Till then, it isn't the high cost of living, it's the cost of living high that affects a lot of people today.

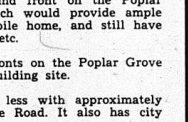

He also gave me one of my first lessons on priorities and what is important in life while we



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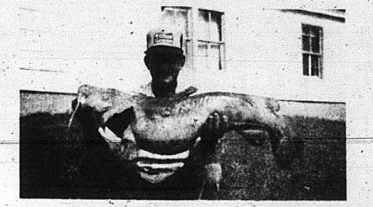

Hospital Focus

Roger Pence is the new administrator at Rockcastle County Hospital. He began his duties on May 23 after coming to Mt. Vernon from West Virginia where he was administrator of the 127 bed Grafton City Hospital in Grafton.

Pence received his master's in health care administration from the Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, and earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Cincinnati, Ohio. He sees health care as combining the best of both worlds: business and serving people.

"I've found that dealing with a number of diverse groups in a hospital setting is as much or more of a challenge than I had expected," said the 32-year-old Pence.

He has strong opinions about the role a privately-operated hospital plays in a community, the size of Rockcastle. Economics is a big factor. Being the second largest employer in the county (second only to the school system), the hospital's economy benefits the community's economy through employing skilled residents who reinvest their payroll with local purchases.

The hospital is also important to the community by the services it offers. People don't have to leave the county for health care.

Pence realizes that small hospitals are going to have a difficult time in the future because of the economy and changing government regulations. "It's going to mean that small hospitals will have increasing expenses that will be more difficult to meet—through skilled nursing, and reduced help from the government," he said.

He thinks one answer to the problem of small rural hospitals is innovative management. Competent administration, management controls and affiliations with other institutions are options available to enable the small hospital to survive.

Although he has been in his position at Rockcastle only a short time, Pence sees things he would like to accomplish. "The key right now is stabilization. There have been changes in administration and personnel reductions. Now we need to put things into place. There will be future changes, such as revised personnel policies, but hopefully not radical modifications."

He would like to work with the Board of Directors in mapping out a long-range plan. This will enable employees and administration to work toward established goals.

He describes his managerial style as open. "The Department Heads are in charge of their area, but if they have a problem they come to me. If I have a question, I'm going to ask them." He feels that employees can come to him, but only after going to their supervisor first.

Pence is a native of Sidney, Ohio. His father is a building contractor and Pence worked in the family business while in high school and college. His mother is a real estate salesperson and he has two younger sisters.

He met his wife while working as vice-president for planning at the Galesburg Cottage Hospital in Galesburg, Illinois. Becky is a registered nurse and has been pursuing a job in health care since moving to Rockcastle.

Pence and his wife were active in the community while in Grafton, West Virginia, and they're looking forward to living here and establishing strong ties.

Pence pointed out that the Board wants the public to know they have every intention of maintaining Rockcastle County Hospital and Skilled Nursing facility. "We've had some problems and we've made headway in overcoming those problems. We're making every effort to maintain the high quality of health care we're provid-

An Ordinance of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, granting a TV Cable Franchise.

The City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, does ordain as follows:
Section 1. That Wayne Stewart, d/b/a Mount Vernon TV Cable, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, is hereby authorized to acquire, purchase,

construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system of works for the generation, distribution and transmission of television cable service from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City; to have and hold any easements or other right necessary or convenient for said purposes; to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys and public places while constructing or operating said television cable service or works; and to cross any and all streets and streams in this City for the purpose of constructing such poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of television cable service in and through this City.

Section 2. The purchaser shall indemnify, and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley, or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the

exercise of any privileges herein granted, by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.
Section 3. The purchaser may furnish television cable service to any person or persons residing along or near the aforesaid streets, avenues, alleys and public places, and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and said person or persons.
Section 4. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.
Section 5. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of ten (10) years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.
Section 6. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser.
Section 7. This ordinance is effective upon publication.

Grand Jury hears evidence; returns indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury met Friday and issued a ten count indictment against Denver Earl Holley of Laurel County in connection with the deaths of three Rockcastle County residents on Sunday, May 21. The deaths were a result of a head-on collision on I-75 north in Rockcastle County. Holley was indicted on three counts of murder, first degree assault, theft by unlawful taking over \$100, fourth degree assault, third degree escape, driving under the influence of intoxicants, operating a vehicle on revoked license and drinking beer in a public place. He was arraigned Friday and trial date was set for August 23.

Terry Robillard, a resident of Florida, was indicted on 18 counts relating to charges brought following an incident involving a stolen motor home.

Robillard was indicted for receiving stolen property, 11 counts of wanton endangerment in the first degree, three counts of first degree criminal mischief and three counts of third degree criminal mischief.

Other indictments returned were Gerard Miller for cultivating marijuana and E.J. Reed and Sally McCollum for production of marijuana.

Marijuana charge

A charge of cultivating marijuana was placed against Charles "Bud" Lovell, Jr., city policeman at Livingston, after Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor and deputy "Jibb" Hasty confiscated 16 plants of marijuana growing in pots in Lovell's back yard at Burr and in the edge of the woods behind his residence.

According to the sheriff, the search warrant was obtained Friday after complaints were registered against Lovell.

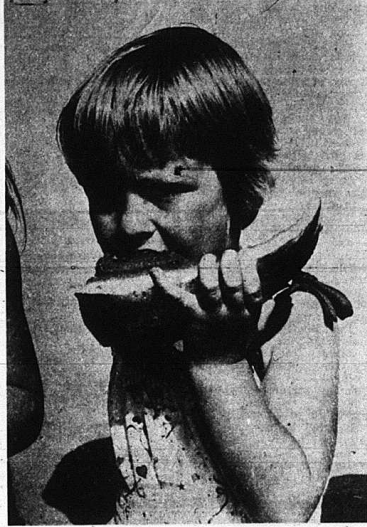

Local man killed in jeep accident Saturday

A Rockcastle County man died Sunday morning around noon, the result of injuries he received in an automobile accident early Saturday morning.

Timothy Dwayne Chasteen, 24, of Route 3, Mt. Vernon, was pronounced dead at the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center in Lexington by Fayette County coroner Chester Hager. Hager said Chasteen died of injuries to his liver. According to Hager, 80 per-

cent of Chasteen's liver was destroyed and his blood would not clot.

According to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor, Chasteen and his older brother, Marvin, were coming up the Negro Town Hill Road from Lake Linville around 1:45 a.m. Saturday morning when the Jeep they were traveling in overturned, throwing both occupants out.

After throwing the two men out of the Jeep, it rolled over and pinned Tim

Chasteen underneath it, Taylor said.

"Marvin, who was added to some extent from the wreck, was about 1/4 of a mile back down to the lake and got help. When he returned, with some other men, they set the Jeep off. Chasteen," Taylor said. "Then, they waited for an hour and a half for an ambulance to come this miles to pick the boy up," he added.

Council reviews and discusses budget which includes sewer annexation to two areas

A budget totaling \$431,000 was read and discussed Monday night at the regular meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

Major new projects included in the budget proposed by Mayor Roland Mullins for the up-coming fiscal year, include \$20,000 for sewer extensions into the Fairground Hill and Owens Subdivision sections of town (Mt. Vernon's Community Action Block Grant application to include the sewer extension to Fairground Hill was rejected recently, for the fourth time).

Besides the sewer extensions, the budget also included \$7,000 to match a grant the city is in hopes of getting to do landscaping and sidewalk renovation in connection with the Downtown Revitalization Project now underway.

From the coal severance revenue, \$2,000 was designated to be used to black-top the new city parking lot across the street from the courthouse.

The budget also includes funds to continue the sidewalk to the high

school, build a sidewalk from the new health department building on Dover Street to the hospital and help with the sidewalk project proposed to run from U.S. Highway 25 to the Senior Citizens Center at the County Library.

David Stipes, officer with the Rockcastle Conservation Office, presented a \$12,000 proposal to the city government to clean the canal, drain the playground area and seed the road bank at the park at Lake Linville. Stipes said he would have the final figures in July when he finishes writing up the plan. Stipes will also apply for a grant through his department for one half of the funds which will have to be matched by the city if the project is approved.

A request to extend the sewer to lots off U.S. 150 near the residence of Arthur Rowe was made by Gary Cromer and Mike Barr, who own the property. A motion passed permitting the extension, providing the property owners provide all the labor, materials and easements. The

city must approve the work however they will bear one of the maintenance costs.

Two bids for auditing of accounts were opened, however, no award was made since there was some confusion concerning what one bid included. Award will be made at the July meeting, according to the mayor.

Only one bid by William D. Ruth of Danville was submitted for auditing of the UDAG grant account.

A one-year lease was signed by Edgar Jackson, boat dock manager, and city officials Monday night. The lease fee is \$1,000.

Jackson discussed problems he has been having at the lake including persons swimming all over the lake, campers on areas other than those designated for camping, illegal boat launching and the need for more police protection.

The council voted to put a bouy and sign back up on the Hysinger Hollow Cove area of the lake that the area is for fishermen

Hurst farm operation considered a family affair

Donnie Hurst's mother, Ora Lee, used to take him with her to the milking barn when he was a baby and sit him in the feed box while she helped her husband, Donald, milk.

More often than not, he managed to eat a fistful of feed. She says they have always jokingly told him that is what has made him so "healthy-looking."

In any event, it was an appropriate beginning for the boy who now takes so much satisfaction from farming, which includes milking 40 cows, on his family's farm and a job as supervisor for the Dairy Herd Improvement Association through the University of Kentucky.

Donnie, who is 23, takes milk samples and data from dairy farmers in Rockcastle and Pulaski who buy the computer service from the University.

For the past year and a half, area farmers have had access to this record keeping system which provides the farmer with a data print-out on the cow in the herd, rating each as to pounds production per year, illness, breeding and calving dates, butter fat and feed requirements.

In both counties, eighteen dairy farmers purchase this service for \$1.30 per cow per month, which Donnie firmly believes is well worth the cost.

In Rockcastle, the largest herd he services is Coy and Connie Taylor's (70) and in Pulaski it is Jasper and Associates (150).

Once a month, Donnie used to like to help with the data purchasing farm at the morning and evening milkings to take his data and samples. In addition, he has done 3 days of training at U.K. twice a year.

The Hursts live on the Poplar Grove Road at Will-

handed down" to Donnie's father, Donald, from his grandfather, Lewis, who lives just down the road.

Donald, who works for the Ky. Dept. of Highways and also farms, used to help his dad milk 14 cows by hand before and after school when he was in high school. Ora Lee says he has been into the dairy farming business for more than 24 years since they have been married.

Ora used to like to help with the farm chores but has been unable to since shortly after the birth of twin boys, Barry and Garry, now 18, when she developed rheumatoid arthritis. The twins are no less enthusiastic about farming

than other members of their family. They do most of the milking during the week, getting up at 5:30 a.m. to do the morning job which takes about 2 1/2 hours. In the evening, they milk from 4:30 to 7. On week ends, Donnie and his dad take over, letting the boys sleep late.

Right now, the Hursts have two milking stalls on a leased farm but are planning a new 8 or 4 stall milking parlor to be built on their farm. They will then be able to qualify as a Grade A dairy and will hopefully receive enough increase in price to help pay for the new parlor. The Hursts now sell about 1,000 lbs. of milk a day

(for cheese) to Dairymen, Inc. in London for \$12.65 per 100 lbs.

The twins went to the University of Kentucky for one semester, but dropped out because they loved being on the farm more than on campus.

Barry says, "If you are happy at what you are doing and can make enough to keep you going, that's all I'm worried about."

His older brother said he worked for a year once at a service station, but wasn't satisfied being "cooped up." He likes being his own boss and fully expects to farm for the rest of his life.

Questions and Answers On Rocky Mountain Fever and Spotted Fever?

A. Rocky Mountain spotted fever (RMSF) is an infectious disease which is usually transmitted to people through the bite of an infected tick. Transmission of the disease from a bite does not often occur unless the tick has been attached for more than two hours.

Q. How will I know if I have become infected with RMSF?

A. The onset of RMSF is definite and usually starts two to four weeks after the tick bite.

Q. What are the symptoms?

A. Symptoms include fever, chills, headache and muscle aches. A rash (which often resembles measles) may appear after two to four days of fever. At first it is seen on the wrists and ankles. Later the rash may spread to the rest of the body.

Q. I just found a tick attached to me and pulled it off. What should I do?

A. Not many tick attachments result in infection. If a fever develops within two weeks, see a doctor at once. Be sure to tell him about the tick bite. It is a good idea to make a note on a calendar the day of a tick bite just in case the symptoms of RMSF occur. Recovery is rapid with early treatment, however, without treatment, death may occur.

Q. Do all ticks carry Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever?

A. In Kentucky, only one species, the American dog tick, is associated with transmitting RMSF to man. Fortunately, only a small percentage of all ticks (about one in twenty) carries the disease. There is the possibility that the Lone Star tick may also transmit this disease.

Q. Does a tick have to attach to you to pass the infection to you?

A. No. If you squeeze a tick, body fluids or feces may be excreted which contain disease germs. These may enter the body through any natural openings or even through microscopic breaks in the skin.

pattern to RMSF?

A. Yes. Most cases occur in the spring and summer when ticks are active and when people are more likely to be working or playing outdoors.

Q. Are we apt to find ticks when we visit a recreational area (parks, camps, forests, etc.)?

A. Yes, but most infections are acquired by people who live in areas where there are ticks. Most people who contract RMSF come from rural and suburban areas.

Q. Does RMSF occur in my area?

A. North Carolina reports the highest number of RMSF cases in the United States. Within Kentucky, RMSF infections have been very low the past two years.

Q. Does RMSF affect all age groups?

A. Yes, but because they are more likely to be exposed to ticks, children living in rural and suburban areas and children attending youth camps are more likely to become infected. The disease is severe at all ages, but is more severe in adults, especially the elderly.

Q. What can be done to reduce the risk from ticks?

A. Ticks are most often encountered along edges of paths and trails in woodland areas. Therefore, try to stay on wide paths and roads when possible. It helps to keep clothing buttoned, to tuck pant legs into socks, and to keep shirts tucked into pants. Check yourself and your companions for ticks two or three times a day. With long hair, you will need to part and comb through it to make sure no ticks have attached to the scalp. After they are on your body, ticks tend to crawl upward. Do not remain on your clothing several hours before they attach. Check your clothing carefully for ticks each time you check your body. When changing clothing, check them when first removed before ticks have had a chance to crawl off.

Q. What is the best way to remove a tick after it has attached?

A. You can pull the tick off with your fingers shielded with a piece of paper towel or with tweezers. Grasp the tick firmly and pull away from the point of attachment gently without twisting or jerking. Be patient! The structure of the tick mouthparts prevents instant mouthparts release.

It may take several minutes for the tick to release its hold.

Q. What should I do if the tick's mouthparts break off when I remove it?

A. You can easily remove broken mouthparts with a sterilized needle. If they are not removed, they create the same opportunity for infection as a splinter. Broken mouthparts will not transmit RMSF germs.

We often find ticks on our pets. If there any danger to us?

Yes, many cases of RMSF result from exposure to ticks on pets. Use flea-tick-collars and powder on your pets and check them often for ticks. Remove ticks from pets in the same manner as described above for people. There are several safe and effective pesticides which can be used to control ticks in pet quarters. Contact your county agricultural extension agent for advice on pesticides and their proper use.

Q. We often camp in areas where there are many ticks and we frequently find ticks on us. What can be done?

A. Check yourselves for ticks often. Be sure to check yourselves and all of your clothing carefully at night. If you have pets, check them for ticks every day. Use repellents to keep ticks off your body.

Q. My child was exposed to ticks at camp and then became ill a few days after arriving home. What should I do?

A. Call your doctor and describe the symptoms to him. Be sure to tell him about the child's exposure to ticks.

Q. We live in a rural area. What can we do to reduce our exposure to ticks?

Keep grass and tall weeds cut. Spot treatments of pesticides along the border of woodlands and farm wastelands will help reduce tick populations. Contact your county agricultural extension agent for advice on which pesticides to use and how to use them correctly.

Q. If a member of my family has RMSF, can I catch it?

A. No. RMSF is not transmitted from person to person. It is caused by disease germs which are transmitted through the bite of or contact with an infected tick.

June 30 Final Planting Date

1. Any producer of wheat having not reported to this office should do so immediately.

2. July 15, 1983 is the deadline to report crop acreages to the ASCS office. Crops such as corn, barley, oats, grain sorghum, soybeans and CUA (set aside) should be reported.

3. The Feed Grain bases for 1983 were established the same as 1982. The 1982 bases were established by averaging the reported acreages of 1980 and 1981. As of this time we have no idea how the bases for 1984 will be established to please report acreages by July 15, 1983.

The Rockcastle County ASCS office wishes to remind farmers of the area that June 30, 1983 is the final planting date for insured tobacco.

Acreage of tobacco planted by June 30, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by July 15, 1983 to receive full crop insurance coverage.

Acreage planted after June 30 must also be reported on the July 15 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

Farmers unable to plant prior to June 30 because of excess moisture

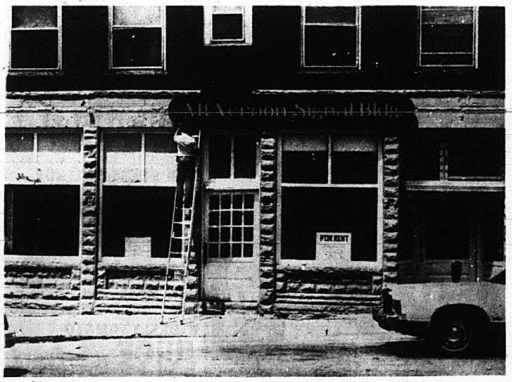
conditions, may sign a 20-day late planting agreement which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower guarantee due to the late planting.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.
