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Forty-two buildings in town documented by Historical Society

A total of 42 buildings in the Mt. Vernon area have been documented by the Kentucky Historical Society, according to Floyd Owens, project director for the Lewistown Revitalization project.

William Gus Johnson, Senior Historian, with the Kentucky Heritage Council has spent over a week in the Mt. Vernon area identifying and documenting the commercial core, several dwellings and churches and other commercial buildings in the town.

As a result of the survey, Johnson told Owens in a recent correspondence that there are significant architectural resources on Main Street to encompass a cohesive commercial district nomination to the National Register of Historic

Places. He went on to say that he believes the project would have a positive impact on Mt. Vernon. Johnson also stated that it is encouraging that local merchants support the proposed project, and that there is an awareness by the citizens of Mt. Vernon of the benefits which would be brought about by the revitalization of the downtown commercial area.

Owens said, the Downtown Revitalization project is now entering its second year of a three-year program and that studies and surveys have been completed in other aspects of the project, and that architects have completed a design for the remodeling of Main Street, and that these designs are on display at the Bank of Mt. Vernon for anyone to see.

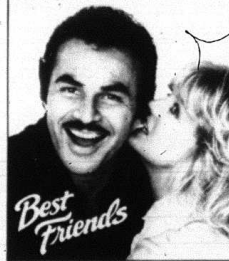

Two magistrates are unhappy with district reapportionment

If Magistrate Donald Rowe of the first district should decide to run for another term on the fiscal court, he would have to run against fellow magistrate Tom Denney in the second district since Rowe's voting precinct of West Mt. Vernon now falls in District 2.

Rowe and Denney voted against accepting the new redistricting proposal submitted by the commissioners appointed to do the reapportionment following the 1980 census.

Rowe accused Mark Jasper, deputy judge, of influencing the work of the commissioners. He said he saw the plan, as Mark had proposed it, lying on Jasper's desk weeks before it became the official plan submitted by the commissioners. He said he felt that it was more than a coincidence; more like politics.

Mark Jasper retorted by saying he had not influenced the redrawing any more than any citizen could have by recommending to the three who worked on the plan.

Joel "Buster" Gentry,

one of the commissioners, was at the meeting and reported that there was no other way to redraw district lines without tearing up the whole thing, including the school districts. He said each commissioner worked for a week individually before the meeting to set lines.

Gentry said they had tried to leave it as much as it had been as possible rather than split up everything. "Then we'd had the whole county mad. This way it's just you (Rowe) and Tom," Gentry remarked to lighten the mood.

Everyone was in general agreement on both these statements and mention was made of the fact that Rowe, Denney or anyone could bring suit over the remapping within 20 days.

Rowe retorted, "No, I'll get over it. I'm not going to do that" (file suit).

Magistrate Bill Wren made a motion to accept the redistricting and Magis-

trates Alex Albright and Joe Clark voted in favor. Magistrates Rowe and Denney voted "no." Magistrate Clark said he was sad everybody couldn't be happy.

Most population growth, according to the census, was in Magisterial District 3, from which Albright is elected. Districts 4 and 5 (Clark's and Wren's) stayed the same. Population in districts 1 and 2 decreased.

When the next magisterial election is held in 1985, Magisterial District 1 (now Rowe's) will be made up of North Brodhead and North Mt. Vernon. The total estimated population of the two precincts is 2,671.

District 2 (Denney's) will be composed of West Mt. Vernon, South Mt. Vernon and West Livingston. The estimated population of district 2 is 2,694.

Magisterial District 3 (Albright's) will be composed of the Bullock, Brown and West Brodhead precincts. The total population is 2,807.

District 4 (Wren's) will stay the same and will be composed of Conway, Roundstone and Climax precincts. The estimated population of these three is 2,773.

District 5 (Clark's) will say the same and will be composed of East Mt. Vernon, Orlando and East Livingston. The total estimated population of district 5 is 2,825.

Another matter at Tuesday's Fiscal Court meeting which caused some split voting was whether or not to charge groups who sell tickets to events at the Fairgrounds and those who make personal gain.

Judge - Bob Jasper brought the matter up and said there needed to be some uniformity with regard to the matter. He said with money tight as it is now, it is hard for the county to pay the utilities for these groups. Some are charged, he said, some are not.

After some discussion and input from persons in attendance, Magistrate Donald Rowe made a motion to charge a \$50 fee when tickets are sold and anyone makes personal gain. Magistrate Bill Wren and Tom Denney voted "yes" and Joe Clark and "Alex" Albright voted "no."

Another issue brought before the Court by Judge Jasper resulted in a tie vote.

Jasper recommended that John Bullock, who now works as janitor, be laid off. Jasper said he felt Bullock had too many jobs and did not have time to get his full hours on

Football coach's resignation accepted; complaints heard

A letter of resignation was read at Tuesday night's school board meeting from head football coach and teacher Larry Woods. Woods resigned the position after five years at Rockcastle County High School and a recent winning season.

Woods will be returning to Garrard County, his home county, to accept a coaching position, according to Superintendent Charles Parsons.

Parsons plans to appoint a committee to interview applicants for Woods' job before the next board meeting.

Four parents attended the school board meeting to protest the rehiring of coach Denney as basketball coach at RCHS.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Robinson, Mr. and Mrs. John Haarmon were present to voice their complaints. Robinson spoke first and said he and other parents were considering the size of the school and talent available, RCHS cannot maintain a basketball team.

He claimed certain students were discriminated against, said many talented students will not play basketball and that students and parents are unhappy.

The Haarmons supported Robinson's contention and asked the board not to rehire Denney.

Denney was rehired as teacher, later in the meeting, along with other certified personnel, however, the board did not make a decision concerning Denney's coaching status for next year. Denney must be notified by May 15 if he is not to be rehired for the coaching position. The board made plans to take up the matter at the May meeting.

Also at attendance at the meeting were several members of the Graves family, heirs, they claim to the Blue Springs School property of approximately one acre.

Alma Griffin, spokesperson for the group, said when the grandfather gave the property to be used for a school, he intended it to fall to his heirs when it was no longer to be used as a school grounds.

School Superintendent Charles Parsons said the deed doesn't say it will become the property of the school board, however, the deed was turned over to the assistant attorney general who deals with legal school matters in Frankfort for a determination. Parsons said he was told that if it is found to belong to the board, they cannot legally sign it over to anyone.

Parsons further stated that the state department had had the document for what he felt was more than sufficient time to make the judgement.

In other business, the board voted to buy three new classrooms at Livingston School to replace the Webb building and a trailer. The addition would be built to tie in to a new major building sometime in the future. The estimated cost of the classrooms is \$110,000.

In an effort to cut costs, superintendent Parsons said the state department is recommending a reduction in days for those who are on extended employment (beyond 185 days, includes principals, administrators, librarians, vocational education teachers, etc.) The cut recommended was 90 of a combined total of 794 days from all personnel who work into the summer. Parsons said when extended employment personnel proposed a cut to ask the board to absorb the cost of 71 of those days amount-

ing to approximately \$8,000. The remaining nineteen days of the 90 were cut from the extended employment of Lawrence Bullock who is employed in the vocational special program "Orientation to the World of Work" at RCHS. Bullock, an ex-major, will be replacing retiring art teacher Barbara Owens next year at RCHS.

The board approved Parsons' recommendation.

The revised school calendar showing school ending May 17 was also approved. Parsons said "snow days" amounted to three and school was dismissed for flu for three days. He said he understands the state "snow bank" will take care of a total of five of the dismissed days. This moves school closing from May 16 to the 17, the earliest in several years, he said.

The motion to seek bids for dirt hauling to fill in at the baseball field at the high school was approved. Parsons said one estimate of amount needed was 400 loads.

In other action, the board voted to approved the lone bid from Storm Security Systems, Inc. of London for a burglar alarm and fire alarm system for Livingston School. The cost is \$10,311.00.

The bid for removal of asbestos from pipes, etc. in all schools was awarded to J&R Salvage of Brooks, Ky. who bid \$14,603. The other bid was from Hibbits Construction Co. of London for \$46,200.

The Master Inservice Plan and the Local Educational Improvement Plan for 1983-84 were approved as was the physical examination by the local health department for pre-school children.

The board accepted the resignation of Donald Hal-

comb as night custodian at Brodhead Elementary, and hired Nancy Bradley as his replacement.

Norma Gaye Reams was approved to receive a GED certificate.

In other action, the board approved advertising for sealed bids for custodial supplies, agreed to pay the final payment of \$8,990 to Wise Construction Company for Roundstone addition; approved order change for deleted electrical box and addition of concrete pad at Roundstone addition; chose the \$250 deductible on the All Risk Insurance from the Norton Insurance Agency for a total of \$19,204 and join with other districts to hire Hall-Kubacki Environmental Services, Inc. to inspect all school buildings for asbestos and write recommendation for audit.

MISINFORMED

Following last week's article on the ambulance service in which we quoted Mike Barr as saying the service is self-supporting, we received information from the county judge's office to the contrary.

According to the judge's office, the county has paid all personnel costs for the three month period which has amounted to near \$10,000.

Mr. Barr said he has been under the mistaken assumption that the service was paying its way since he had been told that earlier in his official efforts which has amounted to near \$10,000.

Ann Rose Mullins, administrative assistant to Judge Jasper, said the bi-monthly checks were usually picked up by hospital administrator or by an ambulance service employee.

Barr issued a statement of apology for his misinformation.

Payment In Kind aimed at reducing grain surplus

The Department of Agriculture's new program of Payment In Kind (PIK) to farmers for grain crops has, according to Harold Ballinger, local ASCS officer, caused a bit of confusion among farmers.

The program is aimed at cutting down on the grain surplus. Rather than pay the farmer outright not to grow corn and wheat, the government program pays the farmer with the commodity which is being held in reserve.

A surplus of approximately 9.10 million bushels of corn and 7.90 million bushels are being stored in bushels of wheat are being stored in warehouses by the government. Ballinger

says this is a two year supply.

Ballinger said Tuesday that in 1959 and 1960, corn bases were established and at that time there were approximately 400 corn bases in Rockcastle County.

That base was replaced in 1980-81 when the government required farmers who wanted to re-enlist their farms in the base program to report their corn acreage for those two years. For those who reported, their base became the average of those two years. Those who did not report, as requested, lost their base. There were 332 bases reported as a result of the new base allotments. This

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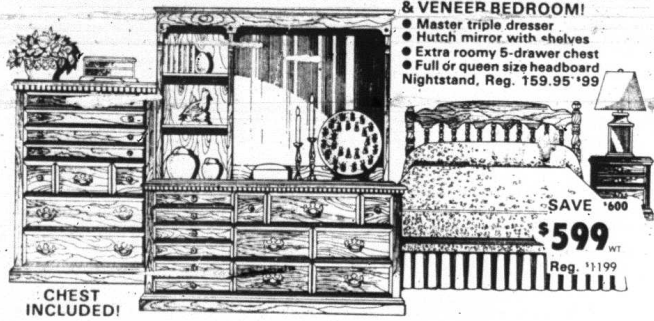
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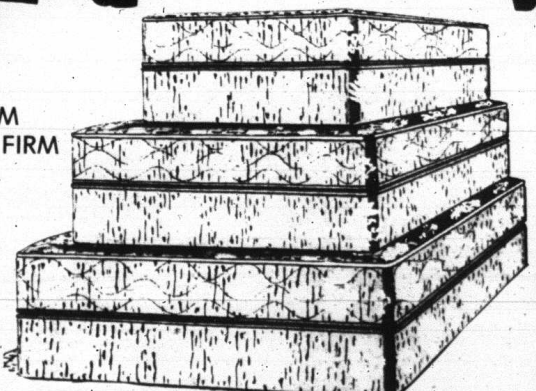

Plant Garden Around Rotations

One of the simplest methods of reducing disease problems in the garden is to rotate vegetable crops. Many diseases, such as early blight of tomatoes and club root of cabbage, can overwinter in the soil and multiply from year to year if the same host plants are grown continuously.

Potatoes, tomatoes, egg plant and peppers can be grown in one plot. These crops require highly fertile soil and are subject to the same diseases.

The following year these crops should be moved to a second plot and the first plot should be limed if necessary and planted with legumes, such as beans and peas and brassicas (cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, kale and kohlrabi).

In the third year, this plot can contain vine crops and salad crops. Finally, root crops, such as carrots and beets, can be planted the fourth year.

Selecting Vegetable Varieties

The question is often asked, "What is the best vegetable variety to plant?" The answer, there are several things to be considered.

Generally speaking, though, the variety should be able to produce high yields and be of good flavor and eating quality. It should lend itself to storage or preservation by canning, freezing or drying, be resistant to disease and insect damage, and when mature, occupy as little garden space as possible.

In most cases when garden specialist in the Un-

iversity of Kentucky College of Agriculture make recommendations, they already evaluated the vegetables for at least a year and know what they are talking about. The home gardener will do well to acquaint himself with their terminology which, incidentally, is also used by seed companies. For instance, when the terms "resistant," "tolerant," or "immune," are used it will be well to know exactly what is meant.

The word, "resistant" means that a particular plant can endure an attack by a particular insect, disease organism, or some adverse conditions of growth. Resistant varieties may also be expected to survive and produce acceptable crops under all but the most severe conditions of climate and insect and disease infestations.

Immune varieties are reasonably safe from specified disease, and insect damage. The term "tolerant" means that a plant is capable of surviving and making a satisfactory crop under adverse conditions, but becoming affected only if conditions favorable to disease or insect damage persist for a long period of time.

A tolerant variety of vegetable is easier to protect from damage by a particular disease, insect, or adverse conditions of soil and climate than a susceptible variety when standard control measures or cultural practices are used. In selecting seeds, pay close attention to plant descriptions on the package or container. In these descriptions, the companies most always will tell whether the plant is resistant, immune, tolerant, or susceptible. They will also give the approximate days from planting to maturity.

Gardeners should also be aware that some seed companies tend to advertise and promote novelty varieties. Such varieties may

produce unusual plants and fruits, but not as plentiful or of good a quality as desired.

Regarding the details mentioned, the thing that really counts is performance. Using recommended varieties and following good cultural practices satisfactory results are greatly enhanced.

Any Kentucky gardener going out to plant this year will do well to first obtain a copy of UK Vegetable Recommendations. The list includes varieties that have been tried and tested and represent the "cream of the crop." The list as well as a free publication, "Kentucky Home Fruit and Vegetable Gardening" can be obtained by writing the County Extension Office at (256-2403) or dropping by the Extension office on the second floor of the Courthouse.
