AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, AMENDING THE EXISTING WATER AND SEWER RATE ORDINANCE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
