## Western Water receives grant and loan for expansion

The Rockcastle County Western Water District has received a loan and a grant from the Farmers Home Administration that will enable them to extend their service to 210 more customers in a three-county area.

A spokesperson for Congressman Harold Rogers' office in Washington announced Tuesday that a loan of \$319,000 and a grant of \$632,500 had been approved by Congress and that Western Water would be receiving the money soon.

Wallace Proctor, a director of the water association said Tuesday that he wasn't sure the exact routes of the new lines but that in addition to Rockcastle, lines would be laid in Pulaski and Lincoln Counties.

The spokesperson from Rogers' office said that the water district would have 40 years to pay back the loan at a rate of seven and one-eighth percent.

## Fiscal Court accepts low bid for local garbage collection

Rockcastle County residents will have something to do with their garbage for at least one more year.

The Fiscal Court voted Tuesday during a special called meeting to enter into a contract with Deputy Sheriff Clarence "Jib" East, Ronnie Bradley and Harlan "Buck" Farthing for a garbage collection service for one year beginning August 1st.

The three men submitted the low bid of \$4,700 per month for the service. Next lowest bidder was Multi-County Garbage Collection (former holders of the franchise) owned by William K. Bullen with a bid of \$5,700 per month.

Two other garbage collection agencies submitted bids but the court felt their bids were unclear as to the total cost to the county.

One of these bidders, Laurel County Garbage Collection (presently collecting garbage for the

county), submitted a bid of \$500 per month for employing six men at Blue Springs and Pongo and a \$500 per month additional \$110 per load of garbage picked up at the other.

Although Harlan Farthing and Bradley had the low bid, the fiscal court spent about two hours trying to decide if they should go into the garbage collection business for themselves.

William P. McGehee of McGehee Associates, a solid waste disposal firm from Prospect, met with the court and presented them with four recommendations as to how the court might set up their own garbage collection service.

The recommendation discussed most by the court was for the county to purchase, from McGehee Associates, a 1981 garbage truck with 2,200 miles on it for \$38,000 and twelve 30 yard dumpsters at a cost of \$27,000. The equipment could be purchased under a four-year lease agreement with the county paying \$3,476.38 down and \$1,738.19 per month for the four-year period.

While this would have enabled the county to collect its own garbage, the court felt the main drawback to this proposal was that they would have to pay either Laurel County or another adjacent county to use their landfill and they felt this charge could amount to much more than \$20 per load for possibly a minimum of 150 loads a month.

After the court accepted the East, Farthing and Bradley bid, they stressed to Hasty that if the court and presented they would terminate the contract.

Hasty said after the meeting that his bid was different from the others submitted in that it did not include the use of dumpsters.

He said the bid stated that a man and a truck

would be at certain sites on specified days and times to pick up garbage. The Deputy Sheriff said that beginning Monday, August 1st, there will be a man at Green Fish Hill, Pine Hill and Brodhead six days a week, excluding Sundays, from noon until 8 p.m. to collect garbage. He went on to say that on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, a man will be at Blue Springs and Brush Creek to collect garbage from noon until 8 p.m. and on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, someone will be at Pongo and Quail during the same hours.

Hasty stressed the fact that anyone caught dumping garbage on the ground during the off hours, will be arrested and charged with criminal littering. "We're going to be watching very closely for people who dump their garbage out on the ground at times when they are not supposed to," Hasty said. "If you prosecute two or three people, you will solve the problem of illegal dumping," he added.

In other business, the court voted to hire Doug Bishop as head mechanic at the county garage and give him a raise to \$450 per hour. The move was necessitated by a leave of absence taken by former head mechanic Charles Bussell, due to illness.

In promotion of Bishop was with the understanding that if Bussell is able to return to work he will get his former position back.

## Grand Jury returns five more indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down five indictments last week in Circuit Court for causes ranging from receiving a stolen car radio to murder. Each of the five persons indicted are either in jail or out on bond.

The indictment was handed down by the Grand Jury for murder, Robert J. McCowan of Lamoine was indicted for the alleged murder of Arthur W. Jones of Lamoine on July 18th at the home of Thelma Keene, also of Lamoine.

Christina Marie Rexroad was indicted for theft by deception. Ms. Rexroad

reportedly gave Druther's Restaurant in Mt. Vernon a money order for \$175 in December of 1982 that was not honored for payment when presented. Ms. Rexroad is presently being held in the Madison County Jail on another offense.

Ottie Kirby of Mt. Vernon was indicted by the Grand Jury for assault in the first degree. Kirby's indictment stemmed from a "June 12th" incident this year near Lake Linville at which time Kirby allegedly stabbed Mark Baker in the back.

Baker spent several days in a Lexington hospital recuperating from the wound.

Kirby was released on

bond from the Rockcastle County Jail.

The other two indictments handed down were for cultivating marijuana and receiving and possession of stolen property valued at over \$100.

Robert Brown of Ottawa was arrested on July 11th of this year by Sheriff William Taylor after it was reported to Taylor that Brown had marijuana growing in his tobacco bed and behind his house.

According to Taylor, Brown said he did not know how the plants came to be on his property but nevertheless he was indicted by the grand jury for cultivating marijuana and later released on bond.

A burglary at the home of Donald Gabbard on March 11th of this year resulted in the indictment of Bruce Potter. Potter was indicted by the Grand Jury for being in possession of a stolen Kraco AM/FM in-dash radio, which allegedly came out of Gabbard's car month.

Since January 1st of this year, Rockcastle's Grand Jury has handed down 95 indictments.

The Grand Jury will reconvene on August 16th.

## Fiscal Court offers hospital contract to take over ambulance

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has offered the Rockcastle County Hospital a contract to run the county's ambulance service.

The offer came during a called meeting of the court Tuesday, July 19 when the court voted unanimously to offer the one-year contract to the hospital.

If the hospital accepts, they would receive an \$18,000 subsidy per year to help operate the service. County Judge Executive Bob Jasper said Monday that before the ambulance service referendum was placed on the ballot

last November, the county was spending about \$4,200 a month to operate the service.

He further said that after the referendum was defeated, the county was forced to begin cutting back on the amount they spent and that, as of January 1st of this year, the county has been paying only what they could afford.

"Sometimes the amount has been as much as \$3,000 but other times it was less. We just paid them (the ambulance service) what we could af-

ford." "I've made a thorough study of our financial situation and \$1,500 is all we can afford right now," Jasper added and further said, "We will not have any control over the service if the hospital ac-

cepted the contract we have offered them. All we will do is help out financially with the \$1,500 per month.

The hospital board met Tuesday night of this week to decide on the proposed contract but thus far, no information has been released from the meeting.

## Northern's dog business, Wildie

Bob Northern belongs to a different time. He seems out of place in our 1980's world of computer software, microwave ovens and video games.

Northern lives without electricity, indoor plumbing and government. Getting to his home in Wildie, Ky., take a vehicle that can maneuver a rough road and two legs that can maneuver a half mile path through a wooded area to the clearing where he lives.

His self-imposed isolation hasn't kept hundreds of visitors from walking that path over the years.

A lot of his visitors come to see what Northern is famous for his dog, Wildie. As a boy, he had as many as 77 to water and feed and sell.

He advertises his merchandise with a white cardboard sign that hangs on a shed near his house. The hand lettering says "Bob Northern, Dog Business."

When Northern comes into view he is sitting in front of his house on an old, overturned freezer. In the heat of the late July afternoon he wears a beige shirt, blue jeans overalls with rolled up cuffs, yellow-stamped belt and work boots. He sports an old hat with a faded blue bill.

Rough-built wooden doghouses are scattered around the edge of the clearing and their restless inhabitants bark and rattle their chains. Another 30 Northern sits calmly and fans himself with an old Maloney's Back to School Yearbook. He is 84 years restlessly on his school-ars.

"One wonders what all the fuss is about two miles away where there's running water and electric lights and the 6 o'clock news."

Northern's most famous visitor is probably Cass Walker, the Knoxville Tennessee personality. "I've showed him dog 13 years," says Northern. "Cass comes from Tennessee every week or two weeks. He has been here twice in a week. He's about as good a feller as you'll ever run into in your life. I told him one time that if a man like him, wouldn't fool with me. He laughed and said, 'I don't see why.'"

Northern and Walker have known each other about 12 or 13 years, and on March 31, 1970, Walker took advantage of Northern.

Even though I'm disgusted concerning events at the Mt. Vernon ball park this year, I'm trying not to let it influence any rational thinking. Monday evening four teams were excitedly waiting to play for the title of first place Tournament winner of '83. All concentrations were on how to play against the other team until time drew near and we all realized the park manager had not shown to call any of the games. Many people drive from Stanton, Berea, Danville and other towns to play in a sport that is quiet important to each of them. No one, including coaches, had been informed before.

My intentions are not to speak harshly of this year's park manager, but to bring the conditions of which we play to the attention of our county officials and anyone who is interested. I more importantly am concerned with the women's softball game. We pay a tremendous \$175 (the same as the men) to play maybe 12 games. We don't get qualified people to call bases, we're rushed along so the men can play and most umpires have told us they would rather we didn't play because we were boring to watch.  
Many of you may be saying women don't need

to be out there trying to play ball but at home cooking, cleaning house and wringing dirty noses. I am married and a mother as the most of us are, 28 years old and have played for the last 7 years. I hold down two jobs and frankly playing softball in the summer is what I look forward to all year long. I just don't have the desire to sit at home watching Dallas and getting fat.

The main reason for writing this letter is for those of authority to heartedly consider our plea that we desperately need a decent place with fair treatment to continue a sport we love. For the last 3 years, I've heard the county was building a new ball park, yet we're still playing at the same old place. Why have we been checking on their own attention and consideration been given to the Little and Senior Leagues. These teams are great, but we are the ones who need to get away from our troubles and problems for at least the short time of our softball game. I intend to play ball until I'm at least 40, so with this thought in mind I speak for other women softball players that we shall beg, plead, fight and do whatever we can to get equal treatment in a decent ball-park. Believe us when we say, "We've just begun to fight."

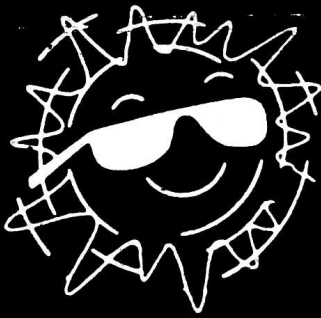

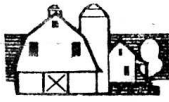

#### Blue Mold Present In Rockcastle

During the past two weeks, farmers here have watched news reports as surrounding counties reported blue mold appearing on tobacco crops. First reports came from southern counties like Pulaski, Wayne and Cumberland, where heavy infestations occurred early in the growing season have farmers worried. Last week, Madison County along with several South Eastern counties have reported active blue mold.

Wednesday, July 13th, blue mold was also found in Rockcastle County. Active blue mold was identified in old plant beds in the Brindle Ridge section. Large amounts of young

actively growing plants with heavy moisture from dew and fogs along with the hot humid temperatures has encouraged blue mold to get established. Farmers are encouraged to destroy old plant beds by plowing or disking in past year, 90% of farms having blue mold in fields have also had near-by plant beds which showed severe damage from the fungus.

With tobacco nearing the lay by stage, farmers are encouraged to re-evaluate their blue mold prevention plan. Many farms have used ridomil as pre-plant applications either sprayed on the field or used against label direction of the setter water. However, with such an early arrival of blue mold and considering the previous methods, tendency for ridomil to run out during the later part of the growing season, farmers should consider applying one quart of ridomil at lay by. Now is an ideal time to apply that extra protection at approximately \$30 dollars per acre. Most everyone is aware that 20 pounds of tobacco would pay for the chemical, and blue mold has the potential of destroying much more than 20 pounds per

acre. After tobacco passes the lay by stage, leaving in the row will prevent chemical incorporation and also increases the amount of moisture held on leaves which will in turn make a more favorable environment for blue mold. Since ridomil can't be incorporated after lay by, the alternative would be the use of foliar insecticide sprays on weekly or after each rain sprays. The spraying would be more costly and time consuming.

We encourage farmers to act now before the alternative run out. Since heavy flea beetles, aphids and beginning horn worm damage is occurring, an insecticide spray can be done at the same time. Apply 30 to 60 gallons of water per acre with one quart Ridomil per acre along with 1 pound of insecticide as a Broadcast spray. The intention is to apply this to the ground and cultivate in as soon as possible. Spray hitting the plants does not hurt and the added orthene will give the needed insect control. Consult your label for further instructions.

Farmers finding blue mold in their fields, are asked to inform the Extension office. If you have questions concerning blue mold, contact Tom Mills at 256-2403.
