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Training for candy strippers

An orientation session for new Candy Strippers will be held at Rockcastle County Hospital on Thursday, June 16 at 1 p.m. in the Training Room.

Any boy or girl who is attending high school is eligible to be a Volunteer Candy Stripper. The program has been revised to update the rules and regulations. To become a Candy Stripper, a person must fill out an application, learn the skills

for the duties they are allowed to perform, and receive a TB skin test. There will be a probationary period of one month and then the volunteer will be informed if they are a member of the Candy Stripper Organization.

After becoming a member, the Candy Stripper receives a uniform and is encouraged to work at least one two-hour session a week. Candy Strippers are required to log their hours at the nurses station and

after 25 hours of service, they are given a cap. After 50 hours of service they receive a pin.

Mrs. Betty Purcell, director of training and a registered nurse, will teach the Candy Strippers the skills they need to be in the program. Leigh Anne Hiatt, volunteer coordinator, will assist in the orientation and will arrange a work schedule for the members who complete the program.

A Candy Stripper at the local hospital learns responsibility, contributes to the well-being of others, and gets health care experience that could be an asset to a future career.

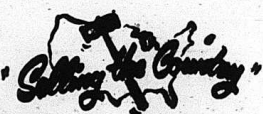

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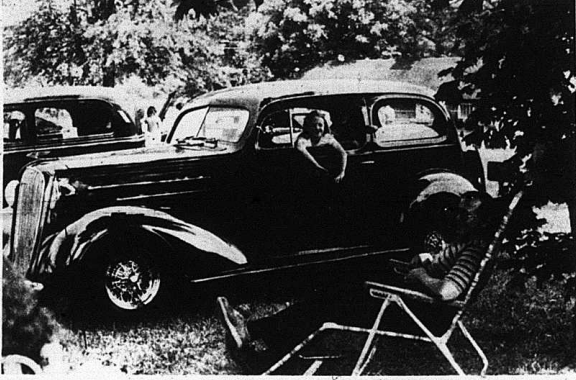

City of Brodhead gets HUD matching grant to upgrade sewer system

Mayor Ronnie Cash announced that he had received word that Brodhead has been awarded a grant of \$329,000 for needed sewer improvements. The grant was made through the Kentucky Community Development Block Grant Program administered through the Kentucky Department for Local Government. The grant culminates several years of effort by the City to obtain funds to improve and expand the City's sewer service.

Mayor Cash reported that the City had received technical assistance in obtaining the grant from Mr. Mike Hayes of the CVADD and from Jim Cass of the Clay County Community Development Agency, as well as from their engineer, Mr. Green Keith of London. He also praised Mr. Dee Russell, Mr. Cam Hancock of the Brodhead Water and Sewer Department, D.A. Robbins, David McCauley, Verla Scott, and

Representative Danny Ford, for their hard work in helping to get the project funded.

This administration as well as the prior City administration has worked extremely hard to obtain this grant Mayor Cash said and our efforts have finally paid off. Actual construction on the project is expected to begin by about the middle of August of this year and extend over into the summer of 1984.

The \$329,000 HUD grant will be matched with \$90,000 in local funds for a total project cost of approximately \$419,000. The project will involve the replacement of broken sewer mains along West Street, and certain other areas of the City. It will also involve installation of a Lift Station in the vicinity of the Old Log Cabin Camp and the deletion of certain lines and manholes along Negro Creek where water is currently getting into the lines.

The 1983-84 county budget is \$839,359, down from last year's budget figure.

County revenues down by over hundred thousand for 1983-84

With demands on county government to provide services and meet the basic needs of its citizenry, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and County Judge/Executive will be especially challenged during the next year.

The biggest single slash came in Local Government Economic Assistance (LGEA) funds, commonly called coal severance tax money.

Last year, the budget included \$109,060 in anticipated revenues from LGEA.

However, near the end of the third quarter, county government officials received word from Frankfort that it had over-estimated and overpaid LGEA funds to Rockcastle.

Actually, by the end of the Fiscal year (July 1st), the county will have received only approximately \$100,000 from LGEA and some of this is overpayment which will be withheld from the county during the upcoming Fiscal Year.

This coming year, only \$30,239 is estimated to be received from LGEA, a \$77,000 shortfall.

Thirty percent of LGEA funds must be spent to repair and keep up roads over which coal trucks travel.

LGEA funds are returned to the coal producing counties on the basis of the amount of coal sold from that county. The depressed coal industry is responsible for reduced revenue from this source.

The county will also be getting \$124,000 less in Revenue Sharing money than it received last year.

Rockcastle anticipates receiving \$189,316.00 from Revenue Sharing in 1983-84.

A decrease of \$5,000 is anticipated in jail fund fees based upon last year's receipts.

Contrary to plans, no action was taken Tuesday night at the school board meeting concerning the hiring of a boys' basketball coach for Rockcastle County High School.

The committee recommended the hiring of Mike Jones, who coaches girls' basketball at Cawood High School in Harlan County. Charles Parsons, superintendent, reported, however, that he had talked with Jones / late Tuesday afternoon and was informed that Jones expected to be hired as head boys' basketball coach at Cawood on Wednesday night. He said Jones had promised to let him know the outcome Thursday morning.

Parsons said if Jones does not agree to come here, the committee (made up of Tommy Hodges, George Poynter, Preston Parrett, Cleston Saylor, Rudolph Burdette and Parsons) will have to schedule more interviews.

Others interviewed along with Jones were Gene Middleton and Paul Hayes. Five new teachers were employed for next year, subject to certification.

John Lester Wells, Jr. was hired to teach math at RCHS. He will fill the vacancy left by Paul Holbrook who is retiring.

Jennifer Weller will be teaching hearing-impaired children from Rockcastle County who travel to Eastern Kentucky University's campers laboratory classroom. The position is a new one funded by the state department of education.

Connie Riddle will be teaching at RCHS this year. She replaces Lawrence Bullock who taught the vocational world of work. Bullock transferred to an art teaching position left vacant by the retirement of Barbara Owens.

Janice Cummins was hired to teach special education at Mt. Vernon Elementary. She will be replacing Doris Cash who is moving into the regular classroom to fill a position left open by Edna Dawson.

Court votes to replace track lights

The Fiscal Court voted to comply with a request from the lessors of the Brodhead Fairgrounds to install new track lights at the Fairgrounds.

At Tuesday's meeting, Frank Martin, spokesman for the group, presented the two bids received to the court. The low bid, of \$6,000 from the Driewood Electric Company of Lancaster was accepted. Martin explained to the court that \$4,000 of the amount would be reimbursed by a grant from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, however, only \$2,000 could be

received this year. The other \$2,000 would not be made available until next year.

The Court members and Judge Bob Jasper discussed the cash flow problem and asked Martin to schedule the work so that payment would not be due until after July 5 when a payment from Revenue Sharing is expected. Mention was also made of the remainder of the lease payment which is due in August and can be applied to the cost of the lights.

Martin said the lighting contractors had also

agreed for the same price to replace some boxes and wiring which leads to the barns and are now a potential fire hazard.

The court also voted to supply the concrete to build a sidewalk to the Senior Citizens' Center at the Library. Pete Hurd, representing the Senior Citizens, said the city had agreed to provide the materials for the forms and the labor for the sidewalk. The concrete is estimated to cost \$1,500.00.

Expressive expressions and sayings

If you "think much on it", language is probably the most powerful force in society today.

Ever increasing modern complexities have brought about a sophisticated language process which is not only verbalized, but also analyzed, stylized and computerized.

Researchers explain body language. Analysts tell candidates what language to use in order to win. Summit conference language has an altogether different meaning and

technique from everyday usage.

The most fascinating aspect of language, to me, especially with regard to oral expression, is the injection into the language of colorful and sometimes graphic expressions and sayings.

Most are so common to us we never give them a second thought, using them, accepting and understanding them readily.

They can also present a barrier to understanding between those of different ages, since these sayings are constantly changing

and since children are not as familiar with language as adults.

Notice the puzzled expression on the face of a person over 70 years of age (unless the person is very "hipped") when a teenager talks about "pigging out" being "groty to the max" (totally unacceptable) or hating to "dump on someone" (tell someone your troubles).

Reverse that and ask one under 20 years of age the meaning of "looking to get down" (ready to give birth) or "he don't take

But after Saul learned the truth, he changed from the "Jews' religion (Acts 22:10-16; 9:18), to the religion taught by Christ and His apostles.

When Lydia and her husband learned the truth, they obeyed it; they changed from the religion they had been practicing (Acts 16:13-15).

Should a person change his religion if he is wrong? If one has an "honest and good heart" (Luke 8:15), he will change without hesitation.

A more common similar remark is the "favors" her sister, To children who are learning the language, these expressions and words, when ages, combined, perhaps with inflection, can be very confusing.

Shirley Cox, mother of pre-school Jonathan did not know up did she realize the mental picture he drew when she called her niece to baby sit and on occasion told her son, "Honey, their mother says they are tied up." Only when he finally quizzed her about the manner in which they were tied up did she realize what he had been thinking. Many expressions seem to be peculiar to a certain region. Patricia Anderson had never heard anyone referred to as being "dressed right out of the ashes" (wearing good clothes) until she moved here. Rachel James said she was confused by people here who use the expres-

Other mountain or area expressions include "clever" to describe a generous host or person; "gettin' above your raisin'" to mean becoming snobbish; "turned funny" to mean a peculiar personality; "light out" or "hit out" to refer to commencing (ex. They lit out, a-walkin'); "white-eyed means tired enough to collapse; "plagued" refers to being embarrassed and "not long for this world" means very sick.

Up slightly from last year's budget entry are the general fund estimated receipts. Last year's \$197,950 figure is increased to \$212,984. This increase is due to a \$17,000 bonus in the District Court office and administration. Most other sources of income for the general budget were down.

County road aid money increased by \$16,000. The Fiscal Court approved a budget to be sent to Frankfort last Wednesday. Following approval by the state, the magistrates will adopt the budget before July 1.

the oil in the two Senior Citizens' vans if the oil is furnished. The magistrates agreed. Juvenile prisoners from Rockcastle County will be taken to Russell County since the court approved a contract Tuesday with Russell County to provide the service for \$15.00 a day per prisoner.

After some discussion of a fence which was recently constructed on county right-of-way along an old county road which was reconstructed 2 years ago, county attorney James Lambert was instructed by the court to write a letter to Bill Gregory asking him to move the fence.

The road in question is from the Niggertown Hill area to Lake Linville, along one side of which property belonging to Gregory lies.

Magistrate Donald Rowe said that he "did not want to be reached by county record," but voiced again his opposition to putting creek-gravel on county roads.

He said, "We are all cutting our throats by putting creek rock on these roads. He said one of his constituents was upset because 2 loads of "mud" had been put on his road. "I don't think we are saving money," he said.

No action was taken on Rowe's remarks, however, at a suggestion by Magistrate Alex Albright, agreement was reached to take bids on "white" gravel.

There was some discussion and voting regarding a decision at a recent called county meeting to work the county's three grader operators 4 days a week, split shift, including Saturdays.

One of the three county owned graders is reportedly out of operation.

At the last meeting all graders were out of the number of days the two remaining graders are working to include Saturdays and divide the work between the three operators.

At Tuesday's meeting, however, Donald Rowe and Alex Albright agreed to a motion by Rowe to rescind the former action.

The motion did not pass, and a counter motion to let the workers on staggered work week was made by Tom Denney. Joe Clark seconded the motion and Bill Wren voted in favor.

Regarding the matter and Rowe's inference that the men did not like the change, Judge Bob Jasper commented "when you have someone working for you, you tell them how to work, you don't let them tell you how to do it."

Jasper and Magistrates Wren and Clark all agreed that the work week change will be temporary, but was necessary now because road work was behind because of recent weather conditions.

Frank Johnson of Scaffold Cave came before the court to complain about the state of the road. He had gotten from repeated requests from county officials to fix the road he lives on.

Johnson lives on a road which is off the Scaffold Cave Road. He complained that once a grader came down and turned in his driveway and went back up with the grader blade up.

He said one tile had been taken out of the road and laid behind a barn for 6 months while the road, according to the state, needs tile, gravel, ditching, and grading desperately. He said potholes are terrible.

He seemed particularly distressed to discuss the road to the magistrate in his district, Bill Wren.

Johnson said "old policy" was to pay for an emergency time he mentions it. The question "Didn't Mr. Thacker fix it for you?" was asked him, he said.

The road is approximately 4 miles and, according to Johnson, accommodates 20 families.

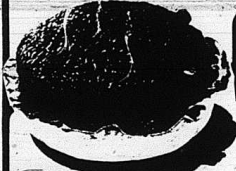

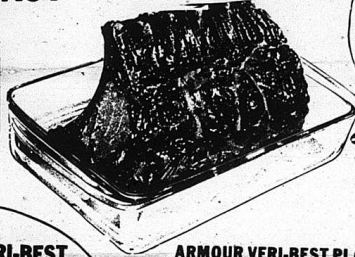

Use Dairy Products During June-Dairy Month
Cost-Saving Tips
-Buy processed cheese instead of natural cheese.
-Grate or slice cheese at home.
-Don't buy individually wrapped cheese slices. They may be easy to use, but they are expensive.
-Make your own cheese spreads.
-Use instant, non-fat dry milk for cooking and drinking. Not only is it usually less expensive, it is lower in calories than fresh whole milk.

Preparation Tips
-Grated or sliced cheese melts faster and blends better with other ingredients. To make about 2 cups grated cheese start with 1/2 pound block.
-Cheese that is cold grates easier than cheese at room temperature.
-Cook milk products gently. When a dish contains large amounts of milk, cheese or yogurt, use low heat. If cooked too long or if cooked over high heat, milk and yogurt will curdle, and cheese will become tough and stringy.
-If possible, add cheese and yogurt during the last few minutes of cooking, at low, just enough time to melt or heat through.

Storage Tips
-Store non-fat dry milk in a tightly closed container. To keep out moisture, keep the container in a cool, dry place. If properly stored, non-fat dry milk will stay fresh for up to six months.
-Keep fresh milk or reconstituted dry milk covered and in the coldest part of the refrigerator.
-Refrigerate unopened cheese in its original wrapper. After opening, wrap well and store in the refrigerator, or refrigerate in a tightly closed container.
-If cheese becomes moldy, completely trim off the mold before eating.
-For longer storage, freeze extra cheese; cheese will stay fresh in the freezer for up to six months. (After thawing, the cheese may crumble easily, but it will taste just as good.)
-Reduce Calories
If you are watching your weight, use the following tips to reduce cal-

ories.
-Choose low-fat and skim-milk products.
-Select plain yogurt rather than fruit-flavored.
-Substitute low-fat cottage cheese or plain yogurt for sour cream and mayonnaises in recipes for dips and dressings, or as a topping for baked potatoes.
-Top desserts with whipped topping made with non-fat dry milk rather than whipped cream.
-Use ice milk rather than ice cream.
-Read food labels and look for the words "low-fat", "reduced calories", "lite" or "skim milk product".
-Compare the calorie differences for yourself. Small calorie savings add up quickly.

Magic Milk Mix
Use this recipe to make puddings, sauces and soups.
4 cups instant non-fat dry milk
1 cup flour
1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine
Mix all ingredients in a large bowl until mixture looks like oatmeal.
Store in a tightly covered container in the refrigerator. Yield, about 5 cups. Calories: 485 per cup.

CREAM SOUPS
4 cups water
2 cups Magic Milk Mix
1 teaspoon salt
Combine and stir over medium heat until slightly thick. You can add any cooked vegetables to the soup. Try one of these variations:

3 cooked carrots
1 pkg chopped spinach, cooked
3 potatoes, cooked and chopped and 1 T. onion, chopped
1 can cream-style corn and 1 T. chopped onion

Season to taste with your favorite herbs or spices.
Yield, 6 servings. Calories, 150 per serving, without vegetables.

Vanilla Pudding
1/4 cup sugar
2 cups Magic Milk Mix
2 cups water
1 teaspoon Vanilla
Mix sugar, Macig Milk Mix and water together in saucepan. Cook, stirring slowly, over medium heat until you see a bubble in the pudding. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Cover and cool. Keep refrigerated.

New program for academically gifted

The Rockcastle County Board of Education will implement a new program for the 1983-84 school year. This is a unique program in that it will be designed to meet the specific needs of the students with high academic or intellectual potential.

This first year the program will exist in grades 4-8 in our elementary schools and will be called "Challenge." Our high school program for grades 9-12 will be called "Humanities."

The selected high school students will enroll in Humanities on an hourly basis per week the same as their other classes. This is an elective course, and half credit will be earned each semester.

The elementary program will operate with a pull-out organizational arrangement. The students will meet for approximately two and one-half to three hours each week on one special day.

These students will participate in areas of study that are diverse, advanced, and complex to reflect their

ability levels. Higher level thinking skills as per Bloom's Taxonomy are developed through activities related to creative thinking, critical thinking, creative writing, problem solving and Jr. Great Books.

Research skills and independent study skills will be utilized as the students design and develop an in-depth study of their specific areas of interest.

Field trips will be utilized to introduce students to new environments and new experiences. Resource people with varying expertise from the community and surrounding areas will work with these students as the need arises.

According to the state guidelines, we can serve only five percent of each grade included in the program. There is a maximum of 150 students; each of the two teachers can have only seventy-five percent. Therefore, because of these strict limitations, only those students with the highest rank can be admitted to the program on an annual basis.

Identification of the students was done very carefully and state guidelines were followed. An appointed committee made every effort to select the students objectively and fairly by means of an anonymous procedure. Students' ID numbers were assigned after preliminary screening was completed. This identification system involved multiple criteria, such as IQ scores, achievement test scores, teacher and peer nomination, and student academic performance throughout this past year. Points were given for each criterion and were then totaled. The students were ranked to points received with 58 being the highest possible.

High school students have been identified first because of scheduling to be done this summer. Parents of those students will be notified soon of their child's selection for the program. Elementary identification and parent notification will be done in August—probably the first week or so of school.

Parental permission will be requested for those classes. This is a local policy to insure that parents are aware of their child's educational program. If your child qualified for either Challenge or Humanities, you should be pleased and should encourage his participation. It will be an exciting and challenging program from which the children will benefit greatly.

Student recommendations will be kept on file at the central office. Each placement will be re-evaluated at least annually in relation to educational progress in this program.

Managing European corn borers in commercial peppers

European corn borers can cause severe damage to commercial peppers. An understanding of the corn borer's life cycle and habits is the key to reducing yield losses to this pest.

There are three generations of the European corn borer in Kentucky. The first appears in late May through early June. The mid-summer generation develops from late July through August. A third generation is active in early September. The second or mid-summer generation is most likely to cause problems for commercial pepper producers. An understanding of the corn borer's life cycle and habits is the key to reducing borer damage to peppers because timing control measures is important.

European corn borer moths tend to congregate in tall grassy areas around field margins. Females fly into fields at night to lay their eggs. Weather condi-

tion during egg laying can greatly affect the severity of corn borer problems.

Calm farm nights are most favorable for moth activity, while few eggs are laid on windy, stormy nights. Second generation moth flight occurs over a period of several weeks.

European corn borer eggs are laid in masses of 15 to 30 eggs per mass. The eggs are round and flattened and overlap each other like fish scales. Often they are placed on the underside of the pepper leaf near the midrib. Color indicates how old the mass is: freshly laid eggs are white then cream. When a distinct black spot (the head of the larva) can be seen in the egg, it will hatch in about 24 hours.

The newly hatched larvae (about 1/16 inch long) leave the mass and crawl toward the developing pods. They do little feeding on pepper leaves. Within two to 12 hours after hatching the young larvae reach the cap of the pods. Once under the cap, they are protected from insecticides and natural enemies.

Corn borer feeding can cause several problems, the most serious is direct damage to the fruit and premature drop of small fruit. Entrance holes in larger pods allow water to enter, often resulting in fruit rot. When rotting begins, borers often leave and move to infest new fruit. In this way, one borer can damage several pods. In addition, stems may break due to tunneling of the borers in the plant.

Several insecticides are registered to control or reduce corn borer damage to peppers. Furadan Granular, a systemic insecticide, may be sidedressed in two applications for prevention of infestations. Adequate rainfall is necessary to assure uptake of Furadan in the plants. Foliar sprays of Orthene, Sevin or Guthion may be used when corn borer egg masses are found. Guthion, a registered use pesticide, is very poisonous and should be applied only by certified applicators.

A knowledge of corn borer activity patterns and proper use of correctly timed insecticide treatments can greatly reduce European corn borer damage to commercial peppers.

Wednesday night's program featured a carnival where admission was empty popcorns. While many of the boys had mustaches and beards painted on their faces, the girls, like Cloia Smith had stars, hearts and rainbows painted on theirs. The carnival's kissing booth was favorite of both boys and girls, even after the chocolate kisses ran out.

Several parents from Rockcastle County joined us for the evening meal on Thursday. They were shown around the camp and to the cabins by their children. We hoped they were not too surprised by the messy condition of the cabins.

Thursday evening's program was a dog show. Not your ordinary dog show, mind you, these dogs were trained law enforcement

dogs. A circle of agents and adult leaders was formed around the dogs so that we would get eaten should any dog escape from his master. The show was wet short because of the rain but it was very informative concerning what dogs can do in law enforcement.
