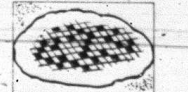

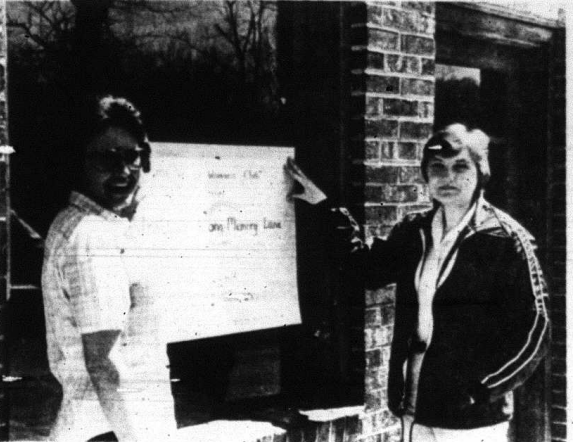

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgements, decrees, costs, and expenses including a reasonable attorney fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the exercise by the purchaser of the privileges herein granted; and, if any claim shall be made or suit brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by rea-

son of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or public place of the exercise of any privileges herein granted, by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

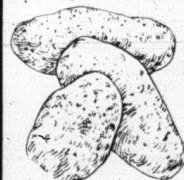

8 cavers rescued Tuesday after 3-day ordeal

All emerged safe and happy after water level fell

8 cavers from the Cincinnati, Ohio area, all emerged safely from a cave in Drew Valley on Crooked Creek in Rockcastle County on Tuesday around 11:30 a.m., where they had been trapped since noon on Saturday.

The six men and two women, all members of the Greater Cincinnati Grotto club, entered the Precinct Number 11 Cave on a farm belonging to Wayne King of Renfro Valley, when the water level in the entrance to the cave was only 19 inches.

The 8 person party was trapped after heavy rains Saturday caused an underground creek to raise the level of water in the entrance way to 35 inches around 11 a.m., Sunday morning, according to Tom Staubitz, vice chairman of the Cincinnati Grotto Club.

"All eight of those people in that cave are very experienced cavers and, each one of them know the risks of caving. I believe they'll be just fine when we find them," Staubitz said Monday morning.

Staubitz, who had been in the cave several times himself, said that once the cavers got through the entrance to the cave they could get out of the cold water and onto dry land.

"As far as we know, the cave itself is approximately 5 miles long which makes for a lot of space for them to stay out of the flood water," the vice chairman said.

The cavers were first reported missing to Rockcastle County Rescue Squad director, Paul Hansel, around 3 p.m., Sunday, afternoon by another member of the Grotto Club, Butch Stockelman of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Stockelman and a friend, Barry Pitcher, were apparently with the party when they arrived in Rockcastle County early Saturday morning. However, when the party reached the Precinct Number 11 Cave, Miller and Pitcher decided to go and explore other caves in the area and to meet the party back at the entrance to the cave on Sunday morning, according to Stockelman.

"When we got back there Sunday and saw that the water level in the entrance way had gotten to

35 inches, we knew they were in trouble. That's when we got in touch with Hansel," Stockelman said.

Hansel said Sunday that he called the Warren County Cave and Rock rescue team from Bowling Green immediately after he received word of what had happened. "Sure we're the rescue squad in the county but when it comes to diving in caves that we know nothing about, then we get the best help possible. These people (the squad from Bowling Green) know exactly what they are doing and they will be the most help in this situation," Hansel said.

"We will remain at the scene throughout the rescue effort and do whatever we can to speed up removal of the party," Hansel said Sunday night.

The rescue team arrived from Bowling Green around 9:30 Sunday night, but were unable to do anything but wait until Monday when professional divers could be brought in from Bloomington, Indiana, according to Hansel.

Jim Burch, who arrived with the rescue team and Staubitz jointly took over command of the rescue operation, said Sunday night, Hansel said.

The two men decided to send a diver, George Veni, into the cave Monday morning around 5:30 to try and make contact with the trapped party.

Veni, a member of the Warren County Rock and Cave rescue team, was gone for nearly six hours and, when he emerged from the cave, he had found nothing. "We are still confident everyone is alright," Staubitz said. "Veni had never been in this cave before and it is not hard to get lost. If I could dive, I think I know right where they are and it wouldn't take long for me to find them," Staubitz added.

At that point, professional cave divers from Bloomington, Indiana were scheduled to be at the cave by around 3:30 Monday afternoon and the rescue team decided to just wait on them. "We've stepped up the pumping operation which began at the mouth of the cave around 10:30 this morning," Burch said. "These coal companies were good enough to bring these four pumps in and help us get the water level at the

News media descended on Rockcastle Co.

If you've ever been to a three-ring circus, then you have some idea of the atmosphere during the two days that the news media covered the rescue of eight spelunkers from a cave in Rockcastle County.

In my life span, although only 22 years, I have never seen so many news people at one event in Rockcastle County. TV, radio and newspaper people came from all over the southeastern United States, including television crews from Knoxville, Cincinnati and Dayton, Ohio and Atlanta, Georgia.

I arrived on the scene with Rockcastle Rescue Squad director Paul Hansel around 10 p.m., Sunday night and figured that we would be there until, at least Monday morning, how wrong I was. One of the biggest surprises was the number of news people who eventually wound up on the scene before the eight cavers were rescued.

When I decided some time Sunday night to go home, because of the 20 degree temperature around the mouth of the cave, I did not know that when I returned the next day, I would be met with a WHAS helicopter landing in the cornfield next to the cave. Two newsmen got out of the chopper and ran to the mouth of the cave, where there was already gathered a large contingent of their competitors.

As the day dragged on and speculation about the safety of the eight cavers grew, more and more news crews filed into Drew Valley.

At one time Monday afternoon, four news helicopters were sitting in the cornfield. One reporter from the Cable News Network in Atlanta, said he had flown into the London Airport and driven to the scene.

State Troopers were sitting in the cornfield. (Cont. to 18)

The Warren County Cave and Rock Rescue team from Bowling Green take much of the credit for

freeing the eight who were trapped for three days, but they were not the only ones who helped out.

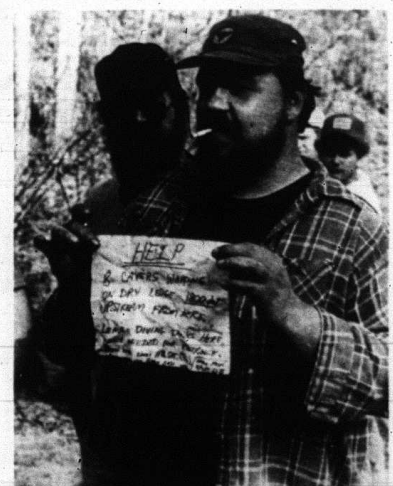
The Rockcastle County Rescue Squad was the first squad to arrive on the scene and they remained throughout the ordeal.

The local squad helped with such things as

installing flood lights around the perimeter of the cave so that rescue efforts would not be hindered throughout the night.

The local squad also kept food on the scene for the other rescue workers, brought in a backhoe to help speed the water flow

CONFESSIONS OF SIN

Christians believe in confession of their sins; they do not believe that men have power to forgive sins in order to salvation. This power belongs only to God. The Bible teaches men to confess. What does the Bible say about confession?

Confess therefore your sins one to another, and pray one for another that ye may be healed. The supplication of a righteous man availeth much in its working" (Jas. 5:16). This injunction bids us confess our sins one to another. There is no hint of confession to a special ecclesiastical person. The confessing of our sins is to be our fellow Christians. Certainly disciples are taught to forgive those who sin against them; nevertheless, eternal salvation depends upon God's forgiveness (Matt. 6:15).

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 Jno. 1:9); hence, the one who forgives sins is God. We are cleansed by the blood of Jesus but forgiveness takes place in the mind of God (1 Jno. 1:7-9). Thus we are to confess our sins to our fellow man and to God. God forgives our sins when we comply with His commands. The means by which He forgives is the blood of Christ.

The passage often used to uphold the theory that a special priesthood can forgive or absolve one from his sins is, "Whosoever sins ye forgive they are forgiven unto them; and whosesoever sins ye retain, they are retained" (John 20:23). The contention is that the apostles had power to absolve one from his sins and that the depository, successor to the apostles, consequently has the same powers. There are two assumptions in this position both of which have no foundation in the New Testament.

The first assumption is that the apostles could do the forgiving. But what does the text say? Christ commissioned them in verse 21. In verse 23 He speaks of carrying out the great commission. He commissioned them to preach repentance and the remission of sins (Lk. 24:47). Under this commission the apostles preached "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins" (Acts 2:38). Hence, directed by the Holy Spirit, they "remit" and "retain" sins by declaring the conditions upon which sins are remitted or retained. God forgives but the apostles reveal the conditions on which He forgives. Those who obeyed their message had their sins forgiven; those who did not obey had their sins retained.

Another assumption is that the apostles had successors who are present now with us. This is impossible because the message the apostles revealed was "once for all delivered" and therefore, there is no need for successors now (Jude 3). Once they bound and loosed nothing else can be either bound or loosed. Definite qualifications were necessary for apostleship. Men had to be eyewitnesses of Christ and His resurrection (Acts 1:21-22; 1 Cor. 15:3-8), and it is impossible to succeed an eyewitness. There were also signs (miracles) of an apostle which no man can perform today (3 Cor. 12:12). Thus there are no successors to the apostles today.

Yes, God teaches that men are to confess their sins. To no cleric is one to make confession. Christians are taught to confess one to another and to God. Confession of sins to one's fellow Christians and to God is right. God forgives, not man!

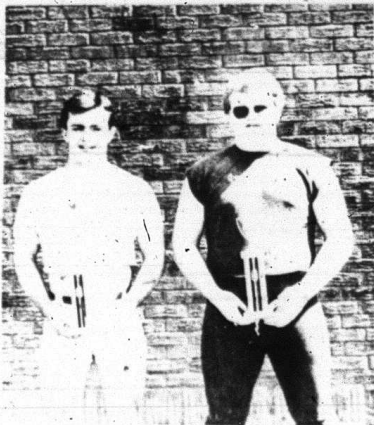

The Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk, Denver Miller, the Circuit Judge, Honorable John T. Mandt, and the Commonwealth's Attorney, Benny E. Hamm, and his staff, for their cooperation and assistance that they have shown during this term of the Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury would like to bring to the attention of the Board of Fiscal Court and would recommend and suggest to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court that it keep good repair and upkeep the Rockcastle County Courthouse as it is the people's place to do their business and the Grand Jury wishes to point out to the Fiscal Court the importance of keeping it in a high state of repair. The Grand Jury makes the following specific notations as to specific areas in need of repair and would encourage the Rockcastle Fiscal Court to arrange to have the repairs made at the earliest possible time and to have the repairs made in a very professional manner as in the long run the Grand Jury feels that any repairs made to be of long range benefit would need to be done in a professional manner as opposed to a haphazard manner that some have been done in the past. The Grand Jury notes the following places in the Courthouse that are in need of repair: the ceilings, walls, plaster, seepage behind a wall and light covers and repairs in the ASCS office; the lights in Sheriff William Taylor's office need repaired; in the Soil Conservation office the ceilings are in terrible

shape, walls need painting, leaks around the windows and painting that needs to be done; the County Extension office, the ceilings plaster is falling, paint and caulking needs to be done around the window seals, and paintings needs to be redone, in the PVA's office the ceilings have been leaking and the walls crumbling.

The PVA's office and the County Court Clerk's office stated a need for additional storage to carry out their duties. Sheriff William Taylor needs a separate room for storage and to interview witnesses

in their course of work. We, the members of the Grand Jury, in concluding note the pride we take in our County and express our gratitude for having the opportunity to serve it in this way and encourage the Fiscal Court to preserve the Courthouse for the use of all the citizens of Rockcastle County.

applied at two pounds per acre on a broadcast basis. The basic fertilization recommendation on a soil that has a medium fertility is to supply approximately 40 pounds of nitrogen, 40 pounds of phosphate and 40 pounds of potash or 90 pounds of 16-10-10 fertilizer. Sandy soils will require slightly more fertilizer and heavy soils may require less. Heavy applications of nitrogen are just before planting should be avoided as a poor quality of syrup may be produced.

The final stage in production of sweet sorghum, harvest, should come when the majority of the seed head, plus the stem above top internode, should be removed. Unless the leaves are allowed to dry, as in curing hay, they should be removed for top syrup quality.

from the cave, helped set up the water pumps at the mouth of the cave, helped build a dam to restrain the water from going into the cave, assisted in looking for alternate ways to get into the cave and, most importantly, stayed all night each night of the rescue effort to keep gasoline in the pump and ventilator fans.

The Boyle County Rescue Squad brought their pump in to help suck the water out of the cave.

Perhaps the most time and money were expended by three coal companies: Mountain Clay Coal Company, Interstate Coal Company and Leeco Coal Company.

Tony Gill, manager of mines for Leeco, Inc., arrived on the scene with four water pumps early Monday morning and began to pump the water out.

Along with Gill, came Safety Director for Interstate Coal, Pat Graham, who, with Gill, remained camped in the cave when the covers were rescued.

About a dozen men were also deployed to the scene by the three coal companies. Four three-inch water pumps and two six-inch pumps were also provided.

Assistant General Manager for Mountain Clay Coal, Jerry Hamm of Mt. Vernon, said the three pumps were out about \$7,000 on the effort. Hamm said the coal companies, who are all owned by KIBAC Corp., were more than glad to help. "We are always willing to help whenever we can," in this kind of situation, Hamm said Monday night at the scene.

The American Red Cross was also on the scene to supply coffee, lemonade and food from Monday night until the rescue operation was over.

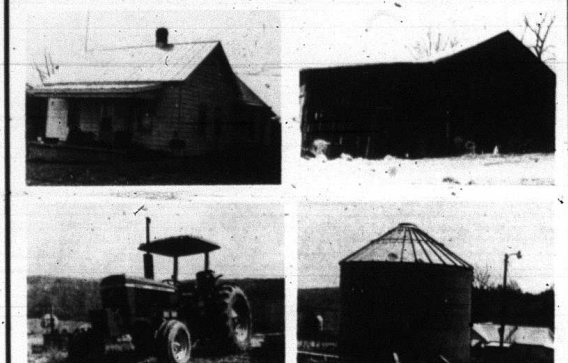

Cavers emerge safe and happy

(Con'd from front) needed for entrance. Been here since 11 a.m., Saturday. Now noon, Monday. The two divers, Jeff Forbes and Stephen Magerlein, both of Bloomington, emerged from the cave about 5:45 p.m. with the note which they said indicated that all eight explorers were alive and in good condition. "They are all safe and they're probably a little cold," Forbes said of the trapped cavers. "We found

the note right at the water's edge," he added. Divers explained to the press that they had returned to the surface because their diving suits were not suitable for crawling through the cave. "We yelled out to the cavers, but we didn't get any response," Forbes said. At that point, rescue workers said it would take four to six hours to pump enough water out of the cave to go after the explorers. "The water is only

brought out of the cave. Mountain Clay sent after another six-inch pump to help bring the water level down. "Once we get the water down to six inches, we'll start bringing the explorers out," Staubitz said. "Nineteen inches is the highest the water can be at the entrance of the cave. At nineteen inches, a cave still only have about 2 inches of air space above the water. The rest of his body is covered in water. We simply are not going to risk anyone's life until the water goes down," he said.

After Forbes and Magerlein got some food on their backs, they were going back into the cave to where the party was located. "They were exactly where I said they would be, up by a cache of supplies. Most of the club members had placed there earlier this year," Staubitz said. "The cache contained such things as food, blankets, sterno-heaters, lights, drinking water and several readings such as a Bible and some magazines," he said.

The eight people trapped in the cave were identified by club member, Shelly Page as: Gary Bush, 45, co-leader of the expedition. Bush is a chemist and is married and has two children. Mary Gratsch, 28, a lab technician, whose husband, Pete, was one of the first Grotto members to arrive on the scene. They have no children.

Mark Rocklin, 28, a microbiologist at the University of Cincinnati, who is married to Denise Rocklin, who was at the scene almost the entire time. Mrs. Rocklin was quite upset when the first diver came out after six hours and said that he couldn't find anything. The Rocklins have no children.

Jack Hissong, 42, an insurance agent and the other co-leader of the group. Hissong, who is married to Sandra Hissong, was trapped in the Mullins Station Cave in Red Hill about two years ago with a group of 20 Boy Scouts. Hissong and the boys were trapped for more than 20 hours underground and Hissong had to eventually swim out for help.

Jacques Ramey, 30, a graduate student at the University of Cincinnati, who is single. John Wisner, 36, who is married and a carpenter. Jeff Gardner, 27, a medical student, who is a friend of Ramey's. His parents were on the rescue site most of the time Monday and Tuesday.

Jill Vedder, 26, who is Ramey's girlfriend and who works at an advertising agency. She was the first caver to finally emerge. Ms. Vedder and Gardner are not Grotto Club members but were invited to go on the cave survey with the group by Ramey. Club members repeatedly told reporters all day Monday that all eight cavers were very experienced spelunkers. Staubitz said that Hissong alone had thirty years experience and he (Staubitz) would trust his life with him in any cave situation.

According to Staubitz, the Precinct 11 Cave, so named because there once was a voting booth near its entrance, was discovered by two of the men in the cave, Jack Hissong and Gary Bush. "Those two men are the ones who found this cave and they are the ones who have mapped most of the five miles of the cave," Staubitz said.

The Warren County Rescue Squad director began telling reporters around 6 a.m. Monday that they hoped to have the trapped cavers out by midnight. "The coal companies have gone and gotten another, even larger, pump than the four now in use and it should be sometime around midnight when the water is low enough to start sending members of the rescue team in," Burch said.

Mountain Clay Coal Company brought their bigger pump in and the water level in the cave began to drop very rapidly, almost an inch every two hours. This made rescuers very optimistic about the time of night the cavers would be brought out. However, around 1 a.m., Tuesday morning, the water level in the entrance of the cave began to stabilize at around 22 inches.

This is when everyone at the site began to realize that it would probably be after daylight before the trapped explorers would be

brought out of the cave. Mountain Clay sent after another six-inch pump to help bring the water level down. "Once we get the water down to six inches, we'll start bringing the explorers out," Staubitz said. "Nineteen inches is the highest the water can be at the entrance of the cave. At nineteen inches, a cave still only have about 2 inches of air space above the water. The rest of his body is covered in water. We simply are not going to risk anyone's life until the water goes down," he said.

After insertion of the other six-inch pump into the cave, the water began to drop and by around 8:30 a.m., rescuers started into the mouth of the cave. During the time the rescue teams were inside the cave, one of the six-inch pumps quit working. This caused some concern among members of the rescue team outside the cave that the water might start back up and trap all who were inside. However, the never materialized and, around 11:30 Tuesday morning, some very happy, wet and cold spelunkers began to emerge from the Precinct Number 11 Cave.

The first out was Jill Vedder, the girl the rest of the Grotto members were most worried about because she had less experience than the rest of the cavers. Ms. Vedder walked a little unsteady but she had a great big smile on her face. It's great to be warm and to finally see the sun, she said again, she said as the crowd gathered around her.

Only moments later, it was her boyfriend, Jacques Ramey, who emerged from the cave. As did each of the eight cavers that came out of the cave, Ramey met Tom Staubitz at the mouth of the cave and shook his hand as if to say, "Yeah, I made it."

Mary Gratsch was the third person to come happily out of the cave. Gratch looked as if she had only been inside for a few

hours. "None of us were ever worried about getting out safely, but we just didn't know how long it would take for the water to go down so we could come out," she said.

The trapped cavers came out in groups of four and brought up the rear in the first group, was co-leader Jack Hissong. Hissong came out smiling and went directly to the press. "Only a matter of time," he said. "We knew the water had to go down soon."

Reporters swarmed the four explorers who had been in the cave for almost three full days, while other members of the rescue team started in after four more.

Leading the way in the second group was Mark Rocklin. Rocklin, who was out of the cave and, completely wet, went straight to his wife and hugged her. Mrs. Rocklin, who had been at the scene with her mother-in-law for two days, didn't seem to care at all.

Jack Wisner was the second member of the second group to emerge. As the others before him, he received applause from the crowd outside the cave.

The third members out of the cave was Jeff Gardner. Gardner, a medical student, was greeted with a kiss by his mother at the top of the cave entrance.

The last of the eight explorers to emerge was chemist, Gary Bush, who has four children. Bush was met by all four of his children and his wife, as he worked his way through the crowd.

As soon as the last four people were safely out of the cave, one member of the Grotto Club that had been there since the outset of the rescue mission, said, "I know it's an old cliché but all's well that ends well. I thank God for their safety." The member went on to say that just as soon as the explorers were warm and dry, the members would head straight back to Cincinnati.

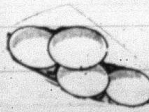

ting at the entrance to the cave from the Red Hill Road and were not letting just anyone drive down the road to the scene.

If the troopers found out that you were a news person, they made you park on the side of the road and walk the rest of the 3-mile journey.

Being the local reporter didn't cut any ice with one of our county troopers either. I found as I tried to go back down the road

Monday morning So, along with the rest of the media, I walked the three miles into the cave.

After the eight explorers emerged safely from the cave Tuesday morning, I came directly to the Signal, where a phone message was waiting for me from the New York Star, a paper in the city of New York.

When I returned the man's call, he asked if he could buy some photos of the rescue scene and said he would pay a tidy sum

per picture. Needless to say, I was happy to work a deal with the man.

A few minutes later, the phone rang again and a man identified himself as being from ABC news in New York. He asked for an update on the rescue effort at the cave.

Local funeral director Bud Cox said he received a call about 4:30 Tuesday afternoon from Australians and the caller (a man) was very inquisitive about what had happened. Cox said he talked to the man for about 10 minutes.

One thing is certain, thanks to the eight trapped cavers in Precinct Number 11 Cave, there are a lot more people across the United States that know where Rockcastle County is located.

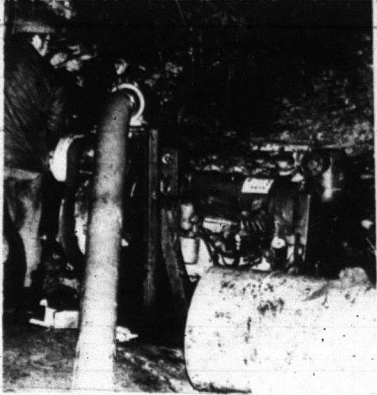

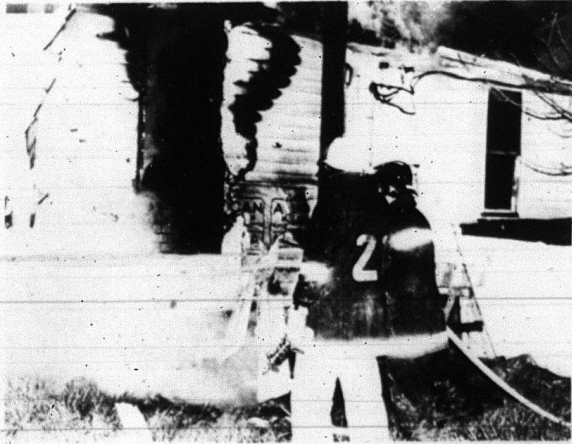

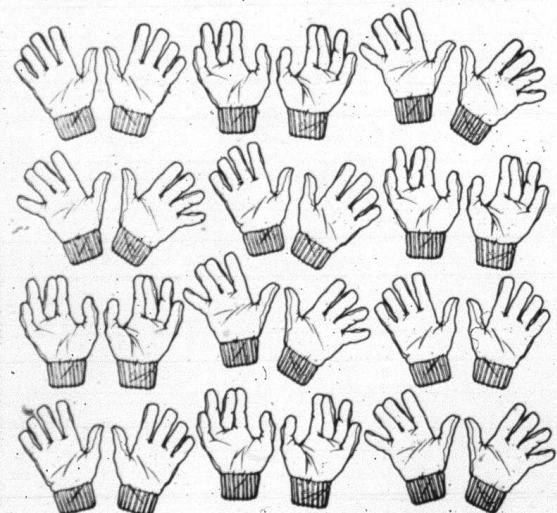
