## Incumbent board members sworn in Tuesday night

The first order of business at the January school board meeting Tuesday night was the oath of office administered to the two incumbent board members who begin new terms, Rudolph Burdette and George Poynter. Judge-Executive Bob Jasper performed the swearing-in ceremony.

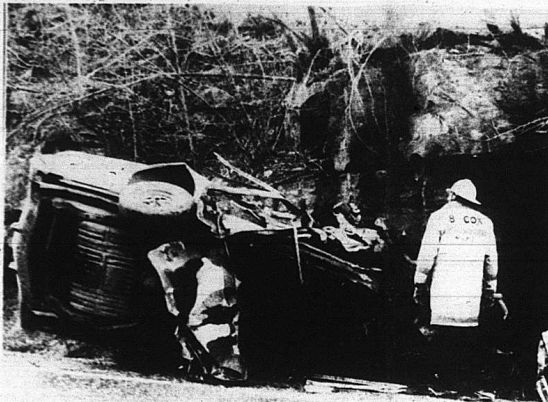
Burdette was swiftly re-elected as board chairman, Willie Taylor as vice chairman and Superintendent Charles Parsons as secretary.

The unemployment insurance policy with the Kentucky School Board Insurance Trust Fund was renewed for one more year as was board attorney Carl Clontz's contract.

The board also voted to add insulation to the ceiling of the school administration building at an estimated cost of \$500.

Carolyn Napier was hired as substitute cook.

According to Superintendent Charles Parsons there has been some controversy over who actually owns the Blue Springs School grounds since the board was never deeded the land. Parsons said the land was deeded years ago with that parcel of land on which the school stood being excluded and designated for a school. Blue Springs School was not opened for classes this fall on a recommendation from the state department of education. Parsons said he had asked for an opinion on the matter from the state's attorney general and is awaiting a reply.

## Local hospital takes over "sick" ambulance service on a 90 day trial basis

The Rockcastle County Hospital has agreed to take over operation of the local ambulance service, effective January 3, on a 90-day trial basis. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to approve the contract with the hospital. The contract provides that the hospital give the court a monthly report and that the court pay the balance of the cost of operation which is not met by income. It was pointed out that there may be some combining of jobs, changes and general re-organization in order to make the operation of the service more efficient.

Last week road workers were cut to four days a week in an effort to conserve limited county funds. The cut was made official at the Tuesday meeting.

In another move aimed at cutting expenses, the court voted to buy for \$1,000 the tools it has been paying \$100 per month to rent from Charles Bussell, county mechanic. The county has been renting the tools since the state turned over the operation of the county roads system to the local government, over three years ago.

Jaller Henry Abney presented to the court a list of needs for the jail including new doors which Abney said the state fire inspector had mandated. The money to make the improvements, estimated to cost from \$5,000 to \$8,500, was not included in the jail budget nor county budget, according to Floyd Owens, county treasurer and is not available at the present time. Magistrates Joe Clark made a motion to take care of the needed items when money does become available. The motion passed.

Gatiff Craig, director of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District, appeared before the court to notify the court of a change in surplus cheese distribution process and to offer the court first option to negotiate a contract with CVADD to coordinate the distribution locally. The cheese, 10,000 lbs. of which was distributed

in Rockcastle last month, according to Craig, is being turned over to the area development districts by the state. Previously, the Ky. Department for Human Resources was responsible for the commodity giveaway.

Craig said 20,000 lbs. had been allocated for Rockcastle in January, a considerable increase over December allotment. The guidelines have been changed and relaxed some. Craig said, since the government still has an over-abundance of the farm product and is having to rent warehouses to store it.

The court voted to authorize Judge-Executive Bob Jasper to enter into contracts with CVADD to assist in coordinating the distribution effort.

On September 7 closing by the court of the Bowman Road, a passageway located on property belonging to Hugh Ramsey and Elbert Eversole in Magistrate Bill Wren's district, a controversy has arisen. Bowman heirs, including Burgess and Henry Abney, have complained to the court that closing the access road, even though there are other access roads to the property, would ruin the sale of the farm on top of the hill which, according to Henry Abney, has coal on it.

The Ramseys and Eversoles who maintain they sweat through proper legal channels to have the road closed pressed for another court vote, Tuesday, to support their earlier decision.

Bill Wren made a motion to leave the road closed—as previously voted and Magistrate Wren, Magistrate Donald Rowe and Joe Clark voted, however, to reopen the road. Magistrate Tom Denney abstained, saying he liked the people on both sides. Judge Jasper then voted a tie-breaker favor of leaving the road closed.

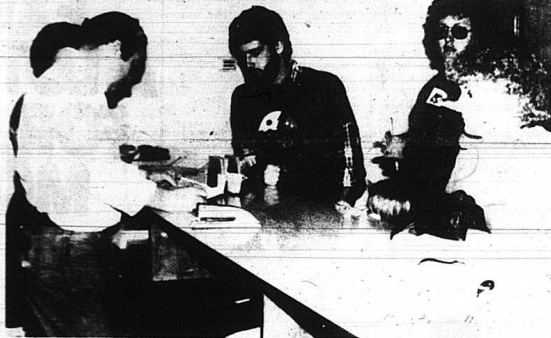
In other business, the court voted to advertise for bids to fence around the county garage. The bids are to be opened at the next regular meeting in February.

The court also voted to hire Williametta Cromer, who had been employed part-time as clerk for the ambulance service, to help Anna Rose Mullins, who is Judge Jasper's assistant. Mrs. Cromer will work 16 hours a week for the county at \$3.75 per hour.

Magistrate Donald Rowe complained near the close of the meeting that it didn't seem like he got anything done on the roads in his district during the time the county road crew was working in his district. (The court agreed some months ago to have the crew work for specific time periods on roads in each magisterial district.)

Paul Hansel, county road supervisor, said they had gravelled, rocked and

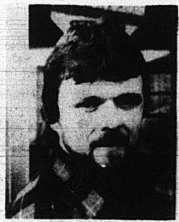

### Note about early dismissals

Since the snow season is here, it might help parents to know the school policy concerning early dismissal time.

Principals are advised to keep school clocks set with WRVK radio station to allow buses to get to the elementary schools. For example, if it is announced that school will be dismissed early at a given hour it is understood that the high school will dismiss 20 minutes earlier to allow buses to get to the elementary schools.

For example, if it is announced that school will be dismissed at 2 p.m. it would mean that the elementary schools would dismiss at 2 p.m. with the high school being dismissed at 1:40 p.m. in order to allow 20 minutes for the buses to travel to the elementary schools by 2 p.m.

Early dismissals will reportedly be kept to a minimum.

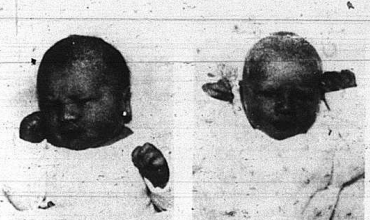

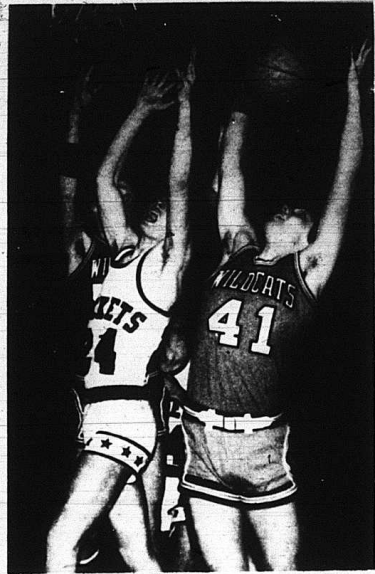

**Does The Bible Teach Predestination?**

The question is somewhat difficult in that the term requires definition and clarification. Certainly the Bible teaches that God used forethought and that He has predetermined many things (Eph. 1:5,11). However, the term "predestination" is commonly used to suggest that God has predestinated some INDIVIDUALS to be saved, and others to be lost apart from choice. The Bible does not teach this theory!

The theory is sometimes called "unconditional Election and Reprobation", and was popularized by John Calvin, and Augustine before him. As one man-made creed expressed the theory: "By the decree of God...some men and angels are predestinated unto everlasting life, and others fore-ordained to everlasting death. These...are particularly and unchangeably designed, and their number is so certain and definite that it cannot be increased or diminished."

If such speculation be true, it invalidates many plain Bible truths.

1. If so, Jesus did not die for ALL men, but for the Bible says, "Christ tasted death for every man" (Heb. 2:9).

2. If so, it makes gospel preaching worthless. Yet, the Bible says, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:15-16). But why preach if God unconditionally chooses who will be saved or lost, and "...there can be nothing by nothing left for men to do, will, or determine, in the matter of salvation" (Calvin's Calvinism, page 63).

3. If so, it completely destroys man's power of choice. Yet Jesus invites "...come unto me, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28). "Whosoever will is invited to take the water of life free" (Rev. 22:17). The Bible teaches that the "elect" are the "Whosoever wills" and the "non-elect" are the "Whosoever won'ts."

4. If so, it makes God a respecter of persons. But the Bible says "For there is no respect of persons with God" (Rom. 2:11).

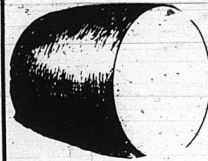

## An interview with the new Circuit Judge

A Somerset attorney, John Mandt, was recently appointed Circuit Judge of Rockcastle and Pulaski counties and although the name and face may be familiar to Pulaski citizens, he is stranger in Rockcastle.

This article is to acquaint local persons with Judge John "Jack" Mandt. For fourteen years, Mandt has practiced law in Somerset, but he says he hasn't been involved very much with criminal law. Most of his practice has dealt with civil cases, so, since his appointment he has been familiarizing himself with criminal law, he said Wednesday, as he sat in his courtroom office.

When asked if he considers himself conservative or liberal with respect to the law, Mandt says he sees himself as more to the middle of the road, but thinks it is very hard to characterize oneself: He does not voice policies, but wants to be flexible. Sometimes, he suspects, he will be considered "hard" and at other times "lenient".

He says he is not a "tough" personality by nature. In the courtroom he feels the proceedings should be taken seriously and be carried out formally, but does not intend to be so strict that those connected with the case cannot be relaxed. If witnesses, lawyers or jurors are tense because they are afraid the judge may explode any minute, the person on trial is not

as likely to get a fair trial, he thinks.

Our country is one of the few in the world that while trying to prosecute criminals, is trying to keep innocent persons out of jail, he said. The two conflicting values make our court system unique and very complex.

Mandt, who comes from German ancestry, was born while his parents lived in Pike County, Kentucky. He was actually born not far away in a hospital in Williamson, West Virginia on December 28, 1932.

His father was in the coal business in eastern Kentucky. The family, which included his mother, the former Digna Torney, father, one sister and John, lived in Floyd County when John was of high school age, but John attended the Kentucky Military Institute where he played basketball with Governor John Y. Brown and knew Jim Earl Hammons of Mt. Vernon who attended at the same time.

Mandt went into the

Navy for four years following high school and when he got out in 1960, got a job with a Pyrofax Gas Company and was sent to Somerset to manage the store there. He worked for the company for five years.

He later entered school at the University of Kentucky and received a law degree from there in 1968.

Mandt married the former Sharon Kelsay of Columbia and they have three daughters, Ann Wilson, 10; Alice Torney, 7 and Mary Triplett, 5.

Besides having served for several years a Somerset city attorney, Mandt has been active in civic and community affairs including serving as president of the Jaycees, the Industrial Foundation and the Chamber of Commerce. He also served for twelve years as a secretary of the Southeastern Graded Milk Producers Association.

Sports, including tennis, golf, racquet ball and volleyball are other interests of Judge Mandt.

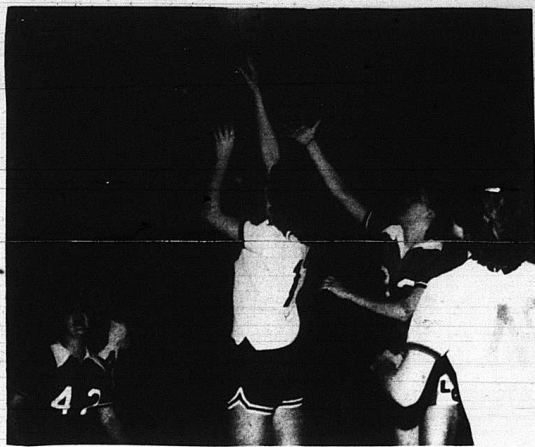

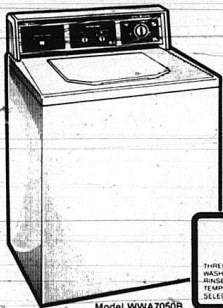
Graduates of the course studied the operation and maintenance of flight simulators and earned credits toward an associate degree in applied science through the Community College of the Air Force.
