## Brodhead School joins Great Balloon Race

"Countdown to the Great Balloon Race begins at 2 p.m. Friday, March 25," says Tom Payne, principal of Brodhead Elementary School in Brodhead. Students at Brodhead will launch helium-filled balloons as part of the nationwide Writing Pals Balloon Contest sponsored by Weekly Reader, the classroom newspaper.

"A message attached to each balloon explains the project and asks that the finder return it to Brodhead School," says Payne. "Weekly Reader will present a \$500 prize to the school that gets back the message that has traveled the farthest distance. In addition, 100 runner-up prizes will be awarded," adds Payne.

Since the annual balloon launch began, Weekly Reader has furnished about one and a half million free balloons to schools participating in the Weekly Reader Writing Pals program, a pen pal program in which Weekly Reader pairs classes across the country. According to Payne, the balloon launch will be the climax of a Brodhead first grade class' year long participation in the Weekly Reader Writing Pals. The goal of the program is to motivate children to write, and to familiarize them with students in other parts of the country.

Brodhead pupils plan to write to every person who receives a message card from our balloons.

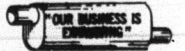

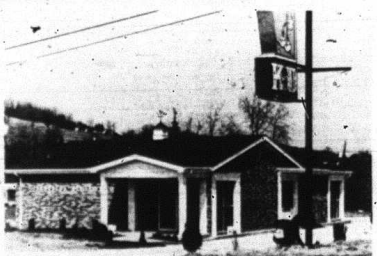

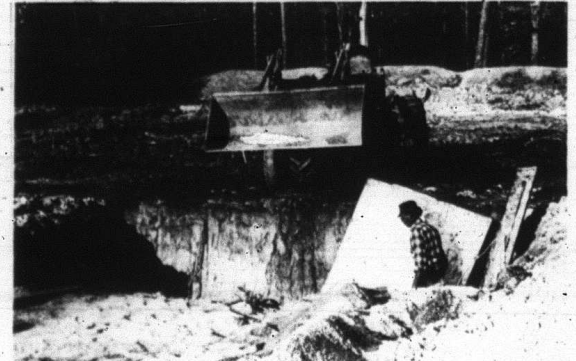

Rockcastle Countians are \$80,000 closer to having a new public health center. That's because of a check for that amount presented last week by Human Resources Secretary Buddy Adams to Rockcastle County Board of Health Chairman Jerry Cox.

The \$80,000 will be used by the county to help with the new health center's construction costs. The funds are part of a \$2 million capital construction allocation designated by the 1978 Kentucky General Assembly for health care facilities.

According to Adams, these funds originally were for other specific projects. "For many reasons, those projects did not... all of their funds," Adams said. "Because of the great need in Rockcastle County for a new public health center, it is only fitting that these funds be put to good use in Mt. Vernon."

Judge Kenton J. Cooper has filed for re-election to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

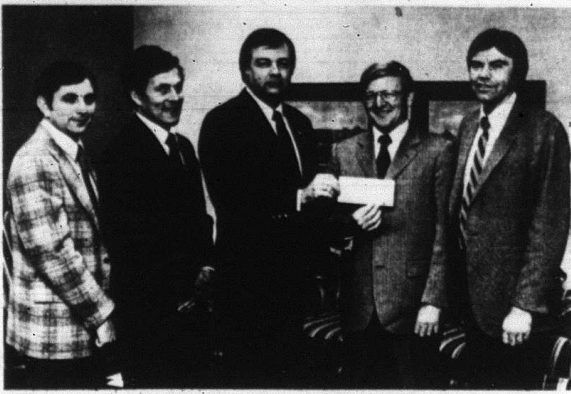
The judge is seeking his second term in the second division of the Third

## If proposal is accepted, 34,000 acres of Forest will be sold; 11,400 acres in county

If Congress approves of a Reagan administration proposal to sell 6 million acres of forest land, it will probably mean that 11,400 acres of federally owned land in Rockcastle County will go up for sale.

More than 34,000 acres in the Daniel Boone National Forest (about 5% of the forest's total acreage) have been earmarked by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for possible sale.

Most of Rockcastle's already logged over forest land was bought by the government in the 1940's and 1950's and much of it is considered for sale by the department possibly because it is in small widely dispersed tracts.

Most of the local government owned land lies to the left of I-75 South over to highway 1249 and to the county line South.

Reaction to the proposed sale of "surplus government property" from Kentucky senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston was reportedly one of anger. Huddleston, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Agriculture Committee, issued a strong statement against what he termed "plunder of our national heritage to achieve ill-defined goals."

The senator's committee will consider the proposal to authorize the sale. The administration is expected to send the legislation to Congress in about 3

months. Huddleston reportedly says he will do all in his power to block it. A spokesman for a Republican Representative Harold Rogers said Rogers wants to see more specific

information on what tracts are involved. "The bulk of the land proposed for sale in the Daniel Boone Forest is reportedly in large tracts be-

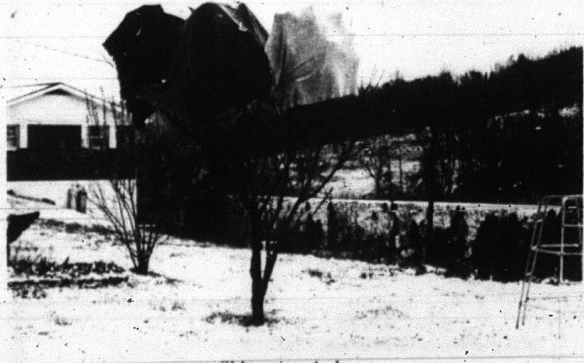

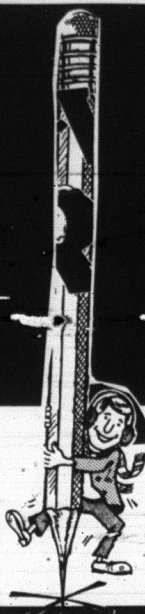

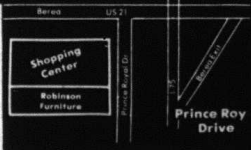

**Control Your Weight With Careful Eating**  
Makes every month National Nutrition Month and learn to control your weight with careful eating. Even though most of us give plenty of thought to keeping weight under control, being overweight is one of the major health problems in the United States. Diseases that doctors and researchers associate with too much weight include heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, kidney disease, gallstones and diabetes.

Excess weight also aggravates problems with feet, back bones and joints (arthritis).

By carefully planning your meals and controlling the size of the servings you eat, you can most likely lose weight. But can't you keep the weight from returning?

To successfully keep lost weight off, it is necessary to change eating habits and increase exercise. It's easier if you start good eating and exercise habits early in life, but it's never too late to improve those habits.

Eat well with less by changing the way you prepare your meals and with less fat and sugar, and serve fewer fried foods, fatty meats, nuts, rich desserts and salty snacks as chips and crackers.

To change your eating habits, look at how often you eat. Do you eat and wait for your next meal when you are doing when you eat. Often you don't realize how much you eat. Find out by keeping a three-day record of what you eat and the amount.

A guide will help in meal planning. The easiest one is the Daily Food Guide. The minimum amount recommended for adults with few added extras (no sugar, alcohol) will provide about 1,200 calories per day. Usually adult women can lose 1-2 pounds a week with 1,200 calories and men can lose the same amount on a 1,500 calorie diet. Diets with fewer calories should not be undertaken without close medical supervision.

## African travelers make study of dark continent "come alive" for 6th graders

When Mrs. Claudinnia Cash mentioned to her friend and former teacher, Mrs. Doris Wright, that her sixth grade class at Broadhead Elementary was beginning a social studies unit on Africa, Mrs. Wright replied by telling her that she had a brother who was going to Africa.

Not long after that conversation, Mrs. Cash says, the class received a long letter from Mrs. Wright's brother, Dr. Clifford W. Randall, a civil engineer who lives in Blacksburg, Virginia.

Before we go further, maybe we should point out who Dr. Randall is. He is the son of the late Bro. W.L. Randall (former pastor of the First Baptist Church) and Geneva James Randall. He received his B.S. and M.S. degrees in engineering from the University of Texas in Austin in 1965.

Dr. Randall is married to the former Phyllis Amis, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Otis C. Amis. Dr. Amis was former superintendent at Mt. Vernon Independent.

Randall is currently a Lunford Professor of Civil Engineering at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University where their two sons are also students.

In his first letter, Dr. Randall promised the children he and his wife would keep them posted on his African trip which began February 17 and he outlined in detail his trip for the students.

"Africa has come alive for this class," Mrs. Cash says. "Each letter, postcard and the pictures present has included facts, but more importantly, each correspondence has had a question or questions to challenge the class."

Mrs. Cash says just about all study and learning skills have been used during the experience. For instance, Mrs. Randall challenged the students to fig-

ure out what time it would be here when they arrived in Africa. They have been challenged to use the library for further research and to learn to pronounce the strange sounding African tribal names and something about the tribes the couple will be visiting.

The students and their teachers have written the Randall's two letters which contain questions of particular interest to the sixth graders as they study and learn more about the continent and the people.

Mrs. Cash says, "Dr. Randall is truly a scholar and an educator. He has spared so much time and been so thorough in his attentions to what the class would like to know. His letters have shared with the class his own social studies class one of excitement and reality."

Dr. Randall did not have plans to go on a safari at first, however, as the trip progressed, he did get the chance to go big game hunting and is sharing these experiences with the class.

A bulletin board display shows points of arrival and departure for the Randall's with green and red yarn detailing the route to each point and home again.

Another display lists questions the class has written and asked them and the answer they received. The answers to the questions have brought the textbooks up to date with regard to what is going on in Africa right now.

Dr. Randall will spend the first four weeks of his tour checking out potential water projects for the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. During the remainder of the trip he will be a guest of the Civil Engineering Department at the University in Cape Town, South Africa.

Dr. Randall was dis-

tinguished in 1981 by being selected from the university faculty to receive a named professorship. These supported professorships recognize eminent engineering faculty for their effective teaching and sustained and distinguished scholarship.

During his tenure at Virginia Tech, Dr. Randall has been very active in graduate education and has served as major advisor for 15 Ph.D. and more than 50 masters students. The co-author of two books, he has also authored and co-authored over 150 professional articles published in journals and proceedings. Noted for his research activities, he has been responsible for over \$3 million in external funding.

A founding director of the Atlantic Seaboard Region of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the American Water Works Association. In addition, he has served as a water pollution consultant to over 50 industries, consulting firms, municipalities and governmental agencies, as well as to the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service, and has had a great influence upon the art of wastewater treatment in Virginia and the Atlantic Seaboard region.

A founding director of the Occoquan Watershed Monitoring (OWM) Program and its allied research, Randall has, at the request of the Virginia State Water Control Board, served as Chairman of the OWM Subcommittee since 1972. This program is responsible for overseeing the quality of the drinking water supply for 650,000 residents of Northern Virginia.

John Dalton appointed him to the Board of Certification for Water and Sewage Operators and, at the request of Virginia Secretary of Commerce Maurice Rowe, he serves on the V-A-N-C Technical Panel for the Chowan River Basin. At Virginia Tech, he has served on the Univers-

ity Council and several commissions and committees.

Dr. Randall is active in numerous professional societies and is a frequent presenter/president at technical and professional meetings throughout the world. He is currently a Director of the Water Pollution Control Federation, is a member of the U.S.A. National Committee of the International Association of Water Pollution Research, is a former Secretary-Treasurer of the Association of Environmental Engineers, and is a former President of the Virginia Water Pollution Control Association and has received two Certificates of Appreciation from the American Society of Civil Engineers, for chairmanship service. The recipient of numerous honors, he is listed in several biographical publications including Who's Who in Engineering and Who's Who in America, and is active in community and church affairs.

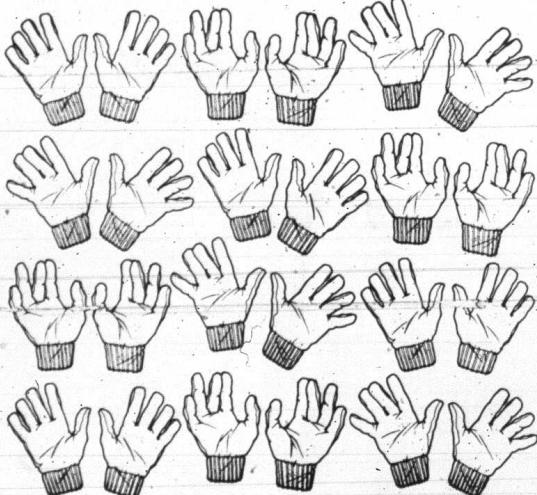

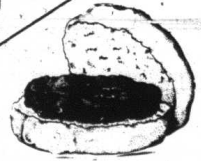

**Letter to the Editor**

During the past few months there has been much discussion around the county about the Fiscal Court's decision to use creek rock to repair county roads. We would like to take this opportunity to explain just exactly why we made this decision.

We did not decide to use creek rock on county roads because we wanted to, but rather we came to this decision because we were forced to. During the first 15 months that this new Fiscal Court has been in office, Rockcastle County has been faced with one serious financial problem after another. No other Fiscal Court in our Rockcastle County history, has had to face as many and as serious of financial prob-

lems as has the present Fiscal Court. Both the state government and the federal government, have pushed more and more responsibility for services back on the county, and instead of sending us extra money to perform these extra responsibilities, they have reduced what we were receiving in the first place.

Rockcastle County is not the only county that is facing serious financial problems. During the past year we were one of the counties where the financial problems were so bad that the State Finance Department had to take over the financial administration of those counties. When the present Fiscal Court took office last year, the State Local Finance Officer told us that our county was facing such serious money problems that we "probably" have to take over financial administration of Rockcastle County.

Well, it has been over a year since we were told that, and we are still managing our own finances, even though we are facing more problems now than when we were told that. We are working every day to get our county on its feet. This has been a very difficult job, and this next year is going to be even rougher.

We want the people of Rockcastle County to know that we are doing everything we can to keep our county running and we are trying to do the best job we can with the money we have to do with. In fact, our 1981-82 Rockcastle County received over \$38,000.00 to repair county roads. This year we will receive only approximately \$426,000.00 for road repairs. That is why we have been forced to use creek rock for road repair county roads. We are trying to do the best we can to make it go as far as possible. If we were to use crushed creek rock, and start buying crushed rock, then that would mean that a lot less money would get repaired. Some people would rather do this. However, we believe that it is our job to fix as many roads as possible, rather than fix only a certain few.

We know that there are many bad roads in our county, and we are trying to do the best we can to fix as many as we can. We would like to ask the people of our county to try to understand the situation the county is in. We know that some people won't understand and won't be patient, but we believe that the majority of the people will. We are striving to provide the necessary leadership to pull our county through these rough times and we ask that you give us your help and support.


