It is suggested that firewood be stacked away from any buildings and not kept in the basement, and that wood be brought into the house in small amounts to keep the possibility of the wood of the winter. There is no need to spray either firewood or your home with insecticide as long as you store wood properly. If insects are carried into your house in wood, it is best simply to use a waruum sweeper to remove them.
