They even tricked Phyllis, one of their wives, into riding down the steep hill, and she ended up in a snow-bank.

My brother, Bluford Payne, who lives in Michigan, spent a month in California visiting son Robert and family. Now I hear he has been ill after returning home. So I have some remedies from the hills, which I couldn't get a doctor, which may help him (or anyone else) when used. Bone set tea will bring him out of the bed if he can survive the bitter taste and he should drink some sassafras tea every day to thin the blood. The water from soaked yellow-root will also give new life to a fellow.

Clear Creek offers it's deepest sympathy to Bro. Dillard Bowman and family because of the death of his 86 year old father, Hobart Bowman of Climax. A part of our life is over when we lose our parents. Someone who still have dependence on them as long as they are here. For comfort to us, using their experience in life, and just being around to put us first. Bro. Dillard will now know that loss of a father for it is so final.

Jane Donaville in California reads the Signal and she writes of how very homesick she got when she saw the hills. Cleve Payne going wild grape hunting in Clear Creek hills the past fall.

"I used to be part of a group who climbed hills and trees there. Time does not wash away memories I have of long ago.

Ronald and Ann Swinford of Berea were driving up Clear Creek the past week to check on winter out here. They visit their second home, Swinford Farms on Upper Clear Creek where they spend a large part of the summer months.

Ronald and Ann are not like Cleve Payne who says he's going to stay "hole up" until the poke salad season comes round.

Some time ago I wrote of visiting Nannie Chasteen Shearer who lives near Berea. She was the daughter of old timer Jim Chasteen, who raised a large family on the Chasteen Hill overlooking Clear Creek. Nan told me she will be 94 years of age on February 24th which is a long part of a century ago. Nan is still active and alert after early hardships in life. I would like to ask of you who know her (and any others) to join me in sending her a birthday card which would please this little woman. She has spent much time alone in recent

years. Her address is Route 1, Paint Lick, Ky. 40461. Early History of Clear Creek

Verda Shearer of Shearer Hollow, now living in Berea, tells me a lot of historical facts about Clear Creek.

I had learned last summer that there was an old graveyard on the land in Upper Clear Creek once owned by the Albert Hart family. Myra Hart, whose husband Charlie also owned the land at one time, assured me it was there but much overgrown.

But for going back past that time, Verda told me that was where her family first settled and the graveyard held a lot of her folks.

Before the Civil War, pioneer Sylvester Shearer moved westward with his family from Virginia, finally settling on the land in Upper Clear Creek.

He had four boys in the family named William, Willis, John and Tom. When the war broke out, all four sons took part in it.

There was no time for much training but the government sent an army officer into the community to teach the men some commands. He drilled the men down Clear Creek Road to where the old post office of Disputanta now stands then it was back up to the head of the creek. They finally learned enough to do battle.

Old timer, Preacher Lewis Rowlett, in later years told Verda he was in the group who had been drilled to get ready for battle. All of the men were on the Union side and soon went south to join in the battle of Chickamauga.

Willis was shot in the hand, then walked for two weeks to Atlanta to have the ball removed. After he returned, all the medication he received before they operated on his hand was a big drink of whiskey.

John was shot in battle also and started the same route. He had little to eat and no medicine, he did not make it but died in an old church house near the battle site.

care of the horses for the battery. He was captured along with brother Tom and landed in Andersonville Prison, the death trap of the Confederate Army. At war's end, after much suffering, the brother's returned home.

During one period of the war, it is told, the father-of-the-boys, Sylvester, was plowing in the fields far up Clear Creek region. He heard news that some soldiers in the Con-

federate Army were making members in the Old State Road near Big Hill. All the old farmers nearby got their guns and ambushed the soldiers along the way.

Sylvester Shearer was buried there on the homeplace with other family members in their time. Eventually, the family scattered elsewhere.

Verd's grandfather, William, died in Mississippi and was brought to Richmond for burial. His

son Bill (or W.S.) Shearer settled in what became Shearer Hollow off Davis Branch Road after marrying a descendant of pioneer Isaac Davis, who came early into this region. She was Mary Davis.

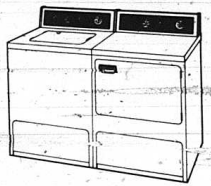

## Business group grants money for pager needed by ambulance

The Mt. Vernon Business and Professional Association met Tuesday and agreed to purchase a pager for the Rockcastle Ambulance Service.

Present at the meeting to explain the need for the pager was Mike Barr, director of the service. Barr said that by laying off about half of the ambulance employees and hiring someone to coordinate collections, the ambulance had been able to make payroll and pay its bills during the first six weeks of the hospital's administering of a county subsidy for a 90 day period beginning January 1, 1983.

Barr said by using people from the hospital more than ever to help, having only one ambulance worker on duty at all times and by raising the collection rate from about 18% to about 80%, the service was barely making ends meet.

This arrangement, however, he said depends upon an ambulance worker, having to be by the phone at home for as many as 16 hours at a time and being only \$81.00 an hour. The pagers, in this case, are needed to allow the worker more flexibility while on call, especially since they are being paid such a minimum, he said.

Barr said the community needs to be aware of the critical situation the ambulance service is in and try to be as understanding as possible.

He said in cases of true emergency, hospital personnel travel in the ambulance which is dispatched immediately, however, in cases which are life threatening, the ambulance may be delayed as much as 5 minutes until the person on call arrives.

The Mt. Vernon Lions Club and the Ashland Lodge each also have donated the \$260 needed to purchase a pager for the ambulance service.

## Architects and engineers reveal plans for downtown revitalization project

Architects working for Proctor Davis Ray, the consulting engineer firm for Mt. Vernon's Downtown Revitalization Plan told members of the City Council and the Local Development Corporation Monday night that the architectural fabric of the building downtown is still intact and of fine quality and from a historical viewpoint the original character and charm has not been modified.

What this means, reported Morgan McAlwain and John Whitney, is that downtown has good potential for renovation. They told the audience rather than trying to imitate large discount stores and shopping centers with regard to modern merchandising, merchants might take advantage of the comfortable, traditional charm and improve upon that aspect.

Among the recommendations made by the firm was street-tree planting along community routes and through the town. McAlwain said trees would tend to tie downtown together in a unified look and provide a pleasant atmosphere. Theoretically, they would be planted 35-40 feet apart in brick planters. They also recommended brick sidewalks and possibly brick paving for Main Street.

Streets lighting with a more traditional look and placed lower to the street and the pedestrian, therefore, giving a warmer feeling, was also recommended.

New street furniture, along with special treatment given to at least three and possibly four public areas was mentioned as improving the

**Renovating Grass Fields**  
 Why renovate grass fields? There are several reasons why pasture and hay fields which have a good stand of grass should be renovated. The primary ground cover in most of Kentucky's acreage are cool season grasses, such as tall fescue, orchard grass, bluegrass and timothy. By adding legumes to grasses, there is an increase in the quality of feed produced, legumes increase the summer production and legumes take nitrogen from the air.

In Kentucky, productive alfalfa stands can fix 200 to 300 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year. Red clover can fix 100-200 pounds, ladino clover 100-150 pounds, vetch, Korean lespedeza and other annual forage legumes can fix 75-150 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year. This is possible because of bacteria on properly inoculated seed which infect the roots of legume plants to form small knots or nodules on the plant roots. Properly managed legume plants supply energy to the bacteria and they use this energy to change the form of nitrogen taken from the air to one which the legume plants can use.

Legumes improve quality by their positive effect on palatability, intake, digestibility, protein and mineral content. A beneficial effect is also found on companion grasses which increase their yield by taking advantage of the nitrogen produced by legumes. We also find that most of the growth of cool season grasses occur during the first one-third of the growing season. Since legumes make more growth during

the summer months, legume grass mixtures improve the seasonal distribution of pasture and hay crop production over that of grass alone.

Moisture and temperature are two important factors in establishing legumes in old grass sods. In the long run, early spring clover seedings (mid-February through March) are more likely to be successful than late spring or late summer seedings. Some keys to a successful renovation are:

1. Graze or mow the grass close, prior to renovating. This will let tillage tools get into the sod more easily. Don't plant legume seed into tall grass. The grass shades legume seedlings and reduces their growth.

2. Test the soil and apply needed lime, phosphate and potash.

3. Disturb 40 to 60 percent of the grass for sowing clover, 80 to 100 percent for alfalfa. This tillage helps control grass growth and opens the sod so that legumes will have a better chance to germinate and live.

4. A disk, field cultivator, or field tiller will do a good job. A once-over renovation seeder can be used to eliminate the need for tillage which disturbs the sod. Broadcast seedings of lespedeza, white clover or red clover made on top of the ground will often result in good legume stands if seedings are made in late February. The grass is extremely short, and proper fertility is supplied.

5. Sow certified seed of adapted legumes at the rate recommended for seeding alone. Just before seeding, inoculate seed with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria. Be sure that some inoculum is stuck to all seeds. Renovated fields should

leases from the City for meetings. McFerron said there is nothing in the building, but vandals keep breaking out windows and turning the heat up.

The council granted permission and Mayor Mullins asked Matt Powell, water superintendent, to work with the club on the matter.

In other business, the governing body agreed to let stand an ordinance dealing with private boat docks and ramps on Lake Linville and wanted Mullins to sign the contract with Western Water District.

The council also voted to donate \$20 from Coke machine receipts to the Council for the Arts to help match grant funds received. The request was in the form of a letter from Martha Cox, Arts Council treasurer.

An agreement was also reached, near the close of the meeting, to make the present parking space in front of the post office a "no parking" zone. The space now has a 12-minute limit. However, several councilmen felt this was being abused and want citizens to have drive-up and drop-in access to the outside mail receptacle.

The "no parking" space is to be painted yellow and enforced.

Seeds kept grazed short until the livestock begin biting off the young legumes. At that time remove the livestock and allow clover (4-6 weeks) and alfalfa (8-10 weeks) to become established. Thereafter, mow and/or graze the field to best suit the particular legume that was planted.

If a once-over renovator is used to till, plant tile legume seed and press the seed into firm soil, special attention must be given to grass management. After planting legumes, the grass should be kept grazed or mowed very closely to control grass competition. When the animals begin grazing the legumes, remove them and permit the legumes to become established. The newly seeded field cannot be properly grazed or clipped. Paraquat may be used to aid in grass suppression. Apply paraquat at the rate of 0.5 lbs. of active ingredient per acre in bands over the

On Tuesday night the boys' varsity traveled to Lynn Camp and came away with a disappointing 60-58 loss.

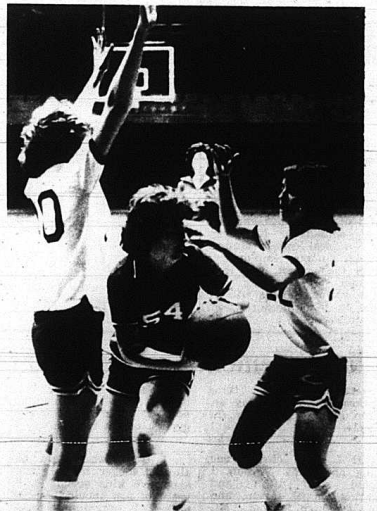

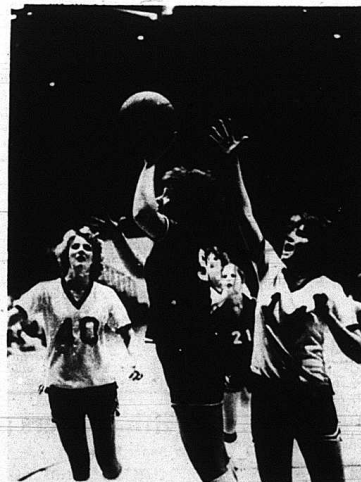

## Swimming pool for Feltner 4-H Camp is a project of area counties

4-H'ers and other visitors to the J.M. Feltner 4-H Camp—next summer will enjoy a welcome new attraction—a swimming pool.

2,000 4-H'ers encamped there approximately \$200,000 needed to build a pool at the 4-H camp in Laurel County, is now underway.

Danny McKinney, office manager of PCA, will head local efforts to support the swimming pool project.

The camp has been without swimming facilities for several years following a health department ban on swimming in the camp lake. Since then, campers have had to travel to nearby Levi Jackson State Park to swim.

That arrangement required all 200-plus campers to swim at one time, either in the morning or evening, which resulted in a crowded pool and precluded instruction for youngsters who cannot swim.

With a 20-25 minute walk each way to swim, campers lost time that could be used for classes.

Volunteers also had to cross a state highway to get to the park, and although they were supervised closely, the trip meant less-than-safe conditions.

For many campers from Rockcastle and other counties, the swimming program at the camp provides the first experience in swimming instruction or of being in a swimming pool.

The pride and sense of accomplishment achieved through learning to swim or simply overcoming a

fear of water, often can supply the boost to a 4-H'er ego when encountering other things.

The Feltner Camp serves 20 counties with 4-H'ers each summer. Rockcastle County alone had 79 4-H'ers camp at Feltner camp last summer.

Thousands of residents from nearby communities also use the camp each year for family reunions and gatherings held by churches, schools and business organizations.

Plans call for a 4,000 foot pool from 3 to 5 feet deep with a 9-foot deep diving well, fencing and a bath house at a total cost of \$180,000 to \$204,000, according to engineering estimates.

Each of the twenty counties have been assigned a given quota to fill for the fund drive by the Area Pool Committee. Variables from county served the quota included county population, assessment, per capita income and when the county served 4-H campers and distance from camp. Rockcastle County's quota is \$10,200.

The swimming pool project is being coordinated by the J.M. Feltner Organization, a non-profit organization with representatives from 20 counties served by the camp. For more information about how you can become involved in the local fund raising efforts, contact Danny McKinney, or Martha Brown, county extension agent for 4-H at the county extension office.

The month is being designated to recognize the work of the state's potato producers. Approximately 20 Kentucky growers raised 2,000 acres or 45 million pounds of potatoes last year. This contributed greatly to the national potato harvest of 35 billion pounds.

Kentucky-produced potatoes make their way to the fresh produce markets or are used by potato chip manufacturers in the state, Barkley said.

In the proclamation, Barkley noted that potatoes help consumers prepare nutritious, low-cost meals. The Commissioner encourages Kentuckians to participate in the month's celebration by using potatoes often in their menus.

### Demon Possession

A bite was taken out of a sandwich which the lady of the house was preparing. Both the husband and wife claimed to have experienced physical torture by demons. After fourteen sessions lasting over a period of twenty-nine days, the priest announced the family's "triumph over Satanic forces." This makes good news copy and the priest and the family involved may have been sincere, but their activities do not square with Holy Writ. The phenomenon of demon possession was fact when Jesus was upon the earth. The exact time of their origin is not known, but it was seen-

ingly a power that Satan had gained after his fall. But why was demon possession allowed during the New Testament age? The casting out of demons was a sign to identify God's spokesmen (Mt. 12:28; Matt. 10:1, 8). Their ability to cast out devils proved the Divine Sonship of Christ. 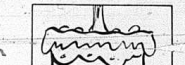

### Social services

#### work to satisfy patient needs at the local hospital

There are many facets to the Social Services Department at the Rockcastle County Hospital. And often, unfamiliar terms and phrases can be confusing if you are having to deal with this department for the first time, as a patient or a family member.

Serena Stratton, Director of Social Services at RCH, explained how the department benefits the public. "Some of my responsibilities include discharge planning and placements on our Acute Facility, and admissions and discharges for our Skilled Facility. I have to do referrals to our Skilled Facility and placements for patients who are at a lower level of care. I'm also responsible for planning and carrying out recreational activities for SNF."

She is involved with both the Acute Facility and Skilled Nursing Facility. "Acute has to have discharge planning on all the patients that are admitted into the hospital and this is my responsibility," said Mrs. Stratton. "On a Skilled I work with every admission and discharge to find a suitable placement in the proper facility. I also do financial assistance for Acute and Skilled patients and outpatients."

What can patients and family members expect when they go through the

Skilled admittance process? "I interview each Skilled patient or their responsible family member. I have a folder that must be filled out on each patient and by doing this we can better foresee problems that could arise for the patient in placement needs."

The Social Services Department contributes to the quality of care that patients receive at the Rockcastle County Hospital. Mrs. Stratton said, "By having direct contact with the patients and the family, I can better assist them with any problems that they may have during their stay at the hospital. I can help to make them more comfortable and assist them in a placement that would best suit them."

Her job requires that she work closely with other hospitals and health care facilities in the state. "We take referrals to our Skilled Nursing Facility from outside hospitals and other Skilled, intermediate and personal facilities. When discharging patients to a lower level of care, I deal directly with area nursing homes. When persons come in on an out-patient basis I often work with other facilities arranging for them to be transferred to a place that would better meet their needs."

What does she enjoy most about her job? "The most rewarding part of my job would be working with the people on a direct basis," said Mrs. Stratton. "I enjoy people and I like to think that I can do something to help them. You know, one spare minute of your time that we spend with these people, can make their day."

Mrs. Stratton gave the definition for several terms that patients and family members find most confusing. Perhaps these will simplify for you a possible experience with the Social Services Department in the future.

Discharge Planning—assisting the doctor and family in proper placement for a patient.

Referrals—When the social worker contacts other health care facilities to arrange a patient's transfer to or from our facility.

Medicaid-medical assistance from the state and federal governments for low income persons.

Medicare-financial assistance for elderly or disabled persons.

Acute Care—when a patient requires 24-hour a day nursing care and medical attention. The care is usually short-term and is provided until the patient is stabilized.

As of last November 1, rates are based on yields on other Treasury securities and are recomputed every six months, Stevens explains. "When yields on Treasury securities rise, returns on savings bonds rise. When rates fall, the return falls but never below 7.5 percent over the life of the bond."

Investors must keep bonds for at least five years to receive these benefits. If bonds are cashed in earlier, you will earn a

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fixed yield, rising from 5.5 percent after one year to 7.25 percent after four and one-half years. These variable rates are also allowed on old bonds which do not mature before November, 1987 and which are not redeemed before that date. Schedules of maturity dates on bonds purchased in previous years may be obtained at banks.

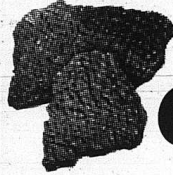
