfro Valley by the Jaycees, and to approve a fund raising for Livingston School in which the children will sell cookies.

## Faulkners calm about prospect of oil well fortune

"And up through the ground came a bubbling crude oil that is... black gold... Texas tea."

Mildred Faulkner says they will be moving to Hollywood (like the Jed Clampets) even if the oil well the Faulkners have been struggling to drill for some 2 years does produce one hundred barrels a day, as was speculated last week when the oil well came in.

Mrs. Faulkner was, in fact, so calm about the whole thing, says her husband Les, that when he came in and told her last Wednesday that they had struck oil, she just kept on quilting, without looking up.

But then Mrs. Faulkner has been a little more skeptical all along about the possibility of striking it rich in oil. Mr. Faulkner says he has never doubted it. "Forty years ago a man

came in and told me about it." But drilling was expensive. It would have been more than the Faulkners could have afforded, says Mrs. Faulkner, but five of their children have helped bear the drilling expenses and will share in the profits. The children, Bobby, Louise, Everette, Roland and B.J., all live and work away but come home almost every weekend to share the fun and excitement of their venture.

So far about \$75,000 has been invested in the well and that does not take into consideration the fact that they have done much of the work themselves. Twelve hundred dollars a week for fuel to operate the drilling rig is one example of how fast money is spent in drilling a well, Faulkner says.

## Ford supports small business

"Kentucky provides one of the best climates for small business enterprise in the United States," Republican state representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon remarked after a November 28th meeting of the Legislature's Task Force on Small Business.

In October a survey conducted by a Washington, D.C. based research institute ranked Kentucky 13th nationally in small business climate. The survey was based on five major factors.

The analysis focused on areas of broad concern to all small businesses, rather than such factors as transportation and energy, important as they may be to some businesses.

Since all small business operators have capital and labor needs and are affected by taxes, the survey looked at the impact of those three factors on small companies.

Growth opportunities in a particular environment are also influenced, sometimes heavily, by external economic and business factors. These factors were reflected under a business activity heading.

Finally, each state was examined for small business support programs initiated at the executive or legislative level.

Kentucky ranked first in the state support category. "The existence of official support does not guarantee the significant accomplishments of small companies are being helped. However, support for innovative programs and a strong commitment to small business by state government can be enormously useful," Representative Ford said.

Representative Ford continued, "Special programs like the Task Force on Small Business help a great deal, by giving small business operators an opportunity to tell the legislature what is working and what is not working. A lot of times we can help by eliminating some laws and regulations that place costly and unnecessary restrictions on small business."

Kentucky, New York and Illinois are the only states that provide a full array of state government programs aimed at supporting the activities of small business.

### Decorate in the Spirit of Williamsburg

This Christmas, why not let the tinsel, glitter and plastic remain in storage and concentrate on decorations from nature?

Decorating for Christmas in a traditional 18th century or "Williamsburg" style is a good opportunity to put your own creativity and individuality into Christmas.

Williamsburg decorating, named after the historic

capital of colonial Virginia, means an emphasis on real greenery, fruits, nuts, cones and seed pods. Although the style of decorating is reminiscent of 18th century Virginia and still abound in restored Williamsburg, people have always used natural decorations.

Natural materials you can use in your holiday decorations include fresh fruits, such as apples, lemons, limes, oranges and pineapples; dried plant materials such as okra pods, magnolia pods, pine cones and cuts, berries such as holly berries, bayberries and cranberries; and greenery, such as ivy, pine, boxwood, cedar, mistletoe, magnolia leaves and holly.

Home decorators need to buy the freshest and most perfect produce they

can find, and to have extra pieces on hand for replacing those that may spoil. Citrus fruits and apples are the longest-lasting. Pears, even though they are elegant-looking, will only last for about three days. All of the fruits you plan to use, with the exception of grapes, should be waxed.

Wax fruits by applying a coat of liquid floor wax with a cotton ball, or spray them with leaf polish. If you plan to eat some of the fruit later, the fruit should be polished with salad oil. Waxing not only prolongs the freshness, it also makes the fruit "glossy".

Home decorators also need to condition any greenery they plan to use. For plants with woody stems, crush the bottom two inches of the stems, then place in hot water for 48 hours to soak up as much moisture as possible.

Place ivy and plants with softer stems in hot water, until the water is cool. Boxwood, the longest-lasting greenery, should be completely submerged in water for 24 hours before using. All berries and greenery should be waxed after being conditioned, either in liquid wax or with plant polish.

Once the natural materials are prepared so they

will remain attractive throughout the season, home decorators can use their imagination as they decide how they want to decorate.

The Williamsburg look can be as simple or as elaborate as you want. It can be anything as simple as red apples in a wooden bowl or as elaborate as a planned fruit and dried plant arrangement. Williamsburg decorating is simple and elegant. Two things that stand out about the look are its symmetry and elegance.

Some good places in the home to decorate are mantels, bannisters, windows, table tops, end tables, bookcases, bathroom vanity counters, doorways and shelves. Too many people limit their decorations to one room or to just the tree and the wreath.

Making decorations is a good way to get Christmas customs started. It's also a good family project. You should get a small child involved stringing cranberries, or helping arrange some fruit.

Don't think you have to buy a ready-made wreath or other decoration. Attractive pieces can be made without spending a lot of time or money, and all of us benefit from

the good feeling that comes with making something.

Here are some ideas for decorating and celebrating Christmas Williamsburg style.

-Feature candles and candlelight with your natural decorations.

-Tuck sprigs of holly or other greenery around pictures, mirrors and a round serving dishes and decorative items.

-Decorate a live Christmas tree with homemade ornaments, popcorn strings, cookies or strings of cranberries.

-Make a wreath from available greenery, or, if you are short on time, trim a ready-made wreath with treated fruits, nuts, berries, and cones.

-Use the pineapple in your fruit arrangements. It is the traditional symbol of hospitality.

-Offer guests sprigs of holly to toss at a yule log burning in your fireplace. This is symbolic of "burning your troubles away."

-Hang a ball of mistletoe, herbs or boxwood in a doorway.

-Use red yarn and ribbon bows for decorative accents throughout the house. The secret in tying a good bow is to use four separate pieces of ribbon.

man Road which was closed in September. Clark's motion was seconded by Magistrate Tom Deane, but failed to carry as the three other magistrates voted to keep the road closed.

In other business, the court voted to support the Kentucky Coal County Coalition's efforts to keep Coal Severance Tax Money appropriations coming to coal producing counties.

Ralph Moseley of Spiro came to the court to ask why Rockcastle County citizens do not have 24 hour police protection. He said someone shot at his trailer last Thursday night, and when the police number was called, the dispatcher told them there was no one on duty at the time and they would have to call the state police post at London. He said he was very disturbed about the situation and did not understand why Rockcastle County could not have officers on duty at all times.

Judge Bob Jasper told him that money was not available to support any more police officers than it has.

## FARM BUREAU

About 72 local Farm Bureau members met early Saturday morning - December 4 and elected new directors of the Rockcastle Farm Bureau Association.

A court order obtained by some former directors, who had reportedly re-appointed themselves as directors at the annual meeting last summer, restrained the group from electing officers at a previously called meeting. ## Animal Waste Management

The use of organic fertilizers such as livestock manure and other wastes have long been recognized as a good management tool in most farming operations. With increased costs of commercial fertilizers, the available fertilizer content of livestock manure produced on farms is becoming valuable.

Usually the biggest drawback in using manure is the inefficient means of holding it or effective application methods. Most concentrated areas of livestock and dairy operations produce an enormous amount of manure in a short period of time. Without any efficient way of handling the waste the task of removing the manure becomes costly. Many times a great deal of fertilizer value is lost due to leaching from rain runoff and exposure.

The Soil Conservation Service is now able to assist landowners in the design of an animal waste holding pond to help store the manure efficiently so it can be spread over the farm. The use of a holding pond also will help to control runoff pollution from livestock areas. The pond size depends upon the number of animals and the frequency of emptying. The Soil Conservation Service in Rockcastle County is ready to assist anyone in developing an animal waste system. Anyone needing information, call 266-2941 or stop by the office in Mt. Vernon.

## DEER HARVEST UP

Kentucky's deer hunters harvested approximately 16,000 deer during this year's statewide gun season, according to the results of an informal survey of fish and wildlife law enforcement supervisors around the state.

With the check station stubs from all but one of the commonwealth's 118 open counties counted, the total deer harvest stood at 15,863. The other county should add approximately 200 more deer to the count.

Last year 12,949 deer were taken during the gun season, which varies from three to 10 days in different parts of the state. The harvest figure this year represents an approximately 20 percent increase over the 1981 figure and is a new record for the state.

Conservation officers encountered fewer deer hunters than last year in several parts of the state and the total number of hunters checked (13,388) was down from last year's figure of 15,001. The officers made 438 arrests for game law violations (up from 328 last year) and reported 320 known illegally killed deer, also up from last year's count of 282.

Harvest increases were reported from all nine of Kentucky's wildlife districts, with the biggest jump reported from all nine of Kentucky's wildlife districts, with the biggest jump reported from the ninth district in Southeastern Kentucky, where the harvest almost tripled—1,616 this year as compared to 591 in 1981. Much of this increase can probably be attributed to the larger number of counties in the district open to deer hunting this season.

Antlerless deer hunting was permitted in more counties this year, so some of the harvest increase can be attributed to hunters being allowed to take does and "button" bucks on the last day of the season in 22 counties. Biologists expect more and more counties to be opened to either sex deer hunting as the statewide deer population continues to increase.

Considering all things, Faulkner is pretty calm about the whole thing, but he says he promises to get excited when "they start hauling it out of here...I've been set back too many times up in there."

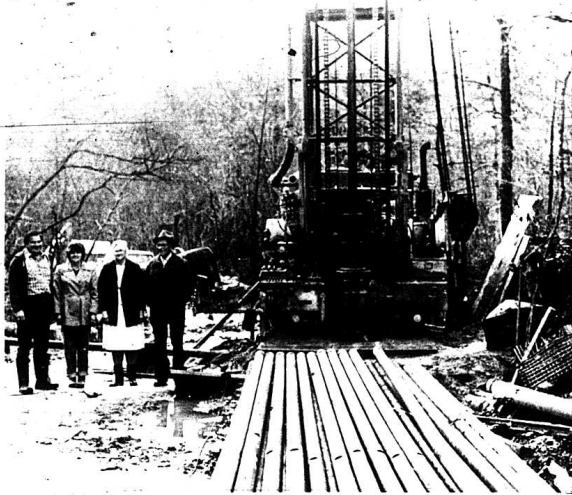

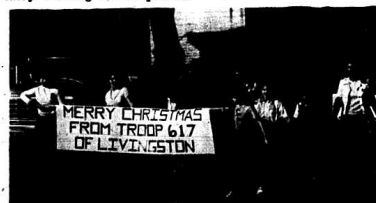

## Western Water receives 2nd highest rating from FHA

Officers and board members of the Western Rockcastle Water District learned at a recent meeting of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District that their application for a \$200,000 FHA loan to be used toward a 1.3 million project package had received a priority rating of number two out of a total of twelve applications submitted.

The total financial package seeks a \$600,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission. A \$450,000 block grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Farmers Home Administration loan. According to Buford Parkerson, board member of the water district, the agency is attempting to extend water lines over the entire county.

ARC applications are grouped into three categories, according to Gatliff Craig, director of CVADD. The first group of applicants qualify to receive money, the second group (into which Western Rockcastle Water District falls) have acceptable projects and will be funded if and when money becomes available and the third group is not considered.

The high FHA rating is a positive rate in the struggle for the project since funding from one source usually improves the chances of additional funding.

If the FHA loan goes through, Parkerson said the project will be extended as far as the funds hold out with engineers looking over the total plan and deciding where the lines will be extended.

## District Judge rules against Cornelius

A civil rights suit filed by Kenneth Cornelius against the Laurel County School Board was dismissed Tuesday, November 30.

Cornelius, a Rockcastle County teacher who served as Laurel County School Superintendent from July 1980 to February 1981, contended in the suit that his civil rights were violated when he was dismissed by the board in February of 1981 without a pre-termination trial.

The suit was filed in federal court in London where U.S. District Court Judge Eugene Siler ruled Cornelius' civil rights were not violated and that law does not require a pre-

termination hearing. He said, by law, a superintendent may be removed for cause for four-fifths of the members of the board.

Carl Clontz, attorney for Cornelius, said he plans to appeal the ruling in the U.S. Court of Appeals Sixth Circuit in Cincinnati, Ohio. He has 30 days in which to file the motion.

The Circuit Clerk's office will be closed December 23, 24, and 25 for Christmas and will also be closed December 30 and 31 and January 1 for the New Year's holiday.

Kentucky's automobile owners will get more than a new license place when they register their cars in 1983.

For the first time, car owners will receive separate title and registration documents.

The change is a result of the state's first title law passed by the 1982 Kentucky General Assembly.

"The title law was created to protect consumers," said State Transportation Secretary James Runke. "It's a weapon against forged titles and odometer rollbacks. It will also prevent thieves from dumping stolen cars in Kentucky."

This year when a person registers a vehicle he will receive a certificate of title and a registration card.

The registration card is simply permission to travel on Kentucky roads. It is a receipt for the taxes paid to maintain and improve the state's highway system.

The title certificate is a document showing proof of ownership.

"The law has always required car owners to keep their registration in the car at all times. That was a boon to car thieves, because the proof of ownership was on the same document," Runke said. "If the car was stolen, the certificate could be filled out on the back. The owner could have a hard time proving that his car was stolen and not traded."

Car owners now will carry only the registration card in their car. The title certificate should be kept in a lock box or other safe place. The title is only needed when the car is traded or sold.

Car owners will not purchase a new title each year. Only the registration will be issued annually. This will reduce the paperwork involved in registering a car.

Kentucky was the last state to pass a title law. An added benefit of the

law is that Kentucky car owners who moved to other states will have an easier time getting a car title in those states.

Car owners who register their cars in 1983 will find some changes.

Car owners must still register their vehicles in the month that the decal expires, but they will register their car up to their birth month in 1984.

The change is a result of new laws passed by the 1982 Kentucky General Assembly.

The change in registration will eliminate long lines at the county clerks' offices early in the year.

About 65 percent of all vehicles must be registered in the first three months of 1983. By changing the registration to the owner's birth month, registration will be more evenly spread over the 12 months beginning in 1984.

When you apply for your new registration, the county clerk will ask for your birth month and Social Security number.

The clerk will also ask if you want to register to your birth month in 1984 or register to your birth month in 1983 and then return in that month and register until 1984.

For example, if your registration expires in January and your birth month is April, you can register your vehicle until April 1983 and then return and register it until April 1984.

Or you can simply register the vehicle through April 1984.

The annual registration fee is \$13.50. In the example above, the person could pay \$13.50 plus \$4.88 in January and be registered until April 1984. Or the person could pay \$4.88 in January and return in April to pay the \$13.50 to register until April 1984.

The \$4.88 is the prorated fee for three months plus the \$2 clerks' fee. The registration fee amounts to about 96 cents per month. I the registration was

due in May and the person's birth month was February, the fee would be \$10.64. The fee is less because the person's birth month is not a full year from the expiration date of the registration.

If a car is jointly owned, either person's birth month may be used.

A company with a fleet of vehicles will register in the company's birth month, the date when the company began operating.

Each car must be registered in the month the decal expires in 1983. But in 1984, all cars owned by a person or company will be registered in the same month.

This will eliminate long lines in January and February. Only 25 percent of the state's 2.6 million vehicles will be registered in the first quarter of the year instead of 65 percent under the current system.

Anyone with questions about the registration system should contact the county court clerk.

Irene Bales, Clerk of Rockcastle County and her deputies, Norma Houk, Kelley Roden and David Bales, met with the Transportation Cabinet concerning staggered registration at the Holiday Inn in Corbin on Monday, December 6.

When you license your vehicle for 1983, your new decal will expire on your birth month. You will have a choice of short term or long term. Example, if a person has an expiration date of January, 1983 on their vehicle and they have a birth month of September, they have an option of licensing their car for a short term period until September of 1983 for the fee of \$9.68 or can take the long term period of September of 1984 for the price of \$23.18.

To prevent heat loss, keep your damper closed when you're not using the fireplace.
