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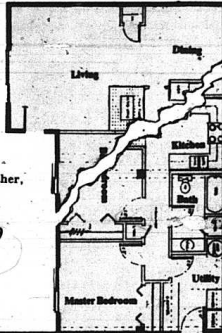

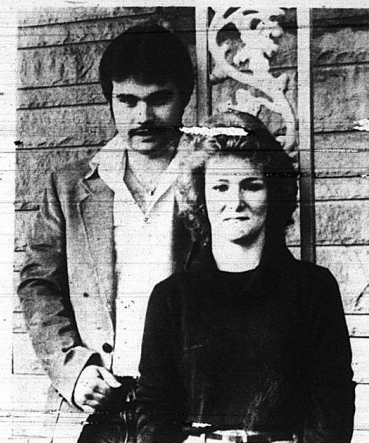

Choose Your Tax Preparer Carefully

The income tax deadline may seem far away, but it is a good idea to give some thought now about who will fill out your tax return.

Nearly 40 percent of U.S. taxpayers pay someone else to fill out their tax forms. If you go this route, you still are responsible for ensuring the forms are prepared correctly. Shop around to find the best preparer for you. Quality and price of tax preparation services can vary greatly.

The IRS may be able to help you. Their free resources include a toll-free...

Consider the various types of tax preparers available when selecting professional help. These include:

- + An enrolled agent who is certified by the IRS after working five years as an IRS auditor or after passing a government exam. Enrolled agents are authorized to represent you before the IRS.
- + A certified public accountant who has passed a professional qualifying exam. CPAs are also authorized to represent you before the IRS. A public accountant may have special accounting training, but lacks certification and cannot represent you at an IRS audit.

Remember that you can get free tax assistance from the National Retired Teachers' Association and the American Association of Retired Persons. To find out how, write, Tax-Aide, NRTA-AAARP, 1909 K Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20049.

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+ An attorney who has passed a bar exam and has special tax training. Attorneys are authorized to represent you before the IRS.

+ Any other individual described as a tax preparer may have special tax training or experience.

Picking a Preparer

To find the best preparer for your needs, call several and ask these important questions:

- *What is your training or experience in preparing tax returns? The more complex your situation, the more you wish the advice of someone with special experience. However, you may be charged more for the advice of these professionals. Many taxpayers, such as retired people, owners of small businesses, professionals, and people with large amounts of income from sources other than salaries, wages and tips, may especially benefit from using a preparer with specific experience in their area.
- *How do you check for accuracy? Does someone else double check returns? If so, are they reviewed for arithmetic errors only, or also for errors in tax law interpretation?
- *Approximately how much will preparing my taxes cost? How is the fee determined?
- *Where can you be reached later in the year, if I need help with an audit?
- *Can you advise my return? What will you charge?

Farm and Home News

Spray School and Recertification Set For February 28th

In 1977 and 1978, many farmers, homeowners and farm supply dealers prepared for the Kentucky Pesticide Use and Application attending Pesticide Certification meetings. This act insures that persons applying restricted use pesticides will attend educational meetings to become aware of safety practices and application methods.

As we reflect on these meetings, a number of people have been trained in pesticide application and safety. However, the restricted use pesticide list contains only four chemicals commonly used by local farmers. Paraquat, Furadan, Bromace (in 4% pound cans) are the restricted use pesticides. At the present time, methyl bromide can be purchased in one pound cans and may be purchased without being certified. Only farmers that use or plan to use restricted use pesticides are to keep their pesticide cards current.

To keep cards up to date, the law requires that five years after the expiration, a recertification must be obtained. All cards issued in 1977 and 1978 will expire in 1983. For those wishing to continue certification, a spray school will be held Monday, February 28th at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building of the high school. Parking will be available in the football field and entrance will be through the Agriculture shop.

This year's program will be different from the original certification meetings. Our topics will

deal mainly with spray equipment, calibration, pesticide recommendations. All material will be useful to farmers who do not plan to use restricted pesticides as well as those that do. So anyone using sprays and spray equipment on their farm are encouraged to attend. This will be the only certification program available in 1983.

STATE LEGISLATURE

The Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee unceremoniously registered its disapproval of an \$86,500 Commerce Cabinet contract on February the 8th.

The questionable contract, according to Commerce officials, will establish a representative office in Tokyo, Japan and administer a series of programs to promote Kentucky's products for export to Asia and to identify and work with industrial investment prospects in Asia.

The Commerce official also said the \$86,000 would be used for salaries, travel and miscellaneous expenses, consumption, a reception and office opening ceremonies and to beef up their work in Hatture (as it translated to Japanese).

According to the Commerce cabinet once again, the office will promote economic development opportunities in Japan, Hon Kong, Taiwan and Australia.

The \$86,500 contract is set to run for five months or \$17,300 per month. The subcommittee members asked the Commerce office how much the contract would cost to operate for all of next year.

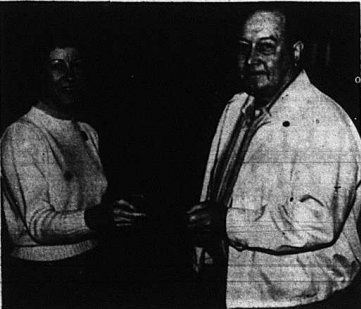

Williams was formally charged with murder by complicity in assisting another and for aiding and abetting in a robbery.

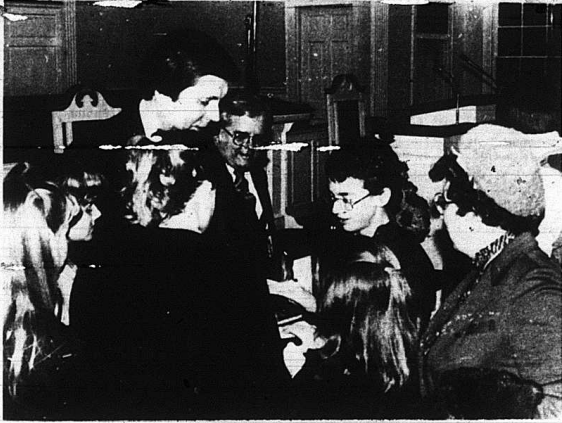
She remains in Rockcastle County Jail under \$75,000 cash bond.

The directors then met Tuesday night and elected officers. Named as president was Shelley Mullins; vice president, Donald Thompson; secretary, Frankie Bullock and treasurer, Henry Brown. Other directors are, Wilse Noe, Wayne Adams, Steve Bullen, Carl Miller, Blain McFarquie, Roland Tankersly, William McClure and Cloyd Bowl-

ing. After the verification, members nominated a total of 24 candidates. Each member could vote for 12 persons to serve as directors. The three lawyers attending the meeting, Gillum, Frazer and Prather counted the votes with assistance from Frankie Bullock and Wallace Proctor.

The twelve directors elected Monday night were the same twelve persons named to fill the positions at a meeting held early in December.

Judge Dan Venters announces candidacy for Circuit Judge

District Judge Daniel J. Venters announced to the people of Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties last Thursday in Somerset that he would be a candidate for election to the Office of Circuit Judge this year. He said that in making this announcement that it would

a cook in a restaurant and as a driver's education instructor.

He married Michele when he was a senior in college. She is also from Kentucky. Venters attended law school at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, where he worked in the law school library as a law clerk for a Lexington law firm, and for the Kentucky Attorney General's office.

While in law school, he met Harold Rogers, who was then the Commonwealth Attorney for this district. He and his wife wanted to settle in this part of the state. Rogers brought them to Somerset, giving Venters his first job as a lawyer in his law practice. They now live on a small farm near Science Hill. They have three children: Joey is nine; Andrew is six and Emily is four.

Venters went on to say that he has faithfully served the people of Pulaski and Rockcastle counties. First as the Assistant Commonwealth Attorney from 1975 to 1979. During that time, he tried more cases in Circuit Court than any other lawyer. As District Court Judge, he continued to serve the people of Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties. The people elected him twice to that office. As District Judge, he heard over 13,000 cases—more than any judge of this district in recent history.

Venters stated in his announcement speech that he knew the victims of crime, those whose homes and businesses have been violated by burglars and thieves; those whose loved ones have been harmed by murderers, thugs and rapists.

He said he knew abused and neglected children, and the families torn apart by the devastating effects of alcohol and drugs.

"I know the small businessman, the farmer, the consumer," he said. He said that he knew these people because he had heard them in his courtroom, in his office and in his home.

Venters continued on saying that he knew the people and the problems of this district and that he felt he could better serve the people as Circuit Judge.

Biographical Information

Judge Daniel J. Venters was born in West Virginia on April 13, 1950. He is the son of Joseph C. Venters, Jr. and Mary Brand Venters, who now reside in Huntington, West Virginia. He has three sisters.

Education

Venters graduated from Grove High School in Grove City, Ohio. In 1972, he received a bachelor of science degree from the Ohio State University, where he majored in Economics.

He attended law school at the University of Kentucky College of Law where he received his Juris Doctorate in 1975. He is licensed to practice law in Kentucky and in the Federal Courts.

Judge Venters has completed advanced training for judges at the National Judicial College in 1979 and in 1981.

Work Experience

Gainfully employed since the age of 18, Judge Venters has worked as a

gas station attendant, restaurant cook, and janitor. To pay his college expenses, he worked as a laborer in a tool factory, operated machinery in a steel plant, and worked as a welder in a factory manufacturing air filtering systems. He also worked as a driving instructor for the American Automobile Association.

Legal Career

While a student in law school at the University of Kentucky, Judge Venters was employed in the school library. He worked as a law clerk for a Lexington law firm, and also for the Kentucky Attorney General's Office. He practiced as a legal intern for the Fayette County Commonwealth's Attorney. From 1975 to 1979, Dan Venters was the Assistant Commonwealth Attorney for Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties. He was Hal Rogers' law partner from 1975 until he became District Judge in 1979.

Dan has served the people of Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties as District Judge since 1979 and has served as the Chief District Judge since 1981.

Schools threatened with closing earlier in week due to 13% absenteeism

The flu epidemic that has caused some school systems in the state to close is suspected of affecting this week's attendance drop in county schools.

Normally the absentee rate runs around 7%, according to pupil personnel director Garland Cummins. This week, however, the rate has almost doubled. Elementary schools seem not to be affected to the degree the high school has been, Cummins said. There were 24 absent at the high school Tuesday out of an enrollment of over 900, but the absentee rate county-wide was 13.8%. Cummins said as long as the percent did not drop below 15% school officials would not consider closing.

Wednesday, attendance was improved over the first two days of the week and school officials were confident that the threat of school closing was waning.

Local doctors say they are seeing a wide spectrum of flu and viral symptoms which one doctor referred to as the "flu syndrome." None of the doctors felt we were yet in the full throes of a flu epidemic.

Attorney John G. Prater of Somerset, who represents the group of disgruntled members wanting to gain control of the organization and spearheaded by Shelley Mullins, said Monday that the two opposing forces had agreed upon the date set for the meeting from a choice of dates set forth by Circuit Judge John Mandt. Both sides in the controversy also agreed to the naming of James Frazer of Monticello as moderator for the meeting.

Robert E. Gillum of Somerset served as counsel for the group of incumbent directors of which Wallace Proctor had served as president.

The first order of business at the meeting, which lasted about three hours, was to certify each voter. Persons indicating a desire to vote were checked against a computer print-out

improperly advertised meetings, court orders, injunctions, directors who were not recognized by the state organization and authority to keep the membership office open all which have plagued the organization for months.

An order issued by Judge Mandt requires the new directors, within the 10 days following their election, to appoint an auditor who will give an official report.

According to Shelley Mullins, the new group of directors will be concerned with "getting on with the business and trying to establish trust and confidence in the Farm Bureau organization." He said there has been a lot of confusion concerning membership cards and second notices for paid dues which he pledges to clear up.

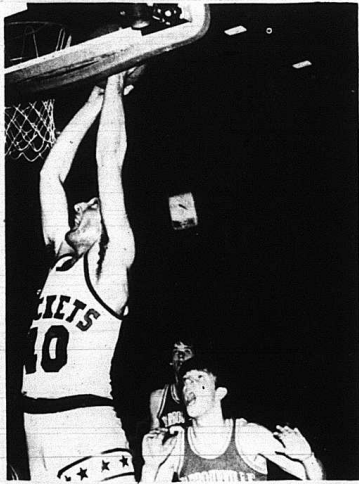

Oscar Hayes

Christopher Oscar Hayes, 73, of Conway, died Wednesday, February 2, 1993 at Good Samaritan Hospital in Lexington.

He was born on March 18, 1920, the only son of the late James H. Hayward and Evaline Hayes, in the Hayes ancestral home at Conway where he lived with his parents and paternal grandparents, William Merida Hayes and Mary Wood Hayes. His maternal grandparents were James Hamilton Hayes and Matilda Fish Hayes.

When Oscar was about nine years old, his parents moved to a farm at Fairview where they lived for about five years and then sold the farm and moved to a large farm near Lincoln, Nebraska. None of the family was very happy at this location and after about six months they returned to the ancestral home at Conway, where they reaped the old store that was formerly operated by Oscar's grandfather.
