(Don't from second front) similar research deals with the micro-psy in the brain. Alzheimer's disease, for instance, is one such investigated area of medical research.

The new knowledge has made dramatic changes in the way emotionally ill patients are treated. The old image of a couch and a doctor who worked through long hours of talking therapy with emotionally troubled patients is fast fading.

Since about 1955, more and more treatment has been affected by use of medication (psycho-tropic). For instance, Dr. Mason says, there are now over a dozen medications for treatment of depression alone.

Before anti-psycho-tropic drugs were developed, the severely ill person was treated with drastic electric-shock treatments, which, at best, only helped a few or the last days of modern therapy. Neither are used much at all today.

According to Dr. Mason, the emergence of regional and local outpatient offices to treat and monitor persons with emotional and mental disorders has been one result of the modern drug therapy.

The closing of many state mental institutions and the emergence of regional and local outpatient offices to treat and monitor persons with emotional and mental disorders has been one result of the modern drug therapy.

Much insight has been gained in the areas of stress, its cause and the physical symptoms which have an emotional basis.

"We must realize that anyone can become emotionally ill if the stress becomes great enough for them," Dr. Mason says.

There is a certain attitude regarding emotionally ill persons and a lack of understanding, however, he says. In the 40 years there has been tremendous improvement in the general public acceptance of emotional illness in the same light as any other illnesses.

Despite the increased knowledge, alcoholism remains one area in which advances in treatment and breakthroughs have come

slowly. In this, as well as a number of other mental illnesses, genetic factors may play a part, but certainly there are many factors.

Dr. Mason wonders if any single breakthrough in the mental health field dur-

ing the next ten years can compare to the tremendous impact and benefit he feels the drug therapy discoveries have had.

With County Extension Agent For Home Economics (Home canners may want to clip this article and place in their canning book.)  
 Information has just been received that the USDA and the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service has just made changes in recommendations of some time and processing methods for home canning of selected fruits.

These changes were made resulting from incidents of death due to botulism in home, canned tomato juice and as a result of research findings.  
 The following are update recommendations:

**TOMATOES:** Do no raw pack tomatoes. Hot pack tomatoes adding 2 teaspoons lemon juice or 1/4 teaspoon citric acid crystals to pints and 4 teaspoons bottled lemon juice or 1/2 teaspoon citric acid crystals to quarts in order to increase acidity level. Process in boiling water bath for 35 minutes for pints and 45 minutes for quarts.

**TOMATO JUICE:** Add 2 tablespoons lemon juice or 1/4 teaspoon citric acid crystals to pints and 4 tablespoons lemon juice or 1/4 teaspoon citric acid crystals to quarts. Process in boiling water bath. Pint jars, 35 minutes/quart jars, 35 minutes.

The longer processing time is intended to destroy spoilage organisms that can lower acidity which in turn may allow Clostridium Botulinum spores to grow. The addition of lemon juice or citric acid insures that the acidity level is low enough to prevent botulism growth.



## Ordeal on Interstate began at a truck stop in Corbin; ended in fiery collision here

An ordeal that began at the 76 Truck Stop Restaurant in Corbin ended in a wreck and explosion on I-75 at the 69 mile marker in Rockcastle County last Friday night.

According to a dispatcher at the London State Police Post, three young men stopped at the truck stop around 8 p.m. Friday night to buy gas for their Winnebago. However, the men reportedly did not have any money and offered to trade a television set for the gas but the trade was refused by the attendant. The men then tried to sell the TV to motorists at the gas station, the dispatcher said.

The attendant at the station became suspicious and called State Police, describing the men's actions and the Winnebago. About 9 miles south of London, a state trooper fell in behind the Winnebago, which was heading north on I-75 and attempted to pull the motor home over. At this point, the dispatcher said, the driver accelerated the Winnebago to a high rate of speed and began to run cars off the Interstate that would not immediately get out of his way. The dispatcher said the trooper following the Winnebago tried several times to swerve in front of the motor home but was unable to do so. He also said that while the Trooper was chasing the Winnebago, one of the men inside threw television sets out of it, one of which broke the windshield out of the trooper's car.

The State Police Post at Richmond was called in to help stop the run-away vehicle and state Trooper Larry Wright of the Richmond post located the Interstate near the 69 mile marker in Rockcastle, with his cruiser in an effort to stop the Winnebago. However, the Winnebago plowed into the cruiser which exploded into flames. Moments after the explosion, the Winnebago, which was unable to navigate around a transfer truck blocking the Interstate, wrecked and all three occupants were immediately arrested by State Police, the dispatcher said.

Arrested were Terry Robillard, 20, of Punta Gorda, Florida, and two juveniles, 13 and 15, of Port Charles, Florida. Robillard was charged with speeding, reckless driving, wanton endangerment and attempting to a-

## Only one local election Tuesday; remainder of ballot features state

Voters in Rockcastle County will only have one local election to vote in next week in the May 24th primary, the rest of the races are for state-wide offices.

Besides the Governor's race, the contest that has stirred the most conversation throughout the county is the race for State Senator from the 15th Senatorial District which includes Rockcastle, Lincoln, Garrard, Pulaski and six precincts in Jackson County.

It pits incumbent John D. Rogers of Somerset, who is seeking his third term, against Dean Stewart of Somerset and Herschel T. Woods of Crab Orchard.

Rogers, who has held the senate seat since 1975, is a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University and the University of Louisville Law School. The former schoolteacher and his wife, Debbie, have two children.

Stewart is also a Somerset attorney, who is a graduate of the University of Dayton (Ohio) Law School. Stewart is not a complete newcomer to politics, having made an unsuccessful bid for the senate seat in a previous election.

Woods, 54, is a farmer and served as delegate to the state Republican convention in 1976. He and his wife, Corrine, have three children.

In the race for the right to oppose the Republican candidate for Governor this fall, it is a three-way competition.

Lt. Governor Martha Layne Collins, a former school teacher, and who, if elected, will be the first woman ever elected Governor in Kentucky, is being opposed by Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloan is trying for the second time to win the nomination, after running second to Governor John Y. Brown in last election.

Former Human Resources Secretary Dr. Grady Stumbo is the third major Democratic candidate and Stumbo has picked up the endorsement of several labor unions and perhaps the most important endorsement of Governor Brown.

On the Republican side is State Senator Jim Bunning and his closest opponent Don Wiggins of Winchester. Bunning should have no problem in the primary. Former Rockcastle and Pulaski County Commonwealth Attorney Lester

Burns will be on the ballot but he announced last week that he was pulling out of the election and throwing all of his support to Bunning.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race, the major Democratic candidates are George Atkins, Alben W. Barkley II, Steve Beshear, and Todd Hollibaugh.

On the Republican side is Nicholas D. McCubbin, Eugene Stuart and Tommy Klein.

Major Democratic candidates for Secretary of State are Drexell Davis, Dale Emmons, Tammy Kessinger and James Wilson.

On the Republican side will be W.D. Blair and Ann Ross.

Democrats running for Auditor of Public Accounts are Jerry Armstrong, Bill Weinberg, Larry Greathouse and Thomas Goodman, Jr.

Republicans running for the office are Sam Kibbey and James G. Weddle.

Republicans have no candidate for Auditor of Public Accounts but the Democrats have six candidates on the ballot - Logan Turner, Doris Weber, Ed Hancock, Jerry Landrege, Tom Ray and Mary Ann Tobin.

In the State Treasurer's race, Democrats will choose from Frances Jones Mills, Mike Miller and John A. Celletti. Republicans will have the choice of Sammie Roland and Patricia Schaffer.

Democrats have three candidates for Superintendent of Public Instruction - James Graham, Alice McDonald and George Tolhurst. Kenneth Bland and William McCall will face off in the Republican nomination.

In the race for Commissioner of Agriculture, Republicans will vote for either Kenneth Carpenter or Richard A. Turner and Democrats will choose between David Boswell, Tom Harris, Ward Burnette or Gatewood Galbraith.

This is the year the Circuit Judge for Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties will be elected. However, with only two candidates in the

race - Circuit Judge John T. Mandt, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Phillip Wicker, and District Judge Dan Venters, there will be no race until November because it is a non-partisan race.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal an assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question, and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value. (KRS 133.120)

## Food service permits are a must for those operating "food service"

Periodically, the personnel working for the health department discover persons in the county who are operating food service establishments without the required permits. Many of these people are unaware that a permit is required or, if they know of the requirement, don't know that they are operating a service establishment.

For the benefit of everyone involved, Kentucky Revised Statute 219.01(3) (a law) defines a "food service establishment" as "any fixed or mobile commercial establishment that engages in the preparation and serving of ready-to-eat foods in portions to the consumer, including, but not limited to: restaurants, coffee shops, cafeterias, short order cafes, lunch-rooms, grills, tea rooms, sandwich shops, soda fountains, taverns, bars, cocktail lounges, night clubs, roadside stands, industrial feeding establishments, private, public or non-profit organizations or institutions routinely serving food, catering kitchens, commissaries or similar places in which food is prepared for sale or service on the premises or elsewhere with or without charge. It does not include food vending machines or establishments serving beverages only in single service or original containers."

In order to legally operate a food service establishment, KRS 219.021 (1) requires a "permit to operate." This permit is issued by the local health department under the authority of the Cabinet for Human Resources.

There is a charge for this permit based on the number of people which can be seated in the establishment.

A "fee exempt permit" is issued to "private, parochial, or public school cafeterias of lunchroom facilities through the 12th grade and all facilities operated by the Cabinet for Human Resources, Bureau of Corrections and operated or licensed by the Cabinet for Human Resources." There is no charge for this permit and it is good from January 1 through December 31.

A "temporary food service permit" is issued to any food service establishment which operates at a fixed location for a period of time, not to exceed fourteen (14) consecutive days. The permit is good for fourteen days and the fee is \$10.00.

In years past, some health departments would allow a person to obtain several temporary permits in a row for operation for more than the fourteen day period if the establishment were temporary.

However, a recent memo from the Division for Consumer Health Protection advises local health departments that food service establishments which are to be operated at a fixed location beyond fourteen days must fully comply with the state food service code and obtain an annual operating permit.

In order to obtain this annual permit, certain procedures must be followed (submission of construction plans, etc.) and there are requirements for equipment such as a three compartment sink, hand wash lavatories, restrooms and other items.

The public should note that auction houses, fairs, benefits and various other activities are not exempt from the requirements of this law and that it is the responsibility of the operator to notify the health department of his or her intentions and to apply for the permit.

It is not the responsibility of health department personnel to go out and find these establishments.

Persons operating food service establishments without the required permits may be cited and charged with a misdemeanor offense and, if convicted in court, be fined from \$100 to \$500 or imprisoned for up to 30 days or both. (KRS 219.991).

For information, copies of the food service code or for assistance, interested persons may call the health department at 256-2242.

be extracted. The process of manufacturing the cells is slow, requires expensive machinery, and loses much of the purified silicon in cutting the wafer-thin cells. Thus, except for remote locations, the cost per watt of PV generating capacity is four to six times that from an oil- or coal-fired electric plant. In addition, the need for accessories—batteries, wiring, regulators, and inverters—can increase the cost of a system by 50 percent.

Nevertheless, in some applications, PV's are cost-competitive to, or even more economical than, utility power. Isolated houses (such as the Rockcastle Resource Center), ocean buoys, light-houses, automated weather stations, and Third World villages are examples where PV power has proven economical.

Furthermore, as researcher Christopher Flavin wrote recently, "Prices have fallen by 50 percent in the last five years alone, and new technologies and manufacturing processes virtually guarantee major cost reductions during the rest of the eighties." The photovoltaics industry, whose production expanded five fold from 1979 through 1981, is working on ways to automate production and increase the cell's efficiency

and is experimenting with new methods of making cells and with alternative semiconductor materials. Major breakthroughs appear monthly in the solar news-magazines.

As the cost of utility-generated electricity continues to rise, the future of photovoltaics becomes more promising. It appears that photovoltaics will be an economical means of generating electricity for the homeowner in the middle to late 1990's.

## Photovoltaics

Photovoltaic (PV) cells convert sunlight directly into electricity. Using materials which are called semiconductors, they produce an electric current to run appliances immediately or to charge batteries for later use.

PV cells were developed by private research laboratories in the middle 1950's because the Army Signal Corps was seeking a way to provide electricity for its remote transmitters. At that time, the Corps decided that they were too expensive. However, in 1958, NASA chose PV's to power the electrical system of their satellites. Through the 1960's, the space program provided the impetus to research and development in the field of photovoltaics.

Most PV cells on the commercial market today are made of silicon. The round or square cells are three to four inches across and only 4 mils thick. (In comparison, plastic garbage bags are 1 to 2 mils thick.) The cells are wired together to form a module, and this module is then encased in a protective coating of soft plastic and glass.

Photovoltaic cells have many points in their favor. They do not have any moving parts to wear out, do not consume any fuel, nor do they produce any pollution. They also operate at environmental temperatures. The only limitation on their lifetime, from the experience of the space program, appears to be the longevity of their protective coverings, which is estimated at 20 to 30 years. Once installed, a PV system provides inflation-proof electricity. Finally, any excess power can be sold to the utility. The electricity must be converted from DC to AC (PV's produce direct current), but under the Public Utilities Regulatory Policies Act (PURPA) of 1978, the utilities are required to purchase the additional PV output.

The major disadvantage of photovoltaics at this time is the cost, while silicon is relatively abundant, it exists mostly in compounds from which it must

## Fly Control

Fly control on beef cattle, especially those on pasture has been a difficult task ever since horn flies and face flies were imported from Europe. Both are most effectively controlled using regularly applied insecticidal treatments. Researchers have been working on ways to simply yet effectively apply insecticides using a variety of methods including regular sprays, backbrubbers or oilers, forced-use dustbags and combinations of these methods. The insecticide impregnated ear tag is the newest technique to become available and happily this method is very effective against both horn flies and face flies when used properly.

Insecticide is blended into polyvinyl chloride plastic which is then extruded into an ear tag. When the tag is attached to

the animal, the insecticide "blooms" onto the tag's surface. When the animal grooms itself, on another animal, the insecticide is rubbed off the tag onto the hair.

Insecticides impregnated ear tags are not a new concept. Preliminary studies using DDPV impregnated strips were done years ago. The first commercial tags contained tetrachlorvin-pyrene insecticide, but they were not especially effective. However, the development of the synthetic pyrethroid insecticides fenvalerate and permethrin has been responsible for the success of these tags. Tags containing these materials have sufficient insecticides in them to provide effective fly control for the entire season.

There are a number of different brand names for insecticide impregnated ear tags but they all contain either fenvalerate or permethrin insecticide.

An alternative system utilizes permethrin insecticide contained in a glass vial which is attached to an existing ear tag with

tape. After this tape is applied the vial should be crushed and the insecticide slowly oozes out onto the tag. Only one company currently uses this delivery system.

Every farmer wants to know how to use these tags most effectively while still keeping cost down. Research at the University of Kentucky has resulted in the following recommendations: 1. Apply two tags per animal including calves. Two tags per animal provides the best face fly control. Horn fly control can be achieved with one tag per animal. 2. Apply tags in the middle to the end of May. This timing gives good fly control and also helps to insure that sufficient insecticide will be available at the end of the season when fly pressure is the greatest. 3. Tag all animals in the herd. 4. Replace lost tags.

## Final date for planting insured corn in county announced

May 31 is the final planting date for insured corn in the Rockcastle County. Acres of corn planted by May 31, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by June 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage. After May 31 must also be reported on the June 15 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

Farmers unable to plant prior to May 31 because of excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower bushel-per-acre guarantee due to the late planting.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local authorized crop insurance agent.

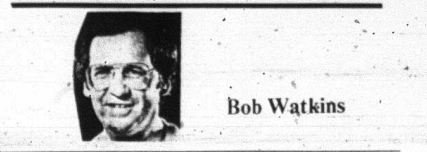

John Hoffman reported that some writers and fans believe Steve Alford's selection as Mr. Basketball in Indiana over Blackmon was because Alford is white. More than 75 percent of the more than 60 coaches and sportswriters who select Mr. Basketball are white. Nobody can say for sure if racism played a role, Hoffman writes. It seems odd, though, that a first-team All-America wasn't considered the top player in his state. Blackmon narrowed his final choice of colleges to UK, Louisville and Iowa. "After the visit (to Lexington) I decided that I could be really happy at Kentucky," he told Hoffman. "And I just loved Wildcat Lodge. Also, Coach (Joe) Hall said I'd get a lot of playing time and that's important to me." Blackmon's high school coach Bill Green believes he's good enough to be right in at UK. "James is a very quiet person, enjoys being by himself and is not outspoken," he says. "He's a very tough, competitive person and his teammates and is certainly the leader on the floor. He loves to pass the ball and gets a bigger jump setting up a great play than scoring."

### Recruiting

Louisville: With little or no fanfare LU added a third cager to its roster last week. Willie Olliges is a 6-4, 215-pound forward from Louisville, St. Xavier. He joins 6-10 Barry Sumpter and 6-7 Mark McSwain.

### UK next year

Nothing official, but there are four known high school seniors on UK's shopping list for '84: 6-10 Chris Washburn from Hickory, N.C.; 6-10 Danny Manning out of Virginia; 6-10 Richard Madison of Memphis-Northside; and 6-4 Steve Miller of Lexington Henry Clay.

Madison is a James Lee-type power player who was the star at Joe's Blue Chip prospect and the real recruiting for his services has not even begun yet.

UK's recruits already have been examined rather closely already. However the last signee was a surprise, Vince Sanford. 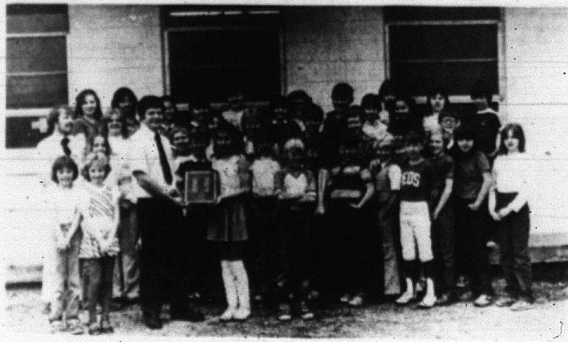

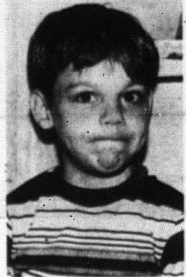

## Treatment of emotionally ill changes drastically in the last ten years

By Nancy Mallins

More advances have been made in the last ten years in the medical field of neuro-chemistry and neuro-physiology and its relation to human behavior and mental illnesses than had been made in the fifty years, says Dr. Arthur Mason, a professor of clinical psychiatry at the University of Kentucky Medical School for the past 20 years.

Dr. Mason travels to Mt. Vernon every other Wednesday and sees patients at clinics at the Mental Health offices on Main Street and also holds clinics in Frankfort.

A pioneer in the organizing and establishing of the first "pattern" mental

health board in Kentucky, the Bluegrass Region Board, following the passage of the 1962 Mental Health Act, Dr. Mason has authored over 40 papers on the care, treatment and rehabilitation of the emotionally ill and two years ago wrote the book "The Book of Anti-Psychotic Drug Therapy" which has been translated for and used widely by the Japanese medical community.

Psychiatry (the diagnosis and treatment with respect to emotionally ill) is researching areas such as senility in the elderly, previously ignored.

"More and more, Dr. Mason says, this and other


