KSP activity

for May

During the month of May, the Kentucky State Police Post at London reports the following activity:

940 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations; 79 were driving under the influence of intoxicants; 405 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 16 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 27 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 189 were property damage only accidents; 83 were personal injury accidents; there were five fatal accidents; 152 persons were injured and seven persons were killed.

223 criminal investigations were made resulting in 135 criminal arrests. 3,366 persons attended 20 safety programs conducted by the Ky. State Police.

During May, the KSP reports the following activity for Rockcastle County: 126 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations; nine were driving under the influence of intoxicants; 36 persons were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and different traffic violations; 17 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, given tourist information, etc.

A total of 38 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these 23 were property damage only accidents; nine were personal injury accidents; there was one fatal accident; 16 persons were injured and three persons were killed.

31 criminal investigations were made resulting in 47 criminal arrests.

He said, "I thought she was the prettiest girl and I was badly struck on her!" He enjoyed seeing a memory from his past.



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

City receives tentative approval of grant

The Kentucky Department of Local Government has announced the tentative awarding of a \$13,333 1983 continuation grant to further downtown development in Mt. Vernon.

According to information received from the department, "The purpose of the grant is to provide planning and technical assistance services to communities in Eastern Kentucky which exhibit outstanding leadership and potential in their central business district efforts. Mt. Vernon was one of ten cities which participated in past phases of this program, a process which has been highly successful in making communities aware of their downtown potential."

It will be the responsibility of the city to assure that \$6,667 in local revenues are applied as match for these federal funds. The actual grant award will come when necessary assurance has been given that the money will be matched and a work program has been approved.

The continuation phase of the program must concentrate on the implementation of prior efforts and must be designed to complement existing activities and to show their application within the downtown.

The conditions of the grant provide that the project must be completed by October 1 and must be spent on trees, shrubs, and other materials and labor connected with landscaping.

Road improvements

scheduled to begin soon

The improvements of Ky. 39 and U.S. 461 are nearing the construction stage, according to Transportation Secretary James Runke.

Bids will be accepted next February for the reconstruction of Ky. 39 and the first section of U.S. 461 will go to contract this year, Runke said.

Runke said right of way is currently being purchased for the two-mile project on U.S. 461 Somerset bypass to Nelson Valley.

The reconstruction of U.S. 461, including construction of the Mt. Vernon bypass, will be completed in five sections.

The first 2.3 mile section from north of Wab to U.S. 150 in Rockcastle County will go to contract in October, he said.

The other sections are scheduled for construction as follows: From the Somerset bypass to seven-tenths of a mile northeast of Buck Creek, 4.1 miles. Bids will be accepted in March 1984.

From northeast of Buck Creek to the Rockcastle County line, 4.1 miles. Bids will be accepted in April 1984.

From the county line to south of Wab, 2.5 miles. Bids will be accepted in April 1984.

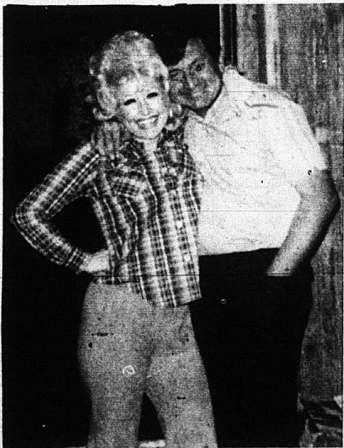

ed in July, 1984. -Mt. Vernon bypass from U.S. 150 to U.S. 25, 2.5 miles. Bids will be accepted in June 1984. The projects were announced by Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. and former Transportation Secretary Frank Metts in 1981. They were included in the state's five-year plan in 1982. Metts released the state's first public five-year plan in 1981. "Metts believed that the intentions of the Transportation Cabinet should be known to the public, state and local officials and the media. This ensures that any project initiated will be completed," Runke said.

Runke said that the five-year plan was accepted so well that the 1982 General Assembly made the plan a requirement under state law and increased it to include six years. An updated version of the plan will be submitted to an interim legislative committee in July. The committee will review its contents and recommend appropriate action to the 1984 General Assembly in January.

Having waited for the big break for so long, Pete says, when it finally came, his business had changed so much, it was not a comedians' business anymore. Disappointed, but not unhappy, he returned satisfied, not looking for fame and fortune anymore.

Later, Dolly tried to get Pete a job as a regular on her t.v. show, but it did not work out. Her producers did not want a regular comedian.

When Dolly left the Porter Waggoner show, she needed comedy material for her own shows and Pete supplied some of what she needed. He would spend 2 or 3 days writing material and then take it to her. He thinks some of his best comedy writing is based upon actual happenings and exaggerations of facts.

Writing used to be a daily part of Pete's life, but not now. He'd like to have more time to devote to writing. Over the years, he has written nearly one hundred songs, with 20 to 25 having been recorded by stars including Porter Waggoner ("I Should Be With You and 'How I Tried'), Red Foley recorded "How About Me?" and Bill Anderson recorded his "Stranger Story". Mac Wiseman, Don Reno and Red Smiley also did songs of Pete's.

The song most local people connect Pete with, however, is one he wrote and recorded on the Dot label entitled "Chevy-kiaser-old no-lack-stude-war-linco-baker". In some areas, the song was in the top ten and in Dayton, it was number one for some time, recounts Pete. Nationwide, he said, it never reached those heights.

Pete Stamper grew up a country boy in Dawson Springs, Kentucky and purchased his first musical instrument, a mandolin, when he was eleven. When he was fifteen, he and two friends, James Melton and Clarence Ray Williams named themselves the Pine Valley Pals and wrote to WHOP radio station in Hopkinsville, 28 miles away, asking for a job.

Without hearing them, Katherine Peden (later a figure in Kentucky politics) who was program director, gave them a 30 minute spot at 11 a.m.

Since gas was rationed, Pete says, the neighbors (who thought the boys were really something to pull down such a job) pooled their stamps and helped get the boys to their early morning job.

The boys, later that summer, got a sleeping room over a bar near the station.

Pete ran across a postcard from Bucky Rambo of the Singing Rambos recently requesting "Hang Out Your Key".

Another of their favorites was "In the Pines". The Pine Valley Pals wrote their own comedy with James Melton as comedian and Pete as the "straight guy". When the summer was over, the group "played all around" near their home. Pete remembers vividly one of the first shows they booked was in a one-room school. The house was packed and Melton, who had recently been a stand-up comedian for a crowd so large, got stage fright, and could not do the part. Pete, out of necessity, became the comic. The audience laughed and it was enough to encourage him to continue in the comic role.

Some of their early comedy routines include parodies on hit songs such as "Let Ole Mother Nature Have Her Way" and "Goodnight Irene".

Some of the material, he says, he sometimes still uses on the Saturday Night Barn Dance at Renfro.

In 1952, Pete and Clarence Ray, came to Renfro Valley and got jobs. He says he decided to try to get a job at Renfro while he was in the army, after talking to Morris Gaskins, a member of a quartet playing in Renfro and realizing, while in Korea, what he really wanted to do

with his life when he got back.

Pete met Red Foley at Renfro and, through him, later met Waggoner and other entertainers. Foley is described by Pete as a very warm, a country boy who never felt comfortable with his fame. Pete traveled with Foley for a time and felt a common bond between them, since Pete, too, felt he would not have been able to cope, had a great deal of fame come his way.

Pete was a regular on the Red Foley Ozark Jubilee, the first national televised country music show in the nation. The show was first on radio and in 1954, ABC televised the show live from Jewell Theater (the old theater converted into a t.v. studio) in Springfield, Missouri. A new comedy routine was demanded of "Pete each week during the two years on the show and there was only Pete to write the material. "T.V. eats up material," he says.

Pete was a regular on the Western Rodeo Tour with Rex Allen and in 1957 was a semi-regular guest on the Grand Ole Opry. At that time, rock and roll was taking over and even the stars were having trouble. The comedians who depended upon the stars to take them with them, were hit the hardest.

He returned to Renfro that year while continuing to work for Porter Waggoner but, he says, he wasn't making any money and in 1959, while living in

Broadhead, he had a show with Johnny Cash in Dayton, Ohio. The promoter ran off with the money and Pete got nothing that was the last straw. He stopped in Lexington and filled out an application to work for an insurance company (something his brother-in-law had been trying to get him to do for some time.) For a while, he worked at the insurance job and at WRVK. Since 1965, he has worked full-time at the station. He is now manager and disc jockey for owner Hal Smith of Nashville. He also works as an engineer for the Saturday night Barn Dance Shows in the Old Barn and occasionally on the Sunday Morning Gatherin' Show.

Sometime within the next three months, Pete plans to record some of his material (a comedy recitation) he has held onto.

He plans to make and sell the finished product with the help of Dolly Parton's endorsement of it to disc jockeys.

It might be hard, he thinks, for people to believe he wouldn't honestly trade places with the stars for their money or fame, but that is how it is. He is glad he has reached the point in life when he can be happy and content "out of it".

Besides the station job and occasional road shows, Pete currently helps his wife (the former Minnie Taylor from Broadhead) run the KOA Campground and helps his son Jeff operate a new nursery business.

Make Your Own Wedding Gown

Wedding gowns with their fine fabrics, detailed styling, perfect fit, yards of lace and fancy trims are the dreams of all brides-to-be. A gown is even more special when a bride designs and sews it herself.

Making a wedding gown means a lot of work but brides or mothers-of-brides who take on the challenge usually find it's worth it.

Most women who sew their wedding gowns are looking for the quality workmanship of unusually styling or fit they can't get in ready-to-wear gowns. Often, they want to sew an heirloom. And some want to create a gown they couldn't afford otherwise.

Brides who sew their own wedding dresses can save a great deal of money—usually, the fabric and notions for the traditional type of gown cost an average \$200, not including sewing time and effort, but you don't want to waste your time copying a \$200 dress. The real savings comes when you copy a designer dress that retails for \$900 to \$1,000.

You can streamline the project and further cut costs by selecting a more simple dress than a traditional gown with its sheer or satiny fabrics, lace trim and special design features, such as long, flowing train.

For today's weddings, there aren't many rules, only considerations. Choose fabrics, colors and pattern styles that suit you, your lifestyle and the wedding setting. Remember, the fabric and pattern don't have to be designed strictly as "bridal."

For spring and summer weddings, select fabrics and

colors that are cool and comfortable. If you're on a budget, put your money where it counts. Concentrate on the areas of the gown that will be seen the most—the bodice, front, neck, cuffs and back. But the more expensive trims to lace there, rather than at the hem.

For experienced home sewers who think a wedding dress would be too difficult to sew, if you can sew a jacket, you can sew a wedding gown. If you do make several mistakes, they'll probably never show.

For example, laces and trims can camouflage a dart that puckers or a crooked seamline—not so on a blazer. The only trick to sewing a wedding gown, is knowing how to use the fabric and lace.

Another trick may be choosing the pattern. Many women have trouble bridging the gap between a gown they see in the bridal you want.

One "ideal" company caterers to the home sewer who can't find the one pattern with every feature she wants in a wedding gown. The patterns have interchangeable parts—bodies, skirts. By mixing and matching the parts, you could make more than 1,000 different gowns from the patterns.

Prove It!
