Spring on Clear Creek brought Paris Swinford and Middlesboro back to visit the old family place with its memories of his life here as a boy. He and Ronald, who owns the farm, walked the fields, recalling scenes from the past.

Bill and Lorene Williams Fowler of Colorado

Spings, Colorado, have felt the call to return to Kentucky after reading the Signal. Being retired, they decided to settle once again near homefolk.

Lorene remembers well, when as a young girl, being a part of the group with my brother, my sister, and I and other young folks from Clear Creek who went for a ride one moonlight night years ago. Times took a different turn when the boys said there was a watermelon patch on a ridge above Climax.

We were chased off before much damage was done. Those old muzzle loader rifles sure make a lot of noise.

"A Look into the Past" Not all southerners disliked the north during the Civil War.

John Sinwford, a Confederate soldier from Georgia, who fought under the command of General Kirby Smith's army while it was in Kentucky, saw the hills and valleys and decided he would return after the war was over.

Near the headwaters of Clear Creek, on the Hammond Fork Branch, stands a large white southern plantation type house in a setting of well kept grounds with trees and shrubbery. Cattle grazing on the green fields surrounding this beautiful home with its tall, white columned porches. High wooded hills loom up in the background of a peaceful country scene.

Probably southerner John Swinford could not have seen ahead to that home but he certainly must have had some thoughts about the future when he yowed he would return to this land in Kentucky and make a future home.

Return, he did, after the roar of cannon, smoke from rifles, and the smell of death had all ceased and "drifted away with time. Bringing his wife and small son Reuben, John Swinford came up from Georgia, settled and accumulated lands in Madison and Rockcastle Counties after 1868.

The after some years around Berea Reuben, who had grown up, married a pretty girl named Nancy Kindred and moved to Clear Creek. Here he ran a sawmill, a grist mill and decided to put up a country store for the neighbors who had a long way to go to market.

Then, as in any mountain family, the children came along. First to be born was Mary Ellen Evans, Marshall was the oldest son. Next was Elizabeth (Moore), then came Frank, Sally (Woods) was the next daughter, followed by Eliza (Mullins). The third son and youngest child was named John Sherman.

The original home of Reuben and Nancy Swin-

ford had fewer rooms than the house as we know it today but as the children came, rooms were added on. The property has been purchased by John Swinford's great grandson, Reuben's grandson, and John Sherman's son, Ronald Swinford of Berea. After the deaths of Reuben and Nancy, Ronald and wife, Ann did some remodeling of the old home. To the exterior, they have given it the look of a gracious southern home, bringing the south to the north as John Swinford and family did years ago.

Ronald said the Swin-

ford house has the distinction of seeing three golden weddings in the family celebrated there.

Reuben and Nancy Swinford, 1919; John Sherman and Daisy, 194; Ron-

ald and Ann, 1961. It is this heritage of his family that Ronald takes pride in owning the home and land. Till then: Try everything in life once and the fun things twice.

4-H Soil Judging Team

Blue mold watch issued for southern counties

The University of Kentucky's Department of Plant Pathology issued a Blue Mold Watch on May 25 for the counties in the Wilderness Trail Area (Rockcastle, Laurel, Jackson, Bell, Clay, Harlan, Knox and White Counties), Lake Cumberland, Mammoth Cave, and Pennyrite Areas. This watch was issued because active blue mold is occurring in untreated plant beds in Tennessee and recent weather favors disease development. Dr. Charles Hadden, extension plant pathologist

at the University of Tennessee, issued a blue mold warning for all of Tennessee on May 24. Blue mold is occurring in untreated plant beds from Williamson County, southwest of Nashville, to Green County, east of Knoxville, and as far north as Hancock County, near the Tennessee, Kentucky, Virginia border. Sporulation has been heavy since May 23. The disease had destroyed several of the beds by the time growers noticed the disease. Systemic infections were common. Kentucky growers should be advised to maintain a vigorous control program for blue mold. Beds that were treated at seedling should receive a supplemental treatment of 2-3 teaspoons (1 tablespoon), because the Ridomil has leached below the root zone. Growers using a preventive fungicide program should increase the frequency of sprays to twice weekly and after each rain. Growers that have used no fungicides to date should begin to spray the beds twice weekly and after each rain with a labeled fungicide. Please bring suspected blue mold infected plants by the Extension Office for confirmation.

You Can Count on Milk

Most people take milk for granted. They know that it is abundant and will be in the dairy case when they shop at the grocery. Shoppers also know they can count on milk to be nutritious and safe. According to the Food and Drug Administration, milk is one of the best controlled, inspected and monitored of all food commodities.

Most Americans drink cow's milk, but a few people consume goat's milk. In some countries buffalo, goat, sheep and reindeer milk is popular.

In the United States, milk is legally defined and there are extensive state and local requirements that pertain to milk production from the time it is obtained from the cow to its final processing for distribution in the grocery.

The addition of vitamins A and D is not required but permitted by FDA regulations. When vitamins A and D are added, at least 2,000 international units of vitamin A must be added and a minimum of 400 international units of vitamin D. This means that an eight-ounce glass of milk provide about 10 percent of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of vitamin A and 25 percent of the U.S. RDA for vitamin D.

The milk purchased at the market is a standardized product, but as it comes from the cow there is some variation due to the breed of cow, the season of the year and the stage of lactation. On the average, milk is about 87.2 percent water, 3.7 percent fat, 3.5 percent protein, 4.9 percent lactose, and 0.7 percent ash.

Samples of raw milk are collected before milk is pumped into the tank trucks for delivery to the processing plant. These samples are analyzed for bacterial count, antibiotic residues, milk-fat content and other properties. State and local agencies also use these samples for their own laboratory analysis. As a result, the consumer buys milk as a grade A product, and in Kentucky milk must be properly pasteurized before it is marketed.

The label on grade A milk usually says whether it is pasteurized or homogenized. If the milk is ultra-pasteurized (minimum heat treatment of 280 de-

grees F for at least two seconds) or homogenized, the label says so. Homogenized milk has to be preheated and then it is forced through tiny openings under pressure of 500 to 2,500 pounds per square inch to reduce the size of the fat globules. This prevents separation of the cream from the milk and gives the milk a uniform consistency.

Food and nutrition experts usually agree that the most valuable contributions of milk are protein, calcium and riboflavin. Milk is not a good source of iron or Vitamin C.

The protein in milk is high quality because it contains a balance of essential amino acids required by adults and children. The protein in milk contributes about 22 percent of the calories in whole milk. Milk and dairy products contribute most of the calcium to the diet. In the United States, about 75 percent or more of the daily intake of calcium comes from milk and milk products. Nutritionists have been concerned about the gradual decline in the consumption of fluid milk in the United States. The increase in the consumption of cheese and other dairy products has helped provide additional calcium.

Many adults are concerned about the amount of fat in milk. An eight-ounce glass of skim milk has just as much calcium as whole milk and slightly more than half as many calories. An eight-ounce glass of whole milk contains 150 to 160 calories, and the same amount of skim milk has 90 calories. Skim milk has a trace of fat and only four milligrams of cholesterol compared to 35 milligrams of cholesterol in the eight-ounce glass of whole milk.

Low-sodium milk is not readily available, but it is produced for consumers on sodium-restricted diets. About 95 percent of the sodium that occurs naturally in milk can be removed by a special process. The sodium content of eight ounces of whole milk is reduced from 120 milligrams to about six milligrams. During the process, the sodium is replaced by potassium. Consumers needing information on how to purchase this special milk should ask the manager or owner of the grocery.

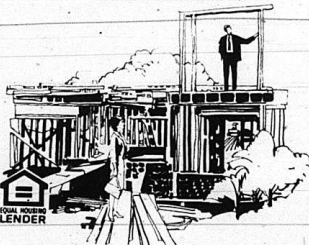

Co-defendants in theft case sentenced

Guilty plea

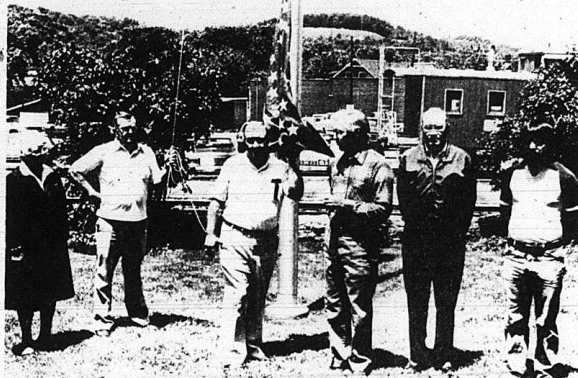
Jackie Clontz was sentenced May 27 in Circuit Court to his guilty plea on two counts of possession of schedule I narcotics on a February 1982 charge.

Investigating officer Dean Ratliff said Wheat told him the truck caught fire as it was moving down the highway. Burn

District Judge Venters denies motion for bond reduction in Capital murder case

Denver Earl Holly will remain in the Rockcastle County Jail at least for now, and his bond was not reduced during a preliminary hearing held last Friday before District Judge Dan Venters.

These two questions were asked of Venters by Holly's attorney, Warren Scoville of London.

Holly was charged with three counts of murder following the deaths of Pamela Burke and her two children, David and Cindy, on Sunday, May 22 after an automobile accident on I-75 in Rockcastle County.

Scoville told Venters during the hearing that he understood the severity of the charges against his client. "I thought the bond (which Venters has set at \$1,030,000 cash) should be reduced. Scoville went on to say that because emotions were running so high in the community that he was worried about his client's safety and wanted Holly transferred to the Laurel County Jail. "I realize that you have a fine jail, but with emotion running so high in the community, some drunk could get thrown into jail and cause problems for my client," Scoville said. He added that the Laurel County Jail was probably one of the finest facilities in the state and that to prepare for a capital murder case, he would need to be alone with his client. He said the Laurel Jail has conference rooms which make it possible for him to bring doctors in to examine his client.

When Scoville finished, Rockcastle County Jailer Henry Lee Abney told Venters that Scoville could be alone with his client any time he wished by using

the jail's kitchen. However, Scoville remarked that he did not feel the jail's kitchen was the proper place to prepare for a capital murder case.

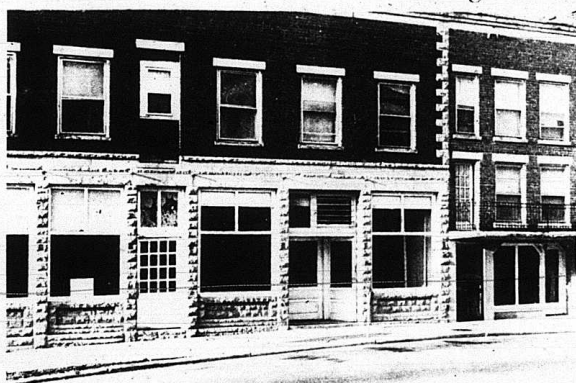
After very little thought on the matter, Venters told the court that he felt the bond that he set was in line with the charges and that he would not reduce it. He did however tell Scoville that he would give some thought to the matter of transferring Holly to Laurel County but that he was not prepared to rule on it at that time.

When State Trooper Marc Daly took the stand during the hearing, he told the court that after he arrested Holly and put him in the back seat of his cruiser, he went back to arrest another man, with whom Holly had allegedly been fighting along the interstate prior to Daly's arrival at the scene. Daly said before he could react, Holly had climbed over into the front seat of the cruiser and was driving away with his hands still cuffed behind his back.

Daly told the court that he commandeered a passing vehicle and went after Holly who, by that time, was traveling at a high rate of speed in the southbound lane of the interstate. He said that when he arrived at the site of the accident, the Burke's vehicle was sitting in the median and his cruiser was sitting in the northbound lane next to the guardrail. at the new competency assessment program soon to be required of student-teachers in Kentucky.

Educators are hailing the comprehensive testing and evaluation program as a means of determining whether candidates for public school teaching jobs are truly qualified for classroom work.

The state Education Cabinet has said that the cost of the program would be \$2 million the first year (1963-64) and \$1.5 million in subsequent years.

The assessment will be based on both a written examination and a one-year teaching internship.

The written test, to be drawn up by the state Education, will be given to each student-teacher prior to the issuance of a one-year temporary teaching certificate.

The test will be designed to measure the candidate's communication skills, general knowledge, professional awareness and competency in his or her specific teaching field. The state board will determine acceptable levels of achievement.

For the duration of the one-year temporary certificate, the teacher will be permitted to hold full-time employment, subject to subsequent re-examination.

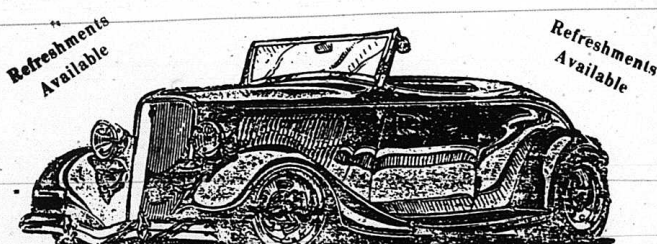
