Council buys lot for parking and authorizes playground director.

City council members voted to purchase a vacant lot in the downtown section of the city at their May meeting Tuesday night.

The lot, between Cox Hardware and the PCA building was bought from Sammy and Danny Ford for \$37,500 plus trade of the old Ideal Cafe Lot next to McBees.

According to the discussion, the city has plans to upgrade the lot to provide more free public parking in the downtown area.

The council also granted permission to the mayor to work out details of providing a summer playground supervisor for the playground at Mt. Vernon Elementary School. The director would provide organized activities and supervision of children from 10 a.m. till 4 p.m. on week days. Funds for the project will come from a matching grant and donations from civic organizations, according to the mayor.

Mayor Roland Mullins asked the councilmen each to take different areas of the budget and try to come up with ways to provide savings for the city. General Fund and Water Works budgets (with the recommended cuts) will be presented at the regular June meeting.

Three sealed bids for the sale of one of the two trailers on city property at Lake Linville were opened. The high bidder for the trailer was Julia Blackburn with a bid of \$52,000.

Also sold was a ten year T.V. franchise. The purchaser, Mt. Vernon T.V. Cable, owned by Wayne Stewart, paid \$10,000 plus expenses for the franchise.

The council voted to redo the sidewalk between Rockcastle Robo and the

Mt. Vernon Dairy Freeze and voted to provide the labor for construction of a sidewalk from U.S. 25 to the Library and Senior Citizens Center if the county furnishes the needed materials.

Jim Farley, manager of the General Dollar Store, registered a protest of street peddlers, however, he was told if peddlers had obtained a privilege license there was no legal way to stop street vending.

Prior to the business of the regular meeting, a public hearing on the proposed use of Revenue Sharing money was held. The city anticipates receiving \$25,000 in Revenue Sharing. The hearing also was open to the use of Municipal Road Aid (\$12,000-\$13,000) and Economic Aid (\$6,381).

Faye Thomason and Wavelle Ballinger, representing the Senior Citizens, were present to ask to be included in the proposed budget.

Floyd Owens, administrator of the Downtown Revitalization Project asked that the city consider spending the money on the landscaping proposals made by the engineering firm involved in the project.

Following the council meeting, city police chief Ronnie Hurd showed the councilmen a film on drug prevention education. The program, sponsored by the MVDP, is available to any group or class upon request.

Rockcastle County Hospital hires administrator; affiliates with agency

The Rockcastle County Hospital's Board of Directors has announced that Roger Pence, of Grafton, West Virginia, has been selected as the new administrator. He will be starting his duties upon relocating in Mt. Vernon.

Pence is leaving his administrator's post at the 127-bed Grafton City Hospital in Grafton, West Virginia, to move to Rockcastle. He has previously worked as vice-president for planning at the Galesburg Cottage Hospital in Galesburg, Illinois, and as a health care management consultant for TriHook Group, Inc. in Oak Brook, Illinois. He has also served as the administrative resident/move coordinator at the United Hospital Center in Clarksburg, West Virginia.

The 32-year-old Pence holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Cincinnati and a master's degree in health care administration from Washington University.

He participated in numerous civic and educational organizations while in Grafton and was an active member of the West Virginia Hospital Association. He is looking forward to becoming involved in the Rockcastle County community.

Pence is married and his wife, Becky, is a registered nurse.

Rockcastle County Hospital has also entered into an affiliation agreement with NKC, the not-for-profit corporation which owns

the Norton and Kosair-Children's hospitals in Louisville.

Steve Estes, controller and acting administrator of the 58-bed hospital in Mt. Vernon, said the affiliation agreement is effective immediately. "NKC currently manages eight hospitals in Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois," said Estes. "They also provide consultative services and technical assistance to additional hospitals in the region."

"We have been working together informally for several months and NKC consultants have been extremely helpful in areas of

financial analysis and the establishment of a reporting system. Our directors of nursing have attended an NKC principles of management course and NKC's nurse consultant has come here several times," said Estes.

"The Rockcastle County Hospital Board of Directors believes this affiliation will strengthen our hospital to the benefit of everyone in our community. Through NKC, we will be able to provide on-site course, management and nursing. Additional consultation services will be available as needed."

Being an ex-resident of Rockcastle County the story of cave rescue brought back many childhood memories. I lived near a cave with my Grandpa Albert Allen of Crooked Creek. There is another entrance to cave up Drew Valley about three miles. My uncle Elmer Allen lived near this entrance. In dry weather it is possible to go through cave, but water remains in cave year round.

Another exit to cave is about 1/4 mile South where some water comes out near Old Soliman Griffin place. There are others in area, too much information to list.

I am now disabled but can give much information on caves in area. Anyone interested may write me. I will answer with knowledge going back to 1937.

General information you may or may not like to know.

My name is Albert Powell and I lived in cave area and have many childhood memories of this cave, as I played many hours in it in my youth.

I have many fond memories of voting house which was near cave and crooked creek. I always enjoyed election days. I collected political cards of people who I still remember. Dave Clark, Charlie Carter, Boone Saylor, Wally Phillips and many more.

My first year of school was in a school house nearby called Cooksburg. In 1939, I knew of moonshine being made in both entrances of Crooked Creek and Drew Valley exits.

I never knew until now that the voting office was precinct 11, known only as Crooked creek. This area, Drew Valley, being about 1/4 mile up creek from entrance to cave

where my Grandpa lived. This cave area used to be the inexperienced as water is dangerous and there is also snakes in cave during hot dry weather.
As I'm not a writer, maybe I can meet Nancy Mullins some day and tell her my knowledge of caves for a story in your paper.

I prefer to hear about the good things in Rockcastle County, and the ones who have helped make it great.

Like John Lair and Renfro Valley and some of my school teachers. Cletus Mullins-Cooksburg School, Goldie Thomas, Thad Drew School, Christine Cox Belle Phillips both of Thad Drew School, and Jack Baker, Livingston High School.

I have read the Mt. Vernon Signal all my life, and receive it in many locations in the U.S. and Europe and now the best, Texas.

I still have many relatives in Rockcastle and Jackson Counties.

I try to visit them at least once a year. Hope to be in area some time this summer.

Was glad to hear that the cavers were rescued safely.

First received news about rescue efforts on Dallas TV news and recognized cave entrance. I told my wife I thought this to be the same cave that I played in.

Few days later my mother called from Richmond, Indiana. She received her Signal and said that was the same cave. I was much concerned as I have known this cave to totally flood including area where cavers were located.

Dear Editor,

As president of the Rockcastle County Unit of the American Cancer Society, I want to thank the wonderful people of this county who have responded with such enthusiasm to each of the projects which our Unit has undertaken this year.

Because of the interest of people in learning more about cancer, its causes and its cures, and because of the cooperation of many of the civic, social and religious organizations, we have exceeded our goals for Public Education for Adults in this county.

And because of the concern of the people in this county, we have exceeded our Crusade Fund Raising goals.

These are the dual purposes of the American Cancer Society—education about cancer so that early treatment of the symptoms might result in saved lives, and research to discover effective cures for those cancers which are resistant to presently known methods of treatment. Of every dollar you have pledged to the American Cancer Society, eight cents will support the organization, thirty-two cents will be used directly for research, and six cents will stay right here in Kentucky for use in education and direct service to cancer patients.


In December, the merchants of the area responded with many fine donations which were purchased by the people of the county during our Radio Auction. In February, we held a pie supper and in the midst of much laughter and fun, we did some serious talking about cancer and raised more funds. Kastle Inn and Tag's Gifts supported us with door prizes. Throughout the year, we have sold Country Faire and Partytime Cookbooks. And this morning, on our annual Radio-Thon on WRVK, we completed our planned projects with funds of \$57,000 from the following people: Mary Purcell; Mary Halcomb in memory of Robert Hal-

Vernon Attic, the Outreach Ministries of Dorothy Williams, the Home Repair Program and more. In 1982 CAP projects provided full and part-time employment for 38 Rockcastle County residents and served over 6,000 people from the county.

Standing in the midst of (what looked to be) thousands of daffodils of many varieties and colors, Eva Mullins said, "You should have seen them last week when so many of them were in bloom!" It was a beautiful setting for

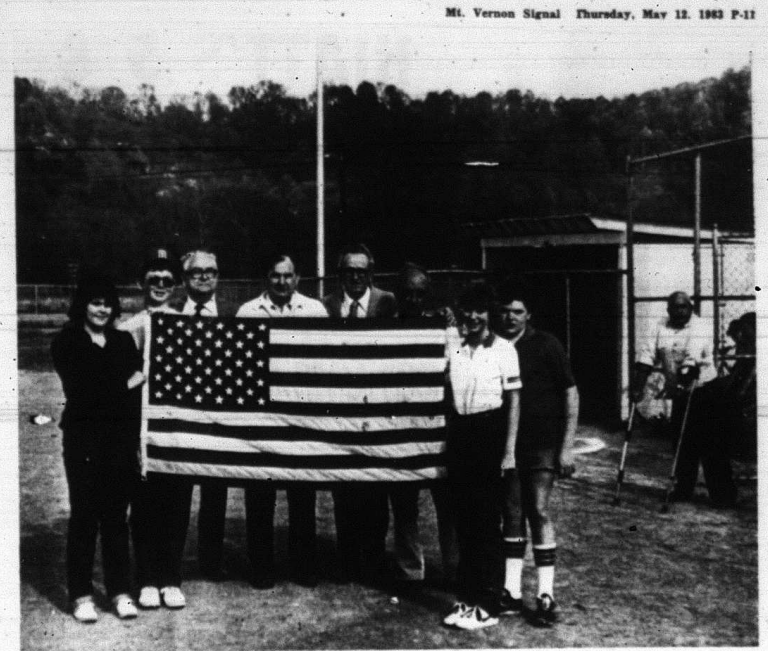
the stone castle like structure of her home. Tulips and wild flowers were in the colorful picture as well.

"We planted these years ago and now they have spread all over the side of the hill around the house," she told me as we walked among them. The air was filled with their fragrance.

As I left, she walked with me over to the road to the mailbox. We looked across the large lake that was built years ago, and saw the rippling of the cool, green water made by lazy fish in its depth. The bridge of large logs, that we had to cross over Clear Creek fit into the picture of nature. The logs were rustic and gray, allowing a splashing, swift flowing Clear Creek to pass through.

Raised in the Scaffold Connection of Rockcastle, Conley Saylor of Berea, is one who has ties in just such manner. Why the man, with his family, who has just returned from Florida, one of the most beautiful places in our country, even proved my point by commenting, "Oh, Florida is all right to visit, and it's nice down there, but I tell you, if I had to make a choice, I'd a whole lot rather come back to Rockcastle to live."

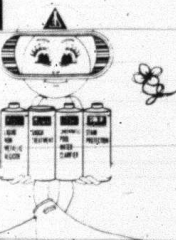

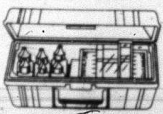

Republican candidate visits here

Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Bunning of Ft. Thomas stopped in Mt. Vernon on his campaign trail Tuesday afternoon and spoke to supporters in and around the courthouse.

Bunning said one of his main concerns if elected governor, will be in the area of education. He said Kentucky is at the bottom of the list when it comes to the percentage of persons who finish high school.

He plans to appoint a panel of leading educators to study the system of funding.

"If we are not getting results out of the amount of money we are spending, then we need to change basic way we fund education," Bunning said.

"It is going to cost money to upgrade education, money for salary increases, raised competency level and other incentives." He is in favor of collective bargaining if the local school board is willing to allow it. He feels it should be a local decision.

Economic development and good education system go hand in hand in Bunning's opinion. "A good educational system is a must to support the highly technical jobs of the present and future."

"The first questions industrial investors ask when seeking sites for new ventures are what about the quality of the area's educational and medical facilities?"

He says there is no reason to go out and try

to get business to come in if you can't provide these basic needs.

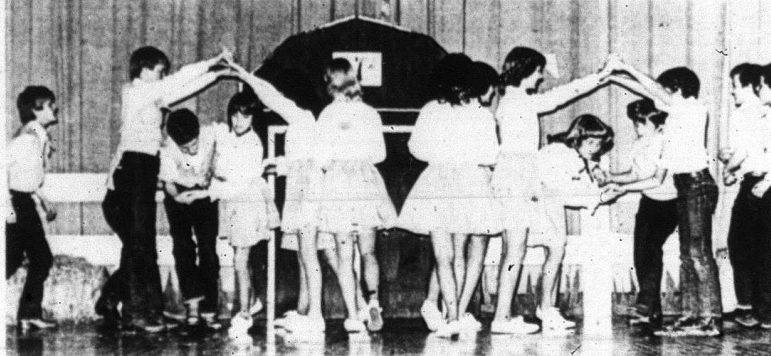
With regard to health care and the spiraling costs, Bunning says he thinks the Certificate of Need Board needs a good examination. He feels the over regulating by the boards have hurt health care. Regional hospitals, not more major medical centers in Lexington, Louisville, and northern Kentucky are what are essential to Kentuckians.

Bunning feels strongly that when budget shortfalls occur such as during Brown's administration, there should be a formula for trimming or the legislature should be called back into session, rather

Tops Goal Here

Rockcastle County volunteers raised \$1,722.00 during the Friends of KET County Call-Out, helping KET to exceed its \$80,000 goal during the local telephone campaign conducted during TeleFund '83. that the governor manipulating and reorganizing.

The freeze of School Building Authority funds is an example of such administrative redirecting in which the legislative branch should have some control, according to Bunning.

As state senator, he supported a work fare program which passed the Senate but was defeated in the House. He thinks anyone who is willing and able to work and is out of a job, having used up all options, should have the chance to work.

Bunning says the Parks and Tourism Department should be upgraded to the level it once was.

"Now," he says, "you have to go in the back door of the Commerce Department where you will find somebody counting how many vacancies exist."

He said two advertising programs, one of which is entitled "Oh! Kentucky" have cost \$4.2 million. Bunning thinks this could have been put to better use upgrading our parks which he said were not conceived as a money-making project, but as a unique development built for the enjoyment and betterment of our people and always to be subsidized.

With regard to the problems of prisons and local jails, Bunning said the state cannot keep mandating programs without sending money to fund them.

If citizens are concerned enough about the overcrowded prison system which puts habitual criminals back on the street before a fraction of their sentence is served, then they

must be convinced it is a priority item and be willing to support the tax to create more prisons.

Why Some Do Not Understand the Bible

In Ephesians 3:4 Paul said: "Whereby, when ye read, ye may understand my knowledge in the mystery of Christ." From this Scripture it is evident that people can understand the Bible.

Because a knowledge of the Scriptures is essential to man's salvation (John 8:32), the Bible affirms, the wisdom of an intelligent understanding of the Scriptures is essential to the Word (Eph. 5:17). It is, however, undeniable that the Bible is NOT understood. This is not because accountable people CANNOT understand the Scriptures - God does not require the impossible - but this is due to other factors - some of the reasons why people do not understand the Bible are:

1. People do not understand it because they HAVE NOT STUDIED IT. The New Testament affirms its completeness 2 Tim. 3:16-17; Acts 20:27, et al. For this reason, we do not learn about God by dreams, visions, supernatural revelations, or direct operations of the Holy Spirit. If a person learns the things of God, he must exercise the moral and spiritual self-discipline required in a diligent pursuit of Bible Study (2 Tim. 2:15; 1 Pet. 2:1-2; Heb. 5:12-14). The gospel is God's power to save (Rom. 1:16), and man must "engraft" it into his life (Jas. 1:21) and "hide it in his heart" (Psa. 119:11) for it to serve its intended purpose.

2. People do not understand the Bible because they WILL NOT STUDY IT. "For this

people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes they have closed, lest at any time they should see with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and should understand that error and apostasy have destroyed their respect for the things of God (2 Tim. 4:3-4). Perhaps they have been blinded by the god of this world (2 Cor. 4:4), or possibly have been choked by the cares, riches and pleasures of this life (Luke 8:14).

3. People do not understand the Bible because of PREJUDICE. It is said that some thought more of their human traditions and doctrines than the commandments of God (Matt. 15:9-9). "Surely no admonition could be better for men than the counsel of God: 'Buy the truth, and sell it not; also wisdom, and instruction, and understanding.' (Prov. 23:23). 'Study to show thyself approved.'" (2 Tim. 2:15).

"Receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls" (James 1:21).

Know Your Vitamin ABC's

Needless Supplements Waste Money, Can Harm Health

A vitamin tablet a day makes good health come your way, and if one is good, then two, three, four or more are better. Right? Not quite.

In general, if you are healthy and eat a balanced, nutritious diet, you don't need to take vitamin supplements. Extra vitamins are expensive at best, and at worst can be harmful to health.

For the record, vitamins are one of the major classes of nutrients. They do not provide energy as do carbohydrates, fats and proteins. Rather, they are chemical substances that aid in the metabolism of those nutrients for growth, maintenance of health and reproduction.

Most Americans do not need these vitamins. The U.S. Recommended Daily Allowances (USRDA), a standard developed by the Food and Drug Administration for the average intake. Most nutrition information found on food labels gives the contents as a percentage of the USRDA in adults four years and older.

The USRD... are higher than the amounts needed to prevent deficiency disease, and are considered adequate to meet the known nutritional needs of most healthy people.

Of course, individuals with special needs or inadequate diets may need supplements. These include:

• People trying to lose weight, especially if they diet often or follow crash diets. With good choices, a weight control diet as low as 1,200 calories a day can be nutritious and efficient in vitamin content, but a diet plan that provides under 1,200 calories a day is likely to be too restrictive in protein, vitamins and minerals. And a multi-vitamin supplement can't make up for all the missing nutrients.

• Pregnant women and nursing mothers have higher requirements for certain nutrients and vitamins, particularly A and C. But it's often enough to increase servings of foods providing the needed nutrients. Pregnant and nursing women shouldn't automatically take multivitamin supplements, without evaluating their intake and following the advice of their doctor or dietitian.

• Infants may need supplements. Generally, breast-fed babies are well-nourished if their mothers eat properly, and may need supplements of Vitamin D only.

• Infants fed commercial formulas usually don't need supplements as the formula supplies them.

• Persons with chronic diseases or special conditions. Diseases of the digestive tract may cause poor absorption of vitamins into the bloodstream. Infections may increase vitamin requirements, and persons undergoing surgery or with conditions such as severe burns may need to replace vitamins lost through body fluids.

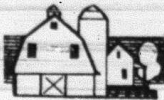
• Some elderly persons may eat less, slowing old slow-body processes and fewer calories are needed. Chewing problems and decreased appetite can reduce food intake and make vitamin supplements necessary.

• Vegetarians who select their diet carefully from a variety of foods may have no need for vitamin supplements, especially if they drink milk and eat eggs. But, the complete vegetarian who eats no animal products may need to include supplements of B12 or fortified soy milk, another source.

Others may be people who always eat on the run or skimp on vegetables and fruits, may not get adequate vitamins in their diets. But don't immediately take vitamins if you miss a meal or feel run-down.

Farm & Home News Nitrogen placement for no-till corn

An estimated 18 to 20 percent of all corn grown in Kentucky is no-till planted. This 400 to 500 thousand acres is directly planted into sod, residues from the previous year, or a winter cover crop. Many field trials have been conducted by University of Kentucky agronomists during the past 15 years to determine nitrogen fertilization practices best suited

for this kind of corn production. These recommendations are published annually in "AGRI Lime and Fertilizer Recommendations" and call for 25 lbs. more actual fertilizer Nitrogen per acre than conventional corn. This is largely justified by: (1) a greater potential for higher yields from no-till resulting from more available moisture and (2) greater potential for leaching, denitrification, immobilization, of fertilizer Nitrogen with no-till planting.

Most fertilizer Nitrogen for no-till corn is currently surface applied either as solid ammonium nitrate, solid urea, or liquid nitrogen. Urea and urea solutions contain both ammonium nitrate and urea. Use of UAN has been particularly popular since it can be used as a carrier for herbicides, thereby saving an extra trip over the field. The greatest concern with surface N applications has been about potential losses of Nitrogen from surface volatilization, particularly from urea and UAN solutions. Results from field studies in Kentucky indicate these potential losses to be largely unpredictable and to range from 0 to 20 percent. Because of this unpredictability, we recommend use of the lowest cost source while pointing out the greater probability of fertilizer Nitrogen loss from surface application of urea or UAN solutions on no-till corn where the urea contact with the soil

is likely to be delayed because of surface residue or plant cover. Recent work in Mayrland has shown a large yield increase when using UAN solution by surface banding (drilling it between the rows in no-till corn fields as compared to the usual practice of broadcast spraying it over the entire surface. This practice presumably decreases surface volatilization losses from urea contained in the solution as well as immobilization of fertilizer Nitrogen by microbial activity in the surface residue layer.

It is nearly impossible to apply large amounts of fertilizer Nitrogen below the soil surface of a sod. However, with the vast expansion of no-till corn acreage, a smaller proportion is now being no-till into sod and a larger proportion is now planted into winter cover crops or residues from the previous crops. In such conditions it is easier to make subsurface applications but usually requires modification of application equipment by using a coultter in front of an application shank or a furrow opener. The coultter cuts through the residue and helps prevent residue buildup on shanks and in the injection slit.

Field experiments during recent years in Maryland, Indiana and Virginia have shown substantial increases in yields of no-till corn from subsurface application of fertilizer Nitrogen as compared to surface

broadcast applications. Presumably, subsurface application of fertilizer Nitrogen decreases volatilization and immobilization losses in the surface residue layer. Field studies on no-till corn in Kentucky during 1982 showed similar results.

ORDINANCE NO. 297 (Amended)

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, AMENDING THE EXISTING WATER AND SEWER RATE ORDINANCE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 2, Paragraphs A, B, C, and D of Ordinance No. 297 is amended so that as amended, it provides:

Section 2. MONTHLY WATER AND SEWER RATES.

The rates and charges for water service and sewer service furnished by the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, are hereby fixed as follows:

A. Minimum Monthly Water-Bill for Residents of this City.

The minimum monthly bill for water service to residents of the City, which minimum bill entitles each customer to 2,000 gallons of water in each month for such minimum charge, shall be Four dollars and fifty (\$4.50) cents.
