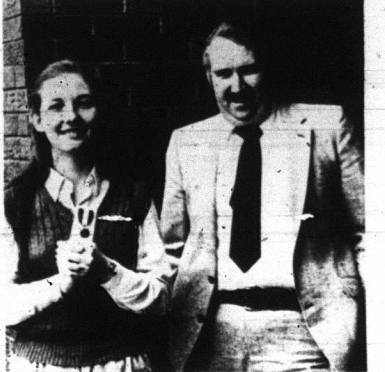

## FARM AND HOME NEWS

### SOIL TESTING

What is soil testing? Soil testing is a scientific analysis of the cropping potential. In other words, measuring the approximate amount of soil nutrients. We say approximate because only a small portion of soil is analyzed and must represent a vast amount of soil throughout the field. This, however, is still a much more reliable way of making fertilizer recommendations than seeing if good or bad, needs no fertilizer or a whole lot.

Since different fields and areas within the same field frequently vary in their availability of plant nutrients for crops, soil samples must be taken to represent these different areas. If an area can be limed and fertilized as a separate field then several samples should be taken to represent as many different types of land as are present.

Special soil tests are required. A soil probe or spad along with a clean bucket are all you need. Once the field to be tested is chosen, start at one corner and walk from one side to the other in a zig-zag pattern taking samples as you work your way to the other end. Take samples from soil within the plow layer. Depending upon the size of the field, samples at 15-25 locations are adequate. Larger fields will require more samples. After enough samples

have been taken to represent the chosen field, mix the collected soil thoroughly. Air dry about one quart and bring this into the extension office. The cost is only \$2.25 which is much less than the cost of a bag of fertilizer. Looking over last year's tobacco samples, we find that 50 to 60% of the farmers actually saved by applying less fertilizer. On the other hand 20-25% needed more than normal applications to meet the crop's needs.

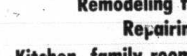

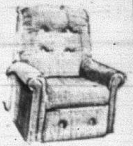

## Mt. Vernon is remembered in book by former resident

The following was taken from a book recently written by Cepha Davis Kincaid of Erlanger, Ky., formerly of Mt. Vernon. The book, entitled simply, "Mt. Vernon, Kentucky" is full of names and locations familiar to Mt. Vernon several years ago.

We chose to include the personal recollections of the Signal and its operation, by the author whose father once owned the paper because it struck some familiar chords here.

My father, William Thomas, "Bill" Davis, worked off and on for about forty years for different owners of the county newspaper, The Mount Vernon Signal. When Attorney W.H.W. Reynolds of Stanford was owner, my father was editor and foreman; my sister Amanda was secretary and reporter; and I started working after school and on Saturdays and holidays as office devil. Office devil was the term given a beginner, whose job was to clean up typed type or type that had been spilled, and had to be replaced in a case. Each letter was placed in a composing stick and distributed in their own individual box where they could be used again by the typesetter. My father took a case of type home to teach us. There were some old cases of ancient looking type which I helped clean and sort. These cases had probably been there for many years. I later became reporter, typesetter for the newspaper, and also for job work; proofreader, that is finding and correcting typographical errors; and learned to manipulate the job press, the large paper press, the folder and the paper cutter. There was also the seemingly small but important task of setting up and stamping subscribers names and addresses on wrappers for each copy sent out.

The Signal was purchased by my father from Mr. Reynolds in 1927. He also had in the Signal office a large display case having various kinds of guns, knives, Barlows and others, powder horns, snake skins and a beautiful English dagger with the crown engraved on it. He also had a pair of forceps,

which his father had carried in his doctor case. My father would sometimes compete with Dr. John D. Henderson, our dentist, by pulling the teeth of small boys when they would come in to the office. He would simply stop his work as editor and extract their teeth.

There are so many memories and so much to tell about the years spent working in the Signal, it is difficult to decide just what to relate and what to omit. The county newspaper rarely failed to make its weekly appearance at the post office. Even through the depression years it was distributed around town, county and many states. Thursday of every week was publication day, the same it is today.

Jim Hansel worked there at one time as did Charlie French and Boone Cummins. Mr. Jim Pinkerton worked there for years. He just wandered into town in a covered truck with a sign on it which read "Pink's Studio". He was a sign painter and his paintings helped to make him a genius in designing ads, letterheads, etc. I remember he and my father experimenting with used metal and old type that was melted in a large dipper with a long handle. This was inserted in the door of the large tall stove that had been the building's heating system for years. They made some of their own cuts or casts for the newspaper ads from this melted type. Mr. Pinkerton claimed to be connected with the famous Pinkerton Detective Agency. Mr. William Tyree was a very efficient ad man in the Signal office at one time.

During the Depression years the staff was made up of Mr. Pinkerton, compositor of ads, circulars, cards, etc.; my sister Lella, as reporter and secretary; and my sister Amanda and me, who were typesetters. My youngest sister, Elizabeth, helped at home and in the office on publication day. She often drove my father to Livingston and Broadhead on business.

Publication day was really a busy day and oftentimes a trying one especially.

## Improvement Council grants to the Arts

## Winter weather wasn't too bad

Only a trace of snow was seen in January, usually the month to expect the worst winter weather. In December, there was only an inch and a half and in February 3/4 inches of snow fell, according to Bud Cox, who records Rockcastle's weather for the National Weather Service.

The low temperature of the winter, 2 degrees, was on January 19 and the high, 78 degrees, was on December 3rd. School children stayed home because of slick roads only 5 days during the past winter. The figure is less than half the average days missed during the three most recent winters, and far lower than the 26, 39 and 35 "snow days" of school years '78-'79, '77-'78 and '76-'77, respectively.

During the three month period, there were 22 days when the temperature did not drop below the 32 degree freezing mark during the twenty-four hour period.

March certainly came in "like a lamb" with temperatures reaching 79 degrees last week. Hopefully, it will go out as peacefully.

## Four month "sting" operation to net car theft ring leads to the arrest of local

A four month investigation by the Kentucky State Police Posts at London, Harlan and the K.S.P. Auto Theft Unit came to a close, Tuesday, March 1, with raids being conducted at five suspected "Chop Shops" in Laurel and Knox Counties and numerous persons being arrested on related charges.

The investigation, which netted police the recovery of 29 stolen vehicles from Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana, valued at more than \$250,000, was the result of an undercover "sting" like operation conducted by Sergeant Allen Scharf and Trooper Roy Wheat of the London Post and Detective Joe Gossett of the KSP Auto Theft Unit. During the four month investigation, the undercover officers bought the stolen vehicles from several persons in the two county area and stored them in a garage near London. As the investigation, which began in November of 1982, progressed the officers were able to identify several persons involved in the thefts of the vehicles and were able to identify the locations where the vehicles were being brought to.

Approximately 30 officers from the Harlan and London Posts, along with detectives from the Auto Theft Unit and the National Auto Theft Bureau, conducted the March 1 raids.

## Somerset attorney announces candidacy for state senate

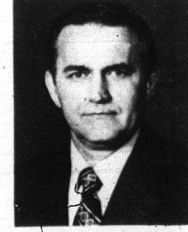
Dean Stewart, an attorney from Somerset announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for State Senator of Kentucky's 15th Senatorial District last week.

## Shake Your Salt Habit

During National Nutrition Month in March, the Cooperative Extension Service and the Kentucky Dietetic Association are urging Kentuckians to "Say Yes to Less" ... less fat, sugar, salt and calories.

Why less salt? Salt is such a popular food additive that it is second only to sugar in the amount added to food each year. Salt provides most of the sodium in our diet. Sodium is important to health but the body needs very little.

High sodium intake is one of the several factors believed to contribute to high blood pressure. Health experts estimate that 10-20 percent of Kentuckians have high blood pressure or are borderline hypertensive. Thus, between 37,000-74,000 residents of our state have a high blood pressure problem. Some people, particularly those with a family history of high blood pressure, are more apt to develop this condition.

Americans consume three to four times the recommended amount of sodium each day. There is consensus among the American Medical Association, the National Institute of Health and the U.S. Department of Agriculture that the American public should moderate sodium intake.

Some ways to moderate sodium intake are:

- Avoid or use smaller quantities of foods high in sodium. These include salted, smoked or cured meats, canned fish and canned meats, pickles and sauerkraut, processed cheeses and cheese foods, sauces and condiments, salted snacks and canned soups, instant soups and packaged broths.

- Use more fresh or plain frozen vegetables, since canned or seasoned frozen vegetables may have salt added.

- Frequently include fruit and fruit juices.
- Read labels on cans and packages for sodium and salt and choose foods with less sodium.

- Use less salt in cooking; experiment with herbs and spices to replace some of the salt.
- Use the salt shaker sparingly.

**Eating Out**

Reducing the amount of salt in foods prepared at home takes care of only part of the problem. Fast food restaurants, school lunch rooms, restaurants and cafeterias account for

about one-third out of four consumed in America. Consuming less salt in eating out can be a challenge because choices are limited.

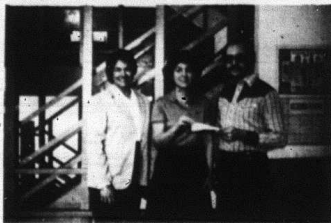
Generally speaking, sauces and dressings tend to be high in salt. So one way to moderate salt intake is to order plain entrees and ask for the sauce in a separate dish. That way you can control how much goes on your main dish. The same strategy works for salads and salad dressings.

Hamburgers and French fries at fast food restaurants are liberally salted. Order a plain hamburger and dress it with limited amounts of seasonings and condiments. Request unsalted French fries and add a controlled amount of salt if desired. Remember, that these and pickles are high

in salt. You may have to avoid restaurants that use a lot of soy sauce and monosodium glutamate in their cooking if you are attempting to reduce your intake of salt.

**Salt Substitutes**

A variety of salt substitutes are available on grocery shelves. Potassium chloride is the main ingredient in most salt substitutes. Other chemicals are added to enhance flavor, modify the bitterness that potassium chloride and half potassium chloride and referred to as lite. Normal healthy people can use salt substitutes with no apparent ill effect. Persons with kidney or liver diseases and certain heart disorders may be sensitive and susceptible to extra loads of potassium.

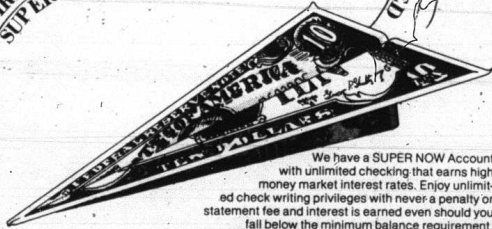

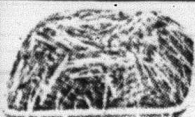

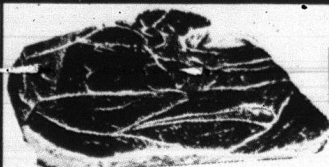

## Physician enjoys weekend emergency room

The Rockcastle County Hospital has offered full-time weekend emergency room services since July, 1981. Different physicians take turns covering shifts so that the hospital is covered from 8 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday. A local doctor is on backup call all weekend.

Dr. Mike McClintock is a weekend emergency room physician.

Once a month the 28-year-old doctor spends a 27-hour shift at the Rockcastle County Hospital taking care of the patients who come to the emergency room and treating the patients on Acute and Skilled if a problem arises.

Dr. McClintock spends the rest of his time as a second year resident specializing in ophthalmology at the UK Medical Center. Ophthalmology deals with treating eye diseases and eye surgery.

After completing medical school in Virginia, he chose U.K. for his residency because he liked their program. "When I first got into the ophthalmology program at UK there were several other residents working in emergency rooms. A resident does not get paid a great deal of money and we look for other ways to supplement our income."

He decided to try emergency room work and started at RCH in October 1982. He found that working in an emergency room is beneficial to his career and intends to continue doing it until he completes his residency in July 1984.

"Working in an emergency room makes you want to keep up-to-date on other aspects of medicine and surgery besides whatever you are specializing in," he said. "It's a good motivating factor to keep you reading on various aspects and treatment of different diseases. We're physicians and we're responsible for the overall care of patients."

The only other hospital Dr. McClintock visits for emergency room work is at Stanford. On the average he spends about three weekend days a month doctoring in an emergency room setting.

He described a typical weekend at RCH. "This is not what I would classify as a high volume emergency room. I would say on the average shift of 27 hours we see between 20 and 30 patients. It can be quite variable. We could see several more than that or it could be significantly less."

"The most busy times are probably late afternoons and early evenings. The worst possible time is probably Saturday evening in terms of bad things, particularly trauma, coming into the emergency room."

Occasionally the E.R. doctor is called to see a patient on Acute or Skilled. "We're pretty much expected to see any patient who develops an acute problem on the floor," he said. "We're glad to go up and see them and institute any immediate treatment that may be necessary as well as contact the family physician on call or the surgeon, if needed."

Also, if a patient has to be admitted into the hospital, he is admitted to his family physician.

Dr. McClintock takes advantage of the lull between patients. "Sometimes it can get really slow. I always bring lots of things to read—medical journals and articles, in particular, to keep me up-to-date on various aspects of emergency room care."

He feels like his E.R. doctoring is rewarding and challenging. "It's different from ophthalmology in that you do get to see different types of problems. It helps to keep you on your toes in terms of being prepared for all types of emergency problems that may arise, regardless of whether I'm working here or at U.K."

Dr. McClintock spoke for the other weekend E.R. physicians from U.K. who spend time at the Rockcastle County Hospital when he said, "I think we

all appreciate the variety as far as residents who do this emergency room work, the basic and fundamental aspects of medical care are still fresh in our minds from our training in medical school and internships.

"I think we're pretty capable and responsible for initiating the basic steps in care, and then contacting other help when we feel like we need it. We really try to be conscientious in the treatment of the patients."

Dr. McClintock concluded, "It's a nice place to work and I think the people in this area are lucky to have the group of permanent physicians and surgeon that they have."

ly for Mr. Shear... the paper was set-up and arranged in the newspaper size form and the form tightened and locked, several sheets were inked and run through the paper press to be corrected for typographical errors. When corrections were made sometimes the result would be pried type or type under the form or the form would "buckle" as it was called. Sometimes it would prove to be too trying, then my father would wash his hands, grab his coat go out in his shirt sleeves.

He would go down the street to Cox's Store on Main Street where several men gathered seated on the benches. He would join in their talk and laughter and then return whistling to his task and succeed in getting out or publishing the newspaper.

Printers ink was another trying matter for those who worked in the print shop. My father bought and tried several kinds and forms of soap from com-

panies and salesmen to remove the ink from his hands and nails. But try as he would, the ink would not be completely removed until he began eating L&M biscuits my mother would make.

However, the best the Rockets could do in the fourth quarter was to trade baskets with the Tigettes for the final score of 49-39.

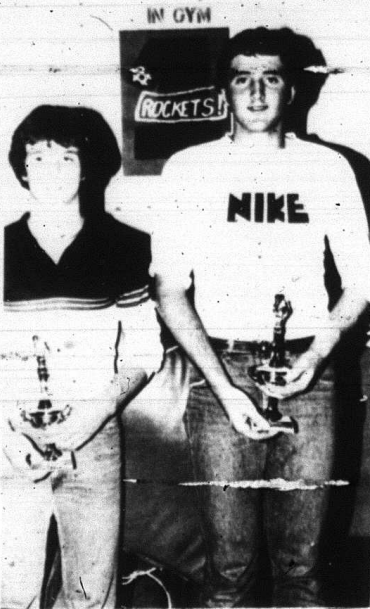
