Hospital trying not to be difficult with instatement of new ER policy

In January the Rockcastle County Hospital announced a new Emergency Room (E.R.) policy. The policy stated that the Emergency Room be used only if the situation is a true emergency, and that payment is expected for a patient to receive medical attention.

The reason for instituting the new policy is that most insurance companies now refuse to pay Emergency Room fees if the patient could have been treated at a doctor's office. This had increased the difficulty of obtaining payment. And payment is essential if the hospital is to continue with its emergency services.

Because of the frequent misunderstanding of the new E.R. policy, Noretta Thompson, Director of Admitting, wanted to explain the reason behind the hospital's actions.

"We're not trying to be difficult," said Mrs. Thompson, "and no one is saying that patients' insurance isn't any good. A few companies will still cover general cases treated in the E.R. And about all companies will cover the use of the E.R. in case of an accident."

"Many insurance companies have to evaluate each situation to determine if and what services they'll pay for," explained Mrs. Thompson. "If we're not sure we'll ask for payment. Then we can do the billing, or leave it up to the patient, if they prefer. If the insurance company decides to pay, then the money is refunded to the patient."

The Rockcastle County Hospital has no way of knowing how much of the bill will be covered by insurance until the form is sent in to be evaluated.

"We're not refusing to see a patient," said Mrs. Thompson. "We will see anyone who pays the E.R. fee and then we'll be glad to bill the insurance com-

pany for them. "We want to stress again that non one will ever be turned away from the Rockcastle County Hospital in a true emergency situation."

To the People of Rockcastle County:

I am a police officer for the city of Livingston. I work long hours to protect the citizens, arresting drunks, thieves and dope peddlers is my job. And I do it well. But no matter how many law breakers I arrest, they are always set free. Why? Simply because the county prosecutor and judge doesn't want to lose their precious votes. I do my job, just as all the other law enforcement officers in our county do their's.

I think that if we, as citizens, thought enough of the judge and prosecutor to vote them into such important offices they ought to think enough of us to punish people who break our laws and endanger our lives.

Here is an example of law our court system is run.

I rented a family a mobile home on my property. They seemed reliable so I didn't check any references. After a while I recognized what a mistake I had made. What a mess that family had made of a practically new mobile home and my property.

Finally, I asked them to

move. The next thing I got a warrant for the mobile home. I was being served with a civil suit. It stated that I had sold 4 acres of property to the family. I had included the mobile home, and to my surprise my name had been forged at the bottom! Immediately, I got a warrant for the mobile home. When it rose before the court, Judge Ernie Woods determined that my name was forged. It was brought before the Grand Jury for an indictment against the family member who had signed it. The person was indicted. Since this person is influential in and around our county, the indictment was somehow reversed. Later, I learned that Daniel J. Venters had advised the woman to file a civil suit, in the first place, I was informed that he had told the woman "By the time it comes up in court, I'll be the judge hearing the case."

This is how other county court systems are being run, I feel sorry for the future of America.

Though it doesn't seem to do much good, I'll continue to arrest law breakers. But I just hope when the next judicial election comes up, we'll be able to elect someone that looks out for us as citizens, and not influential crooks, who take advantage of us.

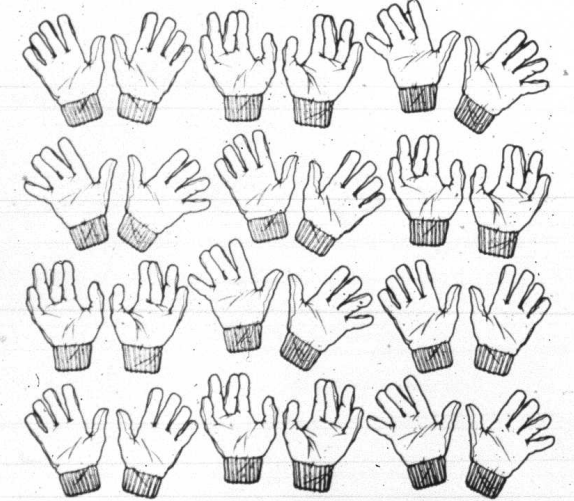

Hospital hires its first comptroller and looks at two options for continued direction

For the first time ever, the Rockcastle County Hospital Board has hired a comptroller to serve as financial director, responsible mainly for directing the business affairs of the hospital.

He is Steve Estes of Burnside, whose duties will include internal auditing, cost reports, budgeting, checking closely cost reimbursements and other activities connected with the operation of the business office.

Estes is also assuming some temporary administrative duties until some final decisions concerning hospital direction are worked out later this week.

Hospital Board Chairman Wayne Stewart said Monday in an interview that decision-making board meetings are consuming an "awful lot of time" right now.

He and the other members of the board, James Lambert and Bill Bailey, are faced with the problems of personnel cutbacks and the trimming of any unnecessary expenditures which do not affect the quality of health care for

the patient. But one of the major decisions lies between two alternatives Stewart sees as having long range effect on the hospital.

One option is to hire an administrator and continue, with the help of Estes, much as in the past.

The other avenue open for consideration has to do with the hiring of a hospital management team, the Norton's Kasair Children's Management Company, Inc. (NKC) of Louisville.

Stewart said the management team would furnish a hospital administrator, a person with a degree in hospital management to handle the highly technical job that running a small hospital has evolved into.

Although Stewart said the hospital has had some good administrators during his 10 1/2 years as a board member, none have been specifically trained in hospital administration.

According to Stewart, the operation of the hospital would remain under local control, but if additional help became necessary under the contract with NKC, they would act as

Ambulance revamping working

Through a program of strict fiscal management during the last 90 days, the Rockcastle Ambulance Service, which was taken over by the hospital on a three month trial basis beginning in January, has been able to break even.

Mike Barr, whose responsibility it has been to manage the service, said Monday, however, "there is no way for the service to be self-sufficient over a long period of time even if we get collections up to

STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries can be very profitable and fit in well with tobacco production, bringing income in the spring. Since tobacco acreage is limited, strawberry production presents an excellent opportunity for farmers to grow another high-income crop per acre.

Labor requirements for strawberry production compare favorably with those for tobacco. Returns to labor and management per hour of man labor. According to one study, were almost as much from strawberries as from tobacco and could be considerably greater, if one were as conscientious in growing strawberries as in growing tobacco.

Total costs per acre are naturally higher, but the cost per quart is considerably lower on high producing ones. Since many of the costs are fixed, studies show that a poor job of production (2,800 quarts per acre or under) will result in the grower breaking even or even losing some money. However, a good production (14,000 quarts per acre) can result in a net profit exceeding \$2,900 per acre.

Factors that will result in returns per acre when you follow the best recommended production and marketing practices, a successful grower will consistently produce 8,000 or more quarts per acre, and it is possible to produce 9,000 to 15,000 quarts per acre.

The selection of varieties may largely determine the success of the strawberry grower. You should select varieties that do well under your own particular soil and climate conditions. Many varieties are regional in adaptation. They do well in one section but not in another.

Sanrise, Redchief, Guardian, Earliglow and Surecrown have been the leading varieties planted in Kentucky. In the last year Redchief and Earliglow have dominated most new plantings. This is partly due to the spread of red stele rot and the resistance of these varieties to this disease.

Try to secure only the best plants. Order only virus-free plants from the most dependable plant sources. Much of the future usefulness of the planting may be determined by the condition of the mother plants. They should be vigorous and disease-free and should have a well-developed root system. Light-colored, fibrous roots indicate a healthy condition. Dark or spotted roots and fibrous roots indicate a diseased or unhealthy condition.

Quite often the plants may arrive from the nursery at a time inconvenient for planting. If you plan to set them within a day or so, you may not need to reheel in the plants. The package should be opened and the plants inspected for disease, insect, and condition. The correct time of the order is to variety and number should be checked. The plants will be tied in bunches of 25 plants in each bunch. Any discrepancy in the order, or any serious drying-out, heating, or greening should be reported to the nursery at once. Then put the plants in a cool, sheltered place and keep them there until the plants cannot be set for several days, they should be kept in cold storage just above freezing and covered in plastic. Do not store strawberry plants in the same cooler with fruit. Fruit and some vegetables give off ethylene which inhibits strawberry plant growth. For heeling in, select a well-drained area that is protected from wind. Dig V-shaped trenches about 6 inches deep. Open the bunches and distribute the plants evenly along the trench. Cover the roots with fine, moist soil and firm well.

The crowns should be just above ground as in planting. Water the plants well after heeling in unless the climate is quite moist.

Planting distances in Kentucky vary with individuals from rows 40 to 48 inches apart. Some varieties that make a profusion of plants such as Delite, may be planted 4 feet apart, while others should be planted 2 feet apart in the rows. There is a trend now to plant more varieties in rows 3 1/4 feet apart and 2 1/4 feet apart in the row. This is being done to accommodate equipment and to narrow the matted row.

A rotation plan is necessary for success over a period of years. If strawberries are grown on the same land year after year, disease and insect problems are magnified to the point where profitable production is no longer possible. Rotations help control weeds; they also add organic matter to the soil. The physical properties of the soil. Strawberries are rather shallow rooted and require a soil capable of holding moisture.

Say Yes to Less Fat and Cholesterol - A Health Plus

When you eat a diet that is moderate in fat and cholesterol can earn you a real health plus. Many scientists believe that eating a diet moderate in fat and cholesterol, as well as excessive sodium consumption, smoking, stress and physical inactivity, raise the risk of heart disease.

High blood cholesterol levels are associated with a higher risk of heart disease, and low levels with a lower risk. Although blood cholesterol levels vary among people, generally people with a high consumption of saturated fat and cholesterol tend to have high blood cholesterol. Heredity permit some people to eat a high-fat, high-cholesterol diet and maintain relatively low levels of blood cholesterol, while others consume less and have relatively high levels.

Many scientists, including the U.S. Surgeon General, consider it sensible to consume only moderate amounts of fat and cholesterol. Although no diet will insure against heart disease, moderation poses no known health risks and may reduce your risk of heart attack.

Eating a moderate fat and cholesterol diet doesn't mean giving up any of your favorite foods. It does mean you will need to recognize which foods in your diet are sources of fat and cholesterol. You learn to balance your total daily intake.

Most of the total fat and saturated fat in the American diet come from fats and oils, meat and poultry, and dairy products. Most of the cholesterol we eat comes from eggs, meat, poultry and dairy products.

For many Americans, cutting down on total fat and saturated fat is the easiest way to trim away calories - a real health plus for the approximately 40 million Americans who are overweight. One ounce of fat has more than twice the calories of protein or carbohydrate.

You may use this knowledge to make small changes in your eating habits and in your favorite recipes. The following suggestions and recipes from the American Dietetic Association, show ways to reduce your intake of total fat, saturated fat and cholesterol. Start with a few changes at a time, then add others. They'll change you can live with!

Vegetables & Fruits: Moderate use of dressings and salad dressings. Season vegetables with herbs, spices, or lemon juice rather than with sauces, butter, or margarine.

Cereal & Baked Products: Be selective in use of high-fat desserts such as pies and some cookies and

Milk and Milk Products: Select lowfat or skim milk and milk products often. Moderate use of cheese and turn to lower fat varieties when possible. Use sour cream and cream cheese only occasionally.

Meat, Poultry & Fish: Select lean meat, poultry and fish. Trim visible fat from meat, including the fat between muscles. Roast, bake, broil, or simmer meats, poultry and fish. Drain fat from meat and poultry after cooking. Use organ meats, such as liver, only occasionally. Eggs: moderate servings of meat and poultry. Combine with vegetables and/or grain products to increase portion size.

Dry Beans & Peas: Use dry beans or peas as an occasional main dish, as an ingredient in combination with meat, or as a vegetable side dish.

Eggs: Use moderate in quantity of egg yolks, including those contained in prepared foods. Try substituting egg whites in recipes. Use egg whites in physical examples in muffins, cookies and puddings.

Fats & Oils: Cook without added fat. Moderate use of fried foods, especially those which are breaded or have a batter coating. Make sauces, gravies, and soups with little or no fat. Skim fat from broth. Be moderate in the amount of butter used in cooking. Use moderate in the amount of margarine used at the table. Use soft margarine rather than butter most of the time. Use oil or margarine rather than hydrogenated vegetable shortening, lard or butter to prepare baked products.

Snack Foods: Choose foods for snacks that are low in total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol.

Jeff, a junior majoring in agriculture, plans to pursue a career in resource conservation. He said the volunteer program gives him a chance to observe the operation of a conservation agency from the "inside." The program will help him in determining his course of studies. Jeff is assigned to the Richmond Field Office where he will assist in the planning and application of conservation practices.

Bill Cantrell, a retired employee of SCS, after 26 years of service, continues his concern for Soil Conservation through the volunteer program. Due to budget constraints the Salsville SCS office was closed in McGuffin County.

Bill retired, and the county was being serviced out of the SCS office in Johnson County. A number of requests for conservation assistance were kept finding their way to Bill due to his local visibility to the people. So, Bill agreed to use his personal office and secretary to take the requests and pass them to the SCS employees. Gordon, Jeff and Bill have joined nearly 600 persons nationwide who have volunteered their time and talents for a new U.S. Department of Agriculture Program to battle soil erosion and other natural resource problems.

Edie L. Woods, State Conservationist for SCS in Kentucky, said more than 300 persons nationwide are already performing a wide range of volunteer services on a part-time or full-time basis.

Volunteer work areas include clerical, information, conservation planning, surveying, conservation education, and public service.

New Heavens and A New Earth

There will be "new heavens and a new earth" after this one has been dissolved, wherein dwelleth righteousness." Peter says in 2 Peter 3:10-14. He says that Christians look for it because our Lord has promised it and the Lord is not slack concerning his promise. (2 Peter 3:9). However, just where and when this shall be are matters on which a great deal of controversy prevails in fact, many fanciful theories have been propagated through the misuse of these scriptures. One such theory is that Christ will renovate the present heaven and earth and dwell therein with the saved for 1000 years at his second coming. The faithful Christian, however, will be careful not to accept speculative theories, but rather that for which he has Bible proof. It does not necessarily follow that because the expression "new heavens and a new earth" appears in scripture the same thing is referred to in each instance. In fact, a careful study of the expression shows it to have both a literal and figurative meaning. The context and all else revealed determines its use and meaning.

The "world" of the former was destroyed by the "world" often refers to the wicked people on earth (cf. Matt. 5:14, John 3:16, 2 Cor. 5:19). I conclude that in this instance it refers to the antediluvians who perished in the flood. The "heavens and the earth" which "were of old" must be identified with that of Gen. 1:1-5. The "heavens and the earth, which are now" refers to the same since the flood, hence the literal dwelling place of man. In Genesis 2:1 reference is made to God's work of creation which is detailed in the preceding chapter. The "new earth" included the atmosphere that immediately envelops the earth—the sun, moon and stars. In this instance, the LITERAL "heavens" and "earth" go together and identify the dwelling place which God prepared for man.

The "new heavens and new earth" will not be this present one renovated, but where Jesus ascended when He left the earth (Acts 1:11), and where He is NOW. He said, "I go and prepare a place for you, that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:3). Did Jesus go somewhere on this earth to prepare a place? No, He said that He was going to His "Father's house" (John 14:2). Where is the Father on this earth or in heaven?

In 2 Peter 3:14-15, the context deals with what will actually happen when Jesus comes and a new dwelling place "heavens and the earth," which are now are to be dissolved. God's people will then have a new dwelling place. This is that for which we look even "new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness." This is a direct reference to heaven—the eternal abode of the saved.

"Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth" (Matt. 5:5). He did not suggest an inheritance of literal earth. This is a proverbial expression (See psal. 37:11 for illustration). We use "land" in a figurative way when we sing, "To Canaan's land I'm on my way." Jesus is here teaching that only God's meek can fully enjoy the abundant blessings while on earth. We have fewer enemies; know true love and friendship; have the providence of God on our side, are truly happy, etc. We have the best of two worlds!

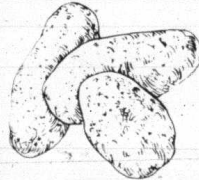

"AMBULANCE" (Cont'd from front)

If the hospital agrees to continue to manage the service, he thinks the county will be able to save \$100,000 to the tune of \$1,500 a \$2,000 monthly. Even though they have not asked the county for any money these first 3 months, there are malpractice and vehicle insurance bills which are due soon, so supplies have been replaced out of the ambulance fund as yet. Some of the equipment is needed to be replaced, and one ambulance which has 125,000 miles on it will have to be replaced before the end of the summer.

Barr feels the ambulance drivers (who now work at the hospital when not on a run) must have a raise. They made \$3.60 an hour currently. No agreement between the county and the hospital board concerning the service had been made last Monday, Barr said, and he did not speculate as to what agreement, if any, would be reached, but he said, hospital management of the service represents roughly a \$20,000 a year expenditure as opposed to a \$60,000 to \$70,000 expenditure facing the county run service.

In order to cut costs and to operate the service more efficiently, Barr says the number of full time employees was reduced from 9 to 5. Previously, there had been two persons on duty 24 hours a day. Now, there are 2 persons on duty only during the day (from 8 to 4) and one person at night, with one on call. Emergency Medical Technicians who work at the hospital in various capacities go on ambulance runs if the call is an extreme emergency and there is no time to wait for the ambulance to arrive or if there is a second run (which happens an average of about 4 times a week). The person on call receives \$1.00 an hour. Barr

also goes to clinic classes in the county and solicited funds to purchase papers for those on call so they do not have to stay by the phone during the entire shifts. Six papers were needed and so far four have been purchased for the ambulance service by the clubs.

Another cost was cut when Barr moved the workers from the Ambulance building to the hospital. He said the heating bill was reduced from \$400-\$500 per month to a little over \$100. The building is used only as an ambulance garage now.

One new persons was hired parttime to take care of the payroll and billing. According to Barr, the collection rate has increased from about 30% to 60 to 70%. Most of this increase has been in medical assistance insurance collections and back billing. He said it may seem a little hard, but cash patients (those who have no insurance or medical assistance) are asked to sign promissory notes.

Ninety-five percent of the ambulance trips are legitimate, that is, the patient can't sit up or needs medical attention during a trip. He said it is not a policy to make trips just because they are asked. Because the charges are lower than most surrounding services, they receive a lot of calls to make transfers from other hospitals. These are the ones Barr says they must refuse to make. In spite of this, the number of runs are up this year, a fact Barr cannot account for, but which has helped some, he says. Last year only 650 runs were made all year. So far this year 200 have already been made.

The hospital has made application for a Emergency Medical Systems funds to replace the one ambulance which will soon be retired. Barr says he has not heard from the ap-

plication, but does not know the status of it, but the money was to have been allocated last week.

Hello from Clear Creek!

The memories of "greening time" in Clear Creek valley, and on its hills, has brought Landis Harding, wife Karen and their baby back from Wisconsin after a two year absence. They have moved in to Disputanta to property owned by Betty Payne James. His parents, Howard and Jean Harding of Upper Clear Creek, are very happy to have their son Landis, and family back home again.

When I asked Landis if he were coming home to stay, he said "I sure am. I've moved everything I have back here except I left my footprints."

I remembered him of all the opportunities they had here, such as borrowing from kinfolk John and Mary, Harding who live nearby and the fact that they could go home to "Mom and Dad's" for Sunday dinner also. This has been the occasion for family gatherings in large camps.

Raymond and Lorene Hurley were in Berea the past week shopping. Lorene told me once that their children all came home on "Sundays for the family dinner and gathering afterward. It was an event to be together and to which they all gladly came.

Cleve and Blanche Payne had four generations of the Payne family to visit them recently. From Berea, came Mary Payne, wife of Howard, and her daughter, Peggy Payne Rowlette. Visiting her parents, Peggy and Lucien Rowlette, came Colette Rose, bringing five months old Lucien Matthew Templin who made the fourth generation being Mary's

great grandson. Many of Clear Creek's pioneers have descendants scattered around this country, on thinking of my dad's 11 children and how their children have populated this land. Even as far as the Dees family scattered to the four sides of the land. In Michigan is Bill Payne, son of Bluford, and the south is Jack Deegan, son of Ruth in Florida, to California in the west is Jane Dondanville, daughter of Stanley, and to the east Virginia is Kenney Rowlette, Howard's grandson. Even though the width of the nation separates these people, they all have roots from Clear Creek valley.

Continuing with the early history of people in Clear Creek, I now write of Johnny Harding's great grandfather from his mother's side of the family, John W. Dees.

Since both great grandfathers names were John, I guess it just came natural to call the little baby John (or sometime Johnny) Harding.

The Dees family, at the time of the Civil War, lived in Laurel County near London. There is no record of the birthdate of John W. Dees, but he was grown man in 1861, a year after the Civil War was declared. This fact is proved by his war record when he volunteered and reported for duty at London in that year. Records tell that he was also wounded that year fighting as a soldier during this time. If a man wasn't a man, it made one of him.

In 1863, Dees was captured by Confederate soldiers in Mississippi. He was brought to their prison in Richmond, Virginia as a prisoner of war. When he has been of the terrible life led by Union soldiers while in the prisons, but somehow John Dees survived it and returned to his home in Kentucky. When his term of enlistment was over, he re-enlisted again. This is hard to believe that a man who endured so much was willing to go back in the army and face death again.

But John's Harding has war records to prove these facts. Dees' final discharge from the Union Army at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, came in 1866. Dees started for Kentucky and what a journey he must have had over the miles. Home was at the end of the way and he'd fought for it.

Eventually, the Dees family left Laurel County and settled in Rockcastle on the headwaters of Clear Creek where the family scattered out, marrying and settling nearby.

John received a pension of \$72 a month from the government for his service in the army which was a great deal of money in those days.

A story is told that John Dees and his son Tommy drove a mule hitched to a sled, down to the grocery store at Disputanta buying as much as 25 pounds of coffee. He was at one time, when others did well to buy one pound. I guess the war years, when John Dees was hungry and without coffee as he was on the march, came back to haunt him and he wanted to be sure of a hot cup of coffee in the hills.

His death came in 1923 and he has left descendants on Clear Creek, a land he had made safe for their way of life, by his willingness to fight for it.

Till then: Do no squander time, that is the stuff life is made of.

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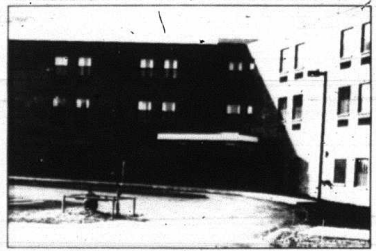
