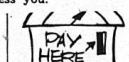
## Disputanta

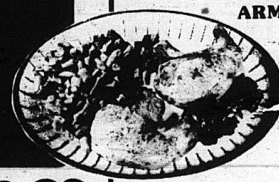

## Abundance of tobacco sold, but abundance left over

After local farmers got over the initial shock of not getting \$2.00 per pound for this season's crops, Harold Ballinger, of the local ASCS office, thinks they were pretty well satisfied with their tobacco checks. "At least we've not had any complaints," said Ballinger Tuesday. He admits, however, that part of the satisfaction may lie in the quantity of tobacco farmers were able to put on the market this year.

Next year may see more disgruntled tobacco farmers if the price is not considerably higher than this year.

Ballinger said some farmers who sold after Christmas reported a slightly stronger demand for "good" tobacco. With smaller markets closed now, farmers with tobacco to sell must take it to the Lexington, Shelbyville and other larger markets.

Kentucky farmers averaged \$1.82 per pound for this year's crop, Ballinger said and guesses Rockcastle farmers did a little better than that with an average of about \$1.84.

The large crops this year was due, in part, to favorable weather conditions and absence of disease plus the fact that farmers were able to market the amount of "under quota" they had not sold the past two seasons. The amount grown was so large this year, Ballinger said, that despite the increased amount allowed, there was more carry-over than usual.

According to state trooper Guy Blevins, who is investigating the break-in, entry was gained by tearing a screen out in a back window and prying the window open.

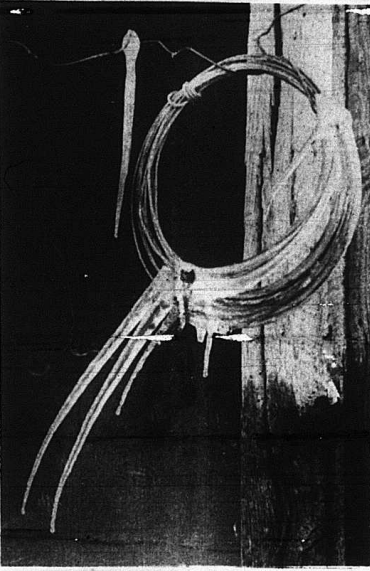

## Plastics company needs still more room

Mt. Vernon Plastics, the newest industry to locate at the Rockcastle Industrial Park is growing at a fast rate. Already they need a second expansion, according to discussion at the Monday night Rockcastle Improvement Council meeting. In fact, for some time, the company has had to rent warehouse space in Madison County and has sent Rockcastle County employees there to work, according to leaders of the council.

The company which manufactures plastic lids for food items was formed as a new company in 1980 and began production in April of 1981. Since that time, there have been almost constant additions in new production equipment, new storage silos for raw material and a building expansion which enlarged the square footage from 10,000 to 20,000. Reportedly, the

company has strained to keep up with the demand for their product and has not been able to expand fast enough to meet the demand.

Because of the rapid growth and rate of investment, the company is unable or unwilling to assume more indebtedness for another expansion at this time. A group of private investors, headed by Jerry Ikerd, chairman of the board of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, are in the process, according to the council, of working out an agreement to build the needed add-on. The addition would be leased to the plastics

## Icy roads last Friday kept students at home

### Girls basketball team stuck on Interstate 75 for seven and half hours Thursday night

Rockcastle County students have finally missed the first real day of school. Last Friday morning, even the teachers got a break. Children in the county had previously missed 10 days of school, but teachers were called to in-service so that those days would not have to be made up.

School was called off completely Friday because of a freezing rain storm that hit southeastern Kentucky late Thursday night and into the morning Friday.

If you happened to be one of those who went to bed about 11 o'clock Thursday night and didn't get out the next day until around noon, then you missed all the action.

Around 11:30 Thursday night, a slow freezing rain began to fall. Within thirty minutes, roads were completely covered with ice and virtually impassable.

Things were not so bad throughout the county as

very few residents were on the road.

However, there was the Rockcastle County High School girls basketball team that was playing in Williamsburg that night. And, an overtime period that pushed the girls' departure from Williamsburg back at least 30 minutes did not help matters any.

The girls, along with a few fans, were stopped on I-75 three times by wrecks that caused the team to sit 7 1/2 hours on the road and arrive home around 5:30 Friday morning. At the last stop, which was only about five miles from Mt. Vernon, the team sat approximately three hours without moving. Both lanes of traffic were backed up for three miles. A state salt truck which found the bus in traffic, notified parents that were waiting at the high school that the bus was alright, but that it would be a while before they would be home. This was around 3:15 a.m.

There was a total of five non-injury accidents on I-75, three of which were in Laurel County and two in Rockcastle.

These letters were the result of an article about two coyotes being caught in Rockcastle County. I believe this article was a public service and that every citizen of this county should be aware of coyotes moving into the area. Some of you may not be aware that our northern neighboring counties are building quite a population of these animals. Coyotes can be potential livestock killers and when coyotes

move into an area the fox usually move out.

Trapping is not the cruel and inhumane practice these people believe it to be. With today's modern trapping techniques, animals are caught and securely held by the foot with minimal discomfort. Animals do not chew their feet off when proper size traps and proper trapping techniques are used.

Although many people feel that hunting and trapping endanger population levels of animals the fact is that many species are on the increase or holding their own nicely in this time of increased hunting and trapping pressure. Habitat destruction is much more likely to reduce animal numbers in an area than any other factor.

Finally, I would like to say a few words about the National Wildlife Federation. This is a very fine organization. In fact, I belong to it myself. The National Wildlife Federation also publishes a booklet entitled "Trapping and Conservation". In this booklet, they recognize the foothold trap as a most effective means of scientific wildlife management. They also

state that there is a surplus of animals in all species that must die so that a few can survive. Trapping merely helps to harvest this surplus. If the trapper did not, mother nature would do it through methods such as starvation and disease.

I would encourage everyone to be concerned with wildlife conservation but conservation means wise use and trappers are conservationists.

### Hospital Focus

#### Administration Explains Financial Situation

During the 1982 fiscal year, which runs from November 1, 1981 through October 31, 1982, the Rockcastle County Hospital lost \$265,630.48 from unpaid bills owed for medical services rendered.

It is for this reason that the hospital is forced to implement a new policy concerning the use of its Emergency Room. The policy will require that the Emergency Room be used only if the situation is a true emergency. The policy also states that payment is expected when a patient receives medical attention.

Most insurance companies now refuse to pay Emergency Room fees if the patient could have been treated at a doctor's office. This has increased the difficulty of obtaining payment. And payment is essential if the hospital is to continue with its emergency services.

In the past, the Emergency Room has been used as a shortcut to seeing a doctor. The patient should go to a doctor's office during its regular hours. Then if the doctor judges it to be an emergency situation, he will refer the patient to the Rockcastle County Hospital.

The administration wants to stress, however, that no one will ever be turned away from the Rockcastle County Hospital in a true emergency situation.

The Rockcastle County Hospital has had a cash flow problem due to third party payers. This is Title XVIII (Medicare) and Title XIX (Medicaid), Blue Cross and other insurance companies. As of January 1, 1983, the hospital had earned and billed these third party payers for \$1,052,625.52, of which \$432,000 is 120 days or older. All of these moneys are due and payable.

The hospital is working with these payers, hopefully that in the near future these cash flow problems will be resolved.

In the 1983 fiscal year the Rockcastle County Hospital will contribute 3.9 million dollars to the local economy. The hospital also has the second largest payroll in the county, second only to the school system.

The Rockcastle County Hospital is like any other business. To continue operation, it must receive payment for services rendered.

# 4-H News

Attention 4-H Leaders:  
It's Tax Time

Taxpayers who do not itemize their deductions may for the first time this year deduct certain out-of-pocket expenses incurred while doing volunteer work. 4-H work is included as a type of volunteer work which can be deducted since it is a non-profit organization and has IRS tax-deductible status.

In 1982 and 1983, 25 percent of the first \$100 in contributions may be deducted; in 1984, 25 percent of the first \$300; in 1985, 50 percent of the first \$300; and in 1986 and thereafter, 100 percent of the first \$300.

The following are representative types of expenditures that 4-H leaders and volunteers may wish to deduct.

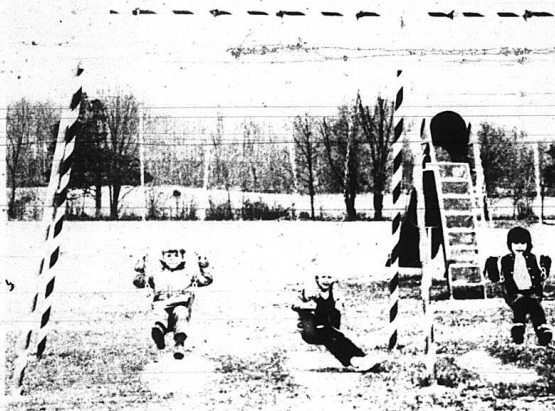
- direct gifts of money to 4-H.
- automobile mileage and expenses.
- parking and tolls.
- telephone bills.
- entertainment and meals given to 4-Hers.
- costs of meals and lodging, if away overnight.
- travel expenses above per diem allowance.
- The following may not be deducted:

- value of volunteer time donated.
- dependent care expenses.
- own meals (unless away overnight).
- own entertainment.

Automobile-related expenses may be deducted either at an .09 per mile standard rate or by keeping receipts and deducting the actual expenses. (There is currently a bill before the House sub-committee to raise the .09 amount.)

Items for which a 4-H leader or volunteer receives reimbursement may be deducted to the extent that actual expense exceeds the amount of compensation.

## New vehicle registration should eliminate lines

The new birth month vehicle registration should eliminate the long lines that form at county clerks' offices around Kentucky, but not until 1984.

This year Kentuckians will face the prospect of standing and waiting at the courthouse as they did last year.

The state's 120 county clerk's processed 474,000 registrations last February. That was more than a quarter of the year's total registrations.

"Next year that figure should be closer to 20,000 and the lines should not be long."

"The new registration system will bring some long-awaited relief to Kentucky's car owners," said Jim Helson, commissioner of the Department of Vehicle Regulation.

"But this year will be similar to last year. In fact, with the changes in the registration process, lines may move slower," Helson said.

His advice is simple. "Don't wait until the end of the month to renew the registration on your car."

The 1982 Kentucky General Assembly approved legislation that changes the registration process.

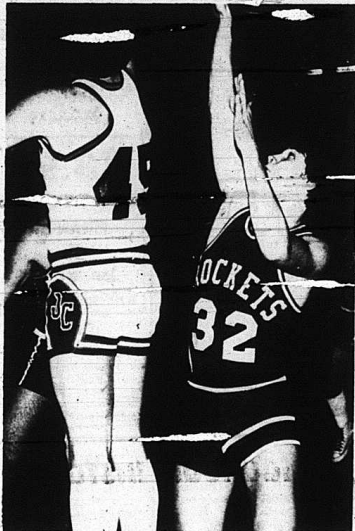

A Pie Supper will be held at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School lunchroom Saturday, February 27, 7 p.m.

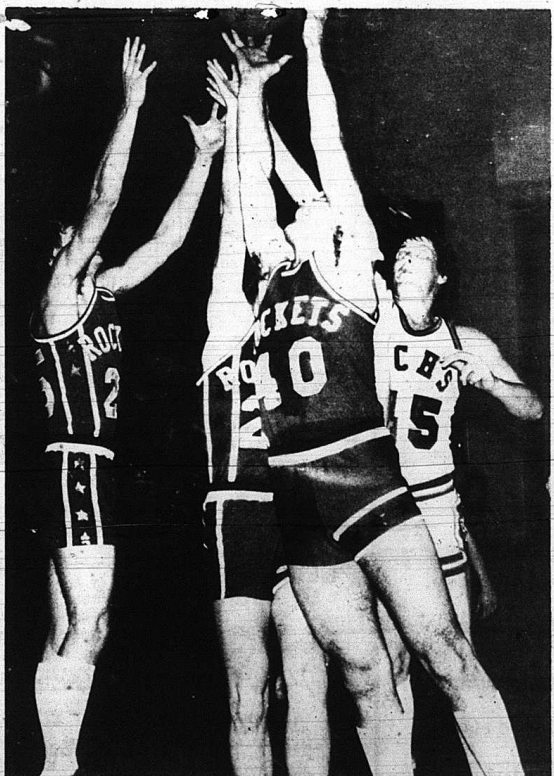
A "Prettiest Lady" and "Ugliest Man" contest will also be held with the winners each receiving a trophy. A door prize will be given.

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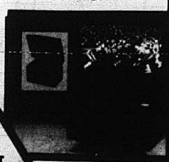

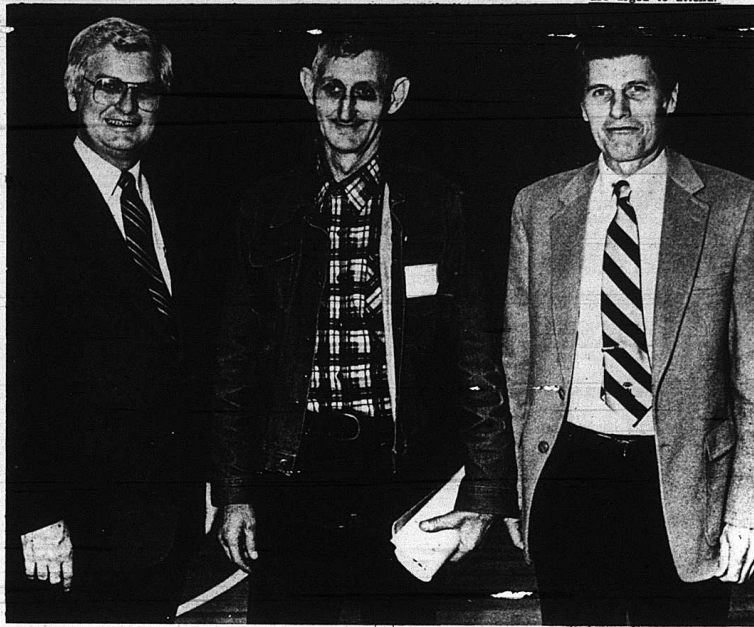

During the month of December 1982 the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

870 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations); 66 were D.U.I.s.

468 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 208 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc. A total of 224 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 1700 were property damage only accidents; 50 were personal injury accidents; there were four fatal accidents; 73 persons were injured and five persons were killed.

During the month of December, the KSP at London reports the following activity for Rockcastle County:

47 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations (including driving under the influence of intoxicants and moving hazardous violations); six were D.U.I.'s.

12 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty

equipment and different traffic violations; 26 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 24 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 17 were property damage only accidents; six were personal injury accidents; there was one fatal accident; nine persons were injured.

Sixteen criminal investigations were made resulting in 6 criminal arrests; 373 persons attended five safety programs conducted by the KSP.
