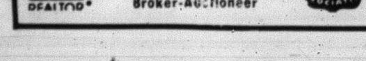

ORDINANCE NO. 340
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE AREA OF SAID CITY.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, desires to annex the following unincorporated territory within the existing boundaries of the City of Mount Vernon, to-wit:

Located near Lake Linville and being Lots No. 23A and 32 of the Lakeside Subdivision as appears on plat of record in Plat Book 2, page 4, in the office of the clerk of the Rockcastle County Court, Mount Vernon, Kentucky.

Section 2. This ordinance in compliance with KRS 41.230 and Chapter 2, page 4, in the office of the local newspaper having the largest bona fide local circulation.

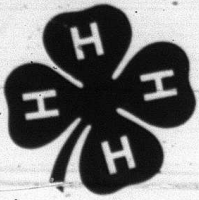

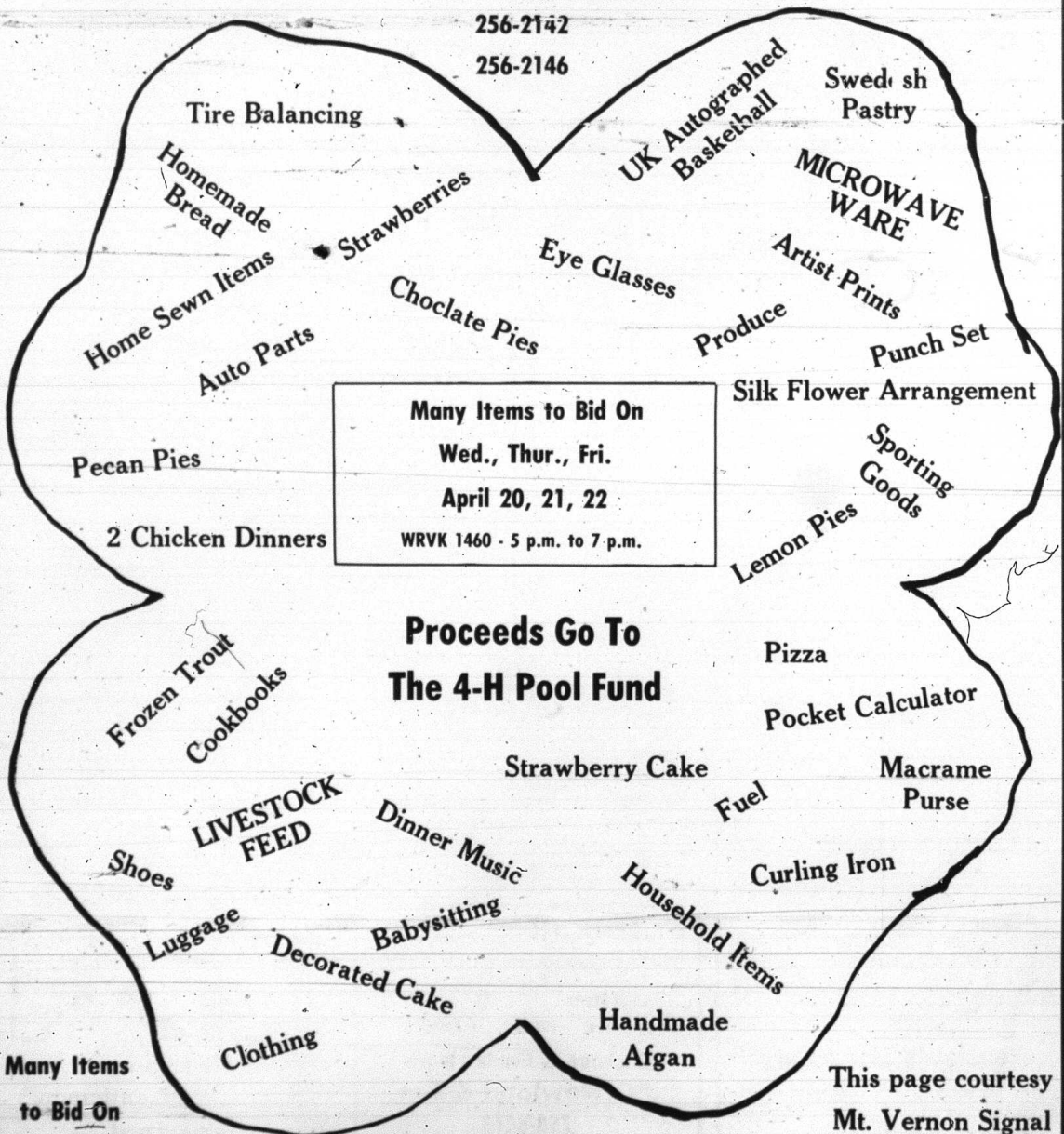

Steve Estes, the hospital's comptroller, said, "These layoffs come after a thorough study of the hospital's current financial condition, patient census and their needs, and the current staffing level. The Board is committed to maintaining the quality of care to patients and the staffing reductions are made with this priority in mind."

The reductions will affect the equivalent of 13 employees and may include both full and part-time workers. Every effort will be made to call back employees as soon as possible after the financial condition of the hospital improves.

The Board of Directors approved one week's severance pay for each employee affected by the layoffs. The Board is seeking a qualified administrator and is also discussing a possible management relationship with NKC, Inc. from Louisville.

NKC is the non-profit organization which owns and operates Norton Hospital and Kosair-Children's Hospital and also manages eight other community hospitals in Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois.

Man shoots self during attempt to elude officers early Tuesday afternoon

A Rockcastle county man took his own life Tuesday afternoon before he could be arrested by local authorities for parole violations and attempted murder.

Charles McHargue, 28, of Route 2, Mt. Vernon died from a single shot close contact penetrating bullet wound to the head, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor said Tuesday afternoon that a warrant had been issued against McHargue earlier in the day for criminal attempt to commit murder on a complaint signed by Rob-in Clemmons.

According to Ms. Carolyn Clark, para-legal for Rockcastle County Attorney James Lambert, Ms. Clemmons stated that McHargue

shot into a car she was driving six times at the Boone-Gap Boutique near the Rockcastle-Madison County line. Clemmons also stated in the complaint that McHargue followed her and Ricky Madden, a passenger in the car, into Madison County where he shot into their car three more times.

Clark said that charges were also filed against McHargue in Madison County.

Sheriff Taylor said that he, Kentucky State Police Detective Roland Huckabee and Commonwealth Police Officer Ann Dick and Deputy Sheriff Willie Powell, went to look for McHargue at his parents' home around 2:30 Tuesday afternoon.

"When we got to Charles' mom and dad's, he was getting into a car with some other people and began traveling south on U.S. 25," Taylor said.

The Sheriff said that he and Huckabee both fell in behind the car in which McHargue was a passenger and that Huckabee turned his lights on. "Some girl from Richmond was driving the car when Huckabee got behind them. They didn't stop so I pulled out and they were stating," Taylor said. He said that about a mile up the road at Pine Hill, when he got beside the girl's car, he saw McHargue with a gun and that, by the time the car pulled off the side of the road, McHargue had shot at them.

According to Taylor, three people in the car with McHargue at the time of the shooting said, in their sworn statements, that McHargue looked back and saw Huckabee and his parole officer and said, "There's my parole officer, I'm just going to waste myself."

Members of the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service worked on McHargue for about 10 minutes at the scene before transporting him to the Rockcastle County Hospital. McHargue died about 4:30 p.m. enroute to Lexington.

The other three people with McHargue were released from custody late Tuesday afternoon and no charges were filed against them.

McHargue's body was taken to Lexington Wednesday for an autopsy.

Inherited Sin

Sin that is supposedly "inherited" is called "Hereditary Total Depravity" by its advocates. "Hereditary" means "Descending from an ancestor; passing down by inheritance." Total depravity means "the whole, entire, complete." "Depravity" means "moral corruption." Putting it all together, you have complete moral corruption is passed down from an ancestor! Yes, many people really believe this, so they talk about babies inheriting sin, chiefly the first sin of Adam which is called the "original sin."

The Bible defines sin as "the transgression of the law" (1 John 3:4); it is called "unrighteousness" (1 John 5:17); and James says "to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17).

Is a baby unrighteous? Does a baby know good and evil? Can a baby transgress the law of God? The obvious answer to these questions is no. The commission would be that a baby has no sin since there are the things that constitute sin.

Some say the original sin is inherited, not committed by each person. But this is not taught in God's Word. It suffers the consequences of Adam's sin which is physical death (Romans 7:13). But consequences and guilt are not the same thing—we are not guilty of Adam's sin; only Adam is guilty of it. We must bear the guilt of our own sins; but we do not inherit guilt of our parents' sin. The Bible plainly teaches that sin is not inherited. God said, "The soul shall not bear the iniquity of the father" (Ezekiel 18:20).

Stop and think: If sin is inherited from our father, Adam because of

his disobedience to God, they do not, children inherit righteousness from parents who are righteous? The truth is that neither sin or righteousness is inherited. When we stand before God in judgement, each person will be judged according to his works (Rom. 14:12).

Taking this a step further, notice Paul's statement: "For as by one man's (Adam's) disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one (Christ) shall many be made righteous" (Rom. 5:19). If by Adam's disobedience babies inherit sin, then by Christ's perfect obedience, babies inherit righteousness, and the result would be "UNIVERSAL SALVATION!"

Babies do not inherit sin from their forefathers. Such a doctrine is taught by several religious groups, but it is not taught in the Bible. It is a doctrine originating with men (Mark 15:9). Since babies do not have sin, they should not be baptized, for they are not the proper subjects for baptism. They cannot believe in Christ (Mk. 16:16); they do not have sins to repent of (Acts 3:38), and are incapable of confessing faith in Christ (Rom. 10:9-10; Acts 8:36-39).

all of which are prerequisites for baptism. One who is not lost has no need to be saved and babies are not lost! Sin is lost when he is "drawn away of his own lust, and enticed" (James 1:14-15).
