Implants Spur Calves' Growth Rate
Growth-stimulating implants offer commercial beef cattle producers a speedy method of increasing growth rate of calves. But their use as profit-boosters is often neglected by beef producers.

Using growth-stimulating implants increases rate of gain is economical and requires little skill, according to Extension beef cattle specialists at the University of Kentucky.

Producers who use implants in calves can expect an increased gain of about 15 percent on suckling calves and 10 percent for

growing calves. Calves getting good quality feed and gaining at a fast rate will have an even greater response to growth-promoting implants.

Implants come in the form of pellets that are inserted in a calf's ear. They generally cost about one dollar per calf and bring returns many times greater than their cost. In trials conducted in 28 Kentucky counties, implanted suckling steer calves gained an average 27 pounds more than nonimplanted calves. That one dollar spent for each implant yielded at least fifteen dollars worth of additional gain.

Two effective and safe growth-promoting products, Synovex and Raigro, are currently available as implants. Synovex is a natural hormone implant which has been on the market for nearly 20 years. It is available in two forms—Synovex S for steers weighing 400-1,000 pounds and Synovex-H for heifers weighing 400-800 pounds. The Syno-

vox implant comes in cartridges composed of eight small pellets, deposited under the skin in the center of the back of the ear.

Raigro, which is not a hormone, contains Zeranol, which stimulates the pituitary gland to produce increased amounts of growth hormone. It may be used on calves from birth to market weight. A dose of Raigro contains three small pellets which are placed under the skin on the back of the ear about an inch from the head.

Producers must take care to implant pellets correctly. If Synovex pellets are crushed during implantation, they may cause undesirable side effects or abnormal behavior such as bulging. To implant pellets correctly, insert the full cartridge into the ear of the calf, push the needle on the implant gun under the skin. Pull the needle out about half way as the process of expelling pellets begins. If implanting is done correctly, the pellets will feel like peas in a pod rather than like a ball or cluster.

Beef producers can easily implant growth-promoting products in calves during other routine practices such as vaccination, castration and deworming. Calves may be reimplanted every 65 to 100 days for additional gain, while calves within 65 days of slaughter must not be implanted. Some feedlot managers prefer calves that have not been implanted because the extra gain takes away from the "compensatory" gain they normally get from thin calves. Beef producers occasionally may encounter some buyer resistance to implanted cattle, but the benefits of using implants far outweigh the disadvantages. The commercial cow-calf producer should be concerned primarily with achieving the most production in his own operation.

Producers should not use implants on either bulls or heifers they intend to keep for the breeding herd. Bull calves treated with growth stimulants have been shown to have small testes, decreased sex drive and decreased semen production compared to non-implanted bulls. The ef-

fects of implants on heifers' breeding performance is not clear. But since some studies have shown detrimental effects, it is not recommended to use implants on heifers destined for the breeding herd.

PIK Program News

Billy Lawrence, Chairman of Rockcastle County ASCS Committee, reminds all Rockcastle farmers of a few important dates. For those County farmers involved with the PIK Program, there is to be No Harvesting of a crop which is in Conservation Use Acreage (CUA or set-aside) from January 1, 1983 thru

December 31, 1983. Also, No Grazing on CUA is permitted from March 1 thru September 1, 1983. Wheat planted in 1982 signed in the PIK Program must be Baled by May 15, 1983 or Grazed thru December 31, 1983.

At this time the ASCS office is taking acreage reports of Wheat, Oats and/or CUA up until May 15, 1983. After May 15, 1983 the office will be taking all crop acreages concerning Corn, Soybeans and/or CUA thru July 15, 1983. Remember the reporting of all crop acreages is important in keeping your base which has already been established or establishing

a base. We think all farmers saw what a base meant with the availability of the PIK Program.

Mr. Lawrence also reminds all farmers of the ACP funds available for practices carried out in accordance with regulations. All information is available through the Rockcastle County ASCS Office open Monday thru Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on the first floor of the courthouse.



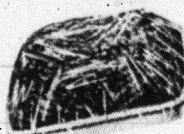

Magistrates praised by state finance officer

Al Howell of the state finance department met with the Fiscal Court Tuesday and complimented the court on the fine job it has done this year managing the budget.

"You are to be commended for holding the county together under these adverse conditions," he said.

"You've had some hard decisions and its not going to be any easier next year, with the cash flow drying up."

Howell then went over the jail budget which has to be approved by the magistrates the first of May.

The budget presented to the court for 1983-84 was \$120,974, an increase of roughly \$15,000 from last year's budget. Any increases has to come from the County General Fund as no increases in other sources of revenue for the jail are forthcoming.

Last fiscal year the county pumped \$30,000 into the jail operation. The requested increase called for \$45,000, however, after close examination and conferring with the jailer, the increases were reduced by clipping \$1,000 from "new equipment"; \$2,000 from "food"; \$3,501 from deputies (which still allows for an additional full time and a part-time deputy) and \$1,836 from "jailer's salary."

This total savings of \$9,000 will make the increase over last year only \$6,000. The amended jail budget for the coming year of \$110,946 was approved.

Danny Ford, representing the Rockcastle County Jaycees, requested \$500 from the court to match \$500 received from the city to repay a loan made to Lake Linville 3 years ago. The grant was approved.

A representative of the American Red Cross, Gladys Parker, requested \$500 from the court for her Berea based unit. Mrs. Parker said the agency helps in such situations as the recent cave rescue operation in which a National Red Cross van fed rescue workers.

The court approved the expenditure.

A request from Pete Hurd for a sidewalk from U.S. 150 to the Senior Citizens Center at the Library was discussed.

Hurd said he had gotten approval from Ed Winstead for an easement on his property if it were needed.

Members of the court asked Hurd to get an estimate of the cost and present it at the next meeting and they would consider it further.

In other business, the court voted to approve \$1,000 for the Conservation District's local office budget; voted to accept a deed from the Quail Homemakers for a community park in order to be eligible for a grant to further develop the park and amended into the road fund budget \$12,635 and \$22,851 into the general fund budget in unanticipated revenues.

Arletta Norton of Norton Insurance Agency presented some information to

the court on group plan insurance. The court took no action, however, they indicated a desire to have Mrs. Norton talk to county employees about the plan and find out how many are interested.

Hansel and Makin football coaches; Denney not rehired for basketball

After almost 2 hours in executive sessions, Tuesday night, the Rockcastle County School Board came out and in swift action voted to hire David L. Hansel as head football coach at Rockcastle County High School.

Hansel has served as an assistant in the program for the last several years. He recruited assistant football coach was Jerry Makin. Makin was also named to fill the teaching position left vacant as Larry Travis retires as industrial arts instructor.

Other applicants for the two football coaching positions were Don E. Smith, Larry Welch, Randall Akers and Shane Bullock.

In attendance at the meeting was Basketball Coach Roscoe Denney, who approached the board and requested to enter into executive session with the board to discuss the "total basketball" program from 1980 thru 1983" after it was announced that his position as coach would be taken up in executive session.

After several minutes behind closed doors, board chairman Rudolph Burdette invited Denney to join them. The board apparently continued to discuss Denney's position at length. Denney was called into private conference a second time by the chairman.

When the board reconvened in regular session, George Poynter made a motion not to rehire Denney as coach. Edna Cameron seconded the motion and Willie Taylor voted in favor of the motion. Kenneth Adams abstained from voting.

All the board members assured Mr. Denney there was nothing personal in their action. Two parents, Mrs. Denny McGuire, were at the meeting in support for Denney.

The board also voted to accept the resignation of assistant basketball coach Richard Bray.

While in executive session, the board chose to hear a complaint from Mrs. and Mr. John Hedge, concerning the alleged physical abuse of their child by a teacher.

The board made no mention nor took any action on the complain in open meeting.

The land on which the Blue Spring School stands will revert back to the Graves heirs, according to School Superintendent Charles Parsons, who made known the legal opinion of the State Department of Education at the meeting. Several of the interested heirs were at the meeting and were agreeable to wait until the June board meeting to set the sale date for the building which is located on the property.

Bids were opened and read from six who competed for the contract to haul fill dirt excavated from the Rockcastle Industrial Park site to the baseball field at the high school. Parsons said they had permission to remove 400 loads of dirt from the site.

The successful bidder was Hammonds and Owens of Crab Orchard with \$5,100.

Others bidding were Newland Construction Co. with a bid of \$5,875; Jack's S&T Hardware, \$10,630; Clifford Collins, \$8,640; Larry Golf Construction Co., \$8,890; BullWal Development Corp., \$15,000.

The low bid on 50 different janitorial supplies was accepted. Four companies, Thompson, Huntington, Kenway and Puritan will be supplying these commodities.

An contract with B&W Awning Company of Lexington was approved for the purpose and installation of storm windows for the

top-floor windows of the Central Office. The price was \$1,189.48.

Newland Construction Company of Brodhead will be doing the Central Office parking lot blacktopping approved by the board at a cost of \$1,300.00.

The board also voted to make an expenditure of \$100 toward a Roundstone PTO project to replace stage curtains at the school. The Parent-Teacher Organization will match the amount from money made in special projects.

A teacher salaries schedule for 1983-84 was approved as follows: emergency (Rank V), \$11,030; Lifetime certification (Rank IV), \$11,960; bachelor degree (Rank III), \$13,890, to 3 years experience, \$15,740; 4-9 years and \$17,400, ten years and over; Master level or equivalent (Rank II) \$15,740, to 3 years \$17,590, 4-9 years and over and Master level plus 30 hours (Rank I) \$17,590, to 3 years, \$19,430, 4-9 years and \$21,100, 10 years and over.

According to Superintendent Parsons, some teachers had requested their

June, July and August checks at the May 20th pay date. Parsons cited conflicting reasons for complying with this request for the specific date and recommended the board extending the pay dates the option of receiving the checks on June 20 instead. The board concurred.

Don Shelton, architect from Lexington, was hired to oversee the Livingston classroom addition. Shelton's fee was quoted as 5% of the total construction cost.

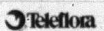



Parent company of Rockcastle Mfg. began as rag washing service

In 1929, a man named "Doc" Farmer who lived in the Cincinnati area was struggling for a way to survive the economic depression, came up with an original and enterprising plan.

The plan involved collecting discarded rags used by various industries, washing them in his wife's washing machine and selling them back to the same industries.

The service business, which included delivery and pick up, grew quickly and the demand for clean rags soon became more than Farmer could manage from his home.

In Bellevue, Kentucky, across the river from Cincinnati, Ohio, Farmer built the Acme Rag Laundry. All members of the family became active in the business, including son Herbel Farmer, who later managed the business. The 1937 flood washed the laundry plant away from the Kentucky bank, but a new plant

across the river in Cincinnati, soon replaced it. The company became known as the Acme Wiper and Industrial Laundry and its services became vital to the same industrial effort.

Later, the company expanded its services and changed its name to reflect it. It became known as Acme Uniform and Shop Towel Supply, renting both uniforms and linen and other items such as chemically treated mops and towels.

In 1967, "Doc" Farmer joined the company and serves presently as its president. In 1965 the all cotton uniforms were replaced with uniforms made of 65% polyester and 35% cotton, a change the company claims increased their market almost overnight and put Acme ahead of its competitors.

With markets in Cleveland, Chicago, Philadelphia and as far away as Texas, the company chose to keep

its central supply and stock room in Cincinnati, and in 1970 changed its name to Cintas.

The company then began selling uniforms and in 1979 Rockcastle Manufacturing became the company's first venture into the production of the uniform its sells and rents.

In 1982 an expansion began which increased the floor space at the plant from 12,000 sq. ft. to 30,000 sq. ft. and included a loading ramp, complete air conditioning and enlarged parking lot.

The local plant now makes 12,000 pairs of uniform pants a week with production soon to be increased to approximately 15,000 pairs.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORADIN AS FOLLOWS:

That the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors, and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, is hereby authorized to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system of works for the generation, distribution and transmission of television cable service from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City, to have and hold any easements of or other right necessary or convenient for said purpose, to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys and public places in constructing or operating said television cable service or works and to cross any and all streets and streams in this City for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or extending such works, and to use any and all apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of television cable service in and through this City.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify, and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgements, debts, costs, and expenses including a reasonable attorney fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the exercise by the purchaser of any of the privileges herein granted; and, if any claim shall be made or suit brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or public place of the exercise of any privileges herein granted, by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish television cable service to any person or persons residing along or near the afore-

said streets, avenues, alleys and public places, and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 5. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of 10 years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 6. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser.

SECTION 7. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon as practicable after the passage of this ordinance, to sell at public auction to the highest and best bidder, within franchise at the City Hall on some day to be fixed by her after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place of sale thereof once a week for three consecutive weeks, in the Mount Vernon Signal, Mount Vernon, Kentucky and in making said sale, she shall receive no bid for less amount than the total expense connected with the making of said sale including the cost of advertising, and she shall report her actions hereunder at a subsequent meeting of this Council. Man's hobby of collecting stimulates research on Indian history in the local area

Howard Bullock says if he had started seriously collecting Indian artifacts when he was a child, he'd really have a collection. He didn't get interested in the hobby, however, until the early 1950's and since that time has accumulated probably one of the best and most complete private collections in the area.

Bullock grew up in the Bloss section of Rockcastle near Lipe Creek and the Rockcastle River, a natural Indian haunt and campground.

As a child he remembers finding lots of artifacts and not really paying that much attention to his finds. He gave a few to his dad, Swan Bullock, who kept them in the cash register in his store and post office until Howard began collecting and displaying his finds.

Howard's wife, Ruth, says many times he has spent the whole day or two days at a time digging under cliffs or searching freshly plowed fields. But he has "just about quit

now," she says.

For searching under cliffs, Howard used a shovel and a screen box to sift through debris. Once, they recalled, after Howard had dug all day under a cliff, a neighbor returned the next day to the same cliff to dig deeper and found a tied bundle of 13, or 14 large blue and gray spotted flint spear heads.

Howard has bought a few, has had a few pieces given him, but over 90% of his collection he has had the enjoyment of discovering himself. Most of his finds were made in this county, but he has found some over the Pulaski County line and some in Boyle County.

Howard's uncounted collection overruns a huge glass display case in his home and includes, besides arrowheads, such unique items as flint fish hooks, gigs, a thunderbird, flint turtles, a bone needle, drills, stone axes, tomahawks, grinders, game balls, spearheads, tanning rock, skull buster, peace

pipes, rock knife, amulets and ceremonial pieces.

One unique small pipe which he found has a face on each end. One face depicts an Indian, the other a white man. One side bears three dots and the other an X marking. During peace, according to Ruth, the pipe was smoked with the faces up and during war, with the faces down. Use markings reveal the pipe was smoked in peace most often.

As Howard found each item, he researched and studied about it and both he and his wife have become very knowledgeable in Indian history and customs and can relate quite a history lesson about each of their artifacts.

SCHOOL REGISTRATION FOR FIRST GRADE AND KINDERGARTEN

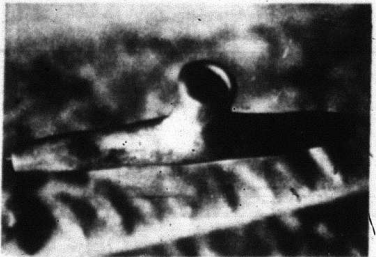
