

attached for more than two hours.

Q. How will I know if Inave become infected with RMSF?
The onset of RMSF is definite and usually starts two days to two weeks after the tick bite.

Q. What are the symptoms?

A. Symptoms include

what are the symptoms include fever, chills, headache and muscle, aches. A rash (which often resembles mealses) may appear after two or four days of fever. At first it is seen on the wrists and ankels. Later the rash may spread to the rest of the body.
