Candy Striping, Anyone?

They learn how to correctly make a bed and operate a call bell system. They assist in passing and picking up food trays, and taking ice water to patients. They practice the proper handwashing technique.

"They" are the Candy Strippers at the Rockcastle County Hospital. The program has a long history and was in operation when Betty Purcell took it over in 1968. Mrs. Purcell, a registered nurse and the training director at the hospital, is in charge of the Teenage Program.

Mrs. Purcell feels that the Candy Stripper program is beneficial to teenagers for several reasons. "It helps them become acquainted with the hospital surroundings if they're thinking of pursuing a

health care "career," she said. "It's a form of diversion, or they may do it to work on a school project. For us, the patients like to see young faces."

Who can join? "Any boy or girl who is attending high school," explained Mrs. Purcell. She trains the volunteers by holding a three session orientation program for several of them at a time. They come for the sessions in the afternoon, receive a TB skin test with their parents' permission, and learn the basic skills for the duties they are allowed to perform.

After the orientation the volunteers are given a pinafore if they are female and a smock if they are male. They are not to begin work until they receive a uniform. Two candy strippers are scheduled to work at a time, and they are encouraged to come for two hour sessions as often as their time permits.

"They work directly with the nurse in charge of

supervision while they are in the hospital," said Mrs. Purcell. They log their hours in a notebook at the nurses station and after 25 hours of service they are given a cap. After 50 hours of service they receive a pin.

A Candy Stripper at your local hospital learns responsibility, contributes to the well-being of others, and gets health care experience that could be an asset to a future career.

in their 80's and 90's without serious illness associated with the skin discoloration. For some, being blue was painful...the pain of being blue in a world that is mostly shades of white to black."

One man, John Stacy, still lives in the two room

log cabin he built for his wife, a "blue woman". Although some recall now deceased Lona Stacy as "the bluest woman I ever saw," Stacy has conveniently forgotten the fact that she was blue, though he can remember most past events with ease.

The condition that became accepted by the Appalachians, shocked and baffled medical science as health clinics came to the area and better roads opened the area up to outsiders.

"There had always been speculation in the hollows about what made the blue people blue-green, a lung disorder and the possibility proposed by one old timer that their blood is a little like Kentucky blue. But no one knew for sure and doctors rarely paid visits to the remote creekside settlements where most of the blue people lived until well into the 1950's."

"By the time a young hematologist from the University of Kentucky came down to Troublesome Creek in the 1960's to cure the blue people, the descendants had multiplied their recessive genes all over the Cumberland Plateau."

Dr. Madison Cawein heard rumors of the blue people when he went to work at the University of Kentucky medical clinic in 1960. Cawein had helped isolate the antidote for cholera and did some early work on L-dopa, the drug for treatment of Parkinson's disease. His real interest developed during World War II, while he was a medical technician, was blood cells, hematology.

Cawein drove from Lexington to Hazard on weekends to look for the blue people he'd heard rumors about. Ruth Pendergrass, a nurse with the American Heart Association's clinic in Hazard had tried to stir up medical interest in the blue people ever since a dark blue woman walked into the county health department one cold day asking for a blood test."

Ms. Pendergrass was reportedly scared at the sight of the woman because she appeared to the nurse to be having a heart attack. The woman assured her she merely came from the blue Combes who lived on Ball Creek.

Cawein and Pendergrass hunted for weeks for the elusive blue people without success. "They were really embarrassed...not being blue" and were perhaps not so eager to become medical guinea pigs. Then one day two Ritchie children walked into the clinic in Hazard while Cawein happened to be there. After a long period of questioning and documentation that day, Cawein "drew lots of blood" from the Ritchies and hurried back to the lab to test for abnormal hemoglobin. The results were negative.

After some medical investigation, Cawein discovered a research theory de-

veloped by a Dr. E.M. Scott and the answer began to emerge. Scott described a similar condition he had discovered in Alaskan Eskimos and Indians.

TAX SAVINGS ON INCOME AVERAGING

How does your 1982 income stack up? If it's running well ahead of the past several years-it you've gotten a big raise, or a super new job, or if the lady of the house has returned to work and is bringing home a pay-check-you may have the opportunity to save on your income taxes next April by income averaging. Income averaging permits you to spread some of this year's extra income over the last four poorer years and so keep it in a lower tax bracket.

(There's another possible benefit: if one of the last four years was ESPECIALLY low, averaging may help here, too.)

Does this seem made-to-order for the young management trainee, just out of school and in his first real job? Government guidelines are tougher than that. The taxpayer (and spouse, on a joint return) must have been a U.S. citizen or resident during the five-year period being averaged, and provided at least half of his or her own support. Or, the taxpayer must be at least 25 years old, and NOT a full-time student for at least four of the five years.

Another requirement measures whether it's worthwhile to average. For your taxable income for 1979 through 1981 and fixed 30 percent of that. Unless your 1982 income is \$3,000 higher than THAT figure, you don't qualify.

Income averaging doesn't always result in lower taxes. It's always advisable to figure out your tax bill both ways to see how you'll do better. A tax professional is best equipped to do the necessary computations and advise you.

City raises Western Water's rate to 84

In a unanimous decision, the Mt. Vernon City Council agreed to raise Western Rockcastle Water District's rate at which they buy water from the city to 84c per one thousand and gallons above their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Mayor Roland Mullins read a letter from Denver Burton, president of the Western Rockcastle Water District, which said in effect that the district would agree to a one-year contract with the city at the new rate. The rate will go into effect this month, according to Mary McClure, city clerk.

Mullins said the old rate was 45c per one thousand gallons and that the increase was due to the high cost of operating the water plant.

Mullins also said the council had offered to handle the billing work for Western Water to help hold down their (Western's) water rate to better help them cope with the price increase.

However, Mullins said that the district had not taken the city up on their offer as yet.

Strange mountain malady, blue skin, challenged hematologist

Information for this story was taken from an issue of Science Magazine entitled "The Blue People of Troublesome Creek" by Cathy Trost.

"I'm My Own Grandpa" was a song made famous during the early days of country music. The song, in a humorous way, pointed out the prevalence of the socially and culturally accepted mountain practice of marrying cousins and others related by blood.

The following story has to do with intermarriage and with a recessive gene that strangely enough was present in two families who settled in the mountains of Kentucky.

The story goes that Marin Fugate, a young French orphan, took up a land grant on the banks of Troublesome Creek in Eastern Kentucky around 1820 and family lore has it that he was blue, although no mention of his skin color was made in any of the historical accounts of the area.

Farm Bureau refused to seat either set of county delegates

Farm Bureau of Kentucky, with a statewide membership of 220,000, held its annual convention last Saturday, December 11 in Louisville. Although the delegates became embroiled in controversy and voted to support certain issues and concerns, it artfully sidestepped the issue of the minds of all of the Rockcastle County delegates that of which of the two sets of delegates and officers the credentials committee of that body would recognize. According to credentials committee chairman, Bourke Mantle, Rockcastle County had two sets of delegates and officers and the committee recommended that the body not seat anyone from Rockcastle.

Charles Denver Burton was re-elected to the state position Saturday with no votes cast from a Rockcastle delegation.

According to a spokesman in the state office, the credentials committee was unable to certify either group of representatives because it could not be determined whether either group had been elected at an annual meeting at which appropriate prior legal notice had been given.

According to one state spokesman, very possibly the November 19 meeting, at which members were served with a restraining order was a properly advertised meeting and had the assembled members elected directors at that meeting, they might conceivably have been seated, however, the spokesman said the issue is very complicated and there were probably facts the state office does not have.

The Rockcastle delegates were given the option at the convention to hold a hearing, at the convention, if they so desired to do so, the state office confirmed. A motion was made from the floor that a committee be sent to Rockcastle to help settle the dispute, however, that motion was amended by another delegate who said that Rockcastle should be allowed to work out its own problems. That is how the matter was left at the convention.

County Farm Bureau groups are autonomous, the spokesman said, and the state does not have the authority to withhold participation, which the body exercised over the feeding Rockcastle groups, Saturday.

The local controversy arose last September when directors reportedly held a business meeting prior to the arrival of members at an annual meeting and re-appointed themselves.

A petition containing the names of 50 disgruntled Farm Bureau members called a new annual meeting and election. Prior notices were advertised for the November 19 meeting, however, interim Circuit Judge Don Ward issued a restraining order on the basis that all directors and members had not been properly notified of the meeting. Directors were not elected at this meeting following the delivery of the court order at the meeting.

On Saturday, December 4, another meeting was held by the challenger, prior to which notices of the meeting were not readily hand-delivered by the sheriff to the directors and public notices were given over the local radio station.

At this meeting twelve new directors were named and officers were appointed. The following Monday, the newly elected directors obtained a court order from Judge Ward restraining (Cont'd to P-11)

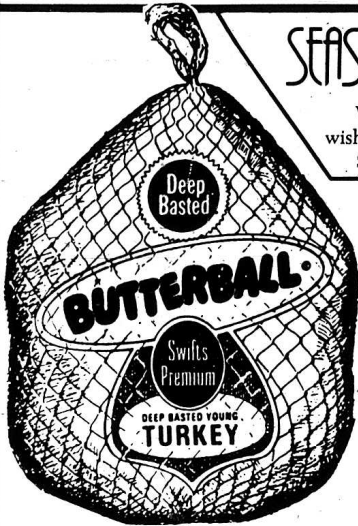

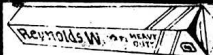

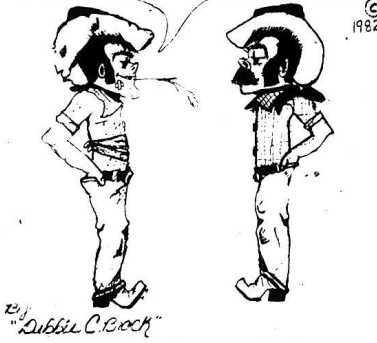
After completing the required period of satisfactory engineering experience he may apply for registration as a professional engineer.

specifically Wallace Proctor, Sharon Burton and Jackie Cash and all other former officers and directors from conducting the official business of the Farm Bureau in Rockcastle.

On December 7, newly appointed and sworn Circuit Judge John Mandt issued an order dissolving the prior orders pertaining to the dispute. The order was issued with the agreement of both the plaintiffs (the group seeking to gain control of the Farm Bureau) and the defendants (the group seeking to retain power in the local organization). The order said that both sides would have a better opportunity to present their positions to the

credentials committee at the convention with the orders lifted.

A permit allowing Jerry Cox to withdraw as legal counsel for the defendants was issued December 10 by Judge Mandt. Reportedly Ward had refused to issue such an order.

William Crabtree, attorney from London has been retained by the defendants and Steve Connelley of Berea is attorney for the plaintiffs.

According to Frankie Bullock, Wednesday at noon the Sheriff's department recommended the Farm Bureau close its office. The recommendation was accepted by officers of both guiding groups. The matter will presumably be settled by the outcome of a civil suit pending in Circuit Court.

the council to discuss the new motel units he is placing at his present motel on Richmond Street.

Last week, the council had asked Killion to stop construction until he met with the council after Vernon Griffin, another motel owner on Richmond Street, complained to one of the councilmen.

Griffin's complaint was reportedly that the city had a fire ordinance which states that buildings must be built 27 feet from the street so that fire trucks will not encounter any problem getting around the structure in case of fire.

Griffin reportedly said that when he built his motel, the city made him move the structure farther back from the street.

City Councilman Joel "Buster" Gentry told the council that Mr. Killion had one building that would be 22 1/2 feet from the road.

After a short discussion on the matter, the council voted to amend the 1936 ordinance and told Killion to proceed with his work.

The council also voted unanimously to purchase six feet of land from Vic Hysinger.

1/2 cup chopped nuts





