The longer processing time is intended to destroy spollage oranisms that can lower acidity which in turn may allow Clostridium Botulinum spores to grow. The addition of lemon fuice or citric acid insures that the acidity, level is low enough to prevent botulinum growth.

### Food service permits are a must for those operating "food service"

These permits come in three varieties. One is for a commercial facility operating from a fixed location. This is called, simply, a "food service permit." It is good from January 1 through December 31 of a particular of the permit based on the number of people which can be seated in the establishment.

A "fee exempt permit" is issued to "private, paro-chial, or public school cafe-terias of lunchroom facili-ties through the 12th grade and all facilities operated and all facilities operated rections and operated or licensed by the Cabinet for Human Resources. "There is no charge for this per-mit and it is good from January 1 through Decem-ber 31.

A "temporary food ser-vice permit" is issued to

The permit is good for fourteen days and the fee is \$10.00.

# **Photovoltaics**

By David Robertson Rockcastle Resource Center

Photovoltaic (PV) cells convert sunlight directly in-to electricity. Using mater-ials which are called semi-conductors, they produce an electric current to run appliances immediately or to charge batteries for later

appliances immediately of the charge batteries for later use.

DV cells were developed by private research laboratories in the middle 1950's because the Army Signal Corps was seeking a way to provide electricity for its remote transmitters. At that time, the Corps decided that they were too 1958, NASA chose PV's to power the electrical system of their satellites. Through the 1960's, the space program provided the impetus to research and development in the field of photovoltaics.

when the search and development of the field of photovoltaics. Most PV cells on the commercial market today are made of sillcon. The round or square cells are three to four linches across and only 4 mils thick. (In comparison, plastic grabage bags are 1 to 2 mils thick.) The process of manufacturing the cells is manufacturing the cells is slow, requires expensive machinery, and loses much of the purified silicon in cutting the wafer-thin cells, thus, except for remote locations, the cost per watt of PV generating capacity is four to six times that from an oil- or coal-fired electric plant. In addition, the need for accessories-batteries, wiring, regulators, and inverters-can increase the cost of a system by 50 percent.

nevertheless, in applications, PV's are applications, PV's are cost-competitive to, or even more economical than, util-ity power. Isolated houses ny power. Isolated houses (such as the Rockcastle Resource Center), ocean buoys, light-houses, automated weather stations, and Third World villages are examples where PV power has proven economical. 
