Little World's Fair tradition continues week of August 1 - 6

Thoughts of the Little World's Fair in Brodhead, conjure up the smell of damp sawdust underfoot, the taste of fresh lemon candy and the voices of carnival workers enticing fair-goers to take a ride or win a prize.

The excitement of a county fair has been a tradition in Brodhead for several generations. That tradition will continue from August 1 to August 6 as the annual Little World's Fair swings into its 88th year.

And the 88th year brings new management, new attractions and new booths to those who eagerly await a day or night of carnival atmosphere that can be found almost in their backyard.

The new management has taken the name of Four B Fair Company, Inc. President is Billy Gentry, Billy Bussell is vice president, general manager is Frank Martin, and Billy Bussell is the events manager and Shirley Martin is the secretary/treasurer.

The five of them make up the Fair Board and Bryan Bussell explained their situation, "We've all worked around the fair for years, but this is the first time we've taken it over." The Four B Fair Company, Inc. has a two-year contract with a two-year option.

For over 20 years, the fair has been managed by D.A. Robbins. The land now used for the grounds was originally donated to the city of Brodhead by R.S. Martin, Frank Martin's grandfather. Although the grounds have changed hands many times, they were sold to Rockcastle County five years ago and 10 acres were designated for government housing.

The Fair Board pays the county \$3,255.55 to rent the grounds the week during the fair and that includes the week before for set-up time and the week after to clean up the grounds.

Frank Martin said, "If you break even we're lucky." The money made on admissions and rent from the midway goes back into operation of the fair.

Along with money, it takes a tremendous amount of time and interest to find the right ingredients that will draw people to a county fair. The Fair Board started working on the 1983 Little World's Fair last year, a year-round job, said Bryan Bussell.

Bryan Bussell, Billy Gentry and Frank Martin attended the Convention for the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows that was held in Owensboro in January. Membership in the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows entitles the Little World's Fair to be sanctioned.

The main advantage of being sanctioned fair area that the Executive Board of the association is always available to give needed information and state aid money can be obtained for construction improvements and premium money for the exhibit hall. Another benefit is the credit points given at the Horse Show.

D.A. Robbins was a member of the Fairs and Horse Shows Association when he ran the fair, but this is the first year that the management has joined the South Central Hackney Pony Association. Belonging to the association will give more publicity to the Horse Show.

One of the most important aspects of a quality fair is the carnival. The Fair Board is always looking for a carnival with good recommendations and safe rides. The carnival for 1983 will be run by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Boling. It is the one booked last year and in the past.

The organizers of the carnival rent the midway from the Fair Board and the carnival owners can rent out remaining space to those who want it for booths. There is also an area that businesses can rent from the Fair Board and use for booths and exhibits.

The Agricultural Fair Board also plays an important role in the fair. This board is responsible for the exhibits, which are displayed under the canopy. Council petitioned to change regulations on Lake Linville

Mrs. Sharon Sewell presented the City Council with a petition, containing over 70 signatures, asking the council to repeal their ordinance concerning Hysinger Hollow on Lake Linville, at the council's monthly meeting Monday night.

The petition asked that the entire lake be opened to internal combustion engines for boats with trolling motors or engines with motors under 15 h.p. The petition did not draw a favorable reaction from any of the council members.

State Legislature

By Senator John Rogers

As of July 1, 1983, Kentucky's state representatives and senators had prefiled forty-one bills for the 1984 legislative session.

Legislators prefile bills in order to allow the public, media and other legislators ample opportunity to become familiar with their proposals before the General Assembly convenes.

Prefiled Bill 17 seeks to grant a sales and use tax exemption to non-resident governmental, educational, or charitable institutions if such institutions are exempt in their resident state and that state's laws contain a reciprocal

provision relating to Kentucky governmental, educational and charitable institutions.

Prefiled Bill 18 pertains to theft and related offenses involving property valued at less than \$500 rather than \$100.

Prefiled Bill 20 proposes to amend Section 39 of the Constitution of Kentucky to permit sheriffs to succeed themselves in office. If this measure were to be enacted by the Legislature, it would still have to be approved by the voters of Kentucky.

Prefiled Bill 22 seeks to exempt fluorapatite, lead, zinc and barite from the state severance tax on minerals.

Prefiled Bill 29 seeks to allow lay representation in unemployment insurance hearings and to allow corporate officers to represent corporations in such hearings to which they are a party. This measure is currently being studied by the Judiciary-Civil committee.

Prefiled Bill 31 seeks to allow registered land surveyors to file plats submitted to the department of mines and minerals for obtaining a permit to drill for oil and gas.

Prefiled Bill 35 seeks to clearly specify the type of road construction equipment that will be exempt from review by the Legislature's Capitol Construction and Equipment Purchase Oversight Committee.

Legislators will continue to prefile bills up until January when the session convenes. As always, there will be no good and no so good proposals offered.

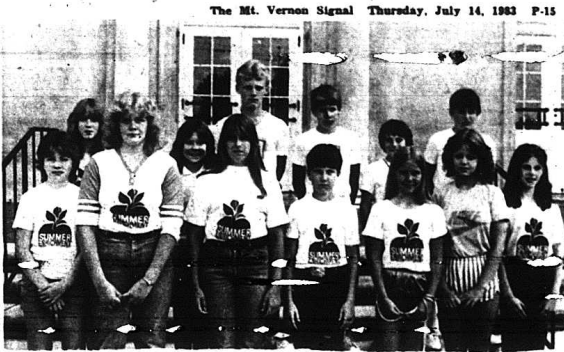
