Jean Chattle serves as the vice-president, Claretta Hodges is equipment manager and Gail Burdette is publicity chairman. Connie Day is a board member and David Sower is in charge of field maintenance. The organization's official photographer is Doug Brock.

Ed Sower, who at 75 is the oldest Little League manager in the southern region, comments, "It keeps the kids off the streets and gives them something to do." He's been a manager for two years and his wife serves on the board of directors.

Sammy Ford has been a manager for the Orioles for four years and his son, John, plays on his team. He feels that the Little League program is instrumental in teaching boys and girls how to win and lose and that it also builds character in those who participate.

It requires discipline too. Before the season be-

gins, the teams practice two days a week and during the season each team plays an average of three games a week. Most of the games are played at Thacker Field in Broadhead on the new field at Roundstone chosen for Little League games played until the district tournament.

Little League has nine teams this year. The Yankees, managed by Tracy Thompson, Reds managed by Paul Kirby, Pirates managed by Danny Coleman, Phillies managed by Jackie Dixon and Dodgers managed by Ed Mahaffey. The Orioles are managed by Sammy Ford, the Cardinals by John Parsons, the A's by Kenneth Chattle and the Braves by Ed Sower.

The Senior League has four teams: the Expos managed by James E. Bradley, Padres managed by Wayne Taylor, Reds managed by Tommy Hodges and the Pirates managed by James Hamilton.

The only criterion of those who can play is age. Even though a few potential players have been turned away in the past, Tagliaboschi stresses that since he has been president, this has not happened and will not as long as he has anything to do with it.

There are two girls who have played Little League baseball this season. Although a separate girls' league is a possibility, he attempts to organize one have so far met with little success.

Financing the county's Little League program is often a problem. The budget runs about \$6,000 a year. Part of this expense is met by the \$15 fee each player pays per season. This fee provides the players with a uniform, helmet, protective equipment, insurance and having the playing field maintained.

Another source of income is the sponsors who pay \$100 a season to have a sign advertising their business hung on the fence around Thacker Field.

The board of directors have organized a Baseball Bonanza for the end of July in order to raise money

for the league. The league will be playing each other in their own tournaments.

The highlight of the baseball season for each division is the district tournaments. All-Star teams are chosen for Little League, Senior League and during tournament time, there is also a 13-year-old division.

The All-Star teams are chosen by vote of the managers. In the Little League division, 20 boys are selected out of 135, and these are then rated by the board of directors. Ability and attitude are the main criteria used to determine who will make the (top) 14 of the All-Star team.

Anita Todd, whose son Jason is a member of the Orioles, feels positively about the program. Speaking of her son, who has played Little League baseball for four years, she says, "His league sportsmanship and how to control his temper, keep his head."

Jason Todd is a 12-year-old pitcher and infielder. He enjoys being with people his age and helping the younger players. Although he has had a few Little League experiences have taught him the rules and the attitudes to have about the game.

All the players, parents and board members call Tagliaboschi "Mr. Tag." Tagliaboschi has always felt that a serious involvement in the county's Little League program when his son, Louis, started playing several years ago. He has noticed that the players are getting more competitive and attributes that to boys who are getting older and have played in the league for several seasons.

Tagliaboschi also notes that parental support of the program is excellent. "It would be a tragedy to the county if we lost the program," he says. "The boys involved are at a critical stage of development."

He enjoys the boys and that makes the work worthwhile for Tagliaboschi. "I can't walk down the street without seeing a Little League wave at me," he says with satisfaction. "I make myself available to any Little Leaguer."

Whether it's a pitcher for Little League, an outfielder for Senior League, a parent watching proudly, or a board member doing paperwork, all are tied by a common interest.

Basketball coach hired; bids open for coming school year

Michael Appelman, assistant coach at Pendleton County High School for the past four years, was hired as head boys' basketball coach for Rockcastle County High School at Tuesday night's meeting of the board of education.

The employment of Mr. Appelman was the recommendation of the committee who had been screening applicants for the position, according to Superintendent Charles B. Parsons.

Following his employment, Appelman told the board, "I hope to have a real exciting ball club, one with lots of enthusiasm."

On the subject of Mr. Appelman's assistant coach the board decided to hold off on employing anyone until the next meeting to give Mr. Appelman a chance to go over the applications since, as Chairman Rudolph Burdette said, "We (the board) want to hire someone you (Appelman) can work with."

The new coach is married and has two small children. He and his family plan to move to the area as soon as a suitable home can be located. Mrs. Appelman is also a teacher but there was no opening available for her this year. Mr. Parsons told the board.

Mr. Appelman will be making \$17,500 as a teaching salary, \$2,831 for his coaching duties and \$331 a year for serving as athletic director for a total salary of \$20,752.00. The employment of Mr. Appelman was unanimous.

In other action, the board opened several bids, including one for school pictures for the next year. Successful bidder was Osborne Photographic Laboratories of Cincinnati, Ohio, who bid \$4.50 for a photo package of one 8x10, 2 4x5's and 8 exchange photos. This bid price is approximately \$3 lower than last year's price.

Other successful bidders and the items they bid on included:
 - Balfour classings;
 - Creative Grafiks Ink of Georgetown - yearbooks;
 - State Farm Insurance - senior bus insurance and Central School Supply - paper supplies.

Ray Mullins was the successful low bidder for tearing down and removing the Webb Building (located adjacent to the Livingston School) at \$900.

The building is to be torn down within 30 days at which time the board expects to take bids on a three classroom addition to the school to be built on the same site.

The board also approved the employment of the following non-certified twelve-month personnel:
 - Naomi Mink, Shirley Mullins, Everett Bradley,

Edd Reynolds, Bill Barrett, Thomas Berry, Danny Bullock, Ernest Mink, Homer Jones, Dorothy Jones, Nancy Bradley, Lena Rucker, Ronald Carpenter, Jesse Bradley, Everett Albright, Lloyd Kirby, John Bullock, Lin Reynolds and Louise Kirby. And, also approved a salary increase to \$11,000 per year for Mrs. Mink and Mrs. Mullins, both central office secretaries.

Supt. Parsons also discussed with the board a suit which has been filed in connection with the recent addition to Roundstone School. Maurice W. Pickett Co., a subcontractor on the project claims \$241 is due him from the general contractor, Wise Construction Co. Besides the general contractor, the suit also names the board, the architect and the bonding company.

Mr. Parsons told the board he had turned the information over to the board's attorney, Carl Clontz, who would be handling the matter for the board.

The board also approved final settlement of the project claims by the State Fire Marshall's office, with Storm Security Systems for a fire alarm and burglar alarm for Livingston School in the amount of \$10,000. Parsons said Mt. Vernon School already has this type system and Roundstone School doesn't need it because of the way it is constructed. He also said that plans are to install a system at Brodhead Elementary next year.

The employment of two additional teachers, both in special education, was also approved by the board.

Mrs. Jewell Alexander Davidson was hired at Brodhead School and Mrs. Nellie Shore was hired as a part-time special education teacher to assist Mrs. Ann Abney at Mt. Vernon School. The board also approved increase for Lori Stewart's position as speech therapist to full-time.

The advertisement for necessary supplies for next school year was authorized by the board and Mr. Parsons pointed out that one item, normally included in the bids - pest control - was not included this time. Parsons said that E.J. Smith, luncheon supervisor, asked for authority to deal directly with Paul Burton, local representative for Madison Termite Co., since he (Smith) and the schools would get better service from a local person.

Parsons said that in years past, Mr. Burton had always been just a little higher than the low bidder on this item but Mr. Smith did not feel that an adequate job was being done in this area by the company with which the board approved this request.

The board also voted to purchase two used vans to be used on rural routes where a small number of children have to be picked up.

They also approved the installation of carpet at the Mt. Vernon School library, carpet strips for the gymnasium seats and new linoleum in part of the principal's office and the girls' restroom. The material is to be purchased from Hysinger Carpet, who will also do the installation, for a total cost of \$2,572.04.

Summer jobs available for low income youth

Youth from low-income families in Laurel, Rockcastle and Whitley counties will provide minor maintenance and perform repair work this summer at homes of low-income elderly and handicapped persons in those counties.

The work will be performed under a \$8,707 contract between the Cabinet for Human Resources and the Laurel County Board of Education, London.

Human Resources Secretary Buddy Adams said the program "will provide summer jobs for low-income youth, and at the same time, help our elderly and handicapped who are trying to live independently in their own homes."

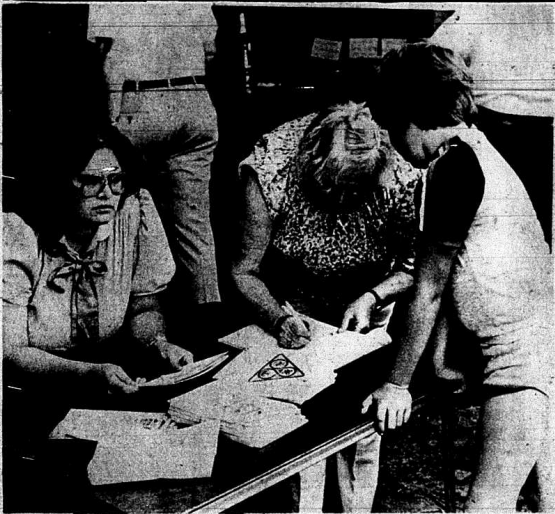
There will be four jobs available for youth aged 16 to 21 and one job for a senior citizen who will supervise the trainees.

The program is part of Project Repair, a \$376,000 CETA-funded program administered through the Department for Manpower Services.

That department will interview applicants for the program. The board of education will work with the Bell-Whitley Community Action Agency, the Daniel Boone Development Council and the Cumberland Valley Area Development District for the program to determine which homes will be work sites. Trainees also may work at senior citizens' centers and non-profit facilities.

Manpower Services Commissioner Robert E. Spill said the work crew will perform heavy housecleaning chores and make minor repairs to homes of eligible persons.

Fiscal Court approves emergency contract with Laurel Service

Only hours after Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper declared the county in a state of emergency because of no garbage collection system, the situation was taken care of, at least for the time being, during a special called meeting of the fiscal court last Friday.

Representatives of Laurel County Garbage Collection of Route 2, East Bernstadt were present at the meeting and made an offer to the court to collect the garbage for \$4,750 for a thirty-day period.

The court voted unanimously to accept the offer but made it clear they would be advertising for bids during the thirty day period in order to get a longer term contract. Jimmy and Brenda Helton, representatives of Laurel County Garbage told the court they would place two eight-yard dumpsters at Pongo and empty them once a week; one eight-yard dumpster at Blue Springs to be dumped once a week and thirty-yard dumpsters at the following places and dump them as needed: Brodhead, Livingston, Pine Hill and at Quail, if a thirty-yard container is needed but possibly a twenty-yard

container will be all that is necessary at Quail, the Heltons said.

The meeting was also held to approve the final draft of the 1962-64 budget and the court, with the exception of Magistrate Donald Rowe, voted to approve the budget. One item stressed was that, contrary to rumor, the amount allocated for the salary of deputy County Judge/Executive Mark Jasper's salary is \$2,500 and not \$25,000.

During the regular monthly meeting Tuesday, the court voted to give Judge Jasper authority to borrow \$35,000 from one of the local banks to help the county meet their financial obligations until tax money starts coming in. The Judge's secretary, Anna Rose Mullins told the court they

needed to borrow \$15,000 for the general fund, which she said would probably be paid back some time in early November. She went on to say that about \$20,000 was needed to maintain the road fund account and she said this would be probably be repaid some time in August. The court voted unanimously to borrow the monies.

Bids were opened during the meeting for the purchase of gasoline, stone and culverts.

Bullock's Service Station in Mt. Vernon was the only bidder on the regular gasoline which is used in county trucks. The bid of \$118.9 per gallon was accepted by the court and the price will be effective for three months.

He sits on an ice cream parlor chair with a metal back as he does the paperwork that is the responsibility of the president of Rockcastle County's Little League Baseball program.

Only dire circumstances prevent him from attending the 14 games that Little Leaguers play each May to July. Sundays and Wednesdays are the "only days exempt from the persistent scheduling.

But, Tagliaboschi says it's worth it and he's in the majority. There are 152 Little Leaguers, 83 Senior Leaguers and 62 Tee Ballers who came out this sea-

son to get in three months of clean competition and athletic opportunities from the all-American sport: baseball.

Rockcastle's Little League program covers the entire county and several of its borders. Three divisions comprise the program which was started in 1978 by Larry Wood, former head football and baseball coach for Rockcastle County High School.

Little League is for ages 9 to 12; Senior League involves 13 to 15 year olds and Tee Ball is for ages 6 to 8.

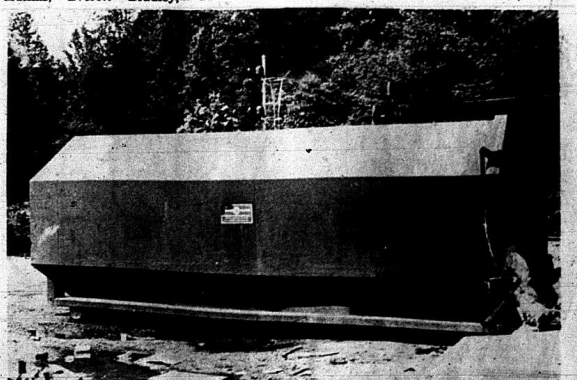

lid must be unused and new enough that the sealing compound can still be trusted to do its job. The screw band must be firmly tight before the jar of food is processed, and should never be further tightened after processing.

As the food in the jar heats up during processing in the boiling-water-bath or steam pressure canner, the heated air in the headspace expands the food, and is gently expelled under the lid (which is not yet tight enough to prevent this venting).

3-Way Test for Seal

As the food in the jar cools after processing, the vacuum forms, pulling the center of the lid down and forming a tight seal. When the jar lid seals, you can hear it, you can see it and you can feel it.

If you're right there when the lid seals, you can hear the "click" if you're out of the room when it happens, tap the lid with a spoon when the jar is cold.

A clear ringing sound means a seal. If food is touching the jar lid, the sound will be dull, but it won't sound like the tapping on an unsealed jar lid.

You can see a tight seal because the lid is curved down. You can feel a tight seal because the center of the lid is down when you press it and will not move under your finger.

If Jar Does Not Seal

If your jar does not seal upon cooling, you can either reprocess the food in another jar with another lid or put it in the refrigerator and use it up within a few days.

How Jar Lids Seal

The two-piece lid on most home canners use self-seal when a vacuum forms during the cooling of the contents of the jar after processing.

In order for this to happen, the top edge of the jar must have no nicks or imperfections. It must be clean, and it must be free of any bits of food. The

If Seal Loosens

Alright contact between the lid and glass retains the vacuum and keeps outside air from entering the jar and contaminating its contents.

If jar seals loosen within a few days, weeks or months, one of several things could be to blame: a faulty lid (not likely if it's new), insufficient processing time, or spoilage of the food.

In the case where spoilage causes the seal to loos-

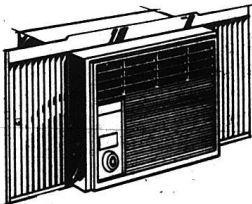

Kentucky Stone was the only bidder on the stone. The county will pay \$3.75 per ton for #610 stone, \$4 for DGA stone, \$4.05 per ton for #57 stone, \$4 per ton for #2 stone, \$4 per ton for #23 stone and \$4 per ton for #8 stone.

Two companies submitted bids on the culverts - Mt. Vernon Produce in Mt. Vernon and All Metals Company in Indianapolis, Indiana. All Metals was the lowest bidder, by a significant amount, but, according to deputy Judge/Executive Mark Jasper, the bid from All Metals was submitted at the factory and didn't include the cost of delivery.

Jasper told the court that he felt All Metals would probably not deliver less than a tractor-trailer load at a time and he did not know if the county could afford that quantity.

County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper told the court the only thing they could do was reject both bids

and advertise again specifying delivered culverts.

Roy Brown was at the meeting to request authorization by the court for Judge Jasper to sign an application for a grant for the Quail Community Park, which the Quail Homemakers had applied for. He told the court that the matching money the grant required had been raised by the homemakers and himself. The court gave their approval.

The Quail Community Park has been a project of the homemakers club for a few years.

In other business, the court voted to lay-off county worker Mike Durham, at his request, effective July 15th.

David Gregory of Mt. Vernon met with the court to ask them to rescind an order that the court made in 1979 closing a county road which runs adjacent to a farm owned by him and his son, William D. Gregory.

All members of the court voted to rescind the order except for Magistrate

Donald Rowe who voted no. County Road Supervisor Paul Hansel asked the court if they could do something about people climbing up in the garbage dumpsters and throwing garbage out on the ground.

Hansel said it was a real problem keeping the ground around the dumpsters clean anyway without having to cope with people going inside them and throwing garbage out.

The court decided they had already passed an ordinance to prevent this problem and asked Deputy Sheriff Bob Hasty, who was present at the meeting, to begin enforcing the law.
