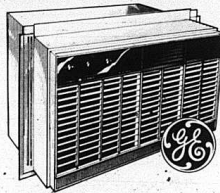

Members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court

We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Transactions of Rockcastle County as of June 30, 1982, and the related Statement of Cash Receipts, Cash Disbursements and Fund Balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with the "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions", issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to KRS 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from the cash transactions of Rockcastle County at June 30, 1982, and its cash receipts and disbursements during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental information presented in this report is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional supplementary data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

We did not conduct a study and evaluation of internal accounting control as we concluded that the audit could be performed more efficiently by expanding substantive audit tests. Therefore, we placed very little reliance on the internal accounting control system.

We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations including federal revenue sharing requirements enumerated in the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing Recipients issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing. Unless otherwise noted below, the tested items were in compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations. During our examination, nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe that the untested items were not in compliance.

Recommendations and areas of noncompliance are as follows:

We remind the fiscal court that KRS 424.260 states that bids for materials, supplies, equipment or services are needed if the expenditure is more than \$5,000 (\$7,000 as of April 2, 1982). The county expended \$119,488 from the Road and Bridge Fund and \$15,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund without obtaining bids.

The Road and Bridge Fund, Revenue Sharing Fund and the Local Government Economic Development Association balances at the end of the fiscal year. This is a violation of KRS 68.110.

The county expended funds from the Grandstand and Exhibit Hall Fund and Rockcastle Ambulance Fund without the funds being budgeted as required by KRS 68.220 and KRS 68.240.

The county is in violation of KRS 68.005 which requires the county to adopt an administrative code.

## Lily couple killed at their home Sunday

Two elderly Laurel County people were murdered Sunday at their home in Lily and two teenagers have been arrested and charged with the murders.

James Bowman, 87, and his wife, Susie, 79, were found by Kentucky State Police officer Roy Johnson after he went to the Bowman's house to investigate a theft report, Sunday afternoon, 7 miles south of London, according to KSP Public Affairs officer Stanley Hale.

Arrested and charged with two counts of murder and theft by unlawful taking were James Leach, 19, and his 16 year old brother, Dennis, 15, said. The Leas are being held in the Laurel County Jail on a 1.5 million dollar bond each, according to Laurel

County Jailer, John Bowling. When Trooper Johnson arrived on the scene he found Mr. Bowling in the living room of the house and he found Mrs. Bowman's body in a wooded area alongside a gravel road that leads from the family's home, Trooper Hale said.

Preliminary autopsy reports revealed that Mrs. Bowman died of multiple head injuries from a blunt object, multiple lacerations, rib fractures and a stable wound, according to Laurel County Coroner Ed Bowlin. The reports showed that Mr. Bowman died of a massive trauma to the head, multiple skull concussions, 27 stab wounds and a single gunshot wound in the head, the coroner said.

The two teenagers, who lived across the Laurel River from the Bowman's house, were arrested a few hours after the bodies were found and according to Laurel County Commonwealth's Attorney, Thomas

V. Handy, the two brothers could be facing the death penalty. He said that he had never considered asking the death penalty in a criminal case as of yet, but

## "Appared" benefits needy

Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc. ("Appared") with its administrative office in Prestonsburg, Kentucky, is a federally chartered, non-profit corporation providing legal services to low income clients in 37 counties in eastern and central Kentucky. The Somerset office, one of eleven branch offices, serves residents in the counties of Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Wayne.

To be eligible for the legal services offered by an Appared office, a person must reside in one of the counties served by the office in which assistance is sought, must have income at or below the federal poverty guidelines, and generally be unable to obtain legal services from any other source. Appared attorneys cannot handle criminal cases, nor can they represent individuals in cases in which a money settlement would pay for a private attorney's fees. Presently there are other criteria being developed that will limit the types of cases accepted because of the loss of funds to adequately staff the offices and handle the many cases presented.

A variety of legal services are offered by Appared such as family

law, bankruptcy, debt collections, individual civil rights violations, environmental infringements and pension benefits. Other poverty law matters handled are consumer transactions, sales, contracts, garnishments, housing, landlord/tenant, evictions, education, welfare, AFDC, Social Security, SSI, unemployment benefits and employment terminations.

The Somerset Office of Appared is staffed by three attorneys, two paralegals, and two secretaries. In an effort to better meet the needs of low income persons in Rockcastle County, a staff member from Somerset will be at the Rockcastle County Courthouse on Monday, June 27, between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. The purpose of this visit will be to talk to prospective clients concerning their legal problems. Any prospective clients desiring an appointment for June 27th should call the Somerset Office to arrange a time. Additional monthly visits will be scheduled if this proves successful.

If legal services are needed immediately, a prospective client should call the Somerset office and make an appointment to discuss their problems with someone at the office. The telephone number is 606-679-7313.

Sometime during the next few weeks, new wings will be ready for occupants.

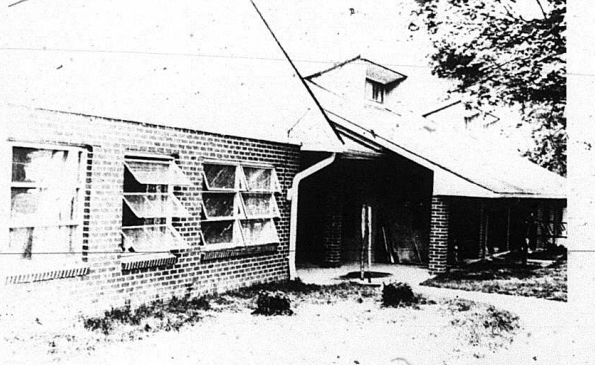
The expansion will create 51 additional beds, bringing the total number

### TOMATOES TO TRAIN OR NOT TO TRAIN?

Home gardeners can grow their tomatoes any of several ways, depending on how much time and attention they want to devote. Common ways of growing tomatoes are on the ground or training them in cages, on stakes, on a trellis or in containers.

Growing tomatoes on the least effort, but a large percentage of fruits succumb to ground rot. Gardeners often try to overcome losses due to rot by overplanting tomatoes. Spacing tomatoes grown on the ground 2-3 feet apart in rows 4-5 feet apart. Straw or plastic mulches help reduce ground rot.

Cage-grown tomatoes suffer much less from ground rot, snails and slugs than those allowed to lay on the ground. Cages save space, since caged plants are set 2-3 feet apart with rows 3-4 feet apart.

are staked. Cages should be 30 inches tall for determinate, or bush, varieties and 60 inches tall for indeterminate varieties. Use cages that you can get your hand through, such as 6-inch by 6-inch concrete steel reinforcing wire. Cut this into 4-6 foot sections to construct cages.

Staked tomatoes have some of the same advantages as caging: fruits suffer less damage from ground rot, snails and slugs. Set plants 12-24 inches apart with rows 3-4 feet apart and they'll save every square space than cage-grown plants. Staked plants are easier to work around and harvest and it is easy to get good spray coverage.

Staked plants will mature about two weeks earlier than plants grown on the ground. Each plant produces fruit from the caged plant, up to 15 pounds less. But more plants can be grown in the same area, so yields are comparable.

Staking plants is a lot of work, and the once-a-week pruning they require takes time. Pruning may increase the chance of spreading tobacco mosaic virus from one plant to another. Although this is not a common problem, staked plants are susceptible to cracking, sunscald, and blossom rot. Minor cracking and blossom-end rot by irrigating the plants regularly or by mulching.

You can construct various trellis systems from wood or metal posts with wood or wire cross ties. Support strings from the wires to the bottom of the tomato plants. Tie a loose knot around the base of the tomato plant, and wrap the string during the growing season.

Trellises are less expensive than cages and less time-consuming than staking. The trellis system can be permanent, but rotate other trellised crops, such as cucumbers, to matos to prevent a potential disease build-up.

Kentucky: Sauger good trolling deep runners over ridges; black bass fair along shoreline; crappie fair fishing deep; catfish fair along rocky areas using trotlines; below dam white bass and sauger fair casting jigs from banks; catfish good using larger minnows out in holes; clear, stable at summer pool, 76 degrees.

Barkley: Bluegill good fishing worms or crickets along shoreline; black bass fair casting plastic minnows along shoreline or crankbaits off points; catfish fair fishing nightcrawlers along rocky areas; below dam white bass slow casting jigs and catfish fair on cutbaits; clear, stable at 1/4 foot above summer pool, 76 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie fair and small in size; bluegill fair and of good size two to five feet deep; clear, falling at 12 feet above summer pool, 80 degrees.

Nolin: Bluegill good on worms and crickets; crappie fair and scattered three to six feet deep; black bass fair casting worms or crankbaits along shoreline or rocky points of main lake; clear, stable at summer pool, 80 degrees.

Barren River: Bluegill good fishing worms and crickets around shoreline cover; black bass fair casting worms or topwater lures early and late in day around flooded brush; catfish fair, clear, falling slowly at 22 feet above summer pool, 79 degrees.

Green River: Black bass good casting surface lures, spinner baits or plastic worms; crappie good fishing minnows eight feet deep around submerged cover; bluegill good with worms around stickups; clear to murky, falling at 10 feet above summer pool, 79 degrees.

Herrington: Black bass good casting crankbaits and nightcrawlers along rocky banks; bluegill good with crickets drifting or sculling along deep banks; hybrid strippers fair trolling medium-deep runners or white grub jigs near mouths of lower lake coves; crappie slow drift fishing minnows around stickups; clear to murky, falling at three feet above summer pool, 77 degrees.

**TO: CITIZENS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY  
FROM: MULTI-COUNTY SERVICES, INC.**

I believe you will agree with me that the timely and safe disposal of trash and garbage has become a severe problem in our country. Garbage and trash remain continually in huge piles around burned out and overturned public dumpsters and despoils with increasing frequency our streams, roadways, and even private farms. This problem is a potential threat to our health by contaminating our water supplies and breeding ground for vermin. Such unsightly messes rob the beauty of our surroundings and make a mockery of our efforts to encourage economic and industrial development.

It is unlikely that outside developers are going to be interested in investing in a county that fails to adequately provide such a basic service as waste management. This is unfortunate when there is such a high need for additional jobs in our county.

The problem of garbage and trash disposal is unfortunately likely to continue and worsen unless you, the citizens of Rockcastle County, come to understand its causes and demand from those responsible that it be solved.

I have operated under contract with the county Fiscal Court to do the following:

1. Supply dumpsters at designated cities throughout the county.
2. Emptying of dumpsters properly filled as needed.
3. Disposal of trash and garbage at a sanitary land-fill.

The County Fiscal Court passed an ordinance to encourage the disposal of household garbage Only at these designated dumpsites. This has not been enforced. Private haulers were also not to dump at these sites. This too has not been enforced.

The County Fiscal Court pledged itself to provide cleanup around the dumpsters under normal circumstances. This has not been accomplished making it difficult for you the public to use these dumpsters properly.

Misuse of the dumpsters and their destruction through burning have imposed a nearly unbearable financial burden on me and the county. Replacement of dumpsters alone has averaged approximately \$5,000 per year.

I believe a solution to this problem is a must. I have been involved in many meetings with members of the County Fiscal Court regarding this problem since January. A Solution was offered by me on several occasions for solving this problem with the Fiscal Court making a relatively small investment that they would even recover from me through payment over the next ten years. The continuance of this problem indicates that this solution has not been accepted.

Sometime near March 1 some members of the Fiscal Court asked me to continue providing my services until June 1, while the Fiscal Court devised its own solution to the problem. Given my experience in this area, I suggested that my services be continued until August 1 to give the Fiscal Court sufficient time. A compromise of July 1 was finally reached as of this date our agreement is terminated.

To meet the need for garbage disposal service, I will continue to operate as a private hauler. These services will be rendered on an individual basis, as long as the County Fiscal Court permits.

I wish to thank the good citizens of this county for their support and cooperation.
